Great War centenary

With the centenary of the 1914-18 war commencing this August, the time has now come to start deciding on some projects for the parish for at least later this year, if not over the next four years. An initial meeting in the autumn got together a small nucleus of residents to take matters forward but more help is required. A further meeting will now take place on Tuesday 7 January at 7.30pm in the village hall to which all are invited to attend.

Ideas to date include commissioning of a piece of public art recognising the conflict and all those who took part in it, a scanning service for residents' old photographs and ephemera so they can all be digitally preserved, a book specifically about life in the parish at the time and the changes that the war brought, together with a community play and a concert of music of the era.

The subject matter is vast so please let us have your own ideas and if you can't make the meeting please send them to the clerk to the parish council, Sarah Wood, via email clerk@sherston.org.uk or just phone them through on 840197.

As to funding, we are fortunate in that some £2,500 remains in the parish council's reserves, representing the profits from the book 'Heroes All' published in 2005. Grant finance is also available from the Heritage Lottery Fund.

Christmas vouchers

Vouchers to the value of over £3,000 were delivered to senior citizens in Sherston and Easton Grey by members of Sherston 1016 just before the festivities began. The vouchers can be spent locally in the Rattlebone Inn, Sherston Post Office Stores or Tucks Farm Shop. The vouchers, in the sum of £15 each, are available to any household in Sherston or Easton Grey parishes where a person who is 65 or over resides. Those widowed who are under 65 are also covered. Anyone who may be eligible but has not yet had a voucher and would like one should please contact Eric Thacker on 841344. All vouchers must be redeemed by 31 January.

Willesley defibrillator

Smile Out Loud

Or should that be laugh out loud? A packed village hall on the weekend of 29 and 30 November was very well entertained by Nick Burridge and Neil Forster at the launch of their Smile Out Loud book. The audience was also treated to special appearances from Kevin Smith performing some of the passages from the book.

Smile Out Loud is a book of poems and prose by Nick Burridge looking at aspects of modern life from a humorous angle. Nick poem's take the reader on a journey which starts with a smile and usually ends in laughter. The 98-page book also contains beautiful illustrations by Neil Forster.

After the launch, the remaining books were offered for sale at the second Sherston Market on Saturday 14 December. The colour book (£14) is close to being sold out but a black and white version is now on sale at the post office(£9). The show on both nights included readings from a number of Nick's poems, with an explanation of the inspiration by Nick himself. The evenings started with Nick reading his poem Dell Boy, penned after his experience when calling a computer helpline after his new computer died! This was followed by his amusing poem to D.O.R.I.S. (Digitally Operated Route Information System or SatNav) and other stories about modern life. The captivated audience was taken on an amusing tour alighting on a diverse range of subjects from the Taj Mahal to the London Olympics, Royal Ascot and our very own Sherston! The audience finished in the same place though – with a smile on their face.

Neil Forster kept the crowd enthralled with stories of his life as a foremost portrait artist. He explained the approach he takes to capture not only the familiar physical appearance, but the personality of his subjects. He also included a moving story about his visit to see the gorillas of Rwanda in 1986.





There was always going to be an appearance by 'Dame' Kevin Smith and what an appearance it was! But prior to a very personal reading of Nick's poem dedicated to his 'Dame', Kevin also performed as Arthur Shakespeare (Willam's lesser-known and very brummie brother), a Welsh outdoor-clothing salesman who Ernest Shackleton would have been very wise to meet before his ill-fated Antarctic expedition, Guy Fawkes and Sherston's lesser-known 1016 hero Douglas Gee!



To add to the funds for the cricket practice facility, three paintings by Neil, two fantastic commemorative collages of the London Olympics by Nick and a hand-crafted coffee table by Andrew Tremellen were donated to a silent auction which over the two nights raised over £1,500.

The Saturday evening included the draw for the Christmas Raffle with a first prize of a £500 hamper crammed with Christmas goodies.

All in all, the two evenings raised over £5,000 towards Sherston Magna's new practice facilities. Many thanks to Nick Burridge, Neil Forster and Kevin Smith for the fantastic show they put on and for the remarkable funds raised.

It is estimated that three in five people will become a carer at some point in their lives. The problem is that most people will not identify themselves as such – people simply consider themselves as a spouse, sibling, parent, grandparent or friend doing what they would be doing anyway. Many also mistake the word 'carer' with those providing paid care work in a residential home or domiciliary agency capacity.

Carer Support Wiltshire is a charity with a team of support workers who can provide information and support to carers living in Wiltshire, at the other end of the telephone, or face to face, along with accessing to counselling and advice relating to your role. Boules at the Rattlebone



David Strong

On Saturday 30 November at 2.30pm the Sherston band rang the church bells in memory of David Strong whose funeral was taking place at the same time in Lockerley Hampshire. The band rang call changes known as 'St Winnows', 'Twenty All Over on Queens' and 'Twenty All Over' and for half an hour or so the sweet but sad sounds of the half-muffled bells drifted over Sherston.

David, Anne and their family lived in the village for 18 years. Their four children, all ringers, attended the old village school and one of their boys, Rob, became a successful manager of the Rattlebone Inn. David taught Chemistry at Westonbirt School and was a very accomplished pianist and organist and could bring the church alive with his playing. He was a Lay Reader for Sherston Parish.

In bell-ringing circles, David was one of the national experts, serving for many years on the Central Council

of Church Bell Ringers. Under his captaincy, the Sherston Tower was the pre-eminent band in the locality, many times winning the district ringing competition. Despite his expertise he was always very approachable and helpful to those less gifted than he. His tuition and guidance were



always appreciated and valued by all who he came into contact with. As a measure of that respect, peals (a continuous ring lasting three hours) and many quarter peals have been accomplished in the Chippenham area, in Guernsey, Isle of Wight and throughout Hampshire dedicated to his memory. David himself rang 1,000 quarter peals and 159 full peals.

Walk on the wild side

Of mumurations, amnesties and joiners

We are now in deep winter, with many bird spending the winter here or changing their behaviour. Our native goldcrest is the smallest bird that is here all year round (see photo taken on a copse on the Cliff) and weighs half the weight of one-pound coin. (A pound coin weighs about 9 grams while a goldcrest weighs about 5g - just pick up a coin ...) What's even more amazing is that the goldcrest is joined by a close relative - the firecrest - which migrates here, although some do breed here. Can you imagine a bird weighing half the weight of a pound coin flying hundreds of miles?!

Our local population of starlings are joined by others migrating from parts of northern Europe. In mid-December, a couple of people made me aware that we had our very own mumuration of starlings. As you may have seen on wildlife programmes, starlings can gather together to form huge flocks that whoosh around the sky just before they roost at dark and form fantastic patterns. Sherston has (or had - as they may have moved since mid-December) our very own near the vineyard on the back road to Brook End.

The amnesty in the title is about what's in my garage. A couple of years ago, I bought a number of nest boxes, many of which have been installed. I do, however, have two sitting in the garage which I will be putting up in Grove Wood. If anyone has unwanted nest boxes, would you let us put them up in the wood?

This brings me to the final point. Barn owls are under significant pressure because of limited food supply at certain times of the year but also due to a lack of nesting sites. Is there anyone willing, with reasonable joinery skills, to build a nest box for barn owls? I have some of the material and can supply the design - and I am sure any other material can be



scrounged from around the village. The nest box is a bit bigger than a tea chest (for those who remember this endangered species!) and would need to be ready by the end of January to be installed in the wood. Precept 2014/5

Setting the precept for the next financial year has proved a difficult task not only for Sherston parish council but also for many other parish and town councils throughout the county and indeed the country as a whole.

Following an earlier decision by the Coalition affected the Government which calculation of council tax grants to local authorities the amount raised in April 2013 by the parish council through the precept for 2013/4 was reduced by £1,480. Fortunately Wiltshire Council made up the shortfall with a grant which ensured that no increase in the total precept figure had to be made for payment by parish council taxpayers. For 2014/5 however this grant has been reduced to £962 and the likelihood is that future grants will be reduced in line with the anticipated fall in receipts to Wiltshire Council from central government. Clearly this has implications for the future precept level of the parish.

Sherston's current financial position is sound but we do need to increase the precept to ensure that we can not only meet the reduced grant situation but also continue to provide a good level of services whilst at the same time maintaining a prudent level of reserves. In recent years Sherston's precept has been quite stable; it increased to £21,400 in 2008/9 and then to £22,400 in 2009/10 with no further rises until now.



Taking all these factors into account the council is therefore proposing a precept of £25,747 for 2014/5, which is an increase in the Band D council tax charge from £31.42 to £36.46. Council does not expect any more increases in the foreseeable future and considers that the increased annual amount per Band D household of about £5 for the year is acceptable.

The precept for the next financial year has to be agreed and submitted to Wiltshire Council by 21 January. The precept will be discussed and finalised at the next parish council meeting on 9 January.

A series of readings prepared people for the beginning of Advent, a time when Christians await the birth of Christ at Christmas time. Mulled wine and mince pies after the service completed the occasion.

Michael Graves, who lives in Hullavington, produces the newsletter of the Peter Warlock Society. He was interested to hear that the choir was to sing a piece by Warlock, a 20th century English composer. He came to the service and has written an article for the next edition of the Society's newsletter, part of which is included here with his permission:

St Mary Magdalene church in my village of Hullavington, Wiltshire, is one of nine in the Gauzebrook Group of Churches. Some months back an appeal was issued for singers across the nine churches to come forward in order to form an 'Advent choir' specifically to sing at a joint Advent service to be held in the Church of the Holy Cross in Sherston on the first Sunday in December 2013. The resulting choir had a few singers with experience, but most were not very experienced, indeed some choir members did not even read music. Nevertheless, the director of the choir, Katherine Bennett,

made the courageous decision to include Warlock's Adam Lay Y Bounden in the service.

I had heard that some choir members were, understandably, finding the piece difficult, but I was pleasantly surprised when I heard their performance. Yes, it was slightly rough round the edges in places, but it was essentially there and it sounded joyful. The choir certainly succeeded in that most important aspect of any performance – it sounded musical!

We all know that there are many amateur choirs around the country that achieve remarkably high standards of performance. There are also small choirs, often church choirs, where the members sing for the sheer joy of singing. It is so encouraging to think that up and down the country there are choirs, like the Gauzebrook choir, that are pushing themselves and rising to the challenge of performing difficult, but manageable works.



The Honest Truth campaign



Students aged between 17 and 24 will soon take part in a driving campaign in a bid to reduce the number of young people killed or injured in car accidents

Approved driving instructors in Wiltshire and Swindon will be delivering the campaign's eight key messages to students learning to drive, and explaining how these can influence and affect their driving.

The key messages the campaign, called The Honest Truth, promotes are not to speed; not to drive after drinking; not to drive while under the influence of drugs; to not use mobile phones behind the wheel; for everyone in the car to wear seatbelts; to not show off behind the wheel; to make sure you're properly insured; and how to avoid getting distracted while driving.

On average, a young person is killed on UK roads every 18 hours, while another suffers a serious injury every 90 minutes.

Although 17 to 24 year olds only make up about 10 percent of the population but in recent years they have accounted for:

- Half of injury crashes between 10pm and 5am
- Over a third of people arrested by Police after failing a roadside breath test following a crash
- Half of crashes blamed on excess speed
- Half of crashes involving only one vehicle
- Nearly half of injury crashes in the rain

By the time 17 year olds start learning to drive they will already have received at least one major road safety campaign presentation. In Wiltshire the Safe Drive Stay Alive roadshow has already been shown to more than 45,000 teenagers over the age of 15.

Whilst the majority are local teams, the rest are prepared to travel from other European countries and even from as far away as Wales. The French and the Welsh have a great track record with several teams having carried the Sherston Cup back to their home towns and villages over the years. Many more go home empty-handed, but have often won the friendship of the locals and vow to return next time for another go. Sherston Boules and Carnival Committee will continue its long-standing commitment to distribute all the profits from Boules Day to local groups, charities and good causes. impressive amount for a small community of fewer than 1,500 residents.

Planning

On occasion there can be some confusion as to the parish council's role concerning applications for planning permission.

Firstly residents should be aware that all planning decisions are made by Wiltshire Council and not the parish council. Accordingly if you wish to comment on an application to those who decide it you must do so directly to Wiltshire Council within the specified time

The parish council is a statutory consultee in the planning process and is sent all applications within the parish upon which it can comment. If you wish to bring your own views on a planning application to the attention of the parish council prior to it considering the application at its monthly meeting these need to be sent to the Clerk to the council as soon as possible. The parish council has to keep to the same response times to Wiltshire Council as everyone else.

Residents should remember that they can also raise their comments on a particular application directly with their Wiltshire Councillor John Thomson – again within those all important time limits. Time is very much the key to have your voice properly heard.


