# Boules Day Car Parking – 13 July

Boules Day is fast approaching and this is a note to remind everyone of the parking arrangements as per last year.

The recreation ground will be available to residents (with permits) who have been asked to move their cars from the High Street and the diversionary roads. Stall holders with permits and disabled visitors may also park on the recreation ground.

Permits will be issued to residents nearer the time. The ATC will be managing the car parks as usual so please display your permits clearly.

We would kindly ask that residents move their cars from the centre of the village the night before, so that pitches can be set up in the High Street from 6.30am on the Saturday and the road diversion put in place.

We will be arranging for the High Street to be swept by a road sweeper at the end of the day (7 or 8pm), so could we please ask that you refrain from bringing your car back to the High Street until after the roadsweeper has finished, otherwise your area will not be swept. The High Street is officially closed until 9pm.

The sports field at Knockdown Road and Stretchline at Brook Hill will be available for visitors' / teams' car parking.

The Boules & Carnival committee are most grateful to Stretchline for making their car park available again this year. Thank you also to all of you who kindly park your cars away from your houses during Boules Day. We do appreciate your help.

# **Defibrillators**



The first defibrillator has been installed in Sherston by the gates into the village hall and shortly a second will be installed in Pinkney (near the crossroads just a few yards down the road towards the bridge). Willesley are deciding where to mount theirs.

In the event of someone having a suspected heart attack, immediately dial 999 for an ambulance. The ambulance service will then give you the opening code for the defibrillator box. (It is an insurance requirement that access is via the emergency services) You always need to push the 'C' button first to ensure the lock is clear.

The first thing to do is to give the usual first-aid responses - mouth-to-mouth, if needed, and CPR. The defibrillator should then be attached to the patient using the pads connected to it; there is also a protected switch to use if the patient is younger than eight. Then press the 'on' button and follow the instructions.

We have arranged two courses for Saturday 21 September in the village hall; one from 10.00am to 11.30am and one from 11.30am to 1.00pm. Please let the parish clerk (Sarah Wood, tel. 840197 or email clerk@sherston.org.uk) know if you wish to attend (and which one) so we have some idea of numbers.

# Take notice

The notice board by the village hall entrance is the property of the Boules & Carnival committee and after this year's event it is going to be cleaned up and repainted.

The board is very heavily used not only for local events by community groups, which was its original purpose, but also by businesses. So many notices are now appearing that some 'rules' are having to be introduced to keep the board both tidy and relevant:

# Easton Grey – Roll of Honour

One of the most poignant parts of any remembrance service for those who have fallen in defence of this country is the reading of the Rolls of Honour. In Sherston, the names of all those in the parishes of both Sherston and Easton Grey are read out. There is, however, a difference in that, whilst the full names are read for Sherston, sadly only the initials and surnames are read out for the majority of those who fell from Easton Grey.

As we near the Great War Centenary, next year Cilla Liddington, Martin Rea and John Tremayne are determined to right this anomaly and try to discover the full names of the 29 men from Easton Grey who we remember every November. Not all of these would have died in the Great War but certainly the majority are thought to have done so. The number 29 is surprisingly high for a village the size of Easton Grey, especially when compared to Sherston which lost a total of 52 men.

# 'Those Wide, Open Spaces'

### A SAD TALE FROM A WILTSHIRE VILLAGE

From our Special Correspondent

You must keep to the straight and narrow path if you live in Sherston (Wilts). For if you stray from that path you are lost in a No Man's Land of potholes and puddles.

This path of virtue leads down the centre of the High Street. It is a very wide High Street, about a hundred feet wide, far too wide for the Wilts County Council, who have driven a beautiful road through the middle of the wilderness of a street and have washed their hands of the 36-foot margins.

There once was a time when it used to be repaired. That was in 1917, when the Rural District Council mended it, but now the R.D.C. has been absorbed by the Wilts County Council. The motto of the Wilts County Council is 'a metalled road or nothing' and since they decline to construct a highway of by-pass dimensions through Sherston, the margins have fallen into a decline, then into decay, thence to a ruin, and, by this declension, into the condition wherein they now stand.


### **SNARES AND PITFALLS**

This is very sad for the cottagers living on each side of the street. At night they fall into snares and pitfalls as they wend their way home at closing time, and in the morning they are cut off from the world by a sea of mud. The children are compelled to wade to school. The Parish Council have approached everyone, from the lord of the Manor to the Ministry of Transport, but the Wilts County Council, whose responsibility it is, decline to take any action. The traffic due to the local fair, which is held twice yearly in the High Street, is reducing the road surface to a worse condition every year.

In the Church is an ancient statue of a Saxon hero who fought in a battle in Sherston in 1016. His name was John Rattlebones. After driving through Sherston yesterday I know why.

(Thankfully, no such problems nowadays with Boules Day!) Cilla Liddington

# Sherston School gets scientific



Sherston School was turned into a series of laboratories for its science-related activities week in May. # High Street


Frustratingly, the much awaited improvements to the High Street are not now due to commence until the middle of August. This is due to a change of main contractor to Wiltshire Council as well as other important works in the area connected with the electrification of the main railway line to South Wales. Furthermore the new contractor has insisted on health and safety grounds that the road itself is closed to through traffic for a 12 day period. 

# Footpaths Group

This month sees the group's fifth birthday and this is a good opportunity to look back at what has been achieved over that time.

The group, which is a subcommittee of the parish council but which consists entirely of residents other than the chair, started as a reaction to the poor state that some of our local footpaths had got into and a determination to improve them, coupled with an intention to encourage as many people as possible to take up walking in the parish. Today, and with the help of Wiltshire Council's Right of Way (RoW) department - in particular our area RoW officer, Stephen Leonard - the paths are in the best condition they have been in for many years. The publication of the Sherston Walks booklet has been a great success, with some 600 copies sold and a new edition being planned with an additional walk to Alderton and Luckington. Sue McKechnie's walks have become a regular feature and introduced many to enjoying the beautiful countryside surrounding us. All this has led to a great increase in the number of people walking in the parish, be they residents or visitors.

The group has always sought to have good relations with local landowners and this has brought great benefits, with a number of issues that could have dragged on for years having been resolved quickly and most amicably by a quick meeting or chat on the telephone. Where there are some long-standing problems (and we have only one or two), matters have improved greatly even if they are not yet completely resolved.

As to the future, we will continue to seek improvements to the footpaths where needed and help maintain them through our small working party. We have a project to increase the number of kissing gates and are presently looking at a number of possible sites where they might be appropriate. Sherston Walks will soon not only be reprinted but also made available on the internet, with its own website. Some of our members are involved in developing the White Walls Way – a 20-mile circular walk taking in Malmesbury, Foxley, Norton, Sherston, Alderton, Luckington and Easton Grey which should be up and running by the autumn.

# Neil Forster picture and Draw

As one of the older members of the village of Sherston, I was delighted to win the wonderful pastel drawing by Neil Forster so kindly donated by him for our Old School Project.

This brought back many memories of my childhood days at the old school as a five year old. In those days even a youngster was expected to, and did, run home to a mid-day meal at 12.00noon. In my case down Gaston Lane and 'the Gastons' to Lower Farm and back again by 1.00pm.

There were just three cars in the village in the early 1930s! One of these belonged to the doctor while the district nurse and midwife travelled by bicycle - very essential as you can imagine.

Our old post office was situated at the top of the High Street in those days. My memories of it as a lad were its illuminations in the winter by paraffin lamps and its possible 45 degree temperature provided by a single, smelly, paraffin stove, electricity not arriving in most of Sherston until 1937 to 1939 with the remainder after the 1939 to 1945 war. Stamps were three for 5p Paul!

Next to our post office was our village tailor Mr H Smith, who would sit cross-

legged in his shop window, skilfully making madeto-measure garments for our village aristocracy. The Duke of Beaufort was one of his customers. His heat was provided by a coke burning stove which also kept his very heavy iron constantly hot.

We should all be grateful for the recent hanging of the bell in its tower and our new post office and stores. Some good and clever people live in Sherston.



# Walk on the wild side

It's all happening...

This time of year is very exciting, with many birds, animals and insects breeding and their young starting to appear. Around the village we have lots of jackdaws nesting in chimneys and under eaves, and house martin chicks almost ready to leave their round mud nests which can be seen on some houses on the High Street. It's also possible to see house martins collecting mud to repair their nests in the stream next to Stretchline, as well as swallows diving into the water for a bath. (Swallows are the ones with the red patch - doesn't quite come out in the Cliffhanger black and white pictures.)



If you take time to sit at the top of The Cliff with a pair of binoculars, it's quite amazing what is nesting, flying and crawling around the steep slopes. There are bullfinches, tree sparrows and linnets (see photo) among others, as well a good variety of butterflies, such as the common blue, peacock, brimstone and comma. There are some 15 types of butterfly you may find around Sherston so, with a bit of patience, you may spot quite a few just on walks around the

village. A number of the species only live as adults for a few weeks but, with a bit of background reading (try www.butterfly-conservation.org as a good source), you can plan to see specific species. Lots of moths and other insects are around too, including some beautiful damselflies along the river in Grove Wood.

There are a couple of birds we are unlikely to see this year due to the low water level in the pond on The Cliff. Last year, we had coots nesting and, up to a year ago, there were little grebes (or dabchicks) but there just isn't the depth of water to attract them to breed this year, although there is a little egret around, which is the first time I have seen one here in the summer.

In July, the bird populations will increase as a result of the breeding season, with many fledglings and many birds starting a second round of nests.

# What's happening with the Vicarage?

After a meeting with the Archdeacon recently, we've decided to answer some questions about the plans for Sherston Vicarage.

Why don't we have a Vicar in Sherston anymore?

When Reverend Malcolm Ross retired, the five parishes around Sherston were combined with three parishes to the south: Norton, Hullavington and Stanton St Quintin. Canon Andrew Evans was Vicar for this new Gauzebrook Group of eight, continuing to live in his Rectory at Stanton, and Reverend Eve Pegler was curate, based in Sherston Vicarage for her allocated four years here. When Reverend Christopher Bryan was appointed, Stanton Rectory was given as his home. However, the whole ministry team are responsible for Sherston, and Reverend Susan Harvey lives here.

### Why wasn't the new Vicar put in Sherston?

Bristol Diocese plans to redevelop Sherston Vicarage, which has become dilapidated, and build a new Vicarage on the site. This is official Deanery and Diocesan policy.

If the Vicarage is in a bad way, why is it being let out?

Good question, and I must admit it puzzles me! I think the answer is that if a house is provided as part of someone's job, it needs to be provided at a

certain standard. If that same house is let on the open market, it is up to the prospective tenant if they wish to take it, on an 'as seen' basis. Also, a tenancy allows the flexibility needed for when the house will be developed.

### So why is that taking so long?

In order to pay for the rebuild, the Diocese needed to build around three extra houses on the site. Local planners objected to the plans and a stalemate ensued.

Will a new Vicarage ever be built?

Yes! If the Sherston Neighbourhood Plan being discussed by the Parish Council is passed, with the vicarage site being put forward as a development site with the Diocese's requirement that any development must fund the building of a new vicarage on the site, and the Diocese would also look sympathetically in gifting a proportion of the rear of the site for additional burial space.

### Is there anything we can do?

The formation of the Gauzebrook Group and the temporary loss of a resident Vicar has been difficult for the parish, but we need to put that behind us and make the most of the situation we are in. The PCC is asking villagers to support the Parish Plan, including the extra houses needed to fund the Vicarage.



# A date to remember

In three years' time, midsummer 2016, it will be the 1,000th anniversary of the Battle of Sherston, and many residents have expressed a wish to mark this important date in a suitable way. After discussions with several local groups, it has been agreed that the main celebration will take place on the weekend of 25 and 26 June 2016, close to midsummer. Sherston 1016, the village's charitable group, has booked a Viking reenactment group to bring an air of authenticity to the village for the weekend. Although the Cliffhanger is such an established part of Sherston's life that it seems it might have been published for a thousand years, we have not yet found the back copy from 1016 with definitive details of the actual event, so the re-enactment may not reflect the correct date or location of the battle.

The battle of Sherston is significant in English history. At the time, Wessex is likely to have been a fairly unruly place. The English King, Edmund Ironside, was struggling to maintain order and when Canute, son of Forkbeard, and grandson of Bluetooth, King of Denmark and Norway invaded, King Edmund fought three battles, including one at Sherston. Aided by John Rattlebone, whose story is well known in the village, the battle ended indecisively and Canute and Edmund Ironside went on to a further battle later in

the year. By December, Edmund Ironside was dead and Canute was crowned King of England. Canute brought peace to much of England and this proved to be a defining time in our history. To mark this, the Parish Council is facilitating the development of plans for a celebration and commemoration of this important national event.

2016 will also be the centenary of a number of events from the Great War of 1914 to 1919 and we have consulted to choose a date that will avoid a clash with significant anniversaries from that period. We are planning that the anniversary of the battle of Sherston will be an opportunity for residents of the village to enjoy this weekend with a Viking and Saxon theme, and to reflect on Sherston's role in English history. As well as a re-enactment of the battle, it is hoped that there will be a Saxon / Viking fair, as well as a church service, to record Canute's support for the church in England, so there will be many opportunities for young and old to look and participate in a number of interesting and exciting activities. We are also exploring links with our Danish connections. We will use the Cliffhanger to keep you informed of planned events, both in the period leading up to the midsummer anniversary and for the anniversary weekend and in return we ask that if individuals or groups wish to arrange or suggest activities during this period that they consult with the Parish Council to avoid unnecessary clashes.


# Christian Aid Week 2013



#### Measles

We are sure you are aware that there is considerable concern about the measles epidemic in the UK, which could potentially spread towards Wiltshire. We are taking part in a national catch-up campaign which aims to give the MMR vaccine to all unvaccinated schoolchildren aged from 10 to 16.

Measles is a horrible illness and can be associated with serious complications, including fits, meningitis, hepatitis (inflammation of the liver), pneumonia and deafness, and rarely can be fatal. Due to the success of earlier vaccination programmes, it was extremely rare in the 1990s, but following the now completely discredited research of Andrew Wakefield there was a serious drop in coverage, leading to the disease becoming more widespread.

This MMR vaccination catch-up campaign aims to prevent further measles outbreaks, following the recent outbreaks in Wales.

Speaking at the launch of the national MMR

catch-up programme, Professor David Salisbury, director of immunisation at the Department of Health, said that the outbreaks in Wales had been 'a wake-up call for parents', and warned that 'what is happening in Swansea could happen anywhere in England'.

Professor Salisbury urged parents to get their children vaccinated with MMR if they were unsure whether they had previously had the jab.

If your child has not been fully vaccinated please consider contacting the surgery to arrange to have your child vaccinated.





# Cricket

### Captain's report on the performances of the Sherston Magna league side.

I couldn't have hoped for a better start to my leadership of the SS magna. Firstly playing seven games out of nine to date is something of a miracle compared to the weather of last year! Secondly we have made an excellent start to the league season being top after eight games (six wins with two cancelled). Here is my report on the league games so far.....

### 4 May - Oaksey (won by 145 runs)

The league season began with a home game against Oaksey, the ground looking splendid for the first week in May saw me lose the first of four tosses and we were asked to bat. A slow but secure start from the openers gave the platform for 16 year old Ewen Kenny to unleash 20 overs of savagery on the Oaksey bowling finally being out in the last few overs for his maiden hundred (113). Sherston finished their 40 overs with full batting points on 229 for 8. Some top quality opening bowling from Ollie Moore and Andy Pegg put the chase out of Oaksey's reach with Ian Gould (6 for 36) and Harry Stevens (2 for 3) ensuring maximum points for Sherston with Oaksey finishing 87 all out.

### 11 May – Ashton Keynes away (abandoned)

A return to the dark days of last season with wet weather encouraging Ashton Keynes to call the game off late on Saturday morning. A squad of Sherston players left frustrated.

### 18 May – South Hill (won by 96 runs)

In our second home game of the season, we (yes we) lost the toss and were once again asked to bat. Another secure start was built on by Phil Cavey (59 not out) and a late cameo from Ian Gould (20 in quick time) pushed the total to 177 and four batting points. Again a tight opening spell from Andy Pegg accompanied by Ian Gould put South Hill way behind the required run rate, although plenty of wickets to take. On came Harry Stevens with his left arm tweakers and bowled superbly to finish with six wickets for seven runs and South Hill were all out for 96 giving the magna a 19 point win.

### 25 May – Coates (won by 28 runs)

There was no change in fortune at the toss in our first away match at Coates, again Sherston being invited to bat first. Another solid start was followed by some impetus from Will Matthews (41) and myself (33) to get Sherston within a whisker of full batting points on 192 all out at the end of our allotted 40 overs. Some early wickets and some superb catching (from me by the way – happy to discuss over a beer or two) restricted Coates at one stage to 55 for five.

Some hard hitting from their skipper made the game closer than it should have been but a silly run out left Coates short and they were eventually out for 164 with Andy Pegg claiming 3 for 25.

### 1 June - Bibury (won by 99 runs)

Yes, you guessed it. Toss lost, Sherston batting first.... However not the solid start we had been accustomed to with Chris Lovell dismissed for 0. This did though bring Richie Cartwright to the crease who scored a majestic 76 on a very slow pitch (well Matt Goodwin at the other end made it look slow and hard to bat on!) A total of 195 always looked a good score. However Andy Pegg and Ian Gould again opened the bowling in miserly fashion! With Bibury needing well over a run a ball on came the spin twins, James Kutchera (3 for 14) and Harry Stevens(3 for 21), who whirled away to dismiss Bibury for 96 resulting in another 19 points win.

8 June – Avening and Cherington (won by 4 wickets) Stop press, I won the toss and put Avening and Cherington in to bat. On a tricky wicket, Ian Gould managed to extract some movement to remove two of their top four batsmen both being taken sharply by James Kutchera at slip. Just when they appeared to be looking to set a tricky total, another excellent spell from Harry Stevens (5 for 15) who has now taken 16 wickets at 2.86 runs apiece, supported by some sharp bowling from Ewen Kenny meant they were all out for 119. The run chase could not have started worse... one over down and Sherston were 0 for 2. Some resolute batting from myself and Andrew Jarvis (the older one...) steadied the ship before Andrew took the game to the bowling to finish with 66. Although there were some nerves at the end, the game was won and 18 points brought back to the shire.

### 15 June – Poulton home (abandoned)

This looked like the game of the season to date with first against second and both teams unbeaten; however a monsoon ended any chance of a game shortly before the start.

### 22 June – South Cerney (won by 9 wickets)

Another fabulous performance. It was a good toss to win but super bowling from Ollie Moore (Five overs, four maidens, three wickets for one run!), Andy Pegg and Ian Gould at the start saw South Cerney with 12 runs for five wickets and out of the game. Eventually making 72 all out on a poor pitch still did not look enough and solid batting from Matt Goodwin, Chris Lovell and Richie Cartwright saw us to 19 points and a nine wicket win.

#### The future....

So after eight of the 18 league games we are top of the league, and if the spirit and commitment of

the players remains it should be a good year! Thanks to those who have made themselves available, it's been a pleasure to captain!

I was surprised at the enthusiasm of members for this suggestion particularly those of senior years. Attics, cellars and sheds are apparently being furiously scoured for photos, newspaper cuttings and memorabilia of all description. I hope to reveal the site details next month but until then the Order wishes those upstarts in the Boules & Carnival Committee a very enjoyable and dry Boules Day.



Wiltshire County Athletics Championships

Those of you who frequent the rec on Monday or Wednesday evenings may well have noticed an odd pair of new-comers these last few months: not odd in that they threw a Nerf Howler back and forth but odd in that they also spent a lot of time taking big strides up and down the field with a measuring wheel thrown in to boot. Early risers may also have come across the same pair circuiting Pinkney and the game-keeper's lodge before spending far too long talking to the horses in the fields behind Gaston Lane. (And yes, I did say 'talking to the horses' so you can't tell me they're not odd now!)

This strange behaviour culminated in a trip to the Wiltshire County Athletics Championship on Saturday 25 May where athletes from all over Wiltshire met at Tidworth Oval to compete. One of the aforementioned pair, Alex Burgess, was entered in the Under 11 QuadKids County Championship with the other, Alex's father, tagging along behind (as was often the case on their morning runs).

Quadkids involves four events; each event is scored and then the scores are totalled to decide the winner. The events are: Long Jump, 75 metre Sprint, Throwing the Howler (a javelin substitute) and then the 600 metre. The weather on the day was perfect; a hot sun with no clouds in the sky. (Some may say that hot and sunny is not the type of weather that athletes would describe as 'perfect' but I wasn't competing and it seemed pretty perfect to me.)

The first event was the Long Jump and Alex did well; his jump of 3.44, whilst not his season's best, put him second, just five points behind the leader. Alex's strongest event, the 75 metres, brought things even closer with Alex finishing 0.4 seconds quicker than the overall leader and reducing the gap to just one point. (It should be noted that Alex's time of 11.4 seconds was the fastest time of any of the four heats



of athletes - way to go Alex) On a roll, Alex overtook the leader with a fantastic throw and was two points in front after three of the four events. With just the 600 metres to go, it felt very reminiscent of Daley Thompson's golden Olympic triumphs in his final event, the 1500 metres; Alex just needed to hang on in there in the long distance race and glory would be his. Like Daley, Alex isn't a huge fan of the longer distances but spurred on by his fantastic performance so far and his dad bellowing encouragements like, 'Get a move on then!' who could doubt that he would shortly be crowned Wiltshire U11 champion?

Unfortunately, Alex's father had omitted to fill him in on all of the details of Daley's heroic exploits and, even worse, had not been able to drag himself out of bed the two weeks prior to the championships so we were left with a fifth place finish overall but still proudly bearing the title of 'Wiltshire's fastest U11 sprinter on the day'. Okay, so it doesn't exactly roll off the tongue but there's always next year and perhaps this will spur other budding athletes to join us on our quest to bring back athletic gold for Sherston!






In addition, everyone was treated to two outstanding sporting displays, from the school gymnastics and fencing teams.
