# Meet Baron and Oswald



Until Young's ceased brewing their beer in Wandsworth, Baron and Oswald used to pull the drays stacked with barrels of beer, delivering them to all the Young's pubs within a three mile radius of the brewery. Due to the heavy traffic in Wandsworth, the horse drawn delivery took no longer than if it were by motorised vehicles. In their heyday, the Young's shire horses appeared at all the county shows and have previously pulled the Lord Mayor's coach. Relieved of their work duties, they now have time to attend charitable events and thanks to Jason Read, landlord at the Rattlebone, they will be coming along to Sherston on Saturday 13 July. The dray they will be pulling in Sherston is the box bottle van they used to deliver crates of bottled beer from the brewery. Built in 1926, it weighs 950kgs before being stacked high with crates of beer but Baron comes in heavier at an impressive 1060kgs. Baron stands 18.1 hands tall and Oswald 18.2 and both are 11 years old. They have been working for Young's since they were five and two respectively. It was usual for the commercial breweries to take the geldings after they had been broken in as the farmers kept hold of the mares for breeding and work on the farm. Baron and Oswald will be offering rides in the dray on Boules Day afternoon from the Rattlebone to the Carpenters Arms and back again, look out for them and take your place in the queue at the Jubilee tree. Check timings in July's Cliffhanger. Donations welcomed – all proceeds to the Boules and Carnival fundraising total. With huge thanks to Young's Brewery and Jason for making the visit possible.

# Have you noticed anything different about the Old School?



If not – go and have a look. There is a bell in the bell tower!

The purchase and installation has been kindly funded by the Matthews family from Pinkney Park – for which we are extremely grateful as this effectively completes the Old School project.

The bell itself was supplied by a local charitable trust (the Keltek Trust) which is active in finding new homes for surplus and redundant bells. It is about 18 inches wide and was manufactured in 1892 by Charles Carr of Smethwick. Unfortunately the Trust is unable to tell us where the bell was originally hung (i.e. on a school or a church) but we are obviously pleased that its age is contemporaneous with the Old School.

The company that supplied the fittings and hung the bell for us is based in Radstock – Matthew Higby and Co – and has done a great job, carrying out all of the work without any fuss (despite being watched by an audience of under 5's - Busy Hands).

We hope you are really pleased with the outcome and look forward to hearing the bell being rung for the first time in the not too distant future.

# Proposals for double yellow lines in Sherston – have your say



Wiltshire Council proposes to introduce some waiting restrictions (double yellow lines) in Sherston under the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 and the Traffic Management Act 2004 to introduce No Waiting at any time on the following lengths of road:

Green Lane – both sides – from its junction with Knockdown Road to a point 15 metres east of that junction.

Knockdown Road – east side – from its junction with Green Lane to a point 12 metres north of that junction.

Court Street – east side – from its junction with Green Lane to a point 10 metres south of that junction.

Details of the proposed scheme may be seen at Malmesbury Library, Cross Hayes, Malmesbury during the hours of 2.00pm to 7.00pm Monday, 9.30am to 5pm Tuesday and Wednesday, 9.30am to 7.00pm Friday and 9.30am to 1.00pm Saturday until 10 June. Documents can also be viewed online a www.wiltshire.gov.uk/council/consultations/troconsultations/troparkingandwaitingsherston.htm Comments on the proposal together with the reasons for which they are made should be sent in writing or via the website to reach the Sustainable Transport Group by 10 June quoting reference LJB/TRO/SHER. The parish council understands that this proposal has been made after consultations between Sherston School and Wiltshire Council as a response to continued dangerous parking around the School. A response by the parish council will be made in due course.



## Sherston Living Churchyard

At last the spring has come and the churchyard has burst into growth and is alive with flowers. Many of them may be dandelions, which seem to be making a takeover bid for any grassy area they can find, but there are also daisies, primroses, Lady's smock, speedwells and cowslips in flower, with sorrel and marguerites soon to follow. The cowslips, which have bloomed in all three of the areas which were seeded with a meadow mix two years ago, are the best surprise as it is only this third spring that they have appeared. Visitors to the churchyard have greeted them as welcome reminders of a time when they were much commoner than they are now, some people remarking that it is the first time they have seen these flowers since they were young.

Before long the meadow areas should be alive with beneficial insects including bees, whose decline is being reported in the media as a potential threat to the human food supply. Even the small steps that are being taken in the churchyard can help to lessen the decline in the insect population and to preserve the world entrusted to our care by God.

Next month's session in the churchyard will take place on a different day - Wednesday 12 June – but still from 2.00pm to 4.00pm. This should be a more convenient time for those currently involved and newcomers are still warmly welcomed.

## Walk on the wild side

#### Not bad for an octogenarian.....

The national treasure that is Sir David Attenborough has been very busy of late. Not only has he been 'tweeting' every day on Radio 4 (tweet of the day) with one bird being discussed every day for 2 minutes with some 265 episodes, he has just launched a major review of the state of our environment entitled State of Nature covering the UK and our overseas territories.

As you may expect, the report makes quite mixed reading with some birds, animals and plants doing well with others almost disappearing from our countryside. On the downside

- Turtle doves have declined by 93% since 1970
- Hedgehogs have declined by around a third since the millennium
- The small tortoiseshell butterfly has declined in abundance by 77% in the last ten years

And we have seen this in the village with, for example, hedgehogs being really quite scarce. One species of plant, the corn cleaver, used to occur in arable fields but efficient farming methods, including herbicides, mean this plant is only found in three locations in the UK.

It's not all bad news and there are two great examples in the village. Around the village there seem to be increasing numbers of house sparrows. They have declined by some 70% but around the High Street and nearby they do seem to be in greater numbers. This year, for the first time as far as I am aware, there is a colony of starlings nesting in the blackthorn on the Cliff. The noise from these gregarious birds is quite something when they fly in to feed their chicks.

We are also fortunate that some of the more cryptic species (I mean that they are hidden) seem to be holding their own. Slow worms, for example, seem to be around the village in reasonable numbers. These legless lizards often occur in gardens and burrow into





the soil in search of slugs and worms. They have a number of quite amazing characteristics – they give birth to live young, they can discard their tail if attacked and then grow a new one and can live up to 30 years in the wild. Their main predator are cats against which they have no defence. They can be seen in gardens and in grassy areas but can be very hard to spot. The photo was taken on the Cliff in May this year and I have seen them on the steep parts of the Cliff.

Overall the State of Nature report makes quite difficult reading and it makes a very valid point that different parts of nature need different types of help. If, for example, we want to help barn owls we can put up more nesting boxes as the lack of suitable nesting sites can limit their ability to increase in numbers. Helping migrating birds or insects is much more complex as it may be really important to protect sites in west or north Africa where they stop over while migrating.

So what can you or I do to help? The first place to start is to get out and understand what we have around us. Join The Wiltshire Wildlife Trust or Butterfly Conservation or Buglife or the British Trust for Conservation Volunteers – they all offer ways of helping make a difference either through physical activities or more sedate one such as helping raise funds or working in their visitor centres.

We do have fantastic local wildlife which can be really quite surprising – just look for slugs mating at this time of year – quite amazing (if somewhat gross....)

## Report on Neighbourhood Plan Community Workshop held on 23 March

#### Workshop format

The workshop was an open public event held on Saturday 23 March between the hours of 10.30am and 1.30pm at Sherston village hall. Registration sign in sheets were provided to record attendees. A display was produced giving an overview of neighbourhood planning, setting out the draft objectives and the key issues identified to date, a brief history of the village, and a series of plans showing the known planning constraints, existing settlement limits, and walking distances from the village centre – all for the purpose of informing the later workshop discussions (copies of most of these documents were published in the April Cliffhanger). The same display was left out for villagers to view on the following morning in the village hall when visitors were invited to make written comments on any matters raised and put them in a comments box.

#### Workshop Overview

An introduction was provided by John Matthews (Chair, Steering Group) who provided an overview of the purpose of the workshop and introduced two speakers – Geoff Wright (an independent Planning Consultant and Urban Design Expert – representing CABE) and Ben Hamilton-Baillie (an independent traffic, transport and urban design consultant – also representing CABE).

Geoff and Ben spoke for about 45 minutes – setting the scene, explaining the benefits of preparing a Neighbourhood Plan, setting out some of the key urban design, planning, highway and transport issues that need to be addressed, identifying (from an outsiders' point of view) what they perceived to be the character and evolution of the village, and finally providing an overview of the workshop exercises to be undertaken in groups.

Five separate working groups were established – each with a facilitator. One resident member of each group was nominated from the outset to provide feedback to the Workshop.

#### First Workshop

- To consider what should happen and where;
- To consider how it could be delivered.

Each group was provided with a large scale aerial photograph of the village, a map showing the various sites that had been put forward by landowners in and around the village (following canvassing by the Steering Group) as having some form of development potential, and a note pad. Each group was asked to review the range of key issues that had previously been identified (or indeed any others that the group considered relevant) and then go on to identify where any of the specific ideas that emerged during those discussions could potentially be located. In addition



each group was specifically asked to consider the scale of housing development considered appropriate for the village over the plan period.

#### Second Workshop

- To sketch physical proposals;
- To add notes and policy suggestions to support your plan.

Groups then considered and diagrammed the potential development options that had come out of those earlier discussions. Notes were prepared to help explain the options being suggested. Each table then provided feedback on the scale, nature and location of future development anticipated in the village over the plan period arising from their discussions.

#### Workshop outputs.

The following represents a summary of the workshop findings.

#### Display boards

At the start of the meeting attendees were invited to indicate their support or opposition to the range of key issues that had been identified through earlier work on



the Neighbourhood Plan. In addition attendees were invited to make any written comments that they might wish to make on aspects of the emerging plan that they did not consider had as yet been fully addressed or indeed that they did not support. (N.B. As noted above this exhibition was left out on display in the Village Hall for a further 24 hours — to allow those unable to attend the Workshop to view the material and to make comments. Some of the comments left in the ballot box therefore, as reported below, will be from individuals who did not attend the workshop or listen to the discussions).

#### Workshop Feedback

A summary of the individual group feedback is given below:

#### **GROUP ONE:**

- Support level of development of between 60 and 80 housing units over plan period;
- Vicarage site to be used for new vicarage plus sheltered housing – to replace existing units at Anthony's Close – which could then be used for GP surgery/pharmacy with further sheltered housing above;
- Existing surgery to be used for offices when vacated;
- Relocate sports facilities from existing football field closer to the new school – and redevelop football field for housing;
- Require developer of football field to link that site into mains gas supply (located short distance to north) – and open up supply to rest of village;

- Funds from redevelopment of football field could be used to construct new sports facilities etc. (including sports centre; changing rooms; and parking);
- Consider whether North End Gardens could be redeveloped at some future date to provide additional housing.

#### **GROUP 2:**

- Support level of development of about 80 housing units over plan period – with mix of housing to meet needs of elderly, young and general housing market;
- Three locations considered as having development potential:
  - A land between Tetbury Lane and Sandpits Lane (north-east)
  - B land at north end of Tetbury Lane (north) C- land to rear of new school (north-west)
- Support new GP surgery proposal which could go on vicarage site with additional parking on recreation ground (to serve both the surgery and wider need);
- Provide land to allow for future expansion of school with Busy Hands next door;
- Expand and enhance existing sports field;
- Support construction of new vicarage;
- Support Superfast Broadband provision;
- Support balanced local employment on one of development sites.

#### **GROUP 3:**

- Support level of development of about 80 housing units over plan period – particularly for elderly and affordable markets;
- Any new build houses must be in character with AONB/Conservation quality of area and have sufficient off street parking, be sustainable (utilising for example solar tiles);
- Three locations considered as having development potential:
  - A Easton Town preferred (but N.B. Not available)
  - B rear new School second preference
  - C Tetbury Road third preference
- Consider recreation ground could be better used (a proper 'village green'). Suggest possibility of allowing some development alongside boundary with vicarage overlooking the green);
- Support provision of additional space to allow school to expand and improve facilities;
- Sports field to be retained and enhanced;
- More allotments suggest either on land adjoining football field or north of Sandpits Lane.

#### Group 4:

• Support level of development of between 60 and 80 housing units over plan period;

- Preferred location for additional development to rear of new school – allowing room for school to expand and pre-school facility to be introduced next door. Separate access via Butlers Close giving access to new GP Surgery and housing site.
- Retain existing areas of open space including recreation ground, football pitch, allotments, and village hall field.
- Support expansion of football field onto adjoining land to allow for improved facilities;
- Consider redevelopment of Anthony's Close to provide upgraded accommodation;
- Additional housing need for older people;
- Stretchline site should be kept in employment use.

#### Group 5:

- Support level of development between 40 and 60 housing units over plan period- including mix of affordable housing, general housing and for the elderly (including sheltered housing);
- Preferred location for additional development to rear of new school – with space for expansion of existing school, new pre-school facility and GP surgery and associated parking;
- All new build development must be of high quality design and sustainability;
- Alternative housing location on north side of Sandpits Lane (opposite North End Gardens);
- Vicarage site possible alternative location for GP surgery.
- Encourage new employment opportunities and retain existing where possible;
- Upgrade sports field increase size of playing area and provide new changing rooms and sports building (to meet needs of local teenagers etc.);
- Support provision of High Speed Broadband;
- Make better use of Village Hall field;
- Protect Recreation Ground from development (green lung);
- Support provision of more allotments Sandpits Lane?
- Encourage improved public transport.



#### Next Steps

The workshop outputs documented in this report will be discussed by the Sttering Group and will be used to help inform the policies and proposals to be produced for the Sherston Neighbourhood Plan. Further consultation will of course take place with the community as the neighbourhood plan develops.

## TREEtalk

#### Why not take a walk in the woods in June?

'Walk in the Woods' is the Tree Council's annual festival to encourage everyone to enjoy trees in the springtime. Throughout May and June, there are walks, talks and other events to get us out walking in local woods and parks. We're lucky living here; there's our own Grove Wood as well as many larger woodlands in Wiltshire and neighbouring counties to visit. Visit www.treecouncil.org.uk for more information about what's going on around the area this month.

Speaking of Grove Wood, have you been down there recently? After the woeful, early spring weather, everything is now bursting with life. One of the few advantages to the slow start is the profusion of flowers that would not ordinarily be blooming at the same time. Now that more light can penetrate the whole wood (yes, we have completed the whole stretch, not that we want to blow own trumpets again!), pink and white wood anemones, the occasional narcissus, lichen of varying hues, cow parsley and carpets of bluebells are vying for space. Take your camera and enjoy the spectacle as we've waited too long and it's over too quickly.

Top of the pops

It's no surprise that the bluebell has recently topped a Woodland Trust poll of spring flowers. Their beauty and link to ancient woods create a natural appeal for woodland visitors. Though the cold spring has resulted in flowering a month later than 2012, they looked fantastic throughout last month and many have only recently burst out.

#### Woodland Trust looking for help




The ash is not the only tree with an uncertain future. Other pests and diseases threaten our native trees and woods, says the Woodland Trust and they are inviting our help to tackle it. The trust is already working on a feasibility study with Defra and other organisations to see how to harness the power of 'citizen science' to help identify and monitor problems in woods across the UK. Reports of tree disease from the public via websites and smart phone apps will be screened by specially trained Woodland Trust volunteers so that information can be passed on to Forest Research scientists in the right format to help with their vital work. If a major bid for European funding is successful, this project will be scaled up later this year.

## THE ANCIENT ORDER OF SHERSTON MANGOLD HURLERS

Whilst members of the order struggle valiantly on with their so far almost disastrous efforts to grow this year's crop of mangolds here is an interesting article by Janet Clarkson on her excellent blog 'The Old Foodie' www.theoldfoodie.com

#### 'The Scarcity Root

Parson James Woodforde of Norfolk has left us with a wonderful legacy of descriptions of the food of the rural middle class in

the second half of the 18th century, but on 28 June 1787 he noted in his diary something of interest to himself as a farmer.

'Sr Wm. Jernegan sent me by Mr. custance a Treatise on the Plant called Scarcity Root'

The good parson was very up-to-date with his agricultural reading: the treatise was undoubtedly that of the Abbe de Commerell, who wrote the first known description in 1787 of a variety of yellow beet that was proving very useful as a fodder crop in the Rhineland. The origin of the name is interesting: originally 'mangold wurzel', or 'root of the beet', in a Chinese whispers sort of way it underwent a transformation to 'mangel wurzel', meaning 'Scarcity root', which was even more appropriate as the plant was able 'to constantly thrive, and to produce a very great crop, even when other kinds of roots and vegetables fail, and when there is a general scarcity of forage'.

Although this 'edible and salutary' plant was primarily grown as animal fodder, it was edible for humans too. Although one

writer did suggest it might also 'furnish an agreeable variety to the tables of the opulent', it was the poor who were the usual recipients of this new agricultural largesse. The root itself may have been cheap and wholesome', but it must also have been a culinary challenge; the leaves however were said to 'exceed spinach', and the stems and stalks of the larger leaves 'eat like asparagus'.

Virtuously wholesome the root may have been, but delicious and appetising - possibly not. Time-honoured ways of dealing with very ordinary edibles include making them into alcohol, and pickling them. As befits its German origins, here is a recipe from 'Mary at the farm and book of recipes compiled during her visit among the Pennsylvania Germans', by Edith M. Thomas (1915)

#### Pickled Mangelwurzel

A vegetable in taste, very similar to very sweet, red beets; in shape, greatly resembling carrots. Wash the manglewurzel and place in a stew-pan with boiling water and cook until tender (allow about an inch of top to remain when preparing to cook). Skin the mangelwurzel, slice and pour over the following, which has been heated in a stew-pan over the fire: One cup of vinegar and water combined, one tablespoonful of sugar, one teaspoonful of salt, a dust of pepper. Stand aside till cold then serve. Or serve hot like buttered beets.'

I am most grateful to Janet for her kind permission to reproduce her article and hope it spurs members on to grow a half decent crop this season!
