A Tiny Crawl and a Long Long Dig

Losing our mains water supply to 30 cattle in a field alongside the Foxley Road, where a new water main is being laid, brought back some childhood memories to me. The old main, laid to supply Bristol in 1933, had to be exposed to view in order to restore supply.

This was a cast iron pipe of 18-inch diameter, laid in 12-foot sections along the relevant roadsides. I remember my father putting me in one end and laughingly taking me out at the other end, me having crawled through as a four-year-old.

I just remember what to me was an army of men along the road.

He later told me that 1,000 Irish navvies had dug the trench by pick and shovel for the 15 miles from Shipton Moyne pumping station to Tormarton and hence to Chipping Sodbury, Yate and Bristol, not forgetting Sherston, which previously had an inadequate supply from its own wind-driven pump.

The Bristol Water workers could scarcely believe this when working their modern machinery.

The new semi-plastic pipe (which I am sure you all have seen around our village) being pushed together electronically, whilst the heavy cast iron originals are joined by nuts and bolts for the whole way.

Only during the last year is it showing signs of wear and leakage.

Not bad service to us all for 80+ years.

On 28 August the funeral of Kathleen Hillier, one of our eldest Sherstonians, took place in the Church of the Holy Cross, Sherston.

Kathleen was born in 1923 in the old farm house at Lower Farm. Having been taught at Sherston School, she was then taught to play piano and eventually organ by its then headmaster until his call up for the Territorial Army Service.

In 1948 she took over permanently as church organist and choir mistress, a role she was to fulfil for the next 60 years. During that time she played at literally thousands of services and for the baptisms, weddings and funerals of generations of villagers. She barely missed a service and whatever the occasion - christening, wedding, funeral or regular Sunday service - she prepared meticulously and always insisted on arriving at church in plenty of time in order to set up.

Its present organist, Mr Richard Creed whom she had introduced to the organ, played for her service whilst a large choir and congregation sang three of her most loved hymns.

An Apple a Day?

We've all heard the phrase, 'an apple a day keeps the doctor away', but is it based on fact or fiction? The theory seems simple enough, apples are healthy and in eating healthily you are less likely to fall ill; but is averting illness really that simple?

The phrase is said to have originated in Pembrokeshire, Wales, and its first recorded usage was in the 1860s. The saying originally claimed 'eat an apple on going to bed, and you'll keep the doctor from earning his bread', before eventually evolving to the form we know today. For the purpose of this 'investigation', we will assume that 'an apple a day' refers to the consumption of apples as opposed to any other uses. (Whilst throwing an apple at a doctor may keep them away temporarily, they inevitably come back a couple of hours later with a few mates and a blunt weapon!)

Several of the natural chemicals found in apples have positive effects on our health, including vitamin C, pectin and boron, which boost immunity, lower blood pressure and support bone strength respectively. Because of their acidic qualities, apples can act as a toothbrush, cleansing our teeth of unwanted bacteria (though this is not a good enough reason to stop brushing your teeth!). According to researchers at the University of Oxford, prescribing one apple a day to everyone over 50 would prevent or delay over 8,500 vascular deaths (such as heart attacks or strokes) every year. This is a similar result to prescribing statins (common anti-cholesterol drugs) to everyone over

With all of these health benefits to boast of, apples are clearly a great dietary supplement, but are they alone capable of keeping the doctor away? The basic answer, of course, is no. Doctors recommend a varied and healthy diet alongside our good old friend regular exercise as the best way to stave off illness. And, whilst the high acidity of apples may be good for cleansing your teeth of bacteria, they can also cause the erosion of enamel, and so are not flawless as a foodstuff. On top of this, they have a rather high sugar content.



So what can we conclude? Well, whilst an apple a day won't grant you a 'get out of jail free' card for the doctors, it may well aid you in minimising your GP visits. With research suggesting that an apple a day could help in warding off vascular diseases as well as bad cholesterol, it certainly wouldn't hurt if we all picked one up from the fruit bowl more often.



Lunch time closure of telephone lines

We have recently changed the lunchtime telephone service so that, instead of getting an answerphone message, our 'out-of-hours service' will take the call. Between 12.30pm and 1.30pm the telephone is answered by an operative who will be able to advise you of the options available to you and, if necessary, contact the on-call doctor at the surgery.

The reason the telephones are switched through at this time is to allow the staff to deal with the daily drugs orders, log them in and put them away, without the distraction of the telephones ringing. It is worth noting that the dispensary deals with approximately 6,000 prescriptions every month. Personal callers are still dealt with at the reception desk throughout the day.

Electronic Prescription Service

We are aware that many of our patients have been receiving letters from pharmacies advising them that they can have their prescriptions sent electronically to them.

However, this is a service that all our dispensary patients already enjoy from the practice dispensary. To protect your right to use the practice dispensary, please tell the surgery that you wish to continue to use the practice dispensary.

If you are asked about electronic prescriptions, you may also tell local pharmacies of your intention to use your usual practice dispensary.

If you feel that an alternative method of dispensing your medication would be of benefit to you, we would ask you to please discuss this with us first. We will do our best to accommodate any special needs. The dispensary is a vital part of the GP Surgery and we need to do all we can to ensure that it is fully utilised.

What is the future for NHS services in Wiltshire?

Wiltshire Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) is led by local GPs and we plan and pay for the majority of NHS services. Over the next five years, we know that, while demand for NHS services in Wiltshire will continue to increase, the money we have available to spend on these services will not increase at the same rate.

Modern advances in health care are helping people to live for longer than ever before which is a cause for celebration. However, this does mean that the demand for NHS services from the over-65s is expected to increase significantly over the coming years. As a result, the CCG needs to adapt the way we provide NHS services so that they better meet the needs of our ageing population.

How will we meet this challenge?

The CCG has developed a five-year plan to enable us to respond to this challenge. Our plan sets out how we can continue to provide high-quality but affordable health services in Wiltshire between now and 2019. We won't be doing it alone either. Our key partners like Wiltshire Council, GP surgeries, local hospitals and other NHS providers are vital to the success of the plan.

It will mean some major changes to the shape of health-care services in Wiltshire. Our vision is that health and social care services should support and sustain independent living and, as the organisation responsible for designing and commissioning those services, we are keen to make them both affordable and the best possible for local people.

Our model for the future of health care in Wiltshire is based on three key principles:

- 1. To encourage and support Wiltshire residents to take on more responsibility for their own health and wellbeing.
- 2. To provide fair access to a high quality and affordable system of care for the greatest number of people.

3. Provide less care in hospitals and more care at home or in the community

To achieve these aims we will need to change the way in which we spend our budget. We will:

- 1. spend more money on health education and prevention to help people take more personal responsibility for their health and wellbeing;
- 2. spend more money to improve community care and increase the range of services provided in a local setting; and
- 3. as a result, spend proportionately less money on providing bed-based care in hospital.

We are going to split Wiltshire up into 20 clusters of approximately 20,000 people. Each cluster will have an integrated team of GP surgeries, community nurses and therapists together with social worker support which will work together to ensure that we have a more joined-up system of health and social care.

How can you get more involved?

The CCG has already been carrying out a wideranging consultation about our five-year plan across the county. This has included public meetings, outreach events, and presentations to a variety of organisations. You may have been involved in one of these events?

Over the next few months the CCG will be giving presentations at the 18 Area Boards across the county. Each Area Board is planning a health fair with lots of different stalls for you to visit followed by presentations from the CCG and Wiltshire Council about our plans for improving health and social care. People in the Malmesbury area can now sign up for free messages - by email, text and voicemail - about policing and crime matters in their neighbourhood by joining Wiltshire and Swindon Community Messaging.

Wiltshire Police, Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) for Wiltshire and Swindon, Angus Macpherson and Wiltshire & Swindon Neighbourhood Watch Association have initially launched this new twoway communications tool which you can sign up to at www.wiltsmessaging.co.uk.

Malmesbury is one of four neighbourhood policing areas going live on Wiltshire and Swindon Community Messaging. The others are Pewsey, Swindon West and Warminster. People who live or work outside these areas can still sign up and they will receive messages as and when their area neighbourhood policing team starts to use Community Messaging.

PCC Angus Macpherson, who is commissioning this new initiative, said: 'Both my office and Wiltshire Police are committed to involving communities in the prevention and reduction of crime and antisocial behaviour, in line with priorities in my Police and Crime Plan and the Force Delivery Plan.

'Wiltshire and Swindon Community Messaging is an exciting new system allowing the police to send emails, texts and voicemail messages to those signed up. It means we will be able to share information quickly and efficiently with our communities, including Neighbourhood Watch coordinators and members.'

People signed up via www.wiltsmessaging.co.uk will be able to receive messages about policing and crime matters in their area, such as community policing news and events, appeals for information and crime prevention advice. They will also be able to reply to messages, feeding back information to their local neighbourhood officers to help them in policing their local area.

Splash Wiltshire



Sherston Neighbourhood Plan

The Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group organised an exhibition and workshops held over the weekend of 20/21 September in the Village Hall to inform local residents about the progress being made in preparing the Neighbourhood Plan and more particularly to seek views on a wide range of topics that are intended to be dealt with in the emerging plan. The event was attended by over 100 people. Questionnaires were handed out to all of those who came – seeking views on a series of issues relevant to the emerging plan. The answers to those questions will help steer the direction of the future plan.

For those who were unable to attend, we thought that it might be helpful to try and summarise some of the key information that was put on display and to offer local residents a further opportunity to make any comments on the various issues under discussion. Copies of all of the display panels and related information are available on the Sherston website http://www.sherston.org.uk/ . For those of you who have not as yet made any comments on the emerging plan – there is still an opportunity to do so. Copies of the questionnaire can be collected from the Post Office & Stores and should please be returned there completed at the latest by midday on Saturday 11 October.

The first part of the exhibition sought to identify and prioritise those core services, facilities and amenities that the village might wish to retain and/or safeguard from future development in the emerging plan. A map was displayed identifying the location of a wide range of community facilities and services, local businesses, and sites that were considered to be potentially worthy of protection (see below).

The first questionnaire asked individuals to indicate whether they supported a set of policies that sought to protect these various sites from development and whether there were any obvious omissions from the list (or indeed any sites included that it was felt should not be included). The questionnaire went on to invite people to indicate their level of support for a policy that sought to secure high-speed broadband compatibility for all new developments and finally asked about the desirability of preserving existing open-air sports facilities.

The second part of the exhibition, and almost inevitably the one that created most interest, was the section dealing with future development proposals. The first board sought to explain that after a 'call for sites' several landowners had contacted the Steering Group to indicate that they would be willing to make their land available for some (unspecified) purpose. A detailed appraisal of each of these sites had subsequently been undertaken by the planning consultants (Foxley Tagg) appointed to assist the Steering Group in selecting those considered likely to be most suitable for development from a sustainability and community viewpoint. The results of this assessment were presented and those






sites which had been identified as having the greatest potential by the Steering Group were shown in greater detail. The six identified option sites are:




Each of the individual option sites were then considered in more detail. This was portrayed at the exhibition in the form of a combination of a SWOT analysis (i.e. identifying the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats of each site) and a draft land use plan (i.e. identifying which of the particular range of development needs could potentially be met on each site). The six sites subjected to this more detailed appraisal were:




Site 1A – Sopworth Lane (to the rear of the new school) – which was identified as a potential mixed use development site considered capable of accommodating some new housing (10 units), a site for a new GP surgery, and room to allow for the future expansion of the existing Primary School and/or erection of a new pre-school facility should either be needed.




Site 4 – the Football Field (off Knockdown Road) – which is owned by the Parish Council and was offered up as a potential housing site (excluding the tennis court area) – but only on the proviso that a replacement site could first be found which would be suitable to accommodate an improved sports facility (including a new football field with changing rooms and possibly some additional indoor sports facilities). Most or all of the funding for any new sports facility to be derived from the sale of the football field for development (i.e. as a Parish funded scheme).




Site 6 – off Sandpits Lane – which was considered to have the potential to accommodate both a proposed relocated sports facility (to replace and improve upon the facilities lost if Site 4 were to be redeveloped) and a limited amount of housing on the site frontage.



Site 10 – the former Vicarage site (Green Lane) –which has been offered up by the Diocese as a potential site for a new vicarage (which it is suggested would be funded by the erection of 3 additional dwellings in the grounds). The rest of the land, at the rear of the plot would be reserved to allow for an extension to the adjoining cemetery.



Site 11 – at the corner of Green Lane and Sandpits Lane – which is an existing allocated housing site in the current development plan and which the Steering Group considered remains entirely suitable for housing development in due course.



Site 17 – at Easton Town (the land to the east of Easton Square) – which has been offered up by the landowner as a potential development site and which the Steering Group considered could be suitable for either a limited amount of additional housing or as a possible alternative site for the new GP surgery – with the land to the rear being an alternative site for the proposed relocated sports facility (should Site 4 were to be redeveloped for housing).

What is the housing target for Sherston?

The minimum housing target for Sherston is determined by the Wiltshire Core Strategy. The Core Strategy has determined that, over the plan period (2006 to 2026), at least 1,200 new homes will be provided in the Malmesbury Community Area (MCA) of which 510 will be provided in the villages.

This equates to a 12.45% increase in the number of houses in the MCA. There are currently 596 dwellings in Sherston so the increase required was calculated as 74 dwellings:

596 x 0.1245 = 74

However, oversupply elsewhere in the MCA means that this requirement has been reduced to 9.8%. Therefore, the target for Sherston is:

596 x 0.98 = 59 units

Furthermore

- 30 dwellings have been built in the village since 2006
- 13 dwellings have Planning
 Permission in the village

Therefore the housing requirement in the village is further reduced:

59 - (30+13) = 16 units

The Neighbourhood Plan <u>cannot</u> promote an amount of development smaller than that identified in the Core Strategy.

Therefore, 16 units is considered the minimum number of units that must be built in Sherston between now and 2026.

To put this in context—between 1999 and 2014 about 80 dwellings were built in

Two separate displays completed the exhibition. The first of these was an explanation by the local surgery as to why they consider that it would be prudent for the Neighbourhood Plan to consider identifying a site for a potential new surgery. (N.B. Copies of the explanatory leaflet prepared by the surgery are available at the surgery). The second display sought to deal with the question 'how many houses should be built in Sherston over the remaining plan period'.

It was explained that whilst there was a minimum number of houses that we really ought to be seeking to accommodate in the village (to ensure conformity with the Wiltshire Core Strategy) there was the opportunity to consider a higher number if it was felt that village services and facilities might benefit from limited further development. As anticipated, the issues raised by the second part of the exhibition were those most discussed during the two hour long workshops held on the Saturday.

A second questionnaire was issued to those who attended asking people to indicate levels of support for the provision of any or all of the following services/facilities – all of which would require land to be identified and safeguarded for such development in the emerging plan:

- A new GP surgery
- A pre-school facility
- Additional allotments
- Room for the future expansion of the Primary School
- Community Orchard

The questionnaire then asked individuals to indicate how many new homes they considered ought to be planned for over the remaining plan period (to 2026) – taking into account the information contained on the display boards - and to identify which (if any)

How many homes should be built in Sherston?

Although the Core Strategy has determined that Sherston must find room for at least 16 new homes by 2026, this is a minimum target rather than a maximum.

Should the Community deem it desirable, the Neighbourhood Plan could plan for a greater number of homes. There are of course advantages and disadvantages of doing so, some of which are addressed below:

<u>Advantages</u>

- Sherston has an ageing population meaning people stay in their homes longer. Building new homes may enable local young people to stay in the area who otherwise may not be able to find a house here.
- If the village does not grow the percentage of the population in work will decrease as the number in retirement rises. The local economy could suffer and the village stagnate.
- Encouraging new development will ensure that local facilities & services are well used and less likely to be closed.
- New housing development could deliver new facilities such as sport and recreational facilities.

Disadvantages

- New development will bring with it associated problems such as increased usage of roads and the problems associates such as congestion
- Sherston has limited brownfield or previously developed land to build on so greenfield sites will likely have to be developed.
- The whole of Sherston is in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty so any new development will impact upon the AONB.
- The relationship between the village and the countryside could be altered where new housing is built.

of the option sites that had been tabled they would prefer to see developed (depending of course on the level of development selected). A specific question was raised about the likely level of support for a mix of potential land uses on Site 1A (i.e. to the rear of the new school). Finally, respondents were asked to indicate which of the two option sites they favoured for a possible relocation of the "football field" (i.e. Sites 6 or 17) should that option be favoured and/ or alternatively, on the assumption that there proved to be no local support for the relocation of these sports facilities whether they considered that some additional land situated to the west of the existing football field (i.e. Site 3) should then perhaps be safeguarded to allow for its future expansion.

As mentioned right at the beginning of this article, copies of all of the exhibition boards and related material are now available for viewing online on the Sherston.org website. In addition, it is intended that the exhibition will be on display (albeit at different times) at both the GP surgery and in the church in the period leading up to the conclusion of this informal round of consultation. Copies of the questionnaires will be available for collection at both of these sites as well as the Post Office & Stores but must be returned there by midday on Saturday 11 October at the very latest.

The next step will be for the Steering Group to consider and analyse all of the responses received before determining how best to progress to the next stage of the plan – which will be to firm up some or all of these various policies and proposals before re-presenting them to the village in the form of a final set of options.

We will endeavour to report back on the outcome of this round of consultation in the next copy of the Cliffhanger. Watch this space.

News from Holy Cross Church

Sherston Lady Chapel hosts a reflective station, and at the beginning of September a wreath was laid on the grave of Private Neale, the first Sherston casualty of the conflict. The bells were tolled half muffled and this act of remembrance will be repeated many times as the centenaries are marked.

By the time you read this, the Archbishop of Canterbury will have visited Bristol and Malmesbury, but hopefully the excitement will have not died down! One follow-on event is through the Agnostics Anonymous group which has been meeting about once a month in a local pub. Genial conversation about matters of belief follows over a slow pint. It has been enjoyable and stimulating, so I've put another couple of dates in the diary: 14 October and 11 November, both at 8.00pm in the Star Inn, Hullavington. There might be scope to run a similar event in Sherston if there was enough interest ...

Children's work often goes to sleep during holidays, but Little Lights carried on running over the summer, sometimes with large numbers of children. This group for 0- to five-year-olds and parents/carers is restarting every Thursday at 10.30am in Hullavington Church.

Holy Cross celebrates Harvest on 5 October with a Family Communion at 9.30am. In the evening, at 6.00pm, there is a Harvest Festival service with a guest speaker, followed by a Harvest Supper. Another special service happens as we observe All Souls and remember those we have loved who have died. This will be on 2 November at 6.00pm. Please put the names of anyone you would like remembered on the list in church.

Meanwhile, in the Deanery, new Priests-in-charge are beginning their ministries in Cricklade and the Draycot Group. This only leaves the Braydon Brook Group vacant, which we hope will be filled this autumn

Finally, we welcome James Harris, an ordinand on placement, to our group during October and November. James currently works as the assistant to the Archdeacon, and is completing a part-time course at Cuddesdon. He is interested in finding out more about rural ministry and especially how we live and work together as a team of eight parishes.

Walk on the wild side - The Holly and the Ivy

Autumn has well and truly arrived, with many trees dropping their leaves and the bird migration in full flow.

Most of our summer residents have gone, such as the house martins and swallows, while not many of the winter migrants, like the redwing (a bit like a thrush), have departed their breeding grounds in Northern Europe.

Believe it or not, but some of our butterflies also migrate. The red admiral butterfly, which is quite common here in the summer, migrates north in May and then goes south again in September. In early September, I was fortunate to spend a week on a small island off the coast of Wales and there were literally thousands starting to move south across the Bristol Channel.

Even more amazing is the migration of a closely related butterfly - the painted lady - which is also quite common here in the summer. Not only does this small insect migrate from tropical Africa to the Arctic Circle, which is a feat in itself, but it takes six generations of them to achieve this. Each generation migrates only part of the way, with the following generation continuing the circular journey. This was only discovered fairly recently using, amongst other things, radar data. This just goes to show how little we know about even common insects that we take for granted.

The ivy growing over walls and up trees is another part of our natural habitat that's easy to overlook. It flowers in October and November and has flower buds that are greenish-white, often look like small drumsticks and are in little groups. The buds open to display tiny little green flowers that smell like elderflower and produce pollen and nectar, so are a really important late autumn food source for many insects. By December, the ivy is covered in black flat-topped berries which are a really important source of food for the winter bird visitors, such as redwings and fieldfares, as well as our resident birds.

This warm, reasonably wet summer has been fantastic for many birds and insects, so we may see larger-thannormal numbers of migrant birds arriving here in the next few weeks so a large food supply over the winter is really important.

Ivy and other berry-producing plants often grow in hedgerows and consequently hedgerows are a major source of food. These, however, are often trimmed/flailed in the autumn by farmers to keep things tidy which can be a disaster for wildlife - taking away important food sources just when they are needed. As a plea, is it possible to trim the hedgerows every few years rather than every year? It will start to look messy but nature really needs messy.

Finally, it's time to get the bird feeders out with a variety of seeds, fats, etc. Please do wash them out on a regular basis as there are some quite nasty diseases that spread from bird to bird. Last winter my feeders weren't used much (aside from the jackdaws and wood pigeons) as it was quite mild. This winter may be harder so please keep the feeders topped up!!
