



We are delighted to report that we have been awarded major funding from the National Lottery to help pay for the proposed rebuilding of the flat-roofed front extension of the Village Hall. This will provide a welcoming, larger, airy entrance lobby, with modern, more spacious toilets. Disability access will be improved. There will also be a small servery, with a sink, to enable interval drinks to be served for productions, concerts and events. A larger storage area will give extra space to store tables, chairs and staging. The design will be more in keeping with the original stone barn which is the main hall, and will feature the existing arched window.

The National Lottery had particular interest in the following proposals and wishes to see evidence when the project is finished:

Increased Use of the Village Hall by all sections of the community.

Accessibility: The layout and fitting of the toilets will be to modern building standards.

Drama Group productions, Rural Touring and other events will be promoted as being 'Wheelchair friendly'.

The Village Hall will be made a welcoming community hub to contribute to addressing problems of social isolation. The village hall will be open more often as a place to drop into, to see temporary exhibitions, local initiatives of interest and to socialise.

While we are extremely grateful to receive this award, we still have some way to go to reach our target to pay for the building work, which has an estimate of £250,000 including VAT. We have submitted several applications to other grant-giving organisations, but it may take some time before we know the results. Local individuals, businesses and families will be approached over the next few months to ask for donations. If you feel you would like to make a donation, please get in touch with those listed below or any member of the Village Hall Committee. You will have the satisfaction that you will have helped make a huge improvement to our Village Hall, the centre of social life in the village. To set the ball rolling, we have received a pledge of £10,000 from Sherston Parish Council via SOSCIC (Sherston Old School Community Interest Company).

On 26 and 27 June we hope to hold Information Days when the community will be invited to see the plans, and to 'buy a Butterfly' for £25. These will form part of wallhangings, painted on silk, to be placed in the new entrance lobby, each one to have the name of the donor. Other fundraising events will be held later in the year.

Recycling Solutions



Wiltshire Council collects the majority of our recycling: plastics, cardboard, paper and glass in the blue-lidded wheelie bin and the black box every fortnight, with the lists of acceptable materials given on www.wiltshire.gov.uk/recycling.

But there are a number of difficult-to-recycle materials that the council doesn't collect on the doorstep, so Sustainable Sherston has scoured the local area for solutions. Because of the Covid pandemic, several of the recycling avenues that were available have been temporarily suspended, so you might need to hold on to some of it if you have the space, to keep it out of landfills.

And don't forget, it's best to avoid goods that come with excess plastic packaging in the first place, and try to use the out-of-village recycling points only if you're travelling there anyway, otherwise the carbon emission from the journey will almost certainly exceed the environmental benefit of the recycling!

Plastic Bags

There's a lot of different soft plastics that come with the grocery shopping and deliveries. Single-use plastic shopping bags (which are best avoided), the slightly stretchy plastic bags that potatoes, bread, bagel, toilet rolls, etc come in, plastic that holds multipacks of baked beans, cola, etc together, and bubble wrap are usually low-density polyethylene (LDPE). This plastic, along with some polypropylene (PP), such as cereal box liners, is accepted by many of the big supermarkets, and Sustainable Sherston is hoping that the Co-op in the village will start taking it soon.

Tesco stores in Tetbury and Yate are currently part of a southwest group of 10 stores trialling a recycling scheme accepting all soft plastics, including crisp packets and pet food pouches. So at least for now, you can take everything there.

If you never go to either Tetbury or Yate, and your usual supermarket is only taking bags, for a trial period, Sustainable Sherston is collecting all clean soft plastics on Saturdays in a labelled wheelie bin at Joy's house at 3 Sandpits Lane.







Crisp packets

Crisp packets are often made from composite plastic, often with an aluminum foil liner. Walkers are paying Terracycle to manage the recycling of all soft crisp packets and you can look on their website (terracycle. com/en-GB/brigades/crisppackets) to see the collection points, the nearest of which is on someone's drive in Nailsworth.

Currently Tesco in Tetbury and Yate are accepting them, and as detailed above for a trial period Sustainable Sherston is collecting clean soft plastics including crisp packets on Saturdays in a labelled wheelie bin at Joy's house at 3 Sandpits Lane.



Pringle Crisp Cans

Pringles are also paying Terracycle to manage the recycling of their cans, by separating out the card, plastic, aluminium layer and metal base. The nearest collection points are shown on the Terracycle website to be in Bisley outside of Stroud, Charfield or Swindon.

Plastic Film

Film is made of various materials for varying degrees of permeability for food preservation, ranging from packets holding pitta breads or fresh salad, to films on punnets of grapes or on trays of fish or meat. Unlike carrier bags made from LDPE, supermarkets mark it as 'not yet recycled' and the majority aren't accepting it.

It's usually possible to distinguish film from easily recyclable LDPE, as film is usually crinkly and it splits easily, while LDPE on its own is slightly stretchy.

For now, Tesco in Tetbury and Yate are accepting it in their trial, and as detailed above for a trial period Sustainable Sherston is collecting all clean soft plastics, including film, on Saturdays in a labelled wheelie bin at Joy's house at 3 Sandpits Lane.







Petfood Dry Food Packets and Wet Food Pouches

Cat and dog food plastic packaging and pouches are commonly made from layers of plastic and aluminium, although there are moves by some manufacturers to remove the aluminium and make them easier to recycle.

Currently, on behalf of several pet food manufactures, Terracycle collects and recycles this packaging which needs to be empty and in the cases of pouches washed thoroughly. The nearest collection points from us, shown on the Terracycle website, are in Cheltenham and Bristol.

For now, Tesco in Tetbury and Yate are accepting them, and as detailed above for a trial period Sustainable Sherston is collecting all clean soft plastics, including thoroughly washed pet food pouches, on Saturdays in a labelled wheelie bin at Joy's house at 3 Sandpits Lane.

Printer Cartridges

The Parish Council is currently collecting printer and toner cartridges in the Sherston phone box outside Shear Class near the post office.



Wiltshire Council



Energy Efficient Light Bulbs

Wiltshire Council will accept low energy light bulbs at the recycling centre in Stanton St Quintin, so store them up at home until you are going anyway.

If you never go to the recycling centre, Sustainable Sherston is trialling collection of low energy compact fluorescent and LED bulbs (less than half a metre in length) on Saturdays in a labelled bin at the side of Ben's house at Dog Leg House, 19a Church Street.





Batteries

It's better to avoid single-use batteries where possible by plugging appliances in or using rechargeable batteries, but if you have spent ones or those that have stopped charging to dispose of, Wiltshire Council will accept them at the recycling centre in Stanton St Quintin.

Many shops and supermarkets that sell batteries often have recycling collection bins, but our recent trips revealed several don't.

Sustainable Sherston is trialing the collection of small used dry cell batteries, the standard 1.5 volt or 9 volt ones, old phone batteries and laptop batteries, on a Saturday in a labelled bin at the side of Ben's house at Dog Leg House, 19a Church Street.

Clothes, Pairs of Shoes and Textiles

There are lots of opportunities for clothes, shoe and textile recycling locally. If you have a hardly used Vivienne Westward ball gown or other good quality clothing that could be reused, we suggest you take it to a charity shop in Tetbury or Malmesbury!

At the other end of the scale, Wiltshire Council has confirmed they will take completely worn-out, ripped clean clothes, bagged to keep it dry, in the fortnightly black box kerbside collection. Clothes and shoes can also be recycled in the container in the village hall car park, with a small amount of the proceeds going to the Wiltshire Air Ambulance.

Recycling Tips

Did you know ???

Used aerosols can be recycled in your Wiltshire Council blue-lidded wheelie bin;

After rinsing plastic bottles and squashing, lids should to be screwed back on as they are too small to make it through the sorting machine on their own.

Soap pump dispensers containing a metal spring can't be recycled so should be removed before recycling the bottle.

Bubble wrap can often be torn from padded envelopes before recycling the plastic and paper separately.

Sherston Old School Project:

10th Anniversary



The Anniversary

Ten years ago this month, Sherston Parish Council completed the purchase of the Old School and granted a long lease to the Sherston Old School Community Interest Company (SOSCIC) for the purposes of renovating and converting the building to commercial use. In an ideal non-Covid world, this would be the moment for the village to be able to get together and celebrate and to give thanks to all of those who played a part in the success of the project.

Unfortunately, due to Covid restrictions, any such celebrations will have to be postponed for the time being. However, it felt appropriate to mark the occasion with this article and to invite some of those who had a part to play in the success of the project the opportunity to say a few words.

Serendipity?

Looking back, the decision by the Parish Council to purchase the Old School turned out to be far sighted. Just consider:

- If the Old School had not closed.
- If the owners had not been persuaded to withdraw their proposals for redeveloping the site for residential purposes.



This board has been erected to acknowledge the generous donations of money, ideas and time given by the many supporters of the Old School project between commencement in 2007 and completion in 2013.

We thank them and the wider community for all of their support.

• If the village had not stepped forward with a plan to convert the building to some form of commercial use. If Paul and Gail Mather had not taken the plunge and agreed to relocate their business into larger premises contained within the converted building.

If none of that had happened, how would we have coped in the village over the last 12 months without access to our own large 'general store'? It wasn't just luck. It was forward thinking -following the recognition that one by one we were gradually losing all our facilities and needed to draw the line somewhere. The decision by the Parish Council to purchase the Old School on your behalf drew that line.

Thanks

No progress would have been made without the help of: Sherston Parish Wardens, who helped to persuade the owners to sell the building; Sherston Parish Council which took the decision to purchase the building; the commitment of Paul and Gail Mather as the potential primary anchor tenants; several key individuals, including Wiltshire Councillor John Thomson, Parish Councillor Martin Rea and our former Chairman Peter Sidebottom who pulled together a team of local residents with a range of skills capable of delivering the project.

Amazingly, it took several years to make this happen. The deal was however eventually finalised on 1 April 2011 – an appropriate date!

Fundraising

We must not forget all of those who one way or another helped to raise sufficient funds to enable the Parish Council to purchase the building and subsequently to undertake the necessary renovation and conversion work under the supervision of SOSCIC.

For those who didn't know, the primary donors to this project were:

- The Eleanor Barton Trust and the Sam Thomson Fund – thanks to the efforts of Richard Creed.
- The Prince's Countryside Fund.
- Wiltshire Council and Sherston Parish Council.
- The Sherston Boules and Malmesbury Carnival Committees.
- Four key individuals namely N Wiles; EA Sells; Christian Landolt; and J Seymour Williams.
- And not forgetting the 280+ Members of SOSCIC.

Then of course there were all of those involved in the many fantastic fundraising events that were held in the village in the years leading up to the start of the building work. These included: the much loved Charity Shop (organised by Marion Gee); the Rude Health comedy show (Dr Phil Hammond); a French Fête (Sue Shortridge); a Winter Ball; and a Garden Day. I am sure there were various other events not mentioned here. My apologies for any omissions as my memory is fading! The village really pulled together at the time to raise a huge amount of money. Thanks to everyone who got involved.



The Construction

Following the grant of planning and listed-building consent, construction work was able to start in July 2011 and the first phase completed by 26 November

2011 when the Sherston Post Office and Stores (Paul and Gail Mather) and Balcony House Cellars (Neil Perry) first took occupation. The excellent building work carried out by Chappell and Dix was brilliantly supervised by our own in house 'Project Manager' John Knight to whom we owe a great deal.

Following a further period of fundraising, and the receipt of a significant grant from the Prince's Countryside Fund, work on the second phase started in February 2012 and was completed six months later. By February 2013 the building was fully occupied.

The building was officially opened by Prince Charles on 25 November 2013 when the new 'school bell' kindly donated by John and Matilda Matthews was rung for the first time.

Our Occupiers

Only three of our original occupiers are still with us. These are: Shear Class Hair and Beauty Salon, Pulse Business Software and Compass Design. Many thanks to all of them for their continued support. The Midscounties Co-op has of course relatively recently replaced the Sherston Post Office Stores and James Pyle & Co (Estate Agents) has replaced Electric Octopus Ltd at the back of the property. One small unit adjoining the Co-op is currently vacant, but we hope to fill that vacancy as soon as reasonably possible post-lockdown. In total, the building currently provides employment for well over 30 local people. A success by any standard. And what would many of us have done if it had not been for the Co-op and the efforts of its wonderful staff over the last 12 months? A vital community service.

Funding Good Causes

SOSCIC is a non-profit making organisation which is run entirely by volunteers on behalf of the village. The rent received is sufficient not only to repay the outstanding Public Works Loan Board Loan (taken out by the Parish Council in 2011 to help fund the purchase of the building) but also to provide sufficient funds to manage and maintain the building in good order, as well as providing a cash surplus that can be given back to the village. This we have started to do. For the last three years, SOSCIC has made substantial donations to the Parish Council to use as deemed appropriate on village 'good causes'. It is our intention to continue to make such payments to the Parish Council whenever our finances permit.

The Future

As for the next 10 years? Well, the first thing for us to do is undertake the repainting of the exterior of the building. This will hopefully be done in the next few months. It will be necessary to erect scaffolding on the pavement for this work. Apologies in advance for any inconvenience caused!

Beyond that – let us hope that the next 10 years proves as successful for the Old School project as it has been over the last 10. All we can ask is that, once lockdown has ended, everyone makes full use of all the facilities on offer in the Old School. As noted above,

the continued success of these businesses provides an income for the village. Whilst most have been able to operate throughout the lockdown, unfortunately Shear Class was forced to close for much of this period. It should hopefully be able to re-open on 12 April. I am sure that many people will be delighted to see it back. I know that my hair is currently looking more 1970s than 2020s!!

Sherston Post Office Stores – Paul and Gail Mather

Our association began way back in 2007 when, subject to receiving our outline commitment that we would support the project by moving premises, the feasibility of the Parish Council acquiring the Old School was first mooted.

After four years of convincing ourselves that it would be worthwhile to sink all our savings (and more) into the project and numerous demanding negotiations with a multitude of 'interested parties', we were delighted to open our doors on 26 November 2011.

It is an understatement that the support we received from customers and our staff exceeded all our expectations and we are honoured to have initiated a facility that will continue to serve the village well for the foreseeable future and will provide the foundation for the ongoing success of the Old School project to deliver a lasting benefit to the community.

In stating the above, it is recognised that, without the initial involvement of the Sherston Parish Wardens to persuade the Diocese of Bristol to reconsider the original planning request, commitment of the Parish Council and Wiltshire Council and founders of the SOSCIC Board 'to make things happen' and tremendous support received from everyone who supported and participated in the fundraising exercise, the development would never have happened. We should all be very proud.

Prince's Countryside Fund

The Prince's Countryside Fund's vision is of thriving family farms and rural communities, encouraged and recognised for their role in creating a sustainable future for the countryside and our whole nation. Through our grant-making programme, which to date has invested more than £10 million in over 400 projects across the UK, we were keen to invest in Sherston Old School. Too often, rural communities are without access to

transport, jobs, housing, shops and community spaces. The Prince's Countryside Fund powers community-led solutions through our grants and resources to ensure that they flourish - now and in the future.

The Sherston Old School project stood out to us as it really aligns with our vision – putting the heart back into rural communities by reinvigorating spaces that might otherwise be abandoned. The way in which the community of Sherston came together to create business opportunities in the village – and the success it's had keeping fully occupied to date! – really shows what can be achieved by Britain's rural communities. We were particularly impressed by how many members of the village SOSCIC signed up to support the project, and how the project contributed to the future sustainability of

The threat of the Old School falling to residential use and a whiff of possible development on the allotments rapidly galvanised a powerful groundswell of opposition.

After initial work by the Parish Council, and especially by Martin Rea, the Sherston Old School Community Interest Company was born in 2010 and flourished under the chairmanship of Peter Sidebottom, whose wide and varied experience in the world of property was invaluable. He was ably assisted by Mike Johnson, Geoff Martin, John Knight and Richard Hulme.

Following extensive fundraising, the project was first opened for business on 26 November 2011 and the opening ribbon was cut by Doris Cooper one of Sherston's eldest residents. It got off to a flying start and continues to flourish.

Since then, Mike Johnson has taken over from Peter Sidebottom as Chairman and the Midcounties Cooperative now run the Post Office and shop. The commercial units at the western end of the building continue to provide valuable services to the local community.

Covid has proved to be a huge challenge but many residents rely on the Post Office and Co-op as their lifeline and it remains the envy of many other local communities from far and wide.

On behalf of the residents of Sherston, the Parish Council offer a huge vote of thanks to SOSCIC for all that it's achieved during the past decade and we look forward to more success in what will hopefully be a Covid-free next decade.




