## Holy Cross Church Roof Appeal



You probably read about the leaks in the church roof in December's Cliffhanger. Although the main part of the church roof was replaced less than 10 years ago, many of you may not have realised that the south aisle and porch were not done then. Now those parts are in urgent need of re-roofing; water is coming in to the Lady Chapel and vestry and it is certain that once the contractors start work in the spring some of the roof timbers will be found to need replacing.

The Parochial Church Council (PCC), those people elected to care for and run your village church, do save what they can into a fund to repair and maintain the building. However, there are always lots of bills to pay and money is tight. We only have about half what is needed if we use all that has been saved up and leave nothing for other work. We have been applying to groups that give grants for this kind of work and have so far been promised a total of nearly £6,000 - by Wiltshire Historic Churches Trust, Allchurches Trust and our local Midcounties Co-operative. We are very grateful for these donations and, with several other applications in the pipeline, hope for more to come.

We still need more than £20,000 though and are asking for your help to raise this. We know that many of you, although you may not be regular churchgoers, would not want to see your village church deteriorating. It is part of our village's heritage and we must pass it on to future generations in good shape. If the building is allowed to become permanently damp through roof leaks, it will not be the warm(ish!) and welcoming place it is today, used by lots of people from our community. Just come in on a winter Thursday morning and you will find

Stay and Play, a thriving carer and toddler group, as well as the Coffee Shop regulars, usually joined by some visiting cyclists or tourists - even at this time

In this Cliffhanger, you will find a yellow donation envelope. Please can you put something in it towards the roof fund? Envelopes can be dropped into the donation box, straight ahead of you as you go into church, or handed to clergy, churchwardens or members of the PCC. If you can Gift Aid your money, and allow us to reclaim the income tax you have paid on it to swell our funds, that would be very helpful. Details about doing this are printed on the envelope. We also have a JustGiving page justgiving.com/crowdfunding/helen-price-512 (Helen is our PCC secretary). Please use this if you find it the most convenient way to give, although be aware that JustGiving does take part of any donation as an administration fee

Thank you all very much for whatever you can do to keep the church building watertight.


## Maple head to The Living Rainforest

## A Jaunt through the Years

Following on from the excerpt published in January's Cliffhanger, the late George Stephens recalls life for his mother and father in Sherston at the end of the 19th century.

The young lady from Sherston that Frederick Stephens married, was born in 1885 at number 20 Gaston Lane. My Mother was the youngest of seven children belonging to Richard Harris and Pamela, nee Wilcox. Her grandfather, William Harris was born in 1801 and died in 1871. He now lies in the eastern side of Sherston Churchyard. Maud's father Richard, worked (as did many) at Westonbirt House, which belonged to Sir George Holford, a local and prominent gentleman who owned a large area of land. Richard Harris was employed at Westonbirt House as a stonemason, but he also took his place some evenings and weekends as a 'flunky' wearing knee-breeches and the customary powdered wig. For this he was paid 12 shillings per week, (60p) and grateful he was for this princely sum. Many local men worked at clearing and keeping in order the great wood near Westonbirt, known as Silkwood. Other men worked on farms, or in the stables as grooms at 'The Big House', there were a number of these in the area.

Mothers were the hub of every family in those days, working from early morning until late at night. The old saying, 'A woman's work is never done' was nearer to the truth than it is today. Her relaxation in the evening was not wasted entirely, but taken

up by darning and mending the family's clothes, thus prolonging their life a little longer, and putting off the expense of buying new. The main meal at home was eaten in the evening, when Father came home from work. The food was always very plain but nourishing, it was cooked in a large iron pot, suspended by a hook in the chimney over a blazing fire. Potatoes, cabbage, meat and pudding, all were cooked together, the pudding separated from the meat and vegetables by only a muslin cloth. The food was always cleared up, and nothing was ever wasted. Any scraps left over were given to the cat or dog, they

were lucky to get that. Some people kept a few chickens, or a pig in a sty at the bottom of the garden. Killing the pig was an important event. The local butcher would arrive in the evening and swiftly dispatch the animal with a knife, amidst a mixed feeling of sorrow at losing what had almost become a household pet and one

of great expectation at the thought of all the food the animal would provide for the family during the coming winter months. Often friends benefited from a basin of offal or blood for black puddings.

Drinking water came mostly from wells. It was usual to find one in the majority of gardens. Where there were two or three cottages, then a well would be shared. Water for other purposes was also shared when it was fetched from a stream or brook. Here it would be carried in wooden buckets by a yoke across the shoulders. Unlike today, water was used very carefully, the thought of carrying it ensured this.

## Recycle your un-recyclables!

Malmesbury is leading the way in response to climate and environmental matters with the recent formation of the Malmesbury Climate Action Network. But how can you help to divert waste from landfill and increase recycling of traditionally hard-to-recycle items?

Plastic bags, film wrap - soft plastic

And in case you haven't found this great recycling scheme yet: Tesco's at Tetbury, Kate and Cirencester have a drop-off point for all soft plastic – plastic crisp bags, clingfilm, fruit and veg plastic sleeves and film, and all plastic bags.

#### Would the Swastika have flown over Sherston?

My wife and I moved to Sherston on 16 December 2019, a date that, 75 years ago, had so nearly become one of the blackest dates in Wiltshire's history; 16 December 2019 was the 75th anniversary of a Nazi/ Fascist plot intended to exterminate freedom and democracy in Britain. The launch pad had been here in Wiltshire.

On Christmas Eve, we went to midnight mass here in Sherston and, upon leaving, I noticed a crucifix beside the door, with a dedication that reads: 'Italian Soldiers, 2nd World War prisoners, are grateful and thankful for how native English people treated them.' I presume that the crucifix was made by prisoners at Camp 89, Easton Grey, which was a light industrial and agricultural working camp, containing what were known as 'co-operator' Italian prisoners of war.

Elsewhere in Wiltshire, however, the prisoners of war were very far from friendly. Camp 23, Le Marchant Camp at Devizes, contained thousands of hardened and disciplined Nazi frontline troops and 16 December 1944 was the date when it was intended that they would rise up and break out of their camp. In December 1944, there were more than 250,000 German prisoners of war held in camps all over Britain. They were an army in waiting.

Hitler had not forgotten his army in Britain. He planned a major counter-attack through the Ardennes forest that was later to become known as the Battle of the Bulge. It was to be launched on 16 December, and Hitler ordered that there should be a major armed break-out by German troops in Britain at the same time. Two prison camps in particular were to be the centre of the break-out: Camp 23, Le Marchant, Devizes, and Camp 17, Lodge Moor, near Sheffield. Between them, they held over 17,000 German soldiers. The plan was to attack and kill their guards, to break out and seize weapons from nearby military arms stores, and then to attack airfields and military vehicle parks. They would steal planes, tanks and armoured vehicles, and advance on London, with Winston Churchill as their probable target.

Happily, the plot at Devizes was discovered a few



days before it was due to come to fruition, and on 14 December 1944, Camp 23 was taken over by British Paratroops, and 32 of the Nazi ringleaders were arrested. Elsewhere in the country, security was increased, escape tunnels were searched for and found, and planned escapes or break outs were, in the main, prevented.

But what would have happened had the Nazi plot not been discovered? Using iron discipline and considerable military expertise and experience, the Germans would have broken out of Le Marchant camp, would have armed themselves, seized vehicles and would have formed armoured columns. It would have been a total surprise for a Britain that believed the war had been won. Whatever a covert Nazi unit might have achieved in London, here in Wiltshire there would have been chaos and if, suddenly, Britain was being ravaged by up to 250,000 German soldiers, any campaign in Europe would have ground to a halt, as British soldiers were rushed back to Britain to defend its people. If Churchill and leading members of his government had been assassinated, who would have led British resistance to the German army rampaging within this country? Would the Swastika have flown over Sherston? Brian Lett

## The 100 Tonne Low-Carbon Diet

Last month, over 80 people packed into the British School Room in Sherston to listen to Professor David Waltham's talk, organised by Sustainable Sherston, about climate change and the need to reduce our carbon dioxide emissions.

Since 1880, we have emitted 1.5 trillion tonnes of  $CO_2$ . With the emission of other greenhouse gases, the combined effect is equivalent to two trillion tonnes of  $CO_2$ . This has produced a 1°C rise in global temperature. The Inter-governmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) says we must not exceed a further 0.5°C rise and has calculated that 770 billion tonnes of  $CO_2$  will produce this.

Therefore, the world's population of 7.7 billion people can only emit a further 770 billion tonnes of CO<sub>2</sub> before potentially catastrophic and non-reversible tipping points are reached, for example the permanent melting of ice-sheets. This means that, each person in the world should aim to be responsible for no more than 100 tonnes of CO<sub>2</sub>. This is the 100 tonne diet.

The average person in the UK emits approximately 13 tonnes of CO<sub>2</sub> per year. If we carry on as we are, we have just seven years before we need to stop emitting CO<sub>2</sub> completely. We therefore need to go on a low-carbon diet. This will prolong the time we have before zero-carbon technology and systems are rolled out.

There are various simple ways you can limit your CO<sub>2</sub> emissions:

- Reduce your intake of red meat, eg one fewer burger a fortnight
- Swap from dairy milk to a plant milk (soya/oat/ almond)
- Avoid one European flight per year
- Walk one mile per day instead of driving
- Travel 1,000 miles by train instead of using the car
- Obey speed limits
- Improve house insulation
- Minimise use of your tumble dryer; hang out washing instead
- Fit solar panels
- Make stuff last longer



Doing these things will reduce your emissions by approximately two tonnes per year, but you would still be emitting an average of 11 tonnes per year.

To reduce emissions further is more difficult. The technical solutions are there; the difficulties are financial, social and political. We need much more wind energy, which is now the cheapest way of generating electricity. We need to plant a lot more trees - roughly 200 trees per person. We need farming to get to net zero by 2040 (the National Farmers' Union have a sensible and achievable plan to do just that). We need to implement a system of 'Carbon Fee and Dividend'. More sophisticated than a carbon tax, the idea is supported by many people - including economists, scientists and the Citizens Climate Lobby, a worldwide organisation - and works on the principle that polluters pay a fee proportional to the carbon pollution they are causing, which is collected by the Government and redistributed as a flat-rate dividend, equally to all citizens. This means that lowincome, low-polluting people would actually have a net benefit, whilst high-polluting individuals would pay extra. Economic modelling suggests that such a system would reduce emissions by 80%.

To conclude, there is a limit to the CO<sub>2</sub> emissions you can make in your lifetime; your share is 100 tonnes. It's possible to keep below that by making small changes on an individual level and encouraging governments and businesses to drive collective action. We need to get to net zero as early as possible, but definitely before 2045. ## Malmesbury League of Friends donates £10,000 towards Fibroscan Appeal



Malmesbury League of Friends (MLOF) has donated £10,000 towards the Brighter Futures appeal to purchase a new Fibroscan machine for the benefit of Great Western Hospital (GWH) patients who have liver disease or are in danger of developing it.

The Fibroscan can assess the degree of liver damage with a non-invasive test which is painless, quick and easy to administer. It replaces the need for an invasive liver biopsy and allows the hepatology unit at GWH to instigate a treatment plan promptly.

In the next few years, liver disease is expected to overtake heart disease as the biggest cause of premature death and is already the largest cause of premature death among 35-49 year olds in the UK. More than 90% of liver disease is due to three main factors: obesity, alcohol and viral hepatitis.

MLOF chairman David Hide said: 'We know that liver disease is increasing, so we are delighted to support this appeal to acquire a Fibroscan which will make diagnosis so much quicker and easier.'

Dr Moby Joseph, the consultant who heads the specialist liver unit at GWH, said: 'This Fibroscan will make a huge difference to the diagnosis of liver disease. We have over 500 patients currently receiving treatment at GWH.'






