

Sherston Village Hall Information Days

Saturday 26 June (10.00am-4.00pm) and Sunday 27 June (12.00noon-4.00pm)

After a delay of over a year (this event should have taken place last April), we are inviting the village to come and see the modified plans for the new Village Hall extension. As reported in last month's Cliffhanger, we have received an award of £99,000 from the National Lottery. Further fundraising is going well but we still need your help!

During the weekend, visit the newly planted Community Orchard, planted by Sustainable Sherston (see page 8). The purchase of the trees was funded by Malmesbury Area Board. This area is planned to be accessible by the whole community and, when it becomes mature, will be a quiet space to sit and enjoy the trees and wildflowers. While you are here, you can find out about the group and there will be a representative to answer your questions.

Many community projects like this encourage people to buy a brick, but we are asking you to buy a butterfly. There will be a display to show what we mean but each silk butterfly will have the name of the donor on it, and they will hang in the new entrance lobby. We propose that each butterfly will represent a donation of £25, but of course you can donate more than that if you wish. There will be forms for donation and for Gift Aid if you can.


There will be an exhibition of wildlife photography by Nick Holland, who is kindly donating proceeds to the Village Hall Fund (see page 4 for more info).

On Sunday, historian Roger Ashley will give a short talk at 2.00pm on the fascinating history of our Village Hall.

We would like to make a display of photographs so if anyone has pictures of events that have taken place at the Village Hall over the years, please do get in touch. We can copy them for you so you are not lending the originals. So far we have a wedding reception from 1938, but there must be many more happy occasions that have taken place in the Hall.

We have been given a set of illustrations of the village, done in pen and wash, to sell in aid of the Village Hall Fund. These will be available to buy, as prints or originals.

Lastly, because the Village Hall was awarded a Covid-19 Restart Grant to help it get back on its feet, we will be supplying free refreshments. Come along



To start with, we cancelled our inter-village match last year as the first lockdown was announced and then we kept our heads down until 22 September. We kept to all the rules laid down by Badminton England, who have been really good at keeping us informed of the changes in rules governing play at clubs and societies, and we've kept to the rules laid down by the Village Hall Committee.

Since then, we have adopted the 'rule of six', allowing just six of our members to play together, and we have devised a booking system so that everyone gets a fair chance of playing. We are still using the booking system and registering who is playing each week. We provide hand sanitiser and sanitise the chairs and, like many sports, we have abandoned any shaking of hands after a game.

It is likely that some changes will stay, such as sanitising and booking, and we are all looking forward to being able to return to a state where we can safely play for a couple of hours each week in the Village Hall. We will not be having a summer break this year as we have missed our badminton such a lot and, hopefully, we will be able to welcome another couple of members. A new community orchard for Sherston



The first trees of Sherston's new community orchard have been planted in the field behind the Village Hall. This initiative, in collaboration with the Parish Council and the Village Hall, was one of the first projects planned when Sustainable Sherston launched in 2020.

During a weekend in March no less than 25 families volunteered to plant the trees. Each family was given a different time slot in order to adhere to government guidelines for social distancing. Tree species planted include apple, plum and pear.

Parish Councillor Martin Fausing Smith said: 'Planting trees is good for the environment, good for people's well-being, and also the fact that it's an orchard means that it produces food that people can eat so it's win, win.

'As the trees mature we will also let the grass grow longer and we're going to have wild flowers underneath them so it's going to be a more biodiverse area of the village. It will be a nice place to relax and take in the atmosphere so it's beneficial on many levels.'

The 25 trees that were planted in March is only the first stage. More trees will be planted in the autumn.





As part of the same initiative, three other trees were also planted in Easton Square as replacements for the large sycamore that came down in 2015. Green Square Group, who are responsible for the green, contributed £250 to the project. Several more small trees/bushes and wildflowers will be planted in the autumn to complete the project.



Energy-saving and cost-efficient home improvements

Sustainable Sherston

Most Bang For Your Buck!



Sustainable Sherston felt we should try to reach as many local people as possible, and one way to do that would be a regular article in the Cliffhanger. In this first of a series, I will outline ideas we can all use to save energy - and money - in our homes.

recent UK surveys shown Many have overwhelming public support for Green Measures to mitigate climate change, but also a proportion have significant concerns about the cost: if you are only 'just about managing' day-to-day, how are you to find the money for green home improvements? With this in mind, it is clear that governments will have to assist homeowners in this endeavour. One recent estimate for the investment required for the UK to reach 'Net Zero' by 2050 put it at £50bn per year, or nearly £1bn per week! About a quarter of our UK energy consumption is in the home and 60% of that is for heating (ie about 15% of all UK energy consumption). Around 25 million UK homes will need to be upgraded and do not expect the government to pay for it all any time soon. So what are the most cost-efficient ways to improve our homes' energy consumption?

There are a few simple principles involved here: reducing our energy use is always the winner (way before we go into greener ways of generating and consuming it).

The first cheapest and simplest option is to replace your incandescent (tungsten filament) light bulbs with low-energy ones, usually LED. Until relatively recently, there were many valid criticisms about the colour/intensity and cost of low-energy bulbs, but there are now myriad options out there and costs have rapidly reduced. We used to have around 14 50w halogen (700w total!) bulbs, which I've replaced with 5w (GU10) bulbs for a massive energy (and cost) saving. I estimate these halogens alone consumed roughly 800kwh per year costing around £120 (ie £10/month); this has been reduced by 90%! The LED bulbs now are very similar in price to halogen and come in various powers and light colours. Ours are 3000K, giving a white light indistinguishable from the old halogens and are dimmable. Some of the original halogens were 12v,

so I removed the old transformers (another source of failure) and made them all 240v GU10. In most cases, replacing halogen for LED GU10s are a direct swap, although some dimmers might need replacing. Experts suggest in terms of cost saving and energy efficiency, it's worth swopping to LEDs as soon as you can and not waiting for old incandescent or halogen bulbs to blow.

Turning to heat loss, the first priority here is to minimise draughts, particularly around doors and windows. A typical 5m roll of draught excluder only costs around £6-7 and is generally quick and easy to install. Similarly, have you got old fire places that are seldom used? It's amazing how much



heat goes up there: years ago, I was fixing a chimney stack on our roof in December and was really surprised at the amount of warm air coming up. You can buy inflatable chimney blockers, or if you are reasonably adept at DIY, you can fashion one from a bit of ply with a wooden handle (see photo). However, do tell others in the house and if necessary put a large conspicuous tag on it: lighting the fire with the blocker in place quickly fills the room with smoke (and much shouting/swearing!).

The next simplest and cheapest heat-loss measure is to insulate your loft: typically about 25% of your home's heat is lost up there. Most homes used to have about 100mm/4" of rock or glass wool between the rafters, but now 270mm is recommended. A typical roll of glass wool costs around $\pounds 4/m2$. Another more option is to use sheep's wool; it has the advantage that it does not crush down like glass wool and is good where condensation might be a problem, but is considerably more expensive at around $\pounds 20/m2$. For loft areas used for storage, a further, but even more expensive option, is to use insulated loft boards (approx $\pounds 40/m2$).

About 40% of home heat is lost through the walls and another 15% through the floors. These are considerably more difficult and expensive to insulate and probably beyond all but the most determined DIYer, so I will discuss those in a later article. Therefore the next simplest option is to replace your incandescent (tungsten filament) light bulbs with low-energy ones, usually LED.

Local Rotary Club helps with Covid Vaccination Roll-Out

Many of us will by now have had either one or both of our Covid-19 vaccinations. Those of you who visited the Malmesbury Primary Care Centre on one of the Pfizer mass-vaccination days will have no doubt noticed the stewards helping out in the car park. Hopefully you found their efforts helpful. These stewards were co-ordinated by the local Rotary Club of the South Cotswolds.

On each of these days, somewhere around 800 people were vaccinated – at a site in no way suitable for that number of people (and their cars) in one day! Each vaccination day needed a crew of at least five outdoor stewards – in all the Rotary Club organised well over 100 steward shifts. This was made more difficult as the Primary Care Centre generally only had a few days' notice of each batch of vaccine and then had to arrange vaccinators and book in recipients in a hurry – and to contact the Rotary Club to ask for car-park stewards!

The stewarding resource required was beyond the capabilities of the South Cotswold Rotary Club alone, so the Club was very pleased to have the support of a number of friends and from the nearby Rotary Club of Royal Wootton Bassett and District. In fact, one of the friends who became a stalwart steward noted what we were doing when he came for his own vaccination and asked to join us!

Being outdoor stewards, we were, of course, subject to the full range of British spring weather, including rain, wind, hail, lightning, occasional sunshine and the coldest April for many a year! However, we received many accolades and thanks from those coming for their vaccinations which reinforced the knowledge we were making a significant contribution to the vaccination effort locally.

Sopworth Village Plant Table

Now in it's sixth year, the Sopworth village plant table may be small but it features a surprisingly diverse range of seasonal plants which are regularly changed. Plants are donated, and the money raised from the sale of them is split equally between Sopworth church and Sopworth village hall. It is open 24/7 during the summer months, and payment is made into the money box on a trust basis.

Valerie Edwards started it five years ago and has run it most capably and successfully. Ann Buxton and Jinny Rawlings have this year now taken over the running of it, ably assisted by Isla Casey when back from school. It is now positioned on the main street of Sopworth at the Didmarton end of the village between Bull Park Barn and Hollybush Barn.* We sincerely thank all those who have supported and continue to support the Sopworth plant table. Gifts of plants and of course purchases of plants are always greatly welcomed.

Movies@Malmesbury relaunch - 7 June

We are delighted to be able to announce that, subject to government guidelines, Movies@Malmesbury will re-open its doors on Monday 7 June.

After what seems like an eternity, Malmesbury's cinema is gearing itself up for a bumper crop of blockbuster films in June and July, with negotiations already at an advanced stage to bring films like Nomadland, The Trial of the Chicago 7, The Father and Ma Rainey's Black Bottom to the screen in Malmesbury Town Hall.

A spokesperson for Movies@Malmesbury said, 'We have been meeting on a monthly basis to review the situation and can't wait to open our doors to the public in June.'

The cinema will operate along similar lines to when it last opened in autumn 2020: all tickets will have to be bought in advance from either the Town Hall or via the online booking agency, Usheru; the capacity in the hall will be restricted to just 27 per screening, to allow for maximum social distancing, and comfort; chairs will be changed between performances; and all windows will be opened between screenings to ensure maximum ventilation in the hall.

'We know, from many comments made to us, how the people of Malmesbury value their cinema. It's one thing to see a film streamed to your television but it's so much more immersive to see it on a big screen with a full sound system.' Movies@Malmesbury is operated entirely by volunteers. Explorers


