# Sherston Primary School moves into top 1% in the Country



Sherston School has topped the reading league tables with its recent Key Stage 2 SATs results, published in December, seeing 100% of the pupils reaching or exceeding the expected standard in reading. This puts Sherston in the top 1% of primary schools in the country for achievement in reading.

Head Mrs Leyden, received a letter from the Minister of State for School Standards, MP Nick Gibb, personally congratulating her for the school's excellent achievements. He says he was delighted to see the results and thanks Mrs Leyden and her team for their work in continuing the 'drive towards higher academic standards and for their commitment and success'.

## Sherston Senior Club

On 4 February, we had a very interesting and moving talk by Spike Parker about the wonderful work the charity Designability undertakes in Bath, at the rear of the Royal United Hospital.

Designability is celebrating over 50 years of existence, having designed over 300 products, which have assisted over 250,000 people during that time. The charity was established as the Bath Institute of Medical Engineering (BIME) in 1968 as an independent charity by the renowned inventor and engineer Bevan Horstmann and consultant surgeon Kenneth Lloyd-Williams. They wanted to make medical equipment that would make a difference to people's lives. Sir Barnes Wallis was their first President. The work the charity does to enable children under five with serious disabilities to be mobile for the first time in their lives is amazing. The Wizzybug, a motorised wheelchair that looks like a car with a friendly face, has enhanced the lives of over 500 children. Designability set up a scheme whereby the 'car' is on loan for as long as the child needs it or outgrows it. It is then returned to the workshop to be refurbished and then re-issued. It is entirely British made. It also designs items to assist people living with dementia, for example, the day clock and simple music player. This was eye opening as none of the members had heard of this charity. A donation was made to this very worthwhile cause.

# Sherston pupils inspire initiatives to make their school more eco-friendly



In her speech to the Houses of Parliament in 2019, Greta Thunberg said: 'The moment we decide to fulfil something, we can do anything.'



# A Jaunt through the Years

Another excerpt from the late George Stephens' recollections and stories of life in bygone Sherston.

Amusements and pastimes were all simple and easily made things. Children played 'Hide and Seek' or 'Mothers and Fathers' using the hedgerow as a house, with scraps of curtain hung among the brambles, which would stay undisturbed for weeks. Old kitchen utensils were brought from home when they ceased to be of any further use to Mother, many happy hours were spent playing at make-believe. Marbles and fivestones were other games played by children. A number of village men also played marbles which was taken very seriously, with knockout competitions resulting in an annual Marbles Champion. Each year a large bonfire was built in the High Street on the fifth of November, Guy Fawkes day. The story goes, that on one occasion a local man seeing children carrying faggots of wood to throw on the fire, called to them, 'Come along my dears, that's it! Keep it going, throw some more on,

what a lovely blaze! Quickly now, go and fetch some more!' only to find the next morning that his own winter supply of wood faggots had disappeared from his garden.

Football matches were played in a field at Knockdown Road. They started in about 1880 when two brothers came to Sherston from Bristol to start a horse bus service. Transport was not thought to be very important at that time, though this service was appreciated. It was said that if one missed the bus at the village pick up point, then it was possible to run and catch up with it on its numerous stops along the Luckington road. The two brothers from Bristol settled in Sherston, living in the Barton at Easton Town, (or as we locals call it, 'Down the Barken').

A Barton was originally used for storing, mainly grain, though they have been used for impounding animals. In more recent years though, Easton Town Barton's Holly House was our village Police Station, (as we were sometimes made aware of by Sergeant Broad). The Horse Bus business soon flourished, and was later taken over by Ralph Goulding, who was also landlord of The Angel Inn in the High Street. The three day a week bus run to Yate was now extended to include Saturday morning, the bus carried eight passengers. Within a few months Ralph Goulding branched out into the carrier business, operating between Sherston and Chippenham on Mondays and Fridays, later running to Tetbury on Wednesdays. A lot of people walked to Malmesbury, if they wanted to buy goods that they could not obtain in the village. They thought little of the journey, being only five and a half miles.





# Health and Wellbeing

I had an email recently from Wiltshire Police which I am forwarding through the magazines for those who may not have seen the advice elsewhere. I don't mean to scaremonger, but it's valuable advice as we look (hopefully) towards some warmer weather and getting out and about a little more than in the colder months. It reads:

Following a series of burglaries in the past couple of weeks in the Malmesbury and Royal Wootton Bassett area which we are investigating, we are asking people to be mindful about how they keep their property and belongings safe.

Remember, most burglars are opportunists, so here are some simple steps that can be taken to make your home less appealing.

#### Crime Prevention Advice - checklist

- Lock your doors and windows every time you leave the house, even when just in the garden. And make sure you have approved locks or bolts to all doors and windows.
- Never leave a spare key in a hiding place like in a plant pot or letter box - a thief knows all the hiding places
- Register all serial numbers from electrical items, tools and garden equipment with Immobilise.com the free national property register. Mark items without serial numbers with an artificial DNA property marker such as Smartwater or SelectaDNA.
- Use a timer to set lights to mimic your usual activity when you are not at home.
- Do not open the door to anyone you don't know or are not expecting. Always check by using a spy-hole or look through a window. Don't trust an ID card.
- Trim back any plants and hedges at the front of your property to no higher than one meter to remove hiding places.
- Always report any suspicious activity, note any vehicle registrations, descriptions of persons involved and direction of travel.
- Consider installing a monitored burglar alarm, and only use a company that is registered or certified with the NSI or the SSIAB.
- Take photographs of all jewellery including hallmarks and keep them safe. Make sure that you have up-to-date contents insurance.
- Keep all keys, purses and wallets out of sight and away from the letterbox.

#### Suspicious activity in your area? Report it.

Have you seen any suspicious activity in your neighbourhood? Call the police on 101 if you see any of the following:

 Anything suspicious or anyone acting suspicious in your neighbourhood

- Unknown or unexpected doorstep traders description and dates are vital pieces of information
- Unusual vehicles vehicle description, registration numbers and direction of travel are vital pieces of information.
- If you have any information about offenders or see something suspicious, please call Wiltshire Police on 101, or call Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555111. In an emergency dial 999.

#### Reminder

Be aware of your home security and build it in as part of your everyday routine; for example, locking a ladder away or a simple step like leaving a light on to make it look like someone is home could make all difference.

# Sustainable Sherston for kids: Powering our homes for the future

#### Where does our electricity come from?

Electricity is most commonly made by burning fossil fuels, such as coal, natural gas or oil, in power stations. The energy stored in the fossil fuels is released when they are burnt and this is transformed, changed, into electricity by using a turbine. This process releases carbon dioxide and water into the atmosphere. In the 1970s people though the biggest problem with this is that fossil fuels are non-renewable so eventually they will run out. In fact we have plenty of reserves that would be better left in the ground or under the sea.

The reason for this is that there is another, bigger and more important problem, and that is that the carbon dioxide made when they are burnt is a greenhouse gas.

# So what's wrong with carbon dioxide being a greenhouse gas?

Carbon dioxide traps the sun's energy and stops it from escaping back into space. This means that some of the sun's energy that enters the Earth's atmosphere





stays trapped in our atmosphere and, over time, causes the Earth's atmosphere to warm up.

At first, the effects are small but, as time goes on and the Earth gets warmer, the effects will become larger. Scientists have been making observations and taking measurements for many years to collect evidence that this is happening. The name they have given to what is happening is climate change. The effect of climate change is that weather patterns are changing, sometimes becoming more extreme, and this is affecting the plants and animals in different habitats which are not able to adapt quickly enough.

## So what are we doing to stop producing carbon dioxide?

Electricity can be made from renewable energy. This energy is sustainable as it will not run out and carbon dioxide is not directly made when we use it. Types of renewable energy include wave, solar, hydroelectric, biomass and wind. Electricity produced using these methods is called green energy. The more demand for renewable energy there is, the more companies are likely to invest in using these types of energy resources.

An enthusiastic band of volunteers will be: organising an audit of the village to understand our current carbon footprint; bringing Sherston some exciting talks by 'green' experts; helping groups get together to come up with the best solutions for our village; and providing clear information on steps we can all take to help stop climate change. It's exciting stuff!



'Right now we are facing our greatest threat in thousands of years,' said Sir David Attenborough in his 'Climate Change The Facts' (a one-hour watch on BBC iPlayer now!). If you are still in any doubt about what we can do this will inspire you – there is still hope if we all act now. Sir David explains, 'What happens now and in these next few years will profoundly effect the next few 1,000 years.' The UK Government has declared a climate emergency and changes need to happen at a global level. Importantly, scientists and groups such as Friends of the Earth recognise that to keep the rise in temperature below 1.5 degrees (a critical 'tipping' point), then there must be change at the individual level in communities like ours.

Together, we can make a difference. There is a groundswell of movement within villages up and down the country and Sherston can be at the forefront. The two broad aims of Sustainable Sherston are:

If we commit as a community to giving this a go, we will be working with millions of people up and down the country all making a difference too. It will also include the one BIG change we all need to make which will have a direct and massive impact on climate change.

#### Join us for a night out

Come along to the talks and films to learn more about the issues. Our last talk with David Waltham was supported by over 90 people. The next night will be Monday 2 March, 7.30pm at the British School Room. Join us for an entertaining talk by Dave Knight who is a leading Sustainability Consultant. Having worked for various UN agencies on ethical business practice for over 20 years, he now runs One Planet. He is also a Non-Executive Director for a project that creates jobs for marginalised people in London. He will be giving a short talk with time to ask lots of questions.

On Friday 3 April at 7.00pm in the British School Room, we have a talk by Chris Goodall. He is a businessman, author and expert on new technologies. His talk will be themed around his latest book 'What We Need to Do Now: For a Zero Carbon Future' that offers a clear plan for getting the UK economy to Net Zero within a few decades and looks in turn at each of the main challenges.

One final thing...We hope this will be an inspiring and positive space. Actions by each person in our community will influence friends and family and it will also move governments and businesses to take action too. As Sir David Attenborough said, 'the future looks alarming indeed but it is not without hope, there's still time if we act now with determination and urgency'.

## **Action Station**



### Change your energy supplier

Reduce your carbon footprint immediately by changing your energy supplier to one that supports 100 per cent renewable energy. We have done the research and if you make the switch to any of the following you are saving the planet. Friends of the Earth and the Energy Saving Trust suggest Ecotricity, Octopus, Pure Planet, Green Energy UK and Good Energy. Imagine if the whole of Sherston said no to dirty fossil fuel generated energy? Another plus is that it will probably save you money on your bills too. Communities up and down the country are doing the same – we have the power.

### Fill the cup, not the kettle

Boiling a whole kettle takes just over four minutes but boiling enough water – say tea for two – takes just over one minute. Saving electricity and the planet.



### Let there be LED light!

Check your bulbs in each room and start to replace them with LED bulbs. It will shave nearly £2 billion off the energy bills for Britain's 25 million homes. It requires just a small investment, that will be repaid within three to four months on your energy bills – and give you a payback lasting more than 20 years according to a recent report in The Guardian. It will stop as much as 8 million tonnes of  $CO_2$  entering the atmosphere, and the energy saved at peak time equates to the output of three power stations the size of Hinkley Point C!

### Switch off lights!

Give this a go, along with the Brownies. An easy one but not for children sometimes (and maybe us grown-ups too!). Help create good habits by having a 'switch off' week - putting a reminder smiley face post-it note on one or more light switches for a week - you know the ones that are always on! You can even



add a pen, then mark when you see the light on when no one is in the room. Can you reduce it every day to 0 by the end of the week? It's fun to award a prize at the end. Make the family their favourite pudding or have a home movie night to celebrate your successful 'switch off' week.

### Don't leave stuff on standby

The Energy Saving Trust estimates that each UK household spends around £50-£86 a year on powering appliances left on standby. If it's switched on at the plug, it's using power. Three great habits to get into:

- 1. Unplug your phone as soon as it is charged and try not to charge it overnight.
- 2. Not using your TV or computer? Switch it off at the plug.
- 3. How much energy are you wasting on Alexa? Switch her off when you are out/at night.

There has been more than a century of non-stop development in the 110 years since Tetbury Camera Club came into being. Over the decades we have featured images taken with box cameras, twin lens reflexes, 35mm designs, pocket-sized models. Latterly, we have also moved from film cameras to digital ones and now, for the first time, the picture with this article was taken with a mobile phone! Though the majority of our members might be described as keen and even serious photographers, anxious to explore and master all that modern camera technology can deliver, we also have members for whom the aim is simply to enjoy their picture-taking and share the company of people with a similar hobby.

For both groups, reaching for a phone when they want to take a picture doesn't come naturally. It's difficult to cast aside a habit that has become second nature over many years. However, we are increasingly impressed by what can be achieved using an average smartphone. Also, by how quickly the engineers and designers working for companies like Apple, Samsung and Huawei are able to miniaturise and bring to market ever-more sophisticated versions of the comparatively heavyweight versions of the cameras we grew up with.

Convenience has helped make them a modern-day fact of life and, as more and more serious photographers, as well as enthusiastic amateurs, become used to taking pictures as well as conducting conversations on their phones, we recently decided that we should move with the times and encourage our members to demonstrate how effective they are at capturing images.

To be honest, we were not sure what response we'd have when we decided to test our members and their phones with a competition to switch from talking to snapping. We needn't have worried: within a few weeks of floating the idea we had 57 entries. They varied from black-and-white still life images to Scottish mountain landscapes and portraits of people to pictures of pets.

We were definitely impressed with the results and with the picture above, taken by Carole Mortimer from Sherston, you will be able to decide if you are too. 


