Referendum Day: Sherston Neighbourhood Plan Thursday 16 May

After more than seven years of effort, the time has finally come for everyone living in the Parish who is eligible to vote to decide whether you wish the Sherston Neighbourhood Plan to be adopted by Wiltshire Council and used to determine future planning applications.

The Referendum is to be held on Thursday 16 May. Voting will take place between the hours of 7.00am and 10.00pm at Sherston Village Hall. All of those eligible to vote should by now have received an Official Polling Card, providing details of how to apply for a postal or proxy vote should you be unable to go to the polling station on the day. It is now too late to apply for a postal vote but applications for a proxy vote can still be made before 5.00pm on Wednesday 8 May.

The actual question that you are going to be asked on the ballot form is:

Do you want Wiltshire Council to use the neighbourhood plan for Sherston to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?

If you want to support the plan then the answer to the above would be YES.

If you do not want the plan to be adopted then the answer would be NO.

As previously advised, if more than 50% of those who vote in the Referendum on the day say YES then Wiltshire Council will be obliged to adopt the plan within eight weeks. It would then form part of Wiltshire Council's development plan. Decisions on planning applications in the Parish will then have to be made in accordance with the Neighbourhood Plan.

A complete set of the Policies contained in the Sherston Neighbourhood Plan have been reproduced in the centre pages of this Cliffhanger. These have been slightly modified (reworded) since they were last reproduced. This was to take into account the comments and recommendations made by the Independent Examiner and Wiltshire Council.

Should you wish to view a copy of the complete Sherston Neighbourhood Plan and all of the related background documents, so that you can better understand the reasoning behind each of these policies, these can be found on the Sherston Parish Council website (https://sherston.org.uk/). Alternatively, hard copies are available at both the Tolsey Surgery and at the church.

Please do take the opportunity to vote on the Thursday 16 May.

Details of the policies are on pages 15-18.

My mind is now turning towards those warm July days when magical Petanque happens in that delightful medieval village of Sherston.

What is this magic I talk about? Well, I will have a go at expressing my feelings about this annual event, when things suddenly happen overnight; turning the car parking strips to sandy pistes and the game of Boules totally takes the village over and becomes more French than the French!

Young strong men with their farming tractors, wide shovels and dumper trucks bring in tons of coarse sand and hey presto, boules pistes magically appear all around the main street. In between these designated areas, pretty decorated stalls arrive as if dropped by Mary Poppins from her flying umbrella.

Looking out of our B&B window after eating a fine breakfast the street appeared to have succumbed to the wizardry of Harry Potter's wand. Amazingly transformed!

Oh, how I wish we could have more days like this in our calendar year where our sport would flourish in more English towns, gathering hundreds of visitors and exposing this game of ours that can be played by all ages.

A great sport that creates long lasting friendships among our community and socially minded people, exposing what creates long lasting friendships far and wide

Make it mine!

Condensed Boules Rules: Sherston 2019

This month we asked our local Boules expert Mr Bob Rumble to explain match rules. Here they are – but for a working understanding of the rules, come along to our POP Boules School at the Rattlebone on Saturday 18 May ... or visit our website for all the finer details!

Our matches are triples (three in each team) and are started by throwing a coin to see which team goes first.

The team that wins the toss marks out the starting location (a circle of 35-50cm drawn on the playing surface, at least one metre from any obstacles) and then selects one of their players to throw the jack. The player must stand with both feet inside the circle to throw the jack. The jack can be thrown in any direction but must end up between 6-10 metres of the starting circle, one metre from the opposite end, and half a metre from the sides. The player attempts to throw one of his/her boules so that it lands as close to the jack as possible. A player from the opposing team then steps into the circle and attempts to land his/her boule closer to the jack, even if it means knocking the opponent's boule out of the way. The boule closest to the jack leads or is said to be 'holding the point'. The other team must continue throwing boules until they take the lead or run out of boules. If they take the lead, the other team then tries to recover by throwing a boule that finishes closest to the jack. There is no order that team members must follow when throwing their boules but they must only throw their own boules, they must go one at a time from within the starting circle with both feed on the ground, take no more than one minute to throw each boule and remain inside the circle until the boule has landed. It is fine to hit the jack.

Once a team has used all its boules, the other side is allowed to throw the rest of its boules. When all boules are thrown, the points are counted. The team that has the boule closest to the jack wins the round or 'end'. The winning team gain a point for each of their boules that is closer to the jack than their opponents' closest boule. Only one team scores points during each end.

Once the points are counted and logged on the scoreboard, the next round begins with the previous round's winners drawing a new starting circle (the previous circle having first been erased). This starting circle is drawn around the final position of the jack in the previous round or, if too short to allow 6-10 metres throwing length, it can be taken back to one metre from the near end (see above). The winning team then selects a player to throw the jack from this new starting circle and the first boule is thrown as before. The person throwing the jack doesn't have to be the person throwing the first boule of an end.

The first team to reach the total number of points set by the organisers wins the game. There is not a required number of ends that must be played in our matches. Full rules are to be found here https://sherstonboules. org/sherston-boules-carnival/how-to-play-boules/



The vicarage site in Green Lane

Ahead of the Referendum on the Sherston Neighbourhood Plan on 16 May, the Parochial Church Council (PCC) wants to keep everyone up to date with plans for the vicarage site in Green Lane. This land is one of the areas shown in the Plan for development over the next 10 years.

There are two planned uses for the site: extension of the churchyard and house-building. Burial space in the existing churchyard is almost exhausted; although it may look as though there is still quite a lot of open space, its use for burial is strictly limited by various different regulations. The usual course, once space has run out, is that a churchyard is declared closed and the Parish Council must then assume the legal responsibility to find an alternative. This can result in a cemetery being sited on the edge of a village, as in Luckington, or in burials having to take place in more distant large cemeteries such as Chippenham. The PCC and Sherston Parish Council have been in touch over the past few years about the possibility of a separate cemetery, but it is very difficult to find available land for this purpose close to the village. We also know how much many people appreciate having a graveyard in the centre of the village. The Diocese of Bristol, which owns the vicarage site, has proposed that an area of garden land at the rear of the Green Lane vicarage site, adjoining the churchyard, can be added to it to provide additional burial space. Sherston Parish Council supports this proposal as it fulfils the need to find addition burial space for the village and is in a central location.

As far as housing development is concerned, the plan in principle has been to build two further houses

in addition to the current vicarage. It was, and still is, intended that one of these new houses will be a new vicarage but, with the recent departure of our rector and the intention that the new incumbent should live in Sherston, it has been necessary to make some interim arrangements. By mutual agreement, the present tenant will leave the vicarage around midsummer and the Diocese will then begin to renovate the house before the hoped-for arrival of a new rector in the autumn. Building work on the site will, of course, be subject to planning permission and will take place once this has been granted, but development is still to be limited to two new houses, with the intention that one house will become the new vicarage. The Rector of the Gauzebrook Group of parishes has not lived in Sherston since the Group was established more than 10 years ago and the PCC is very keen that the new incumbent should live here, in the largest village in the Group. The Diocese intends that funding of the new-build vicarage will be achieved from the sale of land for the second new house and the sale of the existing vicarage, but the rear of the garden is to be retained so that it can be transferred to the church for the churchyard extension as part of this overall plan.

If you support the proposal for provision of more burial space in the centre of the village and a new vicarage, which would allow our rector to live in a purpose-built parsonage in Sherston, the PCC encourages you to support the Sherston Neighbourhood Plan in the Referendum on 16 May.

There he met a world of wheeler-dealers, everyone living on their wits, pulling every trick to make a profit. As the reputation of his work spread, his world expanded, until Nick and his crew entered the rarefied circles of the London art world and he realised he could be dangerously out of his depth.



Sherston Neighbourhood Plan Policies

POLICY 1 Protection of community services, facilities and business premises

Facilities, services, shops and local businesses recognised as important to the local community are shown on Maps 5A and 5B and listed below. The loss of community facilities or services, or the change of use of businesses to non-business or noncommunity uses, will be resisted.

Where a change of use that would result in the loss of a community asset or service, or the change of use of a business to a non-business or non-community use is proposed, this should demonstrate why the benefits arising from the proposal outweighs the harm to the community in respect of the loss of a local asset and must be supported by evidence to demonstrate that the existing use of the asset is no longer viable, including at least six months active marketing for an alternative community or business use, taking full account of local market conditions.



POLICY 2 Protection of open spaces and open areas

- The Village Hall field, the Recreation Ground and the Allotments, shown on Map 6, are designated as Local Green Space, where new development is ruled out other than in very special circumstances.
- Development must respect the character and appearance of the land identified on Map 7, at Avon river valleys, Manor Farm and Grove Wood. Map 6 Map 7

POLICY 3 High Speed Broadband

New development should, where appropriate, demonstrate how it will contribute to and be compatible with high quality communications including local fibre or internet connectivity. Where no internet provider is available, as a minimum and subject to viability, suitable ducting that can accept fibre should be provided either to:

Where possible and desirable, additional ducting should be provided that also contributes to a local access network; or a justified alternative location. The provision of additional ducting that contributes to a local access network for the wider community will be supported.

POLICY 4 Land off Sopworth Lane

- Up to 45 dwellings to serve diverse residential needs of which 40% should comprise affordable housing.
- Strategic landscaping and open space to retain and reinforce existing hedgerows, and to establish new areas of substantial planting and landscaping so as to mitigate the impact of the proposed development on both the existing PROW and the wider AONB.
- Development of the site should conserve and/or enhance heritage assets in a manner appropriate to their significance.

Development will be subject to the following requirements:

- 1. Development must not increase the risk of flooding elsewhere.
- 2. The provision of footpath and cycle links to both the proposed new surgery site and the western edge of the existing primary school as well as to the existing Parish playing fields to the north.
- 3. A design and layout that protects and preserves the character of the settlement and conserves the landscape and scenic beauty of the AONB.

- 4. A detailed Ecological and Mitigation Strategy that ensures that any future development of this site retains existing features and habitats of ecological value, minimises the impact on protected species and maximises the potential of retained habitats to enhance biodiversity.
- 5. An archaeological assessment.

POLICY 5 The Vicarage Site

Land at Site 2 (the Vicarage Site), as identified on Map 10, is allocated for mixed use development, to include:

- 3. Development should conserve the landscape and scenic beauty of the AONB. Development proposals should be supported by a masterplan taking account of the "Development Brief" and the "Design Brief" information set out in the supporting text.

POLICY 6 The Elms


Site 3 (The Elms), as identified on Map 12, is allocated for the development of around 4 dwellings. Development should conserve or enhance any heritage assets affected, including the setting of the Sherston Conservation Area. Development should also conserve the landscape and scenic beauty of the AONB.

Development proposals should be supported by a masterplan taking account of the "Development Brief" and the "Design Brief" information set out in the supporting text.



POLICY 7 Anthony Close

Proposals to upgrade or replace the existing sheltered accommodation on Anthony Close with a purpose-built care or close care facility will be supported.




POLICY 8 Highways Matters

The enhancement of inclusive access and crossings between the proposed new GP surgery on Site 1, the Sherston Primary School and the Post Office/Stores on the high street as well as key residential areas will be supported, so as to encourage all modes of non-vehicular access to these facilities.

POLICY 9 Protection of Sports Facilities

The loss of existing open space, sports and recreational buildings and land, including playing fields, will be resisted unless it can be clearly demonstrated that the open space, buildings or land is surplus to requirements; or the loss resulting from the proposed development would be replaced by equivalent or better provision in terms of quality and quantity in a suitable location; or the development is for alternative sports and recreation provision, the need for which clearly outweighs the loss.



POLICY 10 Land safeguarded for future recreational use

The development of Site 4 adjoining the Football Field, as shown on Map 15, for the expansion of existing sports facilities, will be supported.

POLICY 11 Erection of new or replacement sports facilities

The development of new/replacement changing rooms and club facilities at the Football Field will be supported.




