Capt John Matthews

John Matthews, the well-respected and liked Chairman of Sherston Parish Council, is to retire this month before the elections for the new council.

John was appointed some 20 years ago, a remarkably long period in office; his attendance record was exemplary. He has been a most effective chair. Courteous and patient, he always encouraged discussion from fellow councillors and members of the public, reaching a conclusion in a fair and decisive manner. Meetings were conducted in a collegiate atmosphere; the rare confrontational or tense situation was handled tactfully, often with gentle humour. Under John's leadership, the council meetings were the complete antithesis to the acrimonious and hilarious proceedings at Handforth Parish Council. He leaves a united and harmonious council.

He has been involved in all the significant developments in Sherston and was a hands-on chair, although he always delegated where appropriate. There have been many changes of enormous benefit to the village during his chairmanship, ranging from the introduction of The Cliffhanger and the village website to some major construction projects. The first was the building of the new primary school, which then led to the acquisition of the old school building, the formation of a community interest company, the raising of funding of over £900,000 and the conversion

of the building into the Co-op, Post Office and commercial units. This has proved to be remarkably successful and is generating surplus cash for the benefit of the village. Less visible but also significant was the production over several



years of the Neighbourhood Plan which will shape the future development of the village.

John led the team responsible for the utilisation of the sizeable legacy from the North family: the instalment of the new playground, the construction of the new pre-school and the renovation of the Scout Hut. All these facilities are for the benefit of the youth of the village in accord with the benefactors' wishes. At the time of writing, plans for the renovation of the village hall are well advanced and the parish council and the Tolsey Surgery are in protracted discussions with Wiltshire Council about a new surgery for the village, planned as part of the new housing estate bordering the primary school.

John will be remembered by such lasting monuments to his time as Chairman of the Parish Council and the village owes him a huge debt of gratitude.

After a year in which door-to-door collecting for Christian Aid week was not possible because of the pandemic, we are once again embarking on fundraising to help some of the poorest people in the world.

This year, the campaign focuses on the desperate need for better, safer water supplies in Kenya. The growing problems there have been caused by a changing climate which means that water no longer falls reliably as it did in past years and, when it does come, often brings disastrous floods. This problem is not limited to Kenya, however, and affects many countries around the world. I think we can already see changes in our weather here, making it more extreme and erratic. Where people are already poor, the difficulties are magnified, but we are protected by the resources of a rich country and most of us are not directly affected. Like coronavirus, climate change is a crisis destined to affect us all if it is not tackled. Covid Vaccine Update

The vaccine programme continues to go well, and we are on target to finish the second vaccines on our At Risk and over 50s population by the end of June.

Due to the nature of our lovely Tolsey building, undertaking the clinics 'in house' has meant disruption to our other services, particularly closure of the dispensary to ensure social distancing, and the reduction of staff who are being pulled out of normal duties to invite, coordinate, marshal and vaccinate at the clinics.

It has also meant that our phone lines have been hugely busy as over 90 patients per week phone in to book a vaccine, as well as coping with our normal telephone traffic.

For this we apologise and ask for your understanding through the next few months.

Thanks must go to all our staff who have stepped up, done extra hours, come in at weekends, stayed late and developed new skills in order to help achieve our vaccine targets – well done!

Our Primary Care Network has decided not to take up the project of vaccinating the fit under 50s group, which is the next Government target, because of this disruption, so this is being overseen and coordinated by the larger vaccine centres which have the capacity and do not have to offer any other health services.

Therefore when you are sent a request to book a vaccine in a larger centre, please take it up as we will not be able to accommodate you locally.

Staffing

At the start of this year, Dr Watkins was made an Educational Supervisor by the Severn Deanery. This means the Tolsey can also start having GPs in Training working at the practice, in addition to our continued work with the undergraduate medical students at Bristol University. We are very pleased to welcome Dr Sarah White who joined us in March. She has settled in well and will be with us until at least the end of this year.

We are also pleased to welcome Emma Green to our Dispensary Team who took up her post the week of 26 April. Emma is an experienced dispenser with vast experience, having worked in other dispensing outlets.

Other News

New Surgery - building works

Unfortunately, to date, we do not have any constructive developments to report regarding the starting date for the new GP surgery, despite efforts from John Thompson, our Wiltshire Councillor, and members of the Parish council.

We are of course still pursuing this as a matter of urgency.

The Big Sherston clean-up

Thank you to all involved in the clean-up around the village last month, which included the public area around the Tolsey Surgery. It looks so much better, and our nurse Sue doesn't have to park her bike in a virtual field!

Tolsey Surgery receives medical equipment from Malmesbury League of Friends

Malmesbury League of Friends (MLOF) has recently paid for two new items of medical equipment for use at the Tolsey Surgery.

MLOF paid approximately £1,000 for an INR machine to monitor the warfarin levels in patients receiving this medication to reduce blood clotting and it has donated £1,500 towards a new defibrillator (the thirteenth it has paid for in local villages).

Automatic external defibrillators have been described as the single most important development in the treatment of sudden cardiac arrest. Designed for use by untrained lay persons, they have improved the outcomes of literally thousands of people who have suffered from cardiac arrests.

MLOF has previously purchased items of medical equipment not available on the NHS for the Tolsey Surgery, as well as supporting the Malmesbury Primary Care Centre and deserving local charities and needy individuals.

Andrew Kolenda, the Tolsey practice manager, said: 'Once again, we are most grateful for the support from MLOF, whose help is much appreciated by everyone here and by our patients in Sherston.'

MLOF chairman David Hide said: 'We are delighted to have helped towards the installation of a new defibrillator and the ING machine in Sherston. Supporting our two local practices has always been our number one priority.'



Sherston Footpath Group 2021


Great news ... after a few years of absence the Sherston Footpath Group is back!

Let's start with a bit of history ...

Footpath rights are rooted in English Common Law and some have historically been in use for hundreds if not thousands of years. Often more recent ones were created to allow people to go to work, church and even the pub. Today anyone has a legally protected right to walk on a Public Right of Way such as public footpaths, byways and bridlepaths. Walkers can also use permissive paths where there is no legal right but where the landowner has kindly granted permission.

So, what prompted the revival?

Yes, you've probably guessed - the arrival of Covid-19! This dreadful disease meant that we were all impacted by the various restrictions placed on us and, as a result, had to think about how to make the best of a bad situation. One of the outcomes was that we were all much keener to spend more time in the 'great outdoors' and enjoy more time taking in the world around us. Whilst this was a positive in many respects, the change in our behaviours also had some downsides: more residents walking, more dogs, and more visitors from outside of the village accessing the surroundings. The general increase in 'roaming' subsequently caused concern for our local



farmers and landowners in terms of crop damage, dog poo, gates being left open, rubbish being left from picnics, and damage to fencing, hedgerows and signage.

These concerns ultimately resulted in many of the farmers requesting that residents and visitors stick to the defined Public Rights of Way and Permissive paths around the village, which unfortunately caused some fallout, specifically with residents raising concerns about their access being restricted to the Cliff.

As is fairly typical, what was a negative has turned into a bit of a positive, the Parish Council have revived the Footpath Group which is made up of volunteers from both the farming community and local residents.

What is the objective of the Group?

To provide a forum for landowners and local residents to work together, to provide and maintain a footpath network for the enjoyment of all, whilst ensuring all are fully aware of their responsibilities both when walking and in terms of maintenance. The first meeting of the Group was held on 15 April and was well attended by representatives from the farming community and local residents. The meeting was very constructive and productive, with several of our local farmers and residents offering their time, equipment and materials to help with maintenance of our Public Rights of Way. (This maintenance is strictly speaking the responsibility of Wiltshire Council, however all attendees were really keen to help where they could to make sure defined footpaths are accessible, safe and fit for purpose.)

On the subject of dog poo

One big issue arising from the first meeting was concern from both farmers and walkers about the amount of dog poo. Please pick up your dog's poo when walking on or near agricultural land. Parasites in some dog faeces have been shown to result in abortions in cattle and death in sheep. (Dog faeces can also cause a parasitic roundworm infection called toxocariasis in humans caused by handling contaminated soil.) With such a large number of dogs now being walked in the locality, it just makes sense to always pick up your dog's mess and keep our

fields clean. And, of course, no one likes dog mess on their shoes! The Countryside Code also requires dogs to be always under control and in sight at all times.

New Initiatives Grove Wood

Historically, it has been very difficult to create new footpaths and much easier to lose existing ones. In Sherston, we are extremely lucky to have access to our very own Community Wood - Grove Wood, which is leased from a local farmer on your behalf by Sherston Parish Council. One of the group's initial projects will be to freshen up Grove Wood and subsequently maintain it.

To widen and level the footpath towards the Brook End end of the path.

So, where can we walk and how should we behave when we do walk?

We are so lucky to have access to numerous walks around the village, 10 of which are circular and were developed by the previous Footpath Group, led by the late Phylip Harries, into a beautiful walks booklet which is available to purchase from the Coop at a cost of £10.

- Permissive path detail we also have access to four permissive paths kindly granted by local landowners. One of these permissive footpaths is along by the river from Mill

Cottage to Stretchline, one running out of the back of Grove Wood diagonally left across the field to the road which leads to Brook End. The other two are from Forlorn Bridge - further detail available here www.sherstonwalks.org.uk

Two specific areas to call out relate to Manor Farm ('the Cliff')— there are ONLY two Public Rights of Way on Manor Farm: SHER21 and SHER22. If you are walking, please familiarise yourselves with these paths. Historically, many walkers have assumed that visible footfall denotes a footpath; this is not the case. There are no walks along the riverbank and no access to Manor Farm (the Cliff) from the bottom of Brook Hill over the fencing opposite Stretchline. You will probably have observed that work has been undertaken to replace damaged fencing in that location as a result of people climbing over it and effectively trespassing. Future plans will involve relocating the waste bin and improving the signage in that location.

How can you help?

- Local walkers can do their bit too:
- Please stay on the defined footpaths.
- Please help us to work with landowners and farmers by not trespassing.

- Keep to the Countryside Code, help maintain footpaths, pick up litter and dispose of dog poo. The aim is for all to abide by the Countryside Code to protect and respect our countryside and for landowners and the public to collaborate and work together so we can all share and value our natural spaces. A Jaunt through the Years

Another excerpt from the late George Stephens' recollections and stories of bygone life in Sherston that he compiled in 1995.

The 1930s

Milk was not delivered in those early days. A jug would be taken to a dairy attached to the old building at the Rattlebone Inn. Some housewives fetched their milk from John Goodenough Hillier at Lower Farm, Fairlawn.

There were two blacksmiths in the village until the 1930s, one in the High Street between what is now a Butcher's shop (The Old Bell Inn) and the renovated 'Olde Church House'. Here lived and worked Harry Merchant, he succeeded his father Edmund who had operated the business from the Tolsey buildings. His advertisement in a church magazine of 1904 read: 'Horses shod on the latest approved principles'. The other blacksmith was opposite the Church on the left of the entrance to Gaston Lane, (It is at present a Bathroom display shop - in 1995). His name was Harry Soden, he was a small man, it was said locally that he was an ex-professional footballer. Harry was always rushing about, and became very breathless.



As a boy of 13 years, I spent many happy hours after school pumping the old forge bellows. There was only half light in the Smithy, the windows smothered with years of coal dust, the uneven floor covered with iron of all shapes and sizes. Dust-laden cobwebs hung like dirty curtains from the apex tiles, obscuring the roof timbers. They were visible only when the fire flared up with each downward push of the large leather bellows. The fire would glow red then white as the required heat was reached. The horseshoe would now be pushed into the centre of the fire with the help of very long tongs. Quickly the horseshoe glowed to a white heat, it was now ready to be beaten into shape. Harry quickly pulled it from the intense heat, it glowed like a bright star. Laying the shoe across the big iron anvil, he pounded it into the shape he wanted with the help of a heavy ball hammer. Only when he was satisfied with the shoe, would he stop and plunge it into a trough of dirty water to cool and to harden



it. The horseshoe hissed amidst clouds of acrid steam as it swiftly changed colour from red to black. Some horseshoes were made and stored, hanging on the black smoky beams. But if a horse was waiting to be shod, the shoe was quickly reheated and placed red hot upon the horse's hoof. With his leg over the animal's leg, Harry held the hoof firmly. As he placed the shoe in position, a thick cloud of yellow pungent smoke arose making me cough and choke, (now I know why Harry was always so breathless).

The help I gave, which was also of great interest to me, and was quite voluntary of course, did very little to preserve the state of my clothes, or the health of my lungs, but these things never crossed my mind then.

Mr Selwood (Alfred to his friends) lived in Back Street. He was a barber, cobbler and bootmaker. He also did quite a good job as a decorator. This latter occupation his son Ernest took on, becoming a full-time painter and decorator. He worked for many of the larger houses in the area.

There was another good shoe maker and mender who carried on his business quite close to Mr Selwood. His name was Percy Setter, and his shop was on the corner of Silver Street and Back Street. When entering his shop, one was aware of the strong smell of new leather and old shoes. Accompanying this was the unmistakable smell of boiled cabbage. It could be seen simmering away each day on a primus stove set upon the edge of the counter. A man of slight build, Percy was overshadowed by his wife, she being very tall, thin and wearing a look upon her face that suggested she carried more than her share of worry. She assisted her husband in the shop, attending to customers while watching over the cabbage. In fact they both spent most of their time behind the counter. The floor was always piled high with boots and shoes. Ladies', gents' and children's. Some were waiting to be repaired, others waiting for collection, but they were always jumbled up together. 'They be here somewhere,' was Percy's most common expression.


