Tolsey Times

...And what times we are having.

The coronavirus has affected us all, to lesser or greater degrees, and although the burden of illness has been low in this area it has caused a significant increase in anxiety levels and this has sometimes stopped people seeking timely medical help or advice. We ARE still running the usual GP services at the Tolsey and you should still contact us if you have health concerns. Do not put off seeking help until things return to 'normal'.

The surgery, like everyone else, has been affected by new rules and guidance on how to deal with the effects of the pandemic. Thankfully, we are in an area that has seen relatively fewer cases but that does not mean for one minute we should relax our guard. So, what are we doing specifically?

Total Triage

Under current NHS guidance, we are continuing a total triage for GP appointments which means no face-to-face appointments can occur without the prior

screening by a GP. This is both for urgent and non-urgent issues.

Many services such as routine blood tests, bloods pressures and family planning are being reintroduced by our nursing staff. You may have a screening phone call prior to your appointment to check you are well, with no symptoms of Covid 19 prior to attending the surgery.

What difference does this make? By reducing the footfall dramatically through the surgery, by screening patients, by use of PPE both for patients and staff we are keeping the risk of infection with Covid as low as possible. It also means we have fewer available appointments — we have cleaning between each patient, all the communal areas and changing PPE, all this takes time.

Dispensary

We appreciate your patience in adaptations to the ordering and collecting of medications. If you are happy to be sent a text when your prescription is ready, please make sure we have an up-to-date mobile number; it saves our staff a huge amount of time if they can text rather than phone.

The neighbourhood volunteers have done a fantastic job helping our elderly and shielded patients with medication drops and, as the shielding rules have lifted, many of our patients are now collecting prescriptions themselves. If you are someone who still needs to shield, and do not have a neighbour or relative to collect for them, please let us know.

Staff

Times they are a changing ...

We are very pleased to welcome Melanie and Michelle to our Dispensing and Reception team. They are both undergoing induction and training 'in house' so please give them a big smile especially if they are looking or sounding flustered (we can still smile over the phone, can't we?).

Goodbye to Grace who has worked with us for nearly a year. She is due to start medicine at Sheffield in September so is taking some well-earned time off before she starts.

More Goodbyes

Behind the scenes, for over 10 years, Margaret and Eric Thacker have delivered the monthly medication boxes to our housebound patients. This was a voluntary position, and they have continued through ice, fog and power cuts without a single complaint. We are hugely grateful for their service with a smile, and we will miss them popping in every month.

Flu Clinics in the VILLAGE HALL

The Tolsey is a wonderful, iconic building, but one thing it lacks is space for social distancing.

For this reason, our flu clinics this year are being held in the Village Hall. We have identified three Saturdays in October/November and are working on a simple, safe and swift service for all those eligible for a flu vaccine. ALL patients eligible will be sent a letter this year, asking them to attend a particular clinic. We are predicting a very high take-up, and we ask please to help us by reading the letter and attending the clinic you are invited to.



The Government still have to come up with a strategy to allow us to vaccinate the new group of people between 50 and 65. We await further details before we can look at how we can deliver this extra service.

Covid 19 Update

As suspected, there are waves of increased cases around the world, and nationally, as rules are relaxed. Figures released from a new study suggest that both swab and antibody testing underestimate the extent of coronavirus infections in the population, with at least one in five people infected not showing any symptoms.

So if you have returned from travel abroad, especially off a flight, be considerate to your friends and neighbours, do not think you haven't got Covid just because you feel well, keep your social distance, keep your mask on and avoid seeing anyone who may be at high risk.

The vaccine promised for autumn has not appeared as yet, and when it does will be available initially to the extremely vulnerable and healthcare workers only until the quantity of vaccine required can be manufactured, which may be some time off yet.

If you have not yet downloaded the Covid-19 study app, we would urge you to do so as it contains a wealth of information about the current understanding about the virus. It also enables the researchers (from King's College London) to accurately estimate the prevalence across the UK and they still need as many respondents as possible to keep using it. The app can be downloaded if you search for the 'COVID symptom study' in your app store, or copy this link: https://covid.joinzoe.com/

Finally

We are updating our website with a newsletter regularly, and will publish dates of our flu clinics on there as well.

We have signed up to a new self-help App called Doctorlink, which is a diagnostic flow chart to help patients decide whether they need to see a health practitioner, and if so which one. We are currently attaching this via a link to the surgery system, so that if the algorithm suggests a GP or nurse appointment is needed, that request comes straight to us, rather than going through our reception staff.

Confessions of a Composting Virgin

It all started a few months ago when we needed some compost for the garden. So I fought my way through the mud and the nettles, clambered over the wheelbarrow and peeled away the ivy to find our compost bin which is 'discreetly hidden' behind the shed. It was practically empty because we can't ever get to it to to use it. No problem – despite the lockdown we were able to order some compost online and get it delivered (thank you Hortico!).

All of which got me thinking. We put all our garden waste in our green bin and pay the council £50 a year to take it away. And then in the spring we buy compost! This was an expensive bit of laziness simply because we couldn't access our compost bin ...

There was of course an easy fix. I cleared away the weeds and the ivy, relocated the wheelbarrow and promised myself that walking the extra few paces to the compost bin would be worth the sacrifice.

But what could I put in now that I could actually get to it? A quick Google search later and I discovered that with cold composting I can only dump fruit and vegetable scraps, tea bags, egg shells, etc. Meat, fish and cooked food can only be added if I am hot composting.

So ... hot and cold composting? Another Google search later and it turns out that cold composting is very much a 'dump it in a bin / pile and forget it' method. And in a year's time — maybe longer — you will have compost. But by introducing certain factors, such as aeration and the correct ratio of differing waste product, micro-organisms at the centre of the pile will produce an intense heat which will greatly increase the speed of the whole process - you could have compost in as little as a month.

Wiltshire Council is so eager to cut down on food waste (which goes to landfill) that it is willing to subsidise the purchase of a 'hot' composting bin

for its residents. This led me on to the 'Great Green Systems' website - https://www.greatgreensystems. com/. Here, I found that as a Sherston resident (all I had to do was type in my postcode), I could purchase a 'Green Johanna' hot composting bin with a kitchen food waste caddy for £50 (including delivery) instead of £128.

So we have had our 'Green Johanna' for about a month now. I initially filled it with the correct recommended layers and ratios to start the process with the garden waste I had been saving and got it to about the ¾ full mark. This worried me. However, despite adding to it constantly - including daily food waste – the level hasn't raised in the slightest. And when I give it a stir I can feel the heat it is giving off, so the hot composting process is definitely working.

We had a minor problem with fruit flies in the bin which was instantly solved by giving it a stir. But other than that all is going well. This will hopefully save some money and although the environmental impact may be minimal it is certainly a step in the right direction ...

Tetbury Hospital needs your support

Twenty-seven years ago, the local community fought hard to ensure that Tetbury Hospital's services could continue. The impact of Covid-19 is severely stretching our ability to deliver those services, so we are asking for your urgent financial support.

Tetbury Hospital supported the NHS fight against Covid-19 by lending lifesaving equipment to a frontline hospital. Our Minor Injuries Unit (MIU) and X-ray services have remained open as usual, helping take pressure off the major NHS trauma centres.

However, Covid-19 has now pitched us into uncertainty and as we slowly and safely reopen services it is becoming increasingly clear that the protective measures we must take to keep people safe are significant and very costly.

It will not be possible to see as many patients during a clinic as before and the cost of PPE is rising significantly. Additionally, in line with guidance to maintain patient safety and social distancing, we have relocated our MIU to another area of the hospital that has its own entrance. We also need to increase our staffing levels to manage the new clinical processes and to ensure that additional cleaning is undertaken in all areas, and in each consulting room, after every patient.



Calcot C19 Dinners - Sherston Allocation stats



At the beginning of lockdown, Calcot Manor Hotel decided not to take the opportunity to furlough their chefs but to keep all of them on.

With the hotel and restaurants shut, the chefs' time was spent producing free meals for Malmesbury, Tetbury and some of the surrounding villages, including Sherston.

We were fortunate to receive nearly 500 of these meals over the period. The description below is a fascinating insight into the wide scope of both the recipients and their circumstances.

We owe huge thanks to Calcot, its staff and the generosity of the Stone family, Calcot's owners, as well as to those who administered the whole village scheme and to the volunteers who collected and distributed all the meals.



When

30 days (Monday, Wednesday and Fridays) from 6 April until 12 June

What

The Sherston crate contained 489 dinners for Sherston to allocate

- 14 meals on 1 day
- 15 meals on 19 days
- 19 meals on 10 days

Collected and delivered to the recipients (along with Heal's meals to Shipton Moyne and Luckington) primarily by Nic Fisher, and regularly by Suzie Power and young son Oscar and Martin Smith and once by Caroline Moore.

Who

219 different people in Sherston, Pinkney, Easton Grey, Willesley and an exceptional case in Luckington received a meal from Calcot Manor:

76 single people

45 couples

10 families

Plus 33 dinners to the hard-working staff at the Tolsey and Sherston Stores and two to Sherston Eggs.

- 2 fathers of three whose young wives passed away with cancer during lockdown
- 5 families or couples caring for a family member undergoing cancer treatment – including one diagnosed with childhood leukaemia just before lockdown

A single parent of two young children, diagnosed with cancer during lockdown

- 3 elderly single people with a new cancer diagnosis
- 3 over 75s who broke limbs wrists / arms during lockdown and found cooking hard that week
- 6 who'd just come out of hospital
- 5 recently bereaved (in the last four months) and many more widowed in the last year
- 1 frontline care home worker on 10-day stints and young family to feed
- 1 self-employed couple with young family, no work, and mother-in-law with terminal cancer care

Some self-employed families waiting to get govt help just needing a little lift

A fit over-70s couple whose beloved dog passed away during lockdown

A couple who'd just moved to Sherston from America and early on in lockdown had their family home broken into.





And quite a few more positive cases were helped too, including:

A 94-year-old lady doing well with self-isolating, but this would be a treat for her. She has been going to Calcot for years for family parties, lunch, author visits, etc, so it would be the closest thing to getting her there!

Some self-isolating elderly who met friends for meals out / special occasions at Calcot / even one's husband's wake at Calcot – all loving the Calcot-hug

A daughter nominated her Mum for a 70th special meal as her Dad is officially useless – her words

Someone back from working 30 nights solid fitting out the Nightingale Wales hospital – then back to Sherston in seven days self-isolation

A lady who looks after all her neighbours throughout the year and is always to help anyone although she doesn't have good health herself

A 19-year-old training to be a nurse now redeployed to working on COVID19 ward, seeing horrors so young and on minimum wage

2 young couples back from hospital with their first newborns on their first night at home.

Those who can from Sherston have said how much they are looking forward to a celebration meal in the Gumstool or Conservatory.

I have just read with interest Cilla Liddington's 'A village history', and found my hardly recognisable mug shot on page 38. It set me thinking. I was 15 when that was taken and it was at that camp that I took decisions that determined the rest of my life.

Post-war Sherston was in many respects a kind of hybrid between Laurie Lee's Cider with Rosie and Under Milk Wood by Dylan Thomas. It is almost unrecognisable from the village of today. The posh kids all went to private schools and weren't around much. They were all destined to get good jobs anyway and were discouraged from associating with us ruff village erks. The rest of us were either destined for the farms or the building and maintenance trades. If you made grammar school then an engineering apprenticeship was a possibility down at the Echo works in Malmesbury. I never fancied that. Working inside a factory held no appeal. It was Charlie Dyson that pointed me to a way out. If you stay on at school and take your O Levels and then do A's you could apply for training as a teacher. This was not appealing either. I was yet to do my O Levels let alone A's and my school record to date was mixed at best. My parents would let me stay on and do O Levels making great sacrifice but A Level? Charlie's master stroke was standing between us in that photograph on Page 38.

Skipper Charlie asked Alan Evans to join us at camp and he was able to make the experience he got as part of his training as a P.E. teacher at Loughborough College. Over the campfire at night Alan told us of his marvellous adventures whilst at Loughborough. Work did not come into it. It was sport, more sport, parties and girls and a professional qualification at the end of it. So this was the reward for spending two years serving Queen and country after leaving school? So this is how the other half lived I thought, and a job for life too, doing what I have always wanted to do, and one my father unintentionally was doing his best to stop me from. Dad saw me as an apprentice carpenter and a potential Lay Preacher. There was no way I was going down that road. He had been denied a grammar school education himself so he was happy that I could go to the grammar. Returning from camp to Sherston, I spoke to the skipper and he agreed to speak to my parents. My mother became an enthusiastic ally and we would wait to see what kind of O Levels I could get. Now it was up to me. I had one year left and a lot of catching up to do to prove that I was good enough. I resolved to change my ways and take my studies seriously. Thus an unofficial contract was made. I would get my O Levels and if successful go on to A's then apply to Loughborough College. I spent the rest of the summer break working a 52-hour week in the building industry. At last I had motivation to succeed.

God Bless the NHS:

The People's Army who defend the sick

The National Health Service is our army to defend the sick, and we rely on it today more than ever before. Everybody knows that it came into existence as a result of the political ideals of Nye Bevan, but most probably do not know how those ideals became a reality. The family history and motivation of the leading medic at the time, Hugh Lett, is one which is particularly relevant in the midst of our present COVID-19 crisis.

Hugh Lett was born in 1876, served as a surgeon in the military hospitals on the Western Front in World War I, and was appointed President of the Royal College of Surgeons in 1938. In 1946, he was appointed President of the British Medical Association, and thus was in office when the extensive work took place to turn Nye Bevan's ideal into an effective health service.

The creation of a People's Army to defend the sick was something very close to Hugh's heart. In 1854, Hugh's grandfather, Dr Richard Lett, aged 39, was the village GP in Silverstone, Northamptonshire, a village not dissimilar to Sherston in those days. He was therefore very much in the front line when the village was struck in that year by a highly contagious illness which the medical profession did not yet understand; its name was cholera. It was brought to the village by a maidservant returning from a distant town to visit her widowed mother. Unknowingly, she was carrying cholera and quickly passed it on to others in Silverstone. The disease swept through the village. There was no vaccine. Dr Lett set about his work with compassion, energy and enthusiasm, hoping to find some cure for cholera. Eventually, Dr Lett caught the disease and died on 12 September, leaving a widow and five young children.

The village recovered and regenerated. Dr Lett's widow brought up his children, and his only son also became a doctor and practised as a GP. He had eight children, the eldest of whom, Hugh Lett, followed his father and grandfather into medicine.



It was against that family background that Hugh Lett worked with the politicians to create the National Health Service. He knew only too well what the consequences of a lethal epidemic could be, and how much the people of this country needed the defence they now have. When Sir Hugh Lett, Bt [as he then was] died in 1964, his obituary included the following: 'His wise statesmanship proved invaluable to the profession and the nation in preparing for the start of the National Health Service.'

The message of history, and that of Silverstone in 1854, is that we will come through this sad and depressing time. COVID-19 is not the first devastating mystery illness to strike us. We will grieve those who we lose or have lost, but life will go on. We must think of the future, and of the hope that our children and grandchildren will grow up, have happy lives, and go on to great things. Richard Lett died on the front line, but his grandson Hugh went on to help to create the National Health Service.

WI Report



The local WI, like all those in the country has been unable to meet for its normal monthly meetings with speakers since March. Various Wiltshire WIs that we know about have been holding virtual meetings and, in the good weather, garden meetings with strict social distancing. In Sherston we have several members who have been self-isolating for many weeks but we have been keeping them informed about lectures and talks provided by the Wiltshire Federation and Denman College, the WI's very own college which is closed at the moment but is offering virtual courses, some for as little as £5. On 15 July, it was possible to learn more about Adelaide Hoodless, a Canadian and co-founder of the WI in the 1850s.

Back in May, all WIs in the country should have been voting on which Resolution out of six put forward by different WIs they would like to take forward to put before the Government for action. The final vote normally takes place at the Annual Meeting, which of course had to be cancelled this year and prevented the usual resolution process being completed. The National Federation Board decided that the most democratic way forward, taking into account time and resource constraints, was to adopt the two resolutions – A call to increase potential stem cell donor registration and To End Modern Slavery – that had attracted such a clear majority from members - over 70%.

The Wiltshire Federation Annual Meeting in October is now scheduled to take place as a virtual meeting but we do hope to be able to restart our monthly meetings in the Village Hall before too long. In the meantime, the committee has been holding Zoom monthly meetings and the President has been keeping in touch with our members with a weekly letter.


