Sherston Village Hall Update

VILLAGE HALL

The building project is going on apace and we can all see now that it is going to be a wonderful addition to our much-loved Village Hall.

The committee has received questions and comments about its completion so we would like to answer some of the queries.

The stonework looks very bright at the moment but it will mellow and weather in time, not to completely match the original tithe barn, at least not for several hundred years, but it is genuine Cotswold stone.

However, using genuine stone tiles on the new roof would have been prohibitively expensive. They will instead be good quality, reconstituted stone tiles, as seen on many buildings in the area.

The original architect's drawings showed that the large windows and doors of the entrance would be oak framed. However, when a new architect was appointed to produce detailed working drawings, he recommended that we have painted aluminium frames, which are low maintenance, lighter and more elegant, and also cheaper than oak. The committee thinks that they will be a great success, draughtproof and easy to look after, and it is hoping to replace the kitchen and small hall windows to match. The same type of windows and doors will be installed into the opening into the main hall, which will make a huge difference to the look and feel of the building.

The committee is aware that these changes may not be what some people were anticipating, however rest assured that every decision has been carefully considered in view of usability, cost and aesthetics, and the result will be a building to be proud of. The project is well on track to be completed by the end of November, and in the meantime, the small hall and main hall can be used pretty much as normal.

Collecting crabapples for a good cause!





This September, local condiment maker Tracklements is encouraging the local community to don their wellies, take a walk in the countryside and start collecting crabapples for a terrific cause!

Tracklements is partnering with Sherston school and youth groups to collect crabapples which it will then turn into English Crabapple Jelly; beautifully golden, rich, and fruity – it's the perfect partner for strong Cheddar cheese and divine in a roast pork roll!

Tracklements gives the groups 50p for every kilogram of crabapples donated, and a further 25p from the sale of every jar sold nationwide. Over the last couple of years, this project has helped raise around £2,000 so, if you donated crabapples or bought a jar of English Crabapple Jelly, thank you very much!

Alongside making sensational jelly, the Crabapple Project is a great way to teach Sherston's young people about the provenance of their food by teaching them the process from tree to jar as well as using up fruit which may otherwise go to waste. Crabapples are 'wild' apples and can often be found in British hedgerows, nestled amongst other trees.

Reporting issues to Wiltshire Council Sherston Parish Co



The Parish Council is contacted on a fairly regular basis by residents raising issues regarding highways, footpaths and signage, but did you know that you can report issues yourself directly to Wiltshire Council through either online at www.wiltshire.gov. uk/mywilts-online-reporting or by downloading the MyWilts App on your smartphone and logging in from there.

What is MyWilts?

MyWilts is an online tool enabling you to book services and report issues to Wiltshire Council simply, quickly and easily. The services available include reporting road and street issues, fraud and trading standards in the Wiltshire Council area.

How does it work?

You can choose to set up an account online, or download the app from the App Store. Issues can be logged anonymously if you prefer. Once you have reported an issue, you will be given a reference number and will be able to track progress online.

When reporting, you can provide the location of the issue, a description of the issue and even add a photograph if you have one.

So, what issues can you report? The list is pretty comprehensive and the site will provide you with options. Below are some examples of the type of issues you can report (the list is not exhaustive):

- Abandoned Vehicles
- Parking

- Roads, pavements and footpaths this includes but is not limited to:-
- Bus Stops
- Materials on roads
- Pavement and kerb issues
- Potholes
- Public rights of way blocked, inaccessible, issues with stiles, crops or the surface itself
- Road drains or manholes blocked or broken
- Road markings faded or illegible
- Road signs, bollards or railings faded, broken, knocked down
- Street lighting
- Rubbish/Recycling
- Trees, hedges and grass this is an interesting one. If, for example, one of these is sited on council land and is not being maintained, you can contact the council via MyWilts to ask to them to undertake maintenance. If the item is on private land but causing an issue with a public footpath, you can raise with Wiltshire Council who will make contact with the property owner and ask them to undertake the relevant maintenance.

Having used the site, it is very user-friendly and guides you through the type of information Wiltshire Council needs to address any issues you may have identified. Why not give it a go?

Sherston WI



Our speaker at the July meeting arrived with three very large suitcases. Sara Bottomley, the wife of an army officer is a quilter. Well, she started making patchwork having spied two small hexagon templates whilst she was a student nurse in London. During her nursing career, she moved to various parts of England and continued to become better at quilting.

At 30, she married her army husband and this led to many moves overseas. The first was Cyprus where she joined a quilting class and whilst there made two quilts. Then there was a posting back to England and three different areas. Whilst in England, Sara was working part-time and she also started a quilt for her parents' ruby wedding. Sara's husband's qualifications as a rugby coach and referee gave them the opportunity to go to Westpoint, USA for three years and this was heaven for Sara with so many fabric shops and much equipment available in the States. Next stop was Kuwait where Sara joined a multinational group and where she became the leader of the group which met in her house. Next it was to be Zimbabwe but unfortunately this did not happen and Sara returned to the UK for a year whilst her husband was posted to Kosovo.

After a year, their penultimate posting was to Nairobi where getting around central Nairobi was alarming, with U-turns on motorways, crazy house numbering, etc. Sara joined a quilting group which was run from her house. When she left, her friends each made a sample square in similar materials so that she could put them together onto a quilt. The last posting was to The Falklands - a land of sheep and wool and knitting - no quilting groups but Sara did make herself a quilt whilst there.

Over the years, Sara's skills have moved on from very basic, strictly following patterns to improvising when not sure what to do, to developing her own skills for choosing materials, mixing patterns to the best effect and perfecting her quilting skills. It was a long time before she moved on from hand quilting to machine quilting. Sara showed us wonderful samples as she shared her story and it was a truly fascinating evening. Sara's husband retired some years ago and they now live in Wiltshire.

At the August meeting, members very much enjoyed an in-house general knowledge quiz and at the September meeting we shall be hearing from Hannah Griffin of Sustainable Sherston prior to the Great Big Green Week which runs from 24 September to 2 October. Sherston Apple Day



Sunday 9 October, 10.00am- 3.00pm. Bring your surplus apples!

Apple Day takes place at the village hall and field - by the orchard's young fruit trees. We will be demonstrating apple pressing and inviting everyone to take part. There will also be apple-themed games in the hall (courtesy of the Friends of Sherston School) and local produce and crafts on sale.

We welcome all local surplus apples (eaters and cookers) from your trees! Please deliver to the side of the shed at the front of the village hall any time from 5.00pm on Friday 7 October to 5.00pm on Sunday 9 October.

After the pressing demonstrations on Sunday, we will be juicing the bulk of the apples with our brand new equipment, courtesy of grants from our Malmesbury Area Board and the Wessex Water Environment Fund. The Wessex Water Environment Fund supports charitable and community activities that have a positive impact on the local environment.

The Sustainable Sherston Apple Day and juicing is a celebration of our local produce. It also reduces waste and raises awareness of local apple varieties. By selling the juice locally (via the Courtyard Café, The Angel and outside the Co-op) we will raise funds for the school and for Sustainable Sherston projects, whilst also reducing our carbon footprint by cutting out transportation and packaging. The orchard is a great community space. It is planted and managed to increase biodiversity.

On 26 July, we had an outing to Gloucester Quays. It was a lovely day with plenty of different things to do. Some sat by the docks and enjoyed the fresh air, others had a boat trip, some saw the sights, and some hit the outlet shopping centre with lots of bargains.

On 3 August, we were invited to Sue and Pete Thompson's for a Garden Party at their Easton Grey home. Members relaxed in the garden with tea and scones and had a lovely time. Our grateful thanks to Sue and Pete for their hospitality. It was a very pleasant afternoon.

On 9 August, our speakers were Susan and Maria, volunteers at Athelstan Museum, who told us all about the Malmesbury Coin Hoard. The coins were found by a metal detectorist in a field at Milbourne, Malmesbury in 2012. There were 1,266 coins in a broken pot. Some were copper alloy and some had a silver wash. They dated from between 286AD and 317AD, when Roman currency changed. They were minted by various emperors and were minted in five different countries.

With a generous grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund, further grants from the Association of Independent Museums and Malmesbury Area Board and donations from the public, volunteers were trained to do the necessary recording and photographing prior to the coins being professionally conserved. The coins are now on display at the Athelstan Museum. A very interesting afternoon.

Simon Adams - Sherston's Motorbike Racing Champion?



Sherston's very own Simon Adams has been storming ahead in his first season of motorbike racing. The 39-year-old is currently leading his class at the Metzeler Newcomer 1000 Championship, competing at circuits including Silverstone, Brands Hatch and Donington Park.

He's got his eyes on the prize and is already planning for next year's season. He's intending to form a team for the prestigious ACU National Endurance 1000 Powered By Pirelli championship, and moving up a sprint class to the SBS Brakes Cup 1000 championship. In anticipation of this, he's created a race team brand, T3S Racing, to support his quest for sponsorship for 2023.

The 2022 season has been full of excitement, highs and lows, and battles for every point won.

Moments of high drama include: racing with a fever, his main rival crashing two bikes in two races, missing a race because of a bad Tannoy system, and his contact lenses blowing off mid-race! He's completed six rounds so far with two more rounds in September and October. Simon is ahead by a margin of just 15.5 points. Can he hold the lead?

Simon got into motorbikes through the classic route of childhood indoctrination! Brought up around bikes, he spent his earliest holidays in a sidecar attached to a Vincent. In his teens, he rode a Yamaha YZ 250s, MZs and mopeds. After a detour into cars, he returned to bikes in his late 20s - picking a Ducati 749 as his first road bike (admittedly it was tatty, but full of character). A succession of Pierre Terblanche-era Ducatis followed.

This was when the need for speed really took hold! Simon took his bike off the road to allow a racing-focused setup and hired a racing coach to work with him on track days. Once he commit-ted to racing, he upgraded to an Aprilia RSV4 RF.

As Simon looks towards the 2023 season - his ambitions naturally set high - his race team is seeking sponsorship. It's a fabulous sport to be engaged with, the tension and excitement can't be beaten, and Simon is committed to ensuring that his sponsors get a bespoke and meaningful experience when they support him.

Sustainable Sherston Home Improvements – Insulation



Continuing the series of Sustainable Sherston Home Improvements, we will briefly conclude the subject of insulation with a quick summary of the last remaining item not already covered in previous articles: wall insulation.

Most old houses (like ours) have solid walls, with cavity walls becoming the norm from the 1920s and cavity wall insulation starting from the 1970s and becoming compulsory from the 1990s. Houses built in the last century with cavity walls but without insulation can be 'retrofitted': this entails having holes drilled into the exterior walls and insulation material injected into the cavity. Typical cost is £400-£800.

Thick solid stone walls may seem to provide good insulation, but in fact they are quite poor, although they do have a high 'thermal mass': in other words they take a long time to heat up and cool down. There are two main ways of insulating solid walls, either internally or externally, and there are pros and cons to both, but if not done correctly damp will become a serious problem, so professional consultation and contractors are generally required. Cost is also significant in the £10,000+ range for a whole property, so will take a long time to pay for itself.

The exponential increase in electricity costs has sparked (sorry!) a corresponding interest in solar panels. There are two main types of solar panels: Photo Voltaic (PV – ie: electrical) and Thermal (ie: hot water). These days, PV are by far the most dominant, principally as their cost has reduced massively (by about 2/3) over the past 10 years whilst Thermal have not, meaning that Thermal rarely makes financial sense. Also, you can use 'spare' PV electrical solar power not being used elsewhere in the hometo power an immersion heater in the hot water tank, thus obviating the need for Thermal panels and the associated two-coil tank and extra plumbing.

However, Thermal solar panels can be bought as a kit and installed by a competent DIYer for around £2500. I chose a system with the tubes in a box and automatically operated blinds for safety: the water in your tank cannot be allowed to boil and normally should not exceed 70°C, but on sunny days, if you do not use much hot water, without intervention the solar panels would continue to absorb heat and pump it into the tank. Most systems just turn the pump off when the tank temperature reaches around 70°, but the water in the panels is still heated by the sun and with nowhere for the heat to go, can boil into superheated steam which did not sound very appealing to me. In the system I chose, the pump is turned off when the tank reaches 70° and the blinds cover the tubes. It also has Holiday Mode on the controller (like on your central heating), to make the blinds cover the tubes for the period you are away when you will not be using hot water.

Returning to PV, any excess power you feed back to the grid from your solar panels typically will earn you only 5p a kWh, whereas you may be paying 40p kWh for power used from the grid, hence it makes sense to use as much of the power you generate as possible and minimise your 'exported' power. An ideal addition to solar panels are batteries: these store the power you generate and don't use during the day for use later (eg in the evening or at night). Unfortunately they are quite expensive, typical batteries will cost around £1000 per kWh capacity, or there are now plenty of adverts for combined solar panel and battery installations (eg 3.8kW panels with a 6.5kWh battery for £10,000). Payback period will obviously depend on the future cost of electricity and how much power you use, but at the moment can be a low as five years.

A cheaper alternative to batteries is to divert your excess generated power somewhere else in the home: a smart power diverter will automatically feed excess power to the immersion (eg Myenergi Eddi for around £400) if you have a hot water tank. Similarly a smart home EV charger will divert excess power to your EV (eg Myenergi Zappi). Our solar panels are just over 3kW and on a sunny day in summer will add about 40 free miles range to our car, in addition to powering the house.

There is a common misconception that solar panels can power your heating in winter etc, but because of our northerly latitude, the great majority of solar power is generated in the summer months and minimal amounts in cloudy or even sunny days in mid-winter when the sun angle is very low. As an example, an 8kW heat pump may use 3kW when heating a house in midwinter, while 3.8 kW panels may only deliver 0.4kW of electricity on a cloudy winters' day.

So in conclusion, if you have a suitable property with southeast to southwest facing roofs, and you have the available capital for the upfront costs, now might be an excellent time to invest in Solar PV. I will cover other aspects of EVs in a future article.



Volunteer Health and Well-being Champion 55+ and Carers for Malmesbury Community Area

You may well have known Ellen Blacker from Dauntsey who was employed for many years by Wiltshire Council to fill this role and regularly communicated with our Malmesbury and Community Area through the parish newsletter network. Ellen started a well-earned retirement last year and received the British Empire Medal for all her great local work over many years.

I have recently taken on a slightly different role on a voluntary basis in line with other similar roles across Wiltshire Council; my role will now be to represent the views of older people and carers at both a local and countywide level about their experiences of health and social care. In relation to the Malmesbury Area Board, the champion role is particularly relevant in addressing the Board priority of reducing loneliness and isolation and how we can address this. I have a great working link with our area Community Engagement Manager in Wiltshire Council.

A little about me - I retired two years ago after forty years as a social worker in the community and in service management in mental health and adult social care services. Instead of going miles up and down the motorway, I would now like to use this experience in this new role to get to know the views and needs of people where I have lived for more than 35 years (in Corston) - and make sure these are shared. I would like to meet up with people in Malmesbury and the surrounding parishes, both individually and visiting the extraordinary number of different groups in our area. I hope to feed back some of this in the parish newsletters on a regular basis and include useful information from the excellent Wiltshire Money Forum as I attend their updates.

In this first communication I would also like to introduce our new Malmesbury Area Public Living Room in Malmesbury Library every Tuesday from 1.30pm to 4.30pm. We are affiliated to the Camerados network which calls them 'comfortable places where people look out for each other'. The idea for setting this up came from a Community Engagement meeting with Malmesbury Health Centre. I am there every week with Jan Forsyth, Jan is a Community Connector with Wiltshire Centre for Independent Living working across North Wiltshire. Together we visited Devizes Public Living Room, set up initially by her colleague, and we were so impressed by its open welcome that we've set up our own. The Malmesbury Area Public Living Room is in its second month and most weeks new visitors call in, as well as people who come regularly.
