We want to take this opportunity to say a HUGE thank you Sherston - thank you to everyone who looked after us, fed us, checked on us, looked after the dog, all the messages, the lovely cards, the presents, everyone who did school runs for us, our wonderful neighbours, all the staff at Sherston School, everyone at Pumpkins and the team at the church. We appreciate and thank you ALL for helping us while going through every parents' worst nightmare. We feel incredibly lucky to live in such a lovely village.

Another thank you is to the Wallace and Gromit's Grand Appeal and Cots for Tots for providing us with accommodation while Eva was in intensive care. This meant one of us was always close by.

To give something back and help these charities, I have set myself a bit of a challenge. I am planning to run 4km every hour on the hour for 25 hours. That is 100km in total, more than two marathons! I am starting at 5.00pm on Friday 10 September.

I am really hoping to raise as much money as possible so the Grand Appeal can continue to provide accommodation for families with sick children. I



also plan to direct some of the money raised to the Paediatric Intensive Care Unit. One thing we really appreciated was having access to an iPad - online TV and a family Zoom provided much-needed distractions.

I have been overwhelmed by the support so far over £1,000 has been donated. Please, please sponsor me, every pound will help those 4km laps go by less painfully! Also if you'd like to run with me, I am creating a rota and at this rate will have a different runner/runners accompanying me with every single lap!

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Why I Ring



Sherston Bells in action

The Sherston bells

There are records of bells in Sherston in 1553 but the current splendid tower was not built until 1730. Bells were rung for three centuries in the village but by the early 1900s the bells were considered unsafe, and ringing ceased. The last time the bells were rung properly was to celebrate the relief of Mafeking.

By 1979, money had been raised to re-hang the old bells and add a sixth bell. Since then, numerous villagers have learnt to ring ensuring that the bells have been rung regularly for the last 42 years.

Ringers are drawn from all walks of life; modern bells require little physical strength and many ringers do not attend church regularly. Every year about 25% of the ringing fraternity retire from ringing for whatever reason. In normal times, these ringers would be replaced by new first-time ringers but because of the pandemic no new ringers could be trained and many bands of ringers are finding it difficult to keep going.

If that is not enough to encourage you, we invited current ringers to say a few words about why they ring ...

Chris Pickthall (Tower Captain)

I took up ringing when I was about 16 down in Devon. I had been a boy chorister and didn't fancy joining the men's choir. By the age of 19, I was the tower captain for an eight-bell tower, but I left home for university and the RAF and didn't ring again for 25 years until we moved to Sherston. For 10 years, I worked and stayed in London during the week so I could only ring on Sundays. However, there are plenty of excellent bell towers in London, so I was able to keep my hand in. I became Tower Captain during this time, but I was unable to attend practice night until I retired 12 years ago.

Pip Bartlett (Deputy Captain)

In 2016, I decided I needed a new challenge – learn a new skill- and that year Chris and the team ran an 'Open Tower' session to encourage new ringers. It was not anything I had considered before, but I was intrigued to see how people pulling ropes translated into the sounds that came out of that tower on a Sunday morning. It was daunting, but with tuition I began to get the hang of it, and now I am hooked. From my perspective bellringing is not about music, but about rhythm and teamwork, and the satisfaction of hearing the bells ringing out as we all 'pull together'.

Laura Edgecombe

Back in 2009, my husband and I made a New Year's Resolution to resurrect a dying art. I chose bellringing.

It was like nothing I had done before and quite a challenge but, with tuition from the lovely Jerome Pegler (remember him?), I got to grips with the ropes and even competed in a competition.

Ringing is really good for your brain, and they are a friendly bunch too. The Sherston Ringers are great and anywhere you go, if there are bells in the church you are made welcome to join in with any ringing. There is even a website where you can check the practice nights and contact the tower captain in advance to say hi.

I even rang (at the very last minute) at my sister's wedding in Hertfordshire. I could hear only seven bells and I knew there were eight so I nervously climbed the stairs to join them. They were thrilled.

In case you're wondering, my husband failed at the resolution...

Graham Morris (Tenor)

It was 2007 when Sue and I finally retired, and I became free on Wednesday evenings, so I took up bellringing. (The second half of the training, in the Rattlebone, had something to do with it!) I had never rung before but was made very welcome on the floor. Now, 2021, I am still at it. I found out quite early that I like ringing the heavy bells. Today, as 'Father of the Tower' (I am 82, by the way), I claim my right to pull (ring) the Tenor! (The heaviest 'timekeeper' bell. Ed) Great fun, fellowship and exercise. Come and try it.

Jim Bartlett

I have always loved old buildings, and churches hold a particular aroma of books, wood, rope and stone. When you run your hand over the ancient walls whilst climbing to the ringing chamber you are following the fingertips of generations of ringers past, and this feeling intensifies once you hear the bells ring two floors above you.

I only started a couple of years ago. I am not in the least religious (not all ringers are churchgoers) and I was drawn to try ringing as a different way to expand my horizons socially in a new village and with a new skill to attempt. It felt daunting at first, but with plenty of encouragement from the other ringers I began to feel confident handling the rope and sally (the fluffy bit) and getting the bell to sound at the correct moment. I

am still very much a beginner and there is a lot more to learn.

All in all, a good brain workout, some physical effort and an excuse to gather in the Rattlebone afterwards for a pint with friends.

Ann Simpson

I started ringing the bells when I was around 12/13. I was taught by Ron Lacey and Gordon Edwards; it was around 1980!

I found other activities to fill my time (mainly hanging around the Jubilee Tree) but returned to the tower around 2012 to take up this hobby once again. It's great for anyone looking for a new challenge (you don't have to be a churchgoer to be a bellringer), but for me there's nothing like the sound of bells ringing out on a Sunday morning or to celebrate a wedding.

Martha Pugh

I started bellringing as part of my 'skills' section in my DofE award and have enjoyed it so much that I have continued it two years later. I enjoy the social aspect of ringing and the community that it creates. I like how there isn't a pressure to go to the church afterwards and that you don't have to go every week to be a welcomed ringer.

Jack Doyle

I started ringing about nine years ago in Alderton by joining a band of new recruits captained by Peter Story who asked to use Alderton bells as they were unable to ring in their church in Luckington. Practice on a Thursday enabled us to ring for the monthly Alderton Church service.

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
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
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Athelstan Museum Events Autumn 2021



Home improvements: Keeping your feet (and house) warm





Following on from the last article about the cheapest and simplest measures to save energy and money in home heating, I am going to up the scale slightly in cost and difficulty. As you will recall, draughtproofing and insulation are the most effective green measures you can take, particularly for older houses. Approximately 15% of your home's heat is lost through the floor. In more modern houses, a layer of polystyrene 100mm thick is typically laid under concrete floors during construction to reduce heat loss. To do this retrospectively is possible, but difficult, expensive and messy, especially if there are pipes or wires involved. I have done it in one room where the floor needed levelling, hiring the electric equivalent of a pneumatic drill to remove the old floor. A damp-proof membrane is then laid (thick sheet of plastic), followed by a 100mm thick layer of polystyrene sheet, and finally concrete on top. If you are considering underfloor heating, this would be the time to incorporate it. Care must also be taken if your wall foundations are not sound, or non-existent, to avoid the house falling down!



Hollow wooden floors are much simpler to tackle. In some homes there is space to do this from under the floor. However, our front rooms have just a wooden floor mounted on floor beams under which is just dirt, and the air space is ventilated by air bricks to control damp. The end result is that the floor is freezing! I have recently tackled one of the two rooms. Having emptied the room and removed the carpet and underlay, the chipboard flooring was relatively easy to take up as it was screwed down. Some or all of the skirting boards may also need to be removed to facilitate this.

Some of the heating pipe insulation had been chewed by mice, so I replaced the damaged bits. I then located where the mice had gained access via a small hole next to one of the air bricks and filled it with cement. The floor beams are supported at the ends and by two low brick walls as seen in the photo. I used 100mm Xtratherm board which comes in 2.4m x 1.2m sheets (approx £50 per sheet). This is a type of foam insulation (PIR) board with foil backing on both sides. It can be cut with a sharp knife or saw as required. The supporting walls happened to be conveniently located in my case to support the board, but otherwise brackets can be hung from the beams to do this. It is important to cut the board to be a neat fit between the beams to stop draughts and loss of insulation. Foil tape is then used to cover the joins and beams to help reflect heat back up into the room. The photo here shows some of the Xtratherm sheets in place and foil tape covering the far ends of the beams. Once the whole floor is done, expanding foam can then be squirted around the edges to fill the gaps between the rough walls and the insulation board. After it has hardened, the foam is them trimmed to floor level with a sharp knife. The chipboard floor is then screwed back down, and the underlay and carpet replaced. Voila!

The job would be a bit more time-consuming if you have timber floorboards rather than chipboard sheets. As is typical, the insulation wasn't terribly expensive (three sheets at £50 each plus tape and expanding foam), but labour would be the big charge if done by a contractor.

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ALL for George London Marathon 2021





Monday 2 March 2020. Bristol Children's Hospital. We knew George was unwell, but nothing quite prepared us for the diagnosis. George, our four-year-old little boy, had Acute Lymphoblastic Leukaemia.

The last 17 months have seen us experience a whole range of emotions: shock, anger, frustration, fear, stress, guilt, sorrow, disappointment and relief when we were told in June, that his bone marrow aspirate was clear of any blast leukemic cells. We are so proud of George and he continues to amaze us despite the difficulties he has faced. The first seven months of intense treatment saw him lose his hair; he went from steroid-induced obesity to not eating for months thus requiring a nasal gastric tube; he's suffered mood swings caused by monthly steroid pulses; he's undergone and continues to have countless general anaesthetics; and has to take constant daily chemotherapy tablets. We are now almost 10 months into the maintenance phase of treatment, but George still has a further 22 months to go before he can ring the bell!

Along the way, there has been tremendous support from family, friends, charities, businesses and even strangers who have heard George's story and offered us their support. We are simply astounded by the generosity of everyone who has helped. As for the charities, it is because of seeing first-hand what they do for families just like us, that we wish to try and give something back, with the support of all those who know us or have heard of George's story.

As such, on Sunday 3 October, Neville (George's dad) will be running the London Marathon to raise funds for five amazing charities. He has run it twice previously before George's diagnosis, somewhat ironically, both times for Children with Cancer UK, and whilst the prospect of training and running another marathon wasn't part of the plan, after the hottest ever London marathon in 2018, this time it really is personal.

Tolsey News



As a provider of healthcare in the local community we are mindful of both public safety and public desire for things to 'return to normal' following the Government's 19 July announcement on Step 4 easement of Covid restrictions. At the surgery we see and treat the more vulnerable members of our community; because of this, and the increasing rates of Covid Delta variant in the population, many of our safety restrictions are going to remain in place at least until the winter season is over, to protect both you and us.

We will ask all patients and visitors to wear face masks on entering the building, and in all communal areas.

We will continue to offer an appointment-only service at reception, and ask you please not to enter the building unless you have a prior appointment or agreement.

We will continue our total phone triage system where all requests for GP appointments are screened by an initial phone call.

We will continue to use the 'double door' system at the side of the building to collect prescription medication to improve the flow through the downstairs area.

But some things are changing to make life more comfortable during your visit.

We are opening the ground floor waiting room up again so you may wait in the seated areas before your nurse's appointment. However, this space is limited so please try and arrive on time, not early for your appointment.

We are unlocking the front door, so you can come in, and check in yourself rather than waiting outside using the check-in screen by the stairway.

You can queue inside the waiting room during the bad weather for the dispensary.

We are looking at ways to improve the dispensary hours to help the waiting times for everyone.

If you find wearing a mask difficult, once you are in a consultation room, it can be removed with agreement.

Dispensary News

Having been fully staffed for a very short time, we are now down a full-time dispenser for the foreseeable future. Our new recruit Emma has

been poached back by her former employer, Boots the chemist. This is the second time a major high street player has taken away one of our key team workers and is incredibly disheartening. It is getting very hard to compete in this market place with these occurrences and hope that our patients will be understanding during another period of disruption. We have already lost loyal patients to companies that offer to deliver to your door. Despite the adverts these are not to the benefit for the practice and take business away from us. As many of you will know, without the dispensary there would be no surgery and this continues to be an ongoing concern.

An advert for a replacement has been placed on the Indeed website with immediate effect to try and reduce the disruption to our dispensing service.

A Jaunt through the Years

Another excerpt from the late George Stephens' recollections and stories of bygone life in Sherston that he compiled in 1995.

Zacharia Sattely was a watch and clock maker, though most of his time was spent repairing them. He lived above the premises on the brow of Tanner's Hill when my mother knew him. One of his favourite sayings was,

'If you 'vont to buy a vatch, then buy a vatch, if not don't keep looking in the vindow!'

It was a family business, and his descendants have only recently closed a jewellers shop in Tetbury after many decades in the watch and clock trade. There are a number of old Zacharia Sattely's clocks still ticking away today.



One thing that Sherston could claim above other villages between the wars, was having two brass bands and a string band. The string band consisted of five musicians.

Then there was what some local referred to as 'The Proper Band'. They played strictly by sheet music and all wore smart uniforms, officially known as 'Hill's Band' they were definitely very professional and played during the 1920s and 30s.

The third band was also very good, their repertoire consisted of several popular tunes, and with plenty of practice came into their own when all the opposition finally died. 'Clark's Band', were affectionately known as 'The Thirsty Five', (or eight depending on how many arrived to play!). For some strange reason there were always five or eight, never six or seven.

This band comprised of village men, and they played at all the annual functions.

They acquired their name because after playing for a short time, they would retire to one or other of the numerous pubs in the village for a quick pint, (or two) after which they would form again feeling much refreshed (for a while). They were led by an old Sherstonian, who having lost a leg in the First World War, walked with a stiff artificial one. This he would swing sideways as he headed his bandsmen, like a sergeant on the parade ground. Tall and thin, he wore his moustache waxed to fine points. He issued his orders, then marched the band off, not 'one, two, three', but rather like this;

'Right then, ready?' (Very slowly) 'January, February, March! Watch out for they snotty black 'uns Bert!' This was a warning to the trombonist to be careful how he played the black notes on the music sheet. With a wide sweep of his tin leg he was away. Thus they marched and played until the next stop, which in all probability would be another pub. Their repertoire consisted of several popular tunes which everyone knew note by note. A number of children followed them, imitating both sound and action. The band was looked upon with much affection in our village, even though we all enjoyed a quiet chuckle now and then. All the bandsmen took part for the pleasure of playing together, also to contribute to whatever the special occasion was.



Numerous stories have been told of the exploits of 'The Thirsty Five'. In the 1920s and 30s it was pitch black in the streets of Sherston, and the only house lights were from paraffin lamps. A story goes that on one such dark night, the band stopped to play outside a house, on getting no response at the conclusion of their rendering, someone struck a match. Alas they had been playing around a haystack. Also it was said, that after a fair night of drinking, they found it to be more steady if they played back to back leaning against each other. The problem was if one moved the other one fell over. A tall story? Maybe! Some of the local functions the band played at were Trinity Monday and Tuesday, Sherston Point to Point races, and of course Christmas and New Year.
