Three crucial sites at the heart of Sherston are set to be owned by villagers.

Not only will the old school be bought for the community but now the sections of the village hall field owned by Wiltshire Council and the Diocese of Bristol are included in the negotiations.

'This entire site, which is at the very heart of the village, will be in the ownership of the community,' said Sherston Parish Council chairman John Matthews.

'Years of uncertainty about its future will be at an end.'
The Old School Project involves the Grade II listed
High Street building, empty for some four years, being
purchased by a non-profit-making company run by

residents for retail, commercial and community use.

After months of detailed negotiation, sale terms are now agreed in principle.

The Diocese of Bristol will sell the old school to a company controlled by the community with company membership open to all.

In a new turn of events, the diocese will also sell its freehold part of the village hall field to the village hall and Wiltshire Council will grant the hall a 125-year lease, at a peppercorn rent, on its part of the field. The local Sam Thompson Fund and Wiltshire Council will provide the village hall with the money to buy the field.

The purchase price and initial costs of the old school are likely to be met by the Eleanor Barton Trust, the Sam Thompson Fund and £50,000 from North Wiltshire District Council. This last grant has already been received and is being held by the parish council.

A condition of the grants from the Eleanor Barton Trust and the Sam Thompson Fund is that Wiltshire Council gives the parish council a new 20-year lease on the allotments to safeguard their future.

'The estimated £500,000 cost of developing the old school will be met, if possible, by additional grants with any borrowing kept to a minimum,' said Mr Matthews.

'We intend to apply to the Heritage Lottery Fund and launch a local fund-raising campaign.

'There's clearly much still to be done, especially on the legal requirements.

'Once the old school's bought, detailed plans will need to be prepared, planning permission obtained, funds raised and building tenders sought.

'But the community buying the building will be a major step towards the project's completion.'

There is a car park for the disabled, a signing service and an induction loop.

## Don't dump it – Freecycle it

Stairgates, packing cases and maternity clothes could all be given a new lease of life if more of us participated in Freecycle.

The Freecycle network is a non-profit organisation open to all who want to recycle things they no longer need rather than throw them away.

Usually these are things you desperately need but only for a short while. Examples include child stairgates, removal packing cases, maternity clothes and children's toys. It doesn't usually matter that the item isn't new. Many items come up for offer when you move house and find furniture no longer fits or when you upgrade appliances which still function.

Membership is free. To join a group, you should have a Yahoo email address as the notice board is hosted by Yahoo Groups. However, this is no problem as you can redirect the emails to your usual address.

Each group is run by local volunteer moderators. Log on to the website below and join an area which suits you. You can then choose to have instant email alerts (fine if you are seeking something urgently but this can result in 30 emails a day) or a daily digest (listing 12-15 offers). Alternatively, you can opt out of email alerts and simply visit the website.

When you offer an item, you decide who gets it. It's a good idea to wait until the daily digest has been sent out to allow full viewing. It's up to the chosen receiver to collect from the person offering the item at a mutually convenient time. You are allowed to ask for one or two of the items on offer as long as you are offering items yourself.

Everything posted must be free. The description should be honest - you are giving it away, rather than marketing it. An example would be: 2 seater sofa bed, green, sprung bed with mattress, reasonable condition apart from 2" coffee stain.

Freecycle network members use the list at their own risk. Take care to protect your safety and privacy. Never give your number or address on the initial posting. Happy Freecycling!

## Help the medics help you

A new idea is sweeping the country to help emergency services save lives.

The idea came from a paramedic who found patients at the scenes of accidents with mobile phones but no indication which number to call.

'Yes, there are hundreds of numbers stored but which is the contact person in case of an emergency?' said an ambulance service spokesman.

'If we know who to ring, it could save your life or put a loved one's mind at rest.'

So the idea of the ICE – in case of emergency – campaign was born.

'All you need to do is store the numbers of the people who should be contacted in an emergency under the name ICE,' said the spokesman.

'Emergency service personnel and hospital staff could quickly contact the right person by simply dialling the number you have stored under ICE.

'If you have more than one contact, enter them as ICE1, ICE2 and so on.'

The ambulance service is keen for people to pass this message to as many others as possible in order to establish a nationally recognised scheme.

## Sherston Post Office news

#### Postal rates increase

On Monday 6 April all postage rates increase.

First class will increase from 36p to 39p

A book of 12 first class stamps will cost £4.68 instead of £4.32

Second class will increase from 27p to 30p

A book of 12 second class stamps will cost £3.60 instead of £3.24

Large 1st (up to 100grams /outside first-class size criteria) will be 61p

Large 2nd (up to 100grams /outside first-class size criteria) will be 47p

A postcard / letter up to 20g only to Europe will be 56p

A postcard / letter up to 10g only to the rest of the world will be  $62p\,$ 

A normal letter (up to 20g only) to the rest of the world will be 90p

Stamps bearing 1st, 2nd, Large 1st or Large 2nd bought ahead of the price increase can be used after 6 April at no extra cost.

Despite the increase, sending a first class inland letter compares favourably with other European countries, said postmaster Paul Mather.

Licences for 2009 are now on sale. Changes have been introduced since last year.

Upon purchase, a receipt will be provided. This will be the only proof of payment for one-day and eight-day licences. The Environment Agency will forward annual licences in due course.

Unless they have a special letter from the Environment Agency inviting licence renewal, customers need to bring photographic identification.

#### North Wiltshire bus passes and travel tokens

Travel tokens to the value of £18 will again be available from 1 April for £1 for men and women over 60.

Tokens are only available to those who do not have a free bus pass. People cannot have both.

Bus passes issued last year are valid until 2013. There is no need to re-apply.

'As before, we'll gladly pass unwanted tokens to John Sparrow of Link which provides vital transport to the old, disabled and infirm,' said Paul and Gail Mather of the post office.

# A gritty issue

February's harsh weather created a grit bin controversy. These bins exist to supply grit to help keep public roads and footpaths safe from snow and ice. 'Unfortunately, some people took significant quantities to clear their own private drives, paths and car parking spaces,' said parish council vice chairman Martin Rea.

'This left some bins empty and public roads and footpaths in a dangerous condition for other residents, especially the elderly.

'This was particularly noticeable around the new school. 'In future, please only use the grit for everyone's benefit.'

There are some 1,200 bins in the county and, later this year, the new Wiltshire Council will consider their future positions based on use. Parish councils will be consulted on any changes. Requests for new bins should be put to the parish council.

Children who passed comfortably earned free places while those who scraped through involved their parents in extra expense. Those who did not pass stayed at school until they were 14.

The old school had no running water when Kathleen was there and the only water came from the school pump house or was brought from home.

Children went home for lunch as there were no school meals and boys and girls had separate playgrounds.

'Today's Sherston School has not only running water but also computer suites, wireless networks and white boards,' said

Richard. 'It's a world away from the education of the early twentieth century.


'There are even special toilets for the smallest children, resplendent with sanitary ware in a Mickey Mouse design after the Disney

cartoons and supplied by bathroom specialists Bear Necessities.'

The new school building is less than four years old but the number of children has grown during that time to around 170. The extra classroom is to accommodate everyone and allow for growth.

# For the greater good

Villagers are urged to build on the efforts of others in caring for their surroundings.

'There's no denying that, in recent years, Sherston has improved its general tidiness and in particular reduced litter,' said parish council vice chairman Martin Rea.

'Much of this is down to locals who've taken it upon themselves to collect and dispose of litter in some cases to the very boundaries of the parish.'

The parish council has provided free litter-picking tools and ensures the recreation ground and sports field are regularly cleared of litter.

In addition, the county council's parish steward system has brought improvements, especially in verge maintenance.

'Now we're hoping the new Wiltshire Council will tackle the problem of street cleaning in rural areas which, under the former North Wiltshire District Council, seemed to have been under-funded compared to urban areas,' said Mr Rea.

'After all, we all pay the same level of council tax.'
But locals are suggesting ways villagers can help themselves.

Members of the footpaths group already pick up litter on their walks along footpaths and rights of way. But many hands make light work and the parish clerk will give willing helpers free litter-picking tools.

In addition, Cliffhanger distributor Ian Ashby urges clearing weeds from gutters and where garden walls meet the pavement.

'I suggest we all look beyond our front gardens and have a go with the weed gun,' he said. 'It's a fiveminute job three times a year.'

While Ian suggests local traders buy a job lot of weed guns and sell them at a discount, Cliffhanger editorial team prefer an organic solution.

'A few minutes' work with a hoe can work wonders and it's good exercise,' said Mr Rea.

He added: 'Every year the parish council receives invitations to enter best kept village competitions and every time they are politely declined amid visions of chocolate-box villages. After all, we're primarily a working village.

'But perhaps by working together for the greater good we can one day take the plunge and enter one of these competitions?'

North Wiltshire District Council is no more.

From April 1 (no fooling) there is a new Wiltshire Council delivering all the services hitherto provided by the county council and the four district councils.

Sherston residents will now be able to have all council business dealt with at the one local office in Chippenham.

There will be area boards, including one for Malmesbury, to provide a channel of communication between the local community and the new council.

Wiltshire Council will have 98 councillors, compared with 245 at present across the five authorities. The first elections to the new council will take place on June 4.

# Wiltshire Air Ambulance joins forces with Devizes Textiles



The Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal now needs to raise more money towards the shared Wiltshire Police helicopter/air ambulance since signing the new five year contract in December 08, between the Wiltshire Police and the Great Western Ambulance Service. In order to keep the helicopter flying the Appeal needs to raise in excess of £500,000 per year, increased from £350,000 in previous years.

Danny Williamson, owner of Devizes Textiles, has teamed up with the Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal to launch the WAA Clothing and Shoe Bank Recycling Scheme. Danny donates to the Appeal what he pays for buying donated clothes, shoes, handbags and belts. He then recycles the clothing with the majority going to African countries where they are sold on.

Mr Williamson said: "If every household in Wiltshire donated one dustbin bag of clothes a year we could raise £250,000 for the Wiltshire Air Ambulance Appeal, which is a significant amount. The Wiltshire Air Ambulance is close to everyone's hearts and by donating a bag of clothes it will help support the Air Ambulance that could one day save someone's life. Donating to this scheme would also mean that we would be taking away 2,000 tonnes of clothing that could otherwise have been sent to landfill."

Danny added: "More sites are always needed to place a WAA Clothing & Shoe Bank. In order to raise awareness about this scheme, and recycling, it would be great if companies, supermarkets, schools, sports club, and local councils contacted us and allowed us to place a textile bank on their premises."



## Dodgy alarm sellers at work

Householders are warned to beware of callers selling security alarms.

'Over the past few days, a number of people have had unsolicited telephone and doorstep calls from persons claiming to represent security companies,' said David Budd, police Neighbourhood Watch liaison officer

'They're offering either a free alarm system or free monitoring and half price installation.

'What they don't tell you is that you will sign up to a five-year contract and, if you take up the offer of a free alarm system, there is a daily charge of £1.60.'

Mr Budd recommends taking the company details, including its phone number, and telling the callers they will be reported to trading standards officers.

Trading standards units will take up complaints with the security industry regulatory body.

'It's worrying that these companies can buy a database containing personal details,' said Mr Budd.

'If you're considering having an intruder alarm fitted, contact your police crime reduction officer for relevant advice.'

Crime reduction officers can be contacted through 0845 408 7000.

Police believe the spate of calls results from the Home Secretary's statement that burglaries were on the increase.
