Thanks to a generous donation from a local charity the much needed major repair work to our church roof can go ahead sooner than expected.

The work will consist of removing all the Cotswold stone tiles and relaying, re-covering the lead roof to the tower and repairing and replacing where necessary the rainwater gutters.

While the work proceeds, it will have a significant impact on the visual aspect of the church. To maintain the safety of the fabric and to help the contractors beat the weather, the whole of the roof will be covered in a sheeted scaffolding, known as a 'Top Hat' scaffold.

Work is expected to begin in early spring and carry on for the rest of the year. Services and other church based events are not expected to be affected.

The Parochial church council has been concerned for some time that the Cotswold tiles are reaching the end of their life and that, in this financial climate, our own fund raising would not generate all the money required in time.





TREEtalk

April 2010

It may be later than we've got used to in recent years but spring is here at last. The trees are budding furiously and the daffodils and crocuses are brightening up the gardens. Down at Grove Wood, the winter work is finished, on time and to schedule. Our volunteers have cut, chopped, cleared and burnt the hazel and brambles in Mill Corner (the first section), planted 1000 snowdrops 'in the green' along the river path and are now taking a well-earned rest until the autumn.

John has laid a superb hedge along the top edge, making a tricky job look easy. We have also pegged out the main path which will become the new project for the Community Payback Scheme team, whose efforts on the perimeter fence are much appreciated. Our nature survey has highlighted just how many plants are emerging now that more sunlight can penetrate the wood. Bird nesting boxes have been fixed at a safe height and we may put up a temporary hide for keen twitchers. It's exciting stuff and it will get even better the more we do.

We now have an explanatory board on the first gate, hopefully answering most of the questions we've been asked: 'Why are you cutting down so much?' being the most frequent. Take a walk down the wood and find out.

Many thanks to everyone who has given up Sunday mornings to help, to Sue for her excellent, homemade soup and to John whose expertise is invaluable. Watch out for the Grove Wood section on the new Sherston website where we'll post regular updates and photos of work-in-progress.

Village Green 22 May 2010 SHERST N

When we started planning Village Green Day, we never dreamed it would grab so much interest. There are now over 50 assorted groups, companies and individuals who are keen to join in the fun and have asked for space to promote their work. There's a bit of everything, guaranteeing a great time out on 22 May, International Biodiversity Day.

You'll be able to watch master craftsmen at work, listen to live music from both brass and steel bands, be entertained by the eccentric rituals of the Mangold Hurlers, be impressed by the diversity of skills in our village groups and the wide range of local green interests.

Freshly cooked food and locally produced cider, beer, wine and fruit juices mean you can stop for a tasty lunchtime snack and continue later with tea and home-made cakes. The culinary maestros from the Rattlebone will further tempt your taste buds with an impressive display of flambé cookery!

We've divided the participants into five broad groups; in the Main Hall, you'll find most of the village environmental and crafts groups; the small hall will have Fairtrade clothes, greetings cards and advice (maybe even a massage) from a medical herbalist and aromatherapist. Outside, the gardening section does what it says on the tin - you can buy drought-tolerant plants, a range of 'grow your own veg', lavender, clematis and other perennials, organic seeds and everything for the eco-friendly garden, from wormeries to green compost. The 'demonstration' area gives you the chance to watch the experts at work - dry stone walling, spinning, weaving, wood working, flower arranging, making summer hanging baskets and a range of child-friendly bushcraft skills with some inquisitive alpacas watching too.

And last but not least, the marquee will display examples of the environmental projects on which pupils from Sherston and at least four other local schools are engaged. There will also be supervised creative activities for small (and big!) kids to enjoy, giving the grown-ups the chance to relax and enjoy the fun.

Have we thought of everything? We think so but don't just take our word for it. Make sure you, your family and friends visit Village Green, Sherston's first ever environmental event between 12 noon and 5pm on the 22 May.

Distraction Burglary Awareness

A national campaign was launched in March to make people aware of the tactics used by distraction burglars. It is important that residents safeguard themselves against these opportunists by familiarising themselves with these practices.

A distraction burglary is where one or more offenders distract a person in order to gain entry to their home before committing a burglary. It can sometimes lead to physical or emotional abuse and can affect victims in many different ways, including a decline in health.

The average age of distraction burglary victims is 81, which shows that the elderly are more vulnerable to this type of crime. It is important that people are aware of this campaign which provides advice on what they can do to help prevent others, especially the elderly, from becoming victims of a distraction burglary.

The campaign provides the following messages to the public on how to help prevent distraction burglaries:

- If you are not sure who is at your door, don't open it. Verify the identity of the caller by contacting the company he or she claims to be representing. Do not use any telephone numbers provided by the caller, as they may be bogus.
- Call a neighbour or friend nearby to ask them to check out the caller before you open the door to them.
- Many of the leading gas, electricity and water utilities provide password schemes for customers. If possible, sign up to these. When unannounced callers claiming to be from these utility providers call at your door they should know the password if they are genuine.
- Water Boards no longer exist. Anybody claiming to be from a Water Board will almost certainly be a bogus caller.

- Don't keep large quantities of cash at home. Put it in the bank where it is safe.
- Keep doors locked and windows secure at all times.
- Ensure that if you do let somebody in to your home, you close the door behind them. Distraction burglars often work in teams, with one distracting you whilst others sneak in through the open door.
- If somebody asks for your help (claiming that they need to make a telephone call, that they have lost a ball in your garden, or that they need a drink or pen and paper) refer them to a younger neighbour. Alternatively, assist them through a closed door or call a friend or neighbour to come and help.
- If you suspect a bogus caller is at your door, call the police immediately.

The campaign also includes posters which will be placed around visible areas across Wiltshire.

Sherston Living Churchyard Project

Volunteers met in the churchyard on the last Saturday of February and worked through sunshine and torrential showers to plant snowdrops, to transplant primroses from one part of the churchyard to the other and to finish clearing the ground around the three leylandii which were felled in the autumn. At the March session, which is also the occasion of the annual church spring clean on Saturday 27 March, these areas were seeded with a meadow mix which should produce grass and hay meadow type wildflowers, such as scabious and knapweed.

It is wonderful to see the annual regeneration of wildlife in the churchyard, coinciding with the Christian season of Lent when the renewal of Easter is also being awaited in expectation. I believe that the improvements in the churchyard are now becoming clearer and hope that villagers will begin to see the benefits of what is being done. Before long you should see further clearance taking place near the east wall. This is intended to clear a long overgrown area so that more burials can be accommodated. Living Churchyard Projects nationwide have the aim of making burial grounds better for their purpose as well as better for wildlife.

The April work session will take place on Saturday 24 April from 10am for a couple of hours. As ever, more volunteers are required. Do please get in touch if you are interested in helping and go and have a look at what is going on in your churchyard.

18 tables were sold within the first half an hour, leaving the team with a further three hours to stand around in the rain in their best bibs and tuckers. Happy with the result and only slightly damp, they then retired to The Rattlebone for a well earned lunch.

Digital Switchover

Switchover is a two-stage process. Stage one was completed on 24 March, which involved re-tuning your Freeview, BT Vision or top Up TV digital box or TV.

Stage Two – 7 April

Is the date when all the remaining analogue channels will switch to digital and the remaining digital channels will become available. This means that:

if you haven't switched to digital, you will lose your TV service

if you have Freeview, BT Vision or Top Up TV you'll need to re-tune your equipment again

After re-tuning, you may have to reset any favourite lists and picture settings.


If you re-tune a digital TV recorder, previously recorded programmes will be kept, but you should re-set future recordings (including 'series links') or you may lose them.

THE SHA'S ALIBI

Walter Sha a young man was charged with stealing a loaf of bread from the shop of Mr Tottle, Baker, of the Horsefair Malmesbury. The complainant stated that on Thursday the prisoner who had a basket on his arm, came into his shop and asked him if he wanted to buy any Ferns. He told him that he did not, and as the prisoner was leaving the shop he saw him take a loaf of bread and put it in the basket. He went to the door and collared him. The accused who denied that he was the man, said he had brought no Ferns into Bristol for more than twelve months, and that on the day in question he was at Sherston in Wiltshire cutting Water Cresses. He left Bristol on the Wednesday evening, and did not return until Friday. He put up at the Rattle Bones at Sherston, and stayed on the journey at the Old House At Home at Burton near Littleton Drew, and that information could be obtained from each of these places. Mr Tottle recalled and stated he was positive that the prisoner was the same man. The magistrates remanded him until Monday and directed inquiries to be made at Sherston and Burton.

Sherston W.I.

Members of Sherston W.I. met in the village hall on a cold March evening, to be told the origins of some of the customs and traditions of Lent and Easter.

The Rev. David Alderman, a well known Methodist Minister for Sherston and a large number of churches, in Wiltshire was the speaker. He told us first about his skills as a pancake maker and then explained why the need arose to make them. In order to prepare for the 40 days fasting of Lent people would use up perishable goods, such as eggs and milk for a feast of pancakes. 1445 was the earliest record of a pancake race. The Shriven Bell would be rung on Shrove Tuesday to summon people to Church for confessions. The 40 days of Lent did not include Sundays so that some food could be taken on that day to keep them from starving.

Mother's Day was an American idea thought up by Hallmark cards, whereas Mothering Sunday was the one day before Easter when servants were allowed home and generally took small gifts of flowers which were picked on the way home. Hot Cross Buns were a sign of everlasting friendship with protective powers. Some people kept one bun from one year to the next.

Some of these symbols originated in Pagan rituals and past Jewish customs. Links were shown to the Passover ceremony and the Exodus of Moses from Egypt. Pat Smith thanked the Rev. Alderman for his interesting talk.

After refreshments the business was conducted by the President, Maureen Jolliffe. She began by presenting past Treasurer, Rosemary Venning, with an orchid as an appreciation of her work for the past four years.

The new programme had been prepared by Sheila Harris and it looks interesting and varied. We started with a Craft Day on 12 March in the British Schoolroom. We learned how to do felting and weaving. A jumble sale took place in the Village Hall on 20 March. Two teams hope to be taking part in a Quizzical Pursuits Quiz to be held at Sheldon School on 30 June.

Our June meeting will be a Mini Show when members can show their skill in cooking, craft, flower arranging and other skills. A visit to Denman College is also planned.

Our April Meeting in the British School Room at 7.30pm will be a talk by Tiggy Lessner on 'How to design your garden'. The prize will be a plate of Easter biscuits with recipe.


Visitors are always welcome at our meetings on the first Thursday of the month in the Village Hall at a cost of £3.

In King Athelstan's footsteps

Roy Cooper was a former Mayor of Malmesbury who came to the area in the 1950s with the Peter Saunders organisation which moved from Aberdeen in Scotland to pioneer a new method of world-wide clothes marketing from Easton Grey House. He became Managing Director before the business was taken over and he left in the late 70s.

Roy came from Nottingham and joined Peter Saunders after a tough war at sea, serving in submarines from HMS Dolphin with the Royal Navy, which he joined in 1939. In Malmesbury he soon became a popular and well known character locally – especially with the Athelstan Players the local amateur dramatic society that benefited greatly from his wide and gifted amateur stage experience.

He took a wholehearted interest in everything the town and area had to offer both socially and civically. After joining Malmesbury Town Council Roy became Mayor between 1972-74 and embraced the ancient borough's tradition and history alongside a wish to further the welfare and interests of its townspeople.

Roy died in August 1984 and there is a memorial plaque to him in Malmesbury Abbey Cloister Gardens. He was Chairman of the Malmesbury 1100 Committee in 1980 when the Cloister Gardens were opened by Princess Anne. While visiting the memorial

recently Roy's eldest son Michael, from Hemyock in Devon but who lived many years in Malmesbury, was re-appraised of the Saxon history of the town, and of the importance of King Athelstan, perhaps the first real King of England, who was buried in the Abbey.

Saxon armies mostly moved and fought on foot. Michael decided to walk ancient soldiers' roads from Hemyock across Somerset and Wiltshire to finish at Malmesbury Abbey. He is collecting sponsorship for the military charity Help4Heroes, which cares for ex-service men and women, and Sport Aid which will support disabled competitors in the 2012 Paralympics. The route, which will take in the Lyneham and Wootton Bassett area, will also include the Isle of Athelney, Glastonbury, Wells Cathedral and Lacock Abbey.

Michael will be joined for company on part of the last stage of the journey, from Dauntsey Lock to Malmesbury on the week-end of April 10 and 11, by the Rev Richard Maslen, an old friend of his father who lives at Sherston.

Baggers and chuckers

As well as the 'baggers and chuckers' there are those that simply let their dogs defecate at will and then make no effort to clear up whether in the village or on public rights of way in the countryside. Some of the footpaths adjoining the village can at times take on the appearance of a canine's toilet which is hardly welcoming for those who want to simply enjoy a pleasant walk in the open air especially with children. The public use of these paths has never included a right to abuse them in this way. It must be remembered that the land over which the paths run are privately owned and proper consideration should be given to both the owners as well as all those who use them.
