

The 25th Boules day was undoubtedly one of the best ever. From the peal of the church bells at 9am right through to the winning point of the final match in the early evening the day moved seamlessly from one success to another.

The opening of the event by the Mayor of Gien set the tone for the whole event with the party from Malmesbury's twin town adding enormously to the atmosphere with their folk singers and dancers.

It was clear from mid morning that the day would be a busy one as crowds thronged the High Street. # New shelter in place



Easton Town now has its long awaited bus shelter on the main road at the junction with Easton Square. Councillor Cilla Liddington headed up the project on behalf of the parish council and despite suffering a setback last year when grant funding ran out has been determined to see the shelter become a reality. 'I was surprised at the complication in getting

approval for the shelter' said Cilla. 'As it stands within the conservation area it needed the go-ahead from the planners as well as the all clear from Wiltshire Highways.' Cilla added that special thanks are due to Mr and Mrs Blanchard, whose property abuts the shelter, for being so helpful in agreeing its position.

The shelter cost £5,750 (net of VAT which is recoverable by the parish council) with £2500 contributed by a grant from Wiltshire Council. It is of extremely robust design and should give many years of service.

The shelter was produced by Littlethorpes of Leicester and was installed in a day. The first resident to have the honour to sit in it was Mrs Kath Evans of The Bartons. In return she has kindly agreed to be responsible for keeping it clean and well polished.

### Snapper sought

# Speedwatch

Sherston's community speedwatch team undertook its first exercise last month and seemed to make a real difference in reducing traffic speed. One pedestrian commented to the team that they had never seen the traffic driving so slowly through the village. This is exactly the purpose of the scheme - to reduce traffic speed rather than to simply catch motorists out. To be frank if you speed past the check you can't be paying much attention to your driving as the scheme members have to stand in fully visible positions wearing day glow jackets.

Sherston shares the equipment, provided by the Wiltshire & Swindon Safety Camera Partnership, with Oaksey and Luckington. This means that the scheme runs on a rota basis between these villages. Expect to see the Sherston team in operation again during August.

Further volunteers are required to make the scheme as effective as possible. Training is provided by Wiltshire Police through a straightforward course which takes around an hour to complete. # Parish stewards scheme

Wiltshire Highways Service has 20 stewards, who each look after the general function and appearance of the roads, footways and furniture in their individual areas. Towns and villages are visited on a monthly basis, in a programme which is sent to each local council, in advance of the visit. The duration of each visit is varied to meet the needs of each council.

The stewards are equipped with a purpose-built Land Rover vehicle, which is clearly marked and fully equipped to attend to most events. A system of satellite tracking and mobile radio and telephone communications enable the stewards to respond very rapidly to a wide variety of problems, which occur on the roads.

The scheme was introduced in the autumn of 2006 and has proved extremely popular with many Parish and Town Councils. The work of the stewards has begun to restore the appearance of many areas, a process often regarded as crucial in protecting civil pride.

Examples of winter work, which is routinely undertaken include:

- hand clearing of drainage grips and drain gully cover
- clearing of small culverts, pipes and pits.
- clearing storm debris
- trimming encroaching hedges from around road signs
- cleaning and straightening small road signs
- hand cutting small visibility areas

In the summer, tasks can also include

- painting railings
- cutting growth from around signs and railings
- cutting growth from drainage grips
- removal of ragwort
- treatment/removal of weeds, in rural areas

During times of extreme weather, the stewards are the first line of response, during normal working hours. Outside of normal hours most stewards actively participate on a call-out basis.

The stewards do not operate in isolation and are supported in their role by many mechanised resources, where the work exceeds what one man may achieve. They include verge mowers, high-pressure drain cleaning machines and the county's multi-purpose fleet of Unimog vehicles.

### Garden Party

A traditional garden party at Halfway Bush Farm, Sherston, attracted about 300 people on a glorious summer day, for a wonderful classical and semi-classical music concert by two of the younger generation of English opera singers. The concert was organised by St. Aldhelm Masonic Lodge, Malmesbury, in aid of Diabetes UK, the lodge's designated charity this year. With some money still to come the concert had raised about £2,000, bringing the lodge charity total for the year to about £5,000.

The singers were Tim Pitman and Rebecca Robinson, whose two open-air sessions delighted the audience throughout the afternoon and evening. There were also opportunities to play boules and skittles, admire a large exhibition of classic cars, veteran tractors and motor bikes, and a steam engine, and take a traditional cream tea or a Pimms in the garden. A large raffle was very generously supported.

The Rev. Richard Maslen of Woods Close, Sherston, Worshipful Master of St. Aldhelm Lodge 2009-2010 said 'We are very grateful to Colin and Sue Lewis for hosting such a successful event, to the hard-working friends who did the work - and to Cliffhanger for helping spread the word. Even the fortuitous fly past by the Red Arrows was not entirely unexpected!'

**Footnote:** What was unexpected was sudden disappearance of the skittles balls from the Rattlebone skittle alley the day before the garden party. Landlord Jason Read, a generous supporter, loaned the skittles and balls but when Richard went to collect them the balls had disappeared. # Sherston School Environment Area Group News

## Bring on the rocket!



Chestnut class (year four) at Sherston School shared the array of salad vegetables they have been growing, around the whole school early in the month. Alongside hot and spicy numbers including Mizuma, Green Mustard, and slightly milder Pak Choi, this year's favourite by a long chalk was Rocket. Grown from packets of seed kindly donated by the Corless family which the children sowed in May, the crop was saved from the snails by the hot dry weather to produce a first batch of fresh tasty leaves; more to follow.

### Alice weighs in at eight pounds

Strawberries grown by Sycamore Class (year six) at Sherston school, produced a bumper crop in June. The best pick was 8lbs from just 15 plants on 24 June. Chilled overnight and enjoyed by everyone at school the following day, 'Alice' is a deliciously sweet and juicy variety. Year five pupils have planted a new bed which will start cropping next year.







### Colourful designs



Following the success of Sherston School pupil Hannah Clegg in winning the children's competition for the 2012 Olympic Garden, her year six class has risen to another challenge, to completely renovate a flower bed at the school entrance. The project was to design and plant this  $80\text{m}^2$  area and build three stepping stone paths.



The focal point is a timber and stone bench in memory of Rox Richardson, former school secretary, kindly donated by the Cotswold Wardens.

Each of the five Olympic entrants from last year, led a team to undertake a share of the clearance and prep work, survey and map the site



to calculate the area and circumference, create a plan, and submit a design for re-planting. The final layout was chosen as a combination of parts from each team's work, together with a timber planter which was donated by Wiltshire Wood Recycling. The school is extremely grateful to Les Howells for his enormous generosity in donating all the plants for this project. The plants come from the wide and interesting collection that he grows for his outstanding garden in Pinkney, Sycamore's garden will in turn be a colourful spectacle by late summer. Thank you Les.

With a team of parent and staff overseers (big thanks to them), the five teams completed their tasks in a super fast time of five and a quarter hours, with the stone and bark chip paths laid in 40 minutes. Big thanks also to Holt Landscapes for some of their bark mulch. Lots of credit to the children for all their hard work and enthusiasm and congratulations to them for the end result.

## Sherston W.I.

At our July meeting we learnt about the history of Malmesbury from our speaker, Charles Vernon. It is believed that a Stone Age settlement existed on the site, which has a unique position for defence purposes, with water on three sides. We were told how it became an important place for learning, attracting pilgrims and scholars from far and wide.

The grandson of King Arthur was Athelstan, who became the first king of England, uniting the warring tribes. The Commoners of Malmesbury helped him repel the Vikings and were rewarded with certain rights and land. He was famous for his firmness and diplomacy.

Mr Vernon briefly outlined the development of Malmesbury to present times. He explained that the centre of town remains virtually as it was in medieval times. We all found the talk gave us fresh information on this country town, which has an important place in the history of England.

Five members attended an Open Day at Denman College. They were able to watch demonstrations in cookery, silk painting, jewellery making and many more. They also went to a lecture on garden design by Bunny Guinness from the RHS. There was much to see besides the craft stalls, the gardens were beautiful and we had a perfect summer's day to enjoy it all.

### Footpath group

After the exertions of getting Sherston Walks published in time for Boules Day, the group could perhaps have been excused for taking a summer break. In reality though the group has still plenty to do, especially in ensuring that all the rights of way in the new guide are in as good a condition as possible.

A few months ago a working party was set up with the aim of tackling basic footpath problems such as overgrown vegetation. Tools have been provided by Wiltshire Council through our rights of way officer Stephen Leonard who has also given some essential health and safety advice. The working party is headed up by Nigel Freeth with Chris Edgecombe acting as his deputy. The team has already been out dealing with overgrown footpaths, especially with cutting back nettles. In due course and with some further advice from Stephen Leonard, stile repairs and installation of kissing gates, where appropriate, can hopefully be taken on.

It is very important that the group quickly become aware of any problems with rights of way particularly those referred to in Sherston Walks. If you come across a problem, please report it without delay to the parish clerk, Sarah Wood, on 840351 email clerk@sherston. org.uk giving as much detail as possible. The group has developed a local method of resolving footpath issues by liaising with landowners and together seeking the most practical method of dealing with the matter in hand. This has worked well to date, but if a problem persists the group does not intend to become involved in protracted discussions. Instead it would prefer to leave its resolution to Wiltshire Council as the responsible authority.

If you would like to learn more about the footpath group and perhaps take part in some of its activities please come along to the next meeting on Wednesday 1 September at 7.30 pm in the village hall. The group is a subcommittee of the parish council with a simple remit 'to promote the use by all of the rights of way in the parish, ensuring they are in good condition and free from obstruction'. 



### Village hall

The community payback team will complete the outside painting and the redecoration of the small hall, lobby, toilets and kitchen lobby early this month. They have worked very hard in all their sessions and the management committee is most grateful for all they have done. Special thanks are also due to their supervisor Malcolm Rainbow. We hope to see them again later in the year redecorating the main lobby and toilets.

In respect of the main hall, the committee has taken a decision to have removed all the old paintwork from the walls by means of dry blasting. Years of plastic based paint on top of original lime mortar have taken their toll and a complete removal of the old paint seems the only way forward. This will be undertaken in early August and includes the blasting of the visible roof beams of paint. Once all the paint is gone a decision will be taken as to how best treat the exposed walls. At the same time, new lighting will be installed. All has to be completed by the end of August ready for the pre school's new term.

Naturally all these works to the hall are at a cost. Fortunately recent fundraising efforts plus the absolutely invaluable proceeds from the 200+ Club should meet the present expense. Undoubtedly however further fundraising efforts will be needed to continue the programme of improvements. You have been warned!

It is now over a year since the new air to air heating pump system was installed replacing the old calor gas system in the main hall and electric wall heaters in the small hall. Not only is the new system much better to use, it is also far more energy-efficient and appears to have reduced energy costs by around 25% to 30 %. The cost of the new system was heavily subsidised by a grant from the former North Wiltshire District Council.

Wiltshire Council is proposing the following in respect of future household waste and recycling services –

- A kerbside collection of plastic bottles and cardboard every two weeks.
- A kerbside black box collection for glass, papers, cans, foil and textiles every two weeks.
- A non-chargeable optional kerbside collection of garden waste every two weeks.
- A collection of leftover waste every two weeks.

It will be noted that the proposed recycling service is much improved from the present whilst the weekly leftover waste collections will move to a fortnightly arrangement.

# News from the Tolsey Surgery

Things are changing at the Tolsey Surgery. In April, Dr Watkins became a Partner and we welcomed our new Practice Manager, Judy Sharp, to the team. Since then we have all been working very hard together to try and improve the services on offer to our patients. feedback, national national survey, has been very positive. are grateful for our patients' kind comments. However, there are a few recurring problems, which we are trying to address:

**Appointments** 

introduced Government scheme that appointments that could only be booked 48 hours in advance has caused numerous difficulties. The method in which they had to be booked resulted in patients having to make frequent contact with the surgery. In some instances, patients spent a lot of time trying to get through to the surgery by telephone, only to discover that the appointments had already been taken. We understand the frustration felt by the community when trying to book these particular appointments.

Therefore, we have tried to restructure our appointments system and made some changes that we hope you will find beneficial. We will still be offering 'book ahead' appointments (up to one month in advance), a few 'book within two days', and 'on the day' slots which should only be used for an emergency problem that cannot wait.

#### **Extended Hours**

Another interesting result from the national survey is that 70% of respondents did not know that The Tolsey Surgery offers extended hours, and has done so for the past two years. On each Thursday we have appointments from 7.30 am until 8.00am, and also between 6.30pm and 7.15pm. These appointments are designed particularly for patients who commute to work, and who might otherwise have difficulty getting to the surgery during normal office hours.

### The Coaching Club (1871-2010)

Like the Four in Hand Club (established in 1856), the Coaching Club gave a stimulus to driving four horses to a private coach for pleasure, after steam trains had reduced the use of coaching commercially. The Coaching Club was more exclusive, limited to 50 members and largely made up of wealthy titled families and cavalry regiments.

Today's membership is quite different, consisting of more enthusiastic eccentric aficionados, who wish to keep alive a forgotten way of travel, in a similar manner that steam railway enthusiasts do as well today. They drive 'park drags', as against road or mail coaches, which were like Green Line buses accepting fee paying passengers and carrying post and packages commercially.

Drags are like private minibuses and limousines, belonging to one family for their exclusive use and allowing them to travel alone and in more comfort than by other means. The arrival of the combustion engine around 1905 put an end to commercial coaching, but the clubs kept the tradition alive and continue to provide the spectacle today.

The dark blue driving coat and buff waistcoat worn with brass buttons engraved with 'C.C', was chosen as a compliment to the first president, 'The Blue Duke' of Beaufort, in 1872. The corn flowers worn

The Old Cake House, The Dairy, Pinkney Park, Sherston, Malmesbury Wiltshire SN16 0NX by the Blue Duke at the first meet which has since become the adopted insignia of the Coaching Club.

Coaches weigh about 1 1/2 ton unladen and require four strong horses to pull them, particularly up Brook Hill. These are not heavy horses, of the kind displayed by Wadworth on Boules Day, but faster and more agile horses requiring more skilled handling.

Sherston was on the route from Oxford to Bristol along the B4040. The Angel was a small coaching inn, where fresh horses could be acquired between Malmesbury and the Cross Hands. Around the corner was The Swan commercial hotel. Generally the average distance a team can travel between changes is 10 to 15 miles.

The Tolsey surgery was almost certainly a toll house and perhaps offered a 'cock horse', should it have been required, to assist an overloaded coach up Brook Hill. If unavailable, passengers would have to disembark and push - hence the expression 'putting ones shoulder to the wheel'. Going down hill coaches carry a metal shoe, placed under the near side rear wheel, effectively locking it, called a 'skid pan'.

Coaching dangers are many, with hills just one of a multitude of challenges. They have only manually operated leather brakes, and apart from highwaymen, other perils include collisions, broken axels, overturning, runaway teams, snow, drunkenness and, worst of all, flooding.

Their natural affinity with horses made Dalmatian dogs the ideal companion. They were often stupid and sometimes deaf, but loyal and protective to horses. They used to run under the back axle to see off common dogs annoying the horses and also to warn of stable fires when at home. Today, they are still the mascot of the New York fire brigade.

Road coaches continued to operate through Sherston up until about 1900, when the Great Western Badminton 'cut off' railway line was opened, connecting London with the new Severn tunnel, with local stations at Hullavington and Badminton. The Angel continued to provide a weekly local carrier service to Chippenham, Tetbury and Malmesbury, up until after the First World War.

To be fair both have done much to repair their reputations. growers but to date excessive prices have hindered any conclusive deal. Such is the increasing number of members intent on joining him in what could prove to be a fascinating excursion north of the border that quotes for a suitably sized coach are being sought from Andrew James Coaches.

Whilst the Order is determined to overcome the loss of the local crop contingency plans including the use of swede and sugar beet are being put in place. There will be no doubt that these immortal lines from an 'Ode to a Mangold Hurl' will once again be heard wafting through the air of Sherston come October -

# Neighbourhood News from Wiltshire Police

#### **Priorities**

The Neighbourhood Tasking Group meeting took place on Thursday 24 June at the Kings Arms, Malmesbury. It was hosted by Malmesbury Community Area Partnership and chaired by Cllr Ray Sanderson.

The past quarter's priorities were discussed and the concerns raised by local residents during the Neighbourhood Policing Team consultation meetings were prioritised for the next quarter. Please see below for details of the priority for the next quarter alongside how we will address the issue.

#### Overnight crime in rural areas

During the meeting it was agreed that crime occurring overnight was becoming a major problem with thefts of vehicles, fuel and stone tiles on the increase.

To combat this, we intend to dramatically increase the number of patrols during the times criminals are currently active.

We have already enlisted the assistance of other forces and partner agencies. Don't forget we need your assistance too. Always take crime prevention advice seriously and together let's make life miserable for anyone thinking of taking your property. It also goes without saying if you think something is not quite right about a situation, such as a vehicle parked in an odd place or a stranger loitering, then take their details and let us know right away!

#### **Summary of Crime**

In the past three months our top three crimes have been house burglaries (20 incidents) followed by common theft (19) and burglaries in outbuildings (18).

#### Outcomes

Our previous priority which rolled on for several months was around conducting high visible patrols in order to reassure the community.

During this period a series of daytime and very early evening dwelling burglaries were identified around the Little Somerford area. Lighter evenings and additional patrols may have assisted in stopping these completely since early May.

#### Consultations

We aim to attend as many parish council meetings as we can. This will give you an opportunity to let us know your concerns and have your say on future priorities.

We are in regular attendance at Brokenborough, Dauntsey and Lea including Garsdon and Cleverton. We hope to extend these consultations across all parishes this quarter. Contact us for further details.

# Old school grant success

Wiltshire Council and its partners has awarded £65,000 to the Sherston Old School project from the Performance Reward Grant funds made available to the council from central government in recognition of them meeting a number of targets in service provision. This follows the endorsement earlier in the year by the Malmesbury Area Board of the original application from the Old School project. The result of the bid, given by Wiltshire Councillor John Thomson at the parish council's July meeting, was warmly welcomed.

The project has been further boosted by the news that the protracted negotiations with the Diocese over the terms of the sale of the property appear to have now been resolved. One consequence of that agreement is that the likely project structure will involve the parish council acquiring the property from the Diocese by way of a 999 year lease and subleasing the building to SOSCIC (see note below) for management and development. As a result of their increased role, the parish council has decided to obtain its own separate legal advice and, at their July meeting, a firm of solicitors with specialist knowledge of local authority law were instructed. It is expected that this change is unlikely to impact on the overall legal costs involved.

In order to secure the purchase a number of legal agreements now have to be finalised including leases relating to the allotment site and the village hall field. This will take time to complete. Nevertheless the project now appears to be close to achieving the aim of acquiring the property and thereafter developing it for the benefit of the community.

SOSCIC – Sherston Old School Community Interest Company Limited – is an independent body set up to develop and manage the property for the community. In due course all residents will be invited to become members of the company which is limited by guarantee. Membership will be free on the basis that should the company fail member's liability is strictly limited to £1. The company's board will be elected by the members and its assets both managed and protected for the benefit of the community only.


