This year's Children in Need CD single, John Lennon's peace and love anthem 'All you need is love', features many famous musicians such as Bill Wyman (formerly Rolling Stones), Peter Gabriel, Queen's Brian May, Pink Floyd's Nick Mason, Midge Ure (Ultravox and Band Aid), Bryan Ferry, Heather Small (M People), Lee Mead, Aled Jones, Cerys Matthews, Elaine Paige, Sharon Corr, Hayley Westenra, and Paloma Faith.

Providing the backing are the Kingswood School Orchestra and Singers, from Lansdown in Bath, featuring Charles Price from Sherston on the trumpet. Charles went to Sherston School for his primary education, moving on to Kingswood's secondary school, where he's about to sit his GCSEs next year.

Charlie explains that work on the recording began back in May, with record producer A D Chivers inviting the orchestra to record the backing track. This went so well that, when the time came to record the video to go with the single, the orchestra were invited to the EMI studios in London's Abbey Road, famous as the studios used by a host of stars over the years, including The Beatles and Pink Floyd. Indeed, it was


at Abbey Road that the original Beatles version of 'All you need is love' was recorded live on the first global satellite TV hook-up called 'Our World', back in 1967.

Charlie and the orchestra also went to Longleat back in September, when they recorded an outdoor version of Paul McCartney's 'We all stand together', and this track appears on the album for Children In Need this year, 'Bandaged Together', along with twenty other tracks.

Even clicking on the YouTube video will help, as it improves the ratings, which if it projects the CD into the charts goes on to boost sales even more and helps the charity.

Christmas music concert

There will be a concert of traditional and 16th century Christmas music in the parish church at 7.30pm on Saturday 5 December. The concert will be given by the Amberley Chamber Choir, conductor Harry Lyall, with Anthony Burns-Cox, organ. Price £6 including refreshments.

The Amberley Chamber Choir was founded in 1983 by Harry Lyall, who moved to Sherston in 2006. It has given 130 concerts, mostly in Gloucestershire. This will be the third in Sherston. While specialising in music from the 16th century, the choir always includes carols in its Christmas Concerts.

Anthony Burns-Cox first played with the choir in 2004, and has returned by popular request to play at the Christmas concert ever since.

This year the programme will include traditional carols from England, Wales and France as well as pieces by Michael Praetorious, Peter Philips, Gustav Holst and Peter Warlock.

Benefit rules relaxed

More people can now benefit from changes in the way housing and council tax benefits are worked out.

More residents will be entitled to benefits and those who already receive them may see an increase in what they get.

The changes came into play on 2 November and affect families with children and people of pensionable age.

In the case of families with children, child benefit is no longer counted as income when working out how much housing and council tax benefit a person gets.

In the case of those aged 60 and over, up to £10,000 savings or capital will be ignored when assessing income for housing and council tax benefits purposes.

People already getting housing or council tax benefit need do nothing as they will automatically have their claims re-adjusted by the council's revenue and benefits team.

Existing customers affected by the change should have been notified by the end of last month.

People who have previously not qualified for housing or council tax benefit may now be entitled.

A chart showing various family groups and incomes has been produced to help people work out if they may be able to get help. This is available on the changes to benefit rules page of the council's website and at council offices and on parish notice boards.

Aswineofathing

Swine flu scuppered the first community bus outing planned for last month.

The new Malmesbury-based 17-seater minibus was due to take Sherstonians on a Christmas shopping trip to Cribbs Causeway on 15 November. But the trip had to be cancelled when volunteer driver Eric Thacker went down with swine flu.

'There wasn't enough time to get a replacement driver trained,' said Sherston Parish Council vice chairman Martin Rea.

'But all those with tickets have been offered a refund or a place on the next trip to Cribbs Causeway on Saturday 19 December.'

The bus will leave the High Street at 11am and return at approximately 4pm.

The cost is £4 return and tickets, available from Sherston Post Office, should be bought well in advance as only 16 seats are available on each trip. Under-14 s must be accompanied by an adult.

The outing is part of a pilot project to run weekend sightseeing and shopping trips to places such as Bristol and Bath.

'The trips are designed to enable those who would otherwise find it difficult, if not impossible, to visit large shopping centres and other places of interest.' said Mr Rea.

'If these initial trips prove a success they could be extended next year.'

In the longer term, the Malmesbury and villages partnership hopes for regular trips using larger coaches serving Malmesbury and other villages.

'They'll be visiting the site on a weekly basis over the winter to complete the work which is extensive,' said parish council chairman John Matthews.

'Villagers Irene Johnston and Mary Johnson have kindly volunteered to act as additional supervisors for the team and have been trained by Wiltshire probation service.'

As a way of repaying their debts to the community, offenders on the scheme have already cleared a rough area of land around the sports field skateboard area for the parish council.

The village hall committee hopes the scheme can help with internal and external redecoration of the hall.

French connection on offer

One of the sunniest villages in France is looking to team up with Sherston.

With a population of more than 1,250, Lathus is part of an agricultural area which has strong horse-riding interests and a small percentage of English farmers.

About 4.5 hours' drive from the Caen ferry, Lathus has its own railway stop and is half-way between Poitiers and Limoges on the northern Limousin plateau.

It is in the commune of Lathus St Remy in southern Vienne which is geographically the largest commune in the region of Poitou-Charente.

'Only the Côte d'Azur region has more sunshine hours per year,' said Pete Johnston of the Tarters who, with his wife Irene, regularly spends the summer there.

'Although Lathus isn't picturesque like Sherston, it's similarly set in verdant countryside with beautiful rivers and is dominated by oak woods and fields full of Limousin cattle and sheep,' added Pete.

'And it has a very active and gregarious community.'
Just over a mile from the village is the River Gartempe which is the regional kayaking centre in the winter and a popular swimming spot in the summer.

The countryside is known for its extensive but not too strenuous walking and cycling.

The largest single employer is the outdoor activity centre CPA.

'On a not-for-profit basis, CPA runs a kayaking, climbing and hiking section with extensive modern accommodation, a 'teaching' farm, a substantial equitation centre and a sailing school on the biggest lake in the commune,' said Pete who has been asked by a Lathus councillor to sound out Sherstonians' appetite for cultural and educational links.

Speak up for Sherston

'Do nothing and you could regret it.'

This was last month's message to villagers from Sherston resident and planning professional Mike Johnson.

Mike was stressing to parish councillors the importance of everyone's taking part in Wiltshire Council's current consultation on planning in the county over the next 20 years. 'Doing nothing will result in us having to accept whatever is finally agreed at the end of the process,' said Mike.

'Housing development is a major issue and the present consultation document says that Sherston should accommodate 'modest development',' he added.

'The question is: 'What will that mean on the ground?'

'Other nearby villages, which don't have Sherston's range of facilities, seem more likely only to get infill development.'

Recently, the parish council has opposed further large-scale development and would rather see existing brownfield sites redeveloped for specific housing needs especially for the elderly.

Mike cautioned that, once planning policy was set, it would be almost impossible successfully to argue against any development proposals.

'So it's essential for the parish and individuals alike to play a full part in the consultation process if they wish to influence the way Sherston and indeed Wiltshire develop over the next 20 years,' he said.

Parishioners have an opportunity to say what they want to see by way of improved services and facilities in the village over the next 20 years.

The consultation period runs until 5pm on 31 December and Mike Johnson will again address the parish council at its meeting on 10 December when a final response will be discussed.

Phone box talks

Pinkney's phone box has been used only twice in the last 12 months. The figures, released by BT, again raise doubts about the future of the red kiosks in Pinkney and Willesley. And the parish council has again been asked to consider the Adopt a Kiosk scheme. Under this scheme, BT disconnects the service and the community pays £1 for the kiosk and takes responsibility for its future maintenance.

Some 350 kiosks have been adopted across the country and are used as information points, meeting places and even mini art galleries. Some areas simply wish to retain the old red kiosk as part of their heritage.

'Certainly the usefulness of the Pinkney kiosk seems very limited,' said parish council chairman John Matthews.

'However, the Willesley one was used 50 times perhaps more than previously thought. And it's close to a main road and could well be vital following a serious motor accident.'

Councillors would welcome residents' views which should be sent to the parish clerk in time for them to meet the BT deadline of 23 January.

Flying start for Sherston Probus Club

A new Probus Club has been formed in Sherston with the inaugural meeting last month. Such has been the interest that the membership list is already almost complete, numbers being limited by the accommodation available for monthly meetings at the Rattlebone Inn.

Probus Clubs now exist worldwide. The movement was founded to provide an opportunity for retired business and professional men to meet regularly, keeping up social contacts with like-minded people. Meetings usually have a speaker and discussion, sometimes followed by a meal together. Sherston meetings will follow this format each month including lunch. Clubs tend to be very popular, many in our area having waiting lists. Sherston is helping to meet this growing demand as well as providing a venue within walking distance for many. Guns 'n road

Five people have now volunteered for training to combat speeding in Sherston.

'But more would help spread the load,' said the police.

Local people are being asked to monitor areas where they consider speed a problem.

They will be issued with speed guns and trained and given health and safety advice by the police.

While their evidence will not be used to prosecute speeding drivers, it will be invaluable in pin-pointing areas on which the police can concentrate most effectively.

Drivers reported to the police will receive written warnings. After three warnings, the police will put the vehicle's information on their computer system for it to be stopped and investigated by their patrol vehicles.




Tetbury Art Society

Winter Safety

With the darker colder nights approaching fast, the time for turning up the heating has arrived. Many of us in Wiltshire have open fires and woodburners as a source of heating.

Chimney fires can be prevented

Keep it clean

Your chimney must be kept clean to prevent fires and structural damage to your property. Clean chimneys also help the environment by assisting the complete combustion of the fuel, reducing emissions in the atmosphere. Regular cleaning of your chimney or flues eliminates the build-up of soot and clears obstructions such as bird and animal nests, leaves and debris.

Using a vacuum cleaner alone is not sufficient to clean the chimney properly. Ensure your chimney flue is inspected at regular intervals to prevent fire breaking out of the chimney. Fireguards can prevent serious injury or death. Spark guards can prevent a serious fire in your property.

- smokeless fuels should be swept at least once a year.
- bituminous coal should be swept at least once a year.

Beauty and the Beast

If beauty is in the eye of the beholder, there were
a lot of beholders in the village hall back in October
to see the latest panto by Sherston Drama Group.
The packed performance of Beauty and the Beast,
written by Andrew Hawcroft, drew on the traditional
story, with additional fruit and a bit of sauce. There's
Beauty, daughter of a pig farmer, and the Beast, who,
as a prince, was far more objectionable than when he
was transposed into a state of beastliness by the Spirit
of the Forest. Message: it's not what you look like, it's
what's inside that counts.



The cast seems to grow like topsy every year with some outstanding performances from everyone so it's unfair to single out individuals. But needs must, as the Spirit of the Forest might have said. Bonamy Smith as Beauty (Beatrice) was sweetness personified; Annabel Green, obnoxious nob, showed us that a lion's heart can beat in a princely breast; and Richard

Warren successfully pigged out on his role as Beauty's dad. Kevin Smith once again cornered the market in panto villains; Shaun Scott was a wonderful (not so simple) Simple Simon; and Andrew Baker's Michael Flathead was a mature performance from a young thesp. Meanwhile, Graham Instrell sat out most of the show as an amusingly mouthy narrator.

Sue Ormiston was a humanitarian Spirit of the Forest, dispensing fair-minded justice on those who deserved far worse, and flitting in



and out of the action with practised assurance. John Pettit's appearance as Sir Hugh of Grant, although only occasional, was an inspired impersonation, a sort of cross between Hugh Grant and Harry Enfield's 'Nice But Dim' character. One hopes he doesn't try this at work.



As for Sherston's troupe of young gifted actors, they all put on a grand showing. Charlie Brock and Harry Andrews, exhausting the paint pots with their beards and moustaches, turned in good performances



as Ernie's two mentally challenged sons; and Rachel McLeish was a busy young lady, who had great presence as a herald and as one of the dancing fairies.

As for Glen Scott, he was a perfect straight man (not an easy task) to Kevin Smith's Baron Blackheart. Other Sherston minors made excellent contributions as bodyguards, wolves, fairies and villagers.


Clive Renton's Butler (a voice of sanity) and Mark Andrews' Chef (his romantic dinner for two did little for romance and nothing for nourishment); Sue Lehrer's Trinny





and Kirstie Blair's Susannah (frightening control freaks from Central Casting), gave some studied cameo performances as the Prince's staff. As for poor Nea Sneddon-

Jenkins (she of the short straw), great sympathy is extended to her as the one landed the unenviable role of seducing the narrator.



But panto is not just about beauties and beasts; there's also music and dance, and the youngsters put in some lovely dance routines, which were very much



appreciated by the audience. In all, there were more supporting roles and backstage helpers than trees in a magic forest; the result was an imaginatively choreographed show with a memorable sparkle.

The two Richards, Skeffington and Warren, directed (who was Beauty, who was Beast, one wonders?) and Katie Skeffington was assistant director. Sue Lehrer took time off from her role as Trinny to choreograph and there was a veritable army of people who all put in a lot to make the whole evening the biggest bang outside fireworks night. Oh yes they did!

One final shameful omission. Nowhere is there a mention of the pig, who for much of the performance was dragged around the stage, humiliated and ridiculed. He was last seen occupying a lonely bar stool at The Rattlebone, sobbing into a shandy. This is vile treatment of a talented player and some kind of recompense should be forthcoming to arrest the decline of this promising anonymous newcomer.





More about Thomas Davis

The membership record of Thomas Davis 1651

Cilla Liddington has made more discoveries about Thomas Davis, the 17th century Sherston merchant whose trade token was discovered in a High Street garden on Easter Monday.

The archivist of the Mercers' Company has found a record of Thomas Davis having been a member, something that was possible only through patrimony, apprenticeship or redemption (payment of a large fee). Thomas was admitted to the company in 1651 by redemption, having paid the then huge sum of £50. However, he then petitioned the company to be admitted through apprenticeship, pointing out that he had been bound as an apprentice to a John Osburne 'beyond the seas'. (Apparently this has the specific meaning of 'outside of the English state, territories, realm or country'). This may mean that Thomas served some or all of his apprenticeship abroad.

The Company subsequently refunded Thomas £40 of his redemption fee and gave the remaining £10 'to the poor', indicating that the company accepted Thomas's petition that he had completed his apprenticeship.

Mercery is the specific trade of exporting wool or cloth such as fustian and importing fine fabrics







such as silk. During the mid 17th century, mercers (in particular those mercers who were also Merchant Adventurers) would be trading most frequently with the Netherlands, Germany and Italy. Mercers might even live and work in a foreign town such as Antwerp, or at the very least frequently travel abroad to visit the quarterly cloth fairs which were held quarterly in major towns such as Bruges.

Because Thomas became a member of the Mercers' Company in 1651 during the Commonwealth, he was recalled to the Mercers' Hall in 1661 to take an oath of allegiance to the King following the restoration of the monarchy.

This year, from Monday November 30th to Monday December 21st we will open for extended hours from 7.00 a.m. to 6.00 p.m. Monday to Fridays and from 8.00 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturdays. We have done this to provide a superior local alternative to you visiting a larger office where long queues at many have featured in the past. No other Post Office in the vicinity will offer this service.

Posting Abroad

Weighty Problem

If possible, avoid sending items over 2kg or it could cost you dear. If you have no choice, consider "splitting" – it will still be much cheaper. e.g.

	1.9Kg	2.1Kg	3.8Kg
Europe	£11.19	£29.99	£34.49
Australia/NZ	£22.16	£55.99	£70.99

Don't guess the weight of your parcel or use scales that are not fully reliable. If your postage is wrong, it could result in problems with your delivery or you paying too much.

Size Matters

Even if the weight is less than 2Kg, to qualify as a "small packet" the combined "length" plus "width" plus "depth" of your parcel must be less than 90cm (3 foot in old language) AND the longest side less than 60cm. Anything outside these measurements must be sent by Parcelforce which could result in you paying twice the price.

Value for Money

Standard air mail small packets only carry compensation of £39 and nothing for cash. If you propose sending a high value item or cash please request either "Airsure" or "International Signed For" to obtain appropriate insurance cover.


