Bonfire smoke nuisance

A number of residents are complaining about the smoke from neighbours' bonfires.

The school in particular has been suffering and there have been occasions when the classrooms and the school kitchen have been inundated with smoke.

This is not only troublesome; for people with respiratory problems it can be positively dangerous.

Gardeners are asked to be considerate and remember that there are other ways of disposing of garden waste: compost what you can and take the rest to the tip.

In the last resort, if smoke from a bonfire is creating a nuisance Wiltshire Council has powers to take action under the provisions of the Environmental Protection Act 1990.

Parking clampdown warning

Community Beat Manager pc Bowden has received numerous complaints about parking on the junction of Court Street and Church Street. He now intends to get tough with offenders.

Pc Bowden said 'The problem has been assessed and it is clear that any vehicle parked on or within fifteen metres of the junction is causing an unnecessary obstruction to other road users and pedestrians. In the interests of safety, it is my intention to issue fixed penalty tickets to any vehicle seen to be contravening Section 137 of the Highways Act 1980.'

He goes on 'This is clearly not the best use of police time and resources and therefore I ask that people apply common sense and consideration to avoid any police intervention'

John Thomson has been elected to represent Sherston on the new unitary Wiltshire Council.

The full Sherston results of the 4 June elections were: Ashby, Ian - Liberal Democrats 470 (25.3 per cent) Ford, Susan Marion - Labour Party 77 (4.1 per cent) Thomson, John Percy Simon Stuart Conservative Party 1,299 (69.9 per cent)

The turnout in Sherston was 50.7 per cent and there were 13 spoiled votes.

Having won more than 60 per cent of the votes cast in the county, the Conservatives control Wiltshire Council.



In our June issue we reported that Sue Robinson was exploring the possibility of changing the management of Sherston churchyard so that it could become a Living Churchyard. Here she provides us with an update.

A small start has been made on what has the potential to be a huge project. Mr. Ivan Randall from Stanton St. Quintin, who is the chief adviser to the Living Churchyard project in Wiltshire, has visited our churchyard to help us make our first steps, for which I am very grateful, particularly as he does all his work in a voluntary capacity. An initial survey has found more than forty types of flowering plant in the churchyard and two areas have now been selected for management to conserve wildlife.

One is to the left of the front path as you go towards the church. There the grass is being left uncut to form a "summer meadow" and already a large patch of marguerites or ox-eye daisies has come into

flower after years of being chopped off by the mower before this could happen. In late July or August the area will be cut and the mown grass cleared away. By this time the flowering plants will have had time to set seed which will fall into the ground, so that there are more flowers for next year. This kind of management is similar to that of a traditional hay meadow and is practised in nature reserves such North Meadow in Cricklade, famous for its fritillaries in the spring. The hope is that over time more plant species will raise their heads or naturalise into the area from outside the churchyard.

The second area now under management is a

'woodland' area either side of the path from the gate near Anthony Close. Here quite a few woodland plants, such as violets, wild strawberries and lords and ladies are already growing. The work done there so far has involved the clearance of seedlings of elder and bramble to allow the smaller plants to grow more strongly.

I have had a lot of expressions of support for this project and some concrete offers of help so I am confident that things will continue to move forward, albeit slowly at first. By the time you read this you may have taken the opportunity to visit the churchyard as part of the church Open Gardens Trail on June 21 and seen what is going on. If you are interested in getting involved more help will always be welcome and I look forward to hearing from anyone who is interested.



Old news

Reproduced below is a snapshot of what the parish council were up to in July 1909 from North Wilts Herald.

SHERSTON

PARISH COUNCIL. - The quarterly meeting of the Parish Council was held on Tuesday, all the members being present. Dr Fletcher was appointed a school manager in the place of the late Mr George Beak and a member of the parochial (water) committee in the place of Mr W Jobbins, resigned. It was decided not to fill the vacancy on the Council caused by the death of Mr G Beak as the triennial election takes place next year. It was also decided that no remuneration should be paid to the Clerk for making out and collecting special expenses rate, it being considered that the fixed salary was ample payment for all the duties pertaining to the office of Assistant Overseer and Clerk to the Parish Council. A satisfactory explanation was given with regard to the alleged irregularity in payment of the tithe in connection with Iddols Charity referred to at the last meeting of the Council. Mr G. Smith called attention to the water supply complaints of which had been received from various parts of the parish. The clerk was instructed to write to the Rural District Council and call attention to the matter.

TREEtalk

What's this all about?

In addition to kids' tree counting and leaf collection competitions, there were fascinating green woodworking and weaving displays by the Cotswold Woodland Crafts organisation.

We hope that Grove wood will become a focus of village activity over the next few years. There are so

many different ways of becoming involved – you don't need to be able to wield a chainsaw or be a tree expert to take part. There will be monthly updates on progress so no worries about a lack of information! A leaflet giving further information is being circulated with this issue of Cliffhanger. 

Did you know?

There are about 20,000 tree species in the world. Britain has some 80% of all the 'ancient' trees in Europe.

Some trees can "talk" to each other. When willows are attacked by webworms and caterpillars, they emit a chemical that alerts nearby willow of the danger. Those trees then respond by pumping more tannin into their leaves making it difficult for the insects to digest the leaves.

Mrs Liddington added that bad parking where Silver Street meets Cliff Road was restricting access and endangering elderly householders needing the emergency services.

After a suggestion from Wiltshire councillor John Thomson, Ness Whiffin undertook to ask her fellow school governors about using the school car park at weekends and holiday times.

Meanwhile, Mike Barnes asked on behalf of Willesley whether a 30mph speed restriction and a weight limit could be imposed in the hamlet.

The parish council will first establish the problems by requesting a 'golden river' - two cables across the road - to register speeds and the mix of vehicles.

John Hall raised similar concerns relating to speeding traffic along Tetbury Lane. These would also be addressed

On the Old School Project, parish council chairman John Matthews said it was in a strong financial position.

Because of the economic downturn, the parish council had reduced its offer for the site from £450,000 to £323,000. Two local trusts had offered a total of £340,000 and the project could borrow up to £500,000 from the Public Works Loan Board.

However, while there was an agreement to the old school scheme in principle, there was still none in writing and there could be no long-term plans until the building had been bought, he said.

In addition, £75,000 would be paid for control of the field behind the village hall.

Other positive events, added Mr Matthews, included the introduction of Cliffhanger and the footpath group and a new school classroom.

Also, the parish council had leased Grove Wood as a community wood.

The year's frustrations included enforcement problems with footpaths and unauthorised development and the lack of plastic and cardboard recycling facilities.

But Mr Thomson reported that legal enforcement was under way over the unauthorised development at Luckington Lane.

Watch out for these scams

Our region is being targeted with two scams: one relating to BT telephone bills, the other to car sales.

Conmen claiming to be from BT are ringing and alleging that householders are liable for an unpaid bill, usually between £30 and £70. When challenged, the caller attempts to demonstrate control by disconnecting the victim's phone line for a few minutes. He/she may then call back and claim the consumer had been sent the bill and it must be paid immediately or the phone line will be disconnected. Any payment made appears to go to an online company.

BT advises consumers never to give personal and banking details over the phone unless they are certain who they are dealing with. BT also confirms that, in any event, they would never make this kind of call.

The other scam involves vehicle matching firms. These firms approach people selling their cars and promise to match them with definite buyers.

Typically, having placed an advert in a magazine, on a website or in a newspaper, the seller is cold-called by phone. The caller promises that a buyer exists for the advertised vehicle but requires the advertiser to pay a matcher's fee upfront before the sale is completed. However in many cases there is no buyer, the contract with the vehicle matcher can't be cancelled and any money paid is lost.

We have been advised of these scams by Consumer Direct, an offshoot of the Office of Fair Trading (OFT).

If you get any suspicious phone calls telling you that you owe money to BT, or promising to put you in touch with a buyer for a vehicle you've advertised, you are advised to call Consumer Direct on 08454 04 05 06.

Zap your food waste

Food waste is disappearing into thin air thanks to a council-subsidised offer.

Under a pilot scheme to avoid householders sending their food waste to landfill, Wiltshire Council and the Wiltshire Waste Partnership are offering food waste digesters at a knock-down price.

There are two digesters on offer made by Green Cone Ltd of Nottingham.

Both take all cooked and uncooked food waste including meat, fish, bones, dairy products, vegetables and fruit.

The first, the Green Cone, uses solar power to ensure the total breakdown of food waste into its natural components of water and carbon dioxide. The manufacturers say this produces a minimal amount of residue which only needs to be removed every few years.

The Green Cone, which usually sells for £69.55, is now only £15 when collected from a sales event.

The second digester, the Green Johanna, takes garden as well as food waste and produces compost for the garden.

Usually priced at £98.99, it costs £20 when collected from a sales event.

Both digesters incur an additional £5 charge for home delivery.

Contrary to Green Cone Ltd's advice, the waste partnership's Recycle for Wiltshire team does not advise putting corn starch bin liners in the Green Johanna.

The digesters can be bought on line from www. greencone.com. Enter your postcode into the Discounts box and click Go. Ordering on line qualifies for a further £1 discount.


of visits to fellow Orders acting in the time honoured role as chaperone to their less experienced maids in her capacity as the maid of one of the country's most long established Orders.






