Police News

My colleague, PCSO Durry Maule, and I have continued to try to patrol Sherston and other villages as much as possible this year after it was agreed at the Malmesbury and Villages Community Area Partnership meeting in January that high visibility patrolling should be our priority.

We complement this with advertised quarterly street meetings throughout the year. The most recent of these was on Tuesday 24 May in the High Street from 2.30pm to 3.30pm. The next will take place some time from July onwards but will be advertised in advance.

It seems that a matter of great local interest is the ongoing misuse of the Fosseway at Easton Grey at the river crossing where a site of historical interest appears to have been turned into a playground for a minority of off road type enthusiasts. Although not in the Parish, Sherston council has written a letter of support to a multi agency meeting which I attended at County Hall in March and at last various organisations are pulling together to end this destruction. This means for the next three months I have to prioritise my resources in preventing further anti-social behaviour there rather than high visibility patrolling. I am pleased with the progress made by working with all our partners and hope to be able to release more resources very soon to work on local issues.

Next month of course is the Boules weekend and hopefully it will be as enjoyable as ever. There will be a small police presence for at least part of the day on the Saturday, but this is only to ensure the free movement of traffic around the event which presented a few minor issues in previous years.

Thank you Sherston

I have just successfully completed the 26th Marathon Des Sables - a multi-leg, self-sufficiency 'ultra' marathon run in South Morocco (243 km in 6 days) across the Sahara desert. Carrying full kit, all you are given is water. Here is a quick summary as I saw it. A thank you for the support of the Afghanistan Trust to support families and soldiers of the Parachute Regiment wounded and killed. The regiment is in Helmand Province right now. Groups of 8 shared a Berber tent, and each carried a daysack of everything they needed, mine weighed just under 10Kg.



Stage 1 - 33 km including the Erg Chebbi Dunes, which is stunning if you're not trying to run the 14 km length of them, 2 steps forward, 1 back, sinking every step. You go up a dune 50 metres and down the other side for 14 km. Temperatures range from 35 °C to 50 °C, in which fast marching sucks the life out of you. The first casualty was a Frenchman who had a heart-attack. The following day another broke a leg.

Stage 2 - 38 km – Cooking breakfast was a challenge in a sandstorm. We reached a sand dune after 9km and ran out looking like a piece of sand paper. I was in the middle of the pack. Many runners were now suffering major blisters. I'm lucky and don't blister easily, but I did tape up all vulnerable bits.

Stage 3 - 38 km - Hard ground and soft sand made it difficult to keep a steady pace. There were more dunes and a dry gorge to negotiate as we climbed to the top of Jebel Foum Al Hopaht, and I started suffering heat sickness - not a pleasant experience. I carried on to the next 'Doc' patrol and recovered quickly after being given some magic heat sickness pills. This was my worst day as I dropped my discipline and neglected my salt tabs, food and regular water. Up most of the night.

Stage 4 - Double Marathon, with the next bivouac site 82 km away. I had a bad start and thought I would

keel over - not how I wanted to start the hardest day. So I forced myself to better discipline and started tabbing (fast march) near the back. Hottest day and IV drips running out, as I think many were running too fast. I kept tabbing and increased pace slowly. By mid-afternoon I was overtaking people. Check point at 50 km (after night fall) so head torches on. I did not stop and kept overtaking, morale high, stumbled over a thousand rocks and at 72 km saw the green laser directing us to the bivouac site. Got in at 03.00am, only three members of our tent were in, not even my oldest friend who had stopped to eat and fallen asleep! I must have overtaken 200-300 runners on that day, which felt good. But the medical tent was now full and many were running with 'hamburger meat.' That afternoon I received an email from my wife, which read - 'Edward born this morning - we're both well. You're in deep sh*t.'

Stage 5 - 42.2 km - Hot but easier, more climbing and fewer dunes, stunning scenery and locals cheered us in. Food was now running short, and the casualty count had risen to 40 runners. Last evening in the desert.



Stage 6 - 17.5 km to the finish. 50 slowest set off first. Then the rest of us. Crowds cheered us to the end. I had no serious blisters and finished in the middle of the pack. But I finished.

I raised with your help in excess of £16,000 for the Afghanistan Trust, so THANK YOU SHERSTON.

Sherston Living Churchyard

Unusually there have been two sessions in the churchyard since I last wrote to let you know how our project is going on. Volunteers have worked to clear ivy from the trunks of the cherry trees whose pink blossoms are so admired every spring. While this work was going on we disturbed a slow worm and it is good to know that there is still at least one of these increasingly rare creatures in the churchyard. All too often they are only seen when they get chopped up by lawnmower blades and this is one of the arguments for leaving some areas of longer grass where they can take refuge. The new grass areas where the overgrown evergreen trees were removed have once again been painstakingly hand-weeded, to remove the nettles, brambles and elder seedlings and encourage the grassland plants.

The wonderful weather over the last few weeks has compressed spring into such a short period that it has been difficult to keep up with recording the appearance of the wild flowers. We are slowly building up a picture of all the different flowering plants to be found in the churchyard and every year the list grows longer. This year, however, there has been no Lady's

Smock. These pale pink flowers come up where the ground is damp and I can only think that their non-appearance has been due to the exceptionally dry weather and hope that we will see them again next year.

A lot of our native wild flowers have the name Lady referring to Our Lady, Mary the mother of Jesus. Later in the year Lady's Bedstraw should be growing yellow round some of the old gravestones. This aromatic plant was used in the past to sweeten the straw stuffed into mattresses and pillows. Lady's Mantle is not found in the churchyard but many of you will have it in your gardens as its green flowers are a favourite of flower arrangers. Lady's Fingers, Lady's Tresses and Lady's Slipper, a rare wild orchid, are other flowers which remind us how the devotion of the people of the past was entwined in the world which surrounded them every day.

The Living Churchyard will once again be part of the Open Gardens Garden Trail at the Church Fête on Saturday 25 and Sunday 26 June. As the Fête is taking place in the churchyard this year it will be easy to come along and have a look at what is happening. June Saturdays are very busy for the church community so the next working session will not be until Saturday 9 July. I hope to see you there.

Last year Malmesbury and Villages Community Area Partnership (MVCAP) ran a public event in Malmesbury Town Hall about transport. The top issue raised was the lack of public transport on evenings and Sundays. MVCAP don't have the resources to solve this, but do believe that they can do something to help.

They are setting up a pilot scheme which will run fortnightly trips from villages to the cinema run by White Horse Pictures at Malmesbury Town Hall. Hopefully Sherston will be part of the pilot. Sow now

The marvelously warm spring brought many plants into flower much earlier than expected, often by as much as six weeks, as well as shortening the overall flowering period. Many gardeners wonder what will be left to flower by the end of June with July, August and even September looking distinctly lacking in interest. Bedding plants can of course always be relied on, so long as they are well fed and deadheaded, but in the garden situation often a greater range of plants are required especially those with height.

It could well be worth taking a tip from that doyen of gardeners the late Christopher Lloyd. He constantly encouraged the sowing of hardy and half hardy annuals so prolonging a colourful garden well into autumn.

Whether you sow direct or into trays or pots to start seeds off there is still a good choice of annuals to grow this month. Why not try *Calendula* (pot marigold), *Centaurea*, *Clarkia*, *Eschscholtizia* (Californian poppy), *Godetia*, *Linari*a or nasturtium? Sown now all should give a good display later in the summer if not into early autumn.

June is also the month to sow biennials for flowering next year. Bellis daisies, Canterbury bells foxgloves and of course wallflowers all spring to mind.

Vegetables to be sown direct throughout the month include French and runner beans, beetroot, calabrese, carrots, mini cauliflower, all chicories, Chinese cabbage, courgettes, cucumber, endive, kohl rabi, oriental salad plants, lettuce, marrow, peas, pumpkin, radish, salad rocket, spinach beet, summer and new Zealand spinach, squash, swede, sweetcorn and turnip. There's plenty of choice I'm sure you'll agree!

For those amongst you with a competitive streak don't forget the Flower, Vegetable and Produce Show at the Parish Party on Bank Holiday Monday 29 August. The schedule will soon be published so start thinking of your entries now.

The Carducci Quartet

The Carducci Quartet, hailed as one of Europe's top young string quartets, swept the audience off its seats with a thoroughly engaging programme of Haydn, Mendelssohn and Dvorak in Malmesbury Abbey on Saturday 7 May. It was the second concert in the Malmesbury Abbey Musical Society's exciting 40th anniversary concert series and was an absolute triumph.

And it started with a joke! Old jokes, as they say, are the best and there are few older or better than the one in Hayden's so-called Joke Quartet (String Quartet in E b Op 33 No. 2) which brought the house down yet again in this performance. The Carduccis executed the deliciously deadpan delivery of the false endings in the finale that gives the work its nickname perfectly and it provided a joyful start to the evening.

Then, in great contrast, came Mendelssohn's String Quartet in F minor Op. 80 – a passionate and heartbreaking piece written by Mendelssohn after hearing of the death of his beloved sister Fanny. He subtitled the work 'Requiem for Fanny' but it served as his own since he died two months later of a stroke. The Carduccis played with total conviction and emotion leaving the audience in no doubt about Mendelssohn's devastation. All present shared his sorrow and anguish.

After the interval, the audience was treated to a superb performance of Dvorak's Quartet in F major. 'The American' was written when Dvorak was visiting the small farming community of Spillville, Iowa, and it combines American and European folk tunes with the composer's yearning for his homeland. The Carduccis brought out both the jolly and the heartfelt. Spontaneous gasps of pleasure from the audience greeted the final notes together with very warm and enthusiastic applause.

The musicians - Matt Denton (violin), Michelle Flemming (violin), Eoin Schmidt-Martin (viola) and Emma Denton (cello) - then returned for an unexpected encore of Shostakovich's wonderfully amusing 'Wrong Note Polka' (Age of Gold Op22a).

This was an appealing end to a thoroughly enjoyable evening.

The next concert of the series is Harry Christophers and The Sixteen on Saturday 4 June at 7.30pm in Malmesbury Abbey which promises to be sell-out.

Heating and Insulation help

Heating and Insulation help from Warm Front - act now before next winter.

The Warm Front scheme provides heating and insulation improvements to households on certain income-related benefits living in properties that are poorly insulated and/or do not have a working central heating system. Qualifying households can get improvements worth up to £3,500 (£6,000 where oil central heating and other alternative technologies are recommended).

Grants are available for improvements such as loft insulation - draught-proofing - cavity wall insulation, hot water tank insulation - gas, electric, liquid petroleum gas or oil heating - glass-fronted fire - the Warm Front scheme can convert your solid-fuel open fire to a glass-fronted fire.

You won't have to pay anything as long as the work doesn't cost more than the grant available. If the cost of the work is more than the grant available you'll have to make a contribution to enable work to go ahead. Work will not start without making sure you are willing and able to pay the difference.

To qualify for Warm Front you must live in your own home or rent privately and be in receipt of one of the benefits below. The property must have a Standard Assessment procedure (SAP) rating of 55 or under. The SAP rating of the property will be assessed at the beginning of the Technical Survey. A householder or their spouse must be in receipt of one of the following to be eligible:

Pension Credit.

Guaranteed Credit or Savings Credit.

Income Support or Income-based Jobseeker's

Allowance.

Old School news

Now that it's possible to get uninterrupted access to the building, a great deal of practical work is going on. Several local building firms have been contacted and four have been chosen to submit tenders to carry out the necessary work on the building. The SOSCIC board hopes to be in a position to select one of these firms in late June or early July, and work should start soon after that. There may well be scope for specialist local tradespeople to be involved as sub-contractors.

There have already been some expressions of interest from potential tenants. Lettings will be handled by Graham Singer, and he will enter into negotiations as soon as the building works are in a sufficiently advanced state.

Having secured the money to cover the cost of the first phase of building work, SOSCIC now needs to find enough for the second phase. Once the builders' investigations have revealed just how much work needs to be done, it will be possible to put a figure on this. Various potential sources of funding are being explored, including Community First, the Prince's Countryside Fund and Heritage Lottery, but contributions from members are going to play an important part.

SOSCIC membership now stands at over 200, a good indication of the level of support in the community. As promised in the May Cliffhanger, a members' meeting has now been arranged and will take place in the village hall at 7.30pm on Monday 20 June. The main purpose of the meeting will be to bring members up to date on progress, but the board hopes also to find volunteers to help things along. In particular, there is an urgent need for a fundraising team and for someone to take charge of it. If anyone out there is interested, there's no need to wait for the members' meeting. 

Lily of the Valley

Rumours abound that there's a small colony of lily of the valley, Convallaria magilis, growing in Grove Wood. If you do come across them please let Tree Warden Irene Johnston know on 841273 or ie_ johnston@yahoo.co.uk or alternatively her deputy Sue McKechnie on 840601 or email suemckechnie@ hotmail.com They usually flower in May although can be a little later especially in a north facing wood like the Grove.

The flower is also known as Our Lady's tears. According to Christian legend, the lily of the valley came into being from Eve's tears after she was driven with Adam from the Garden of Eden. It is perhaps more likely that 'Our Lady' refers to the Virgin Mary whose tears at the crucifixion are said to have turned to lily of the valley.

There is also an English legend of St Leonard the Dragon Slayer who lived in the forest named after him in Sussex and slew the last dragon in England.

Æthelweard's Chronicle of 770AD mentions



'Monstrous serpents were seen in the country of the Southern Angles that is called Sussex'. St Leonard was grievously injured by the dragon and wherever his blood fell lily of the valley plants sprang up.

Male nightingales are apparently drawn by the fragrance of the white nodding flowers leading them to find their mates in woodland glades.


Summoned

At the end of May a missive in the form of a formal summons was found pinned to the gate of the village hall field by a pair of size 3 crimson red stiletto heeled shoes. The shoes and the turquoise ink of the summons pointed clearly to the work of The Very Reverend Ivor Horn BSc (Hons).

Often referred to in hurling circles as Her Honour Judge 'Hellofa' Horn she has been appointed by the Mangold Hurling Association to officiate at a competition to appoint a new Summoner for the Sherston Order of Mangold Hurlers. This follows the sad demise last year of Malcolm Jarrett one of the







greatest Summoners known to hurling.

The latter is apparently all important to the resulting sound emanating from the horn. Bristol to Bordeaux Bike ride






Sherston Football Club (May)

The chosen young lady's identity has since been a closely guarded secret in the village , helped no doubt by the super injunction obtained by her father shortly after she had been 'chosed', but all will be revealed at the Mangold Maid Making ceremony at the Rattlebone Inn at 2.00pm on 12 June. With traditional mangold songs and impressive regalia on show this is an event not to be missed.

Landlord of the Rattlebone Inn Jason Read, in his capacity as Keeper of the Maids, said 'being made Mangold Maid is the highest accolade bestowed upon a young lady of the village and will lead to her enjoying a whirlwind of social occasions between now and the Mangold Hurl on 2 October. In times past a night with the Mangold Maid was the ultimate prize for the Mangold King – the winner of the Hurl. Whilst modern sexual discrimination legislation has ended that aspect the maid is still vital part of the sport of mangold hurling in Sherston.

Indeed it was at the Alderton Hurl in 1934 that an initial spat within the Maids enclosure led to the mass brawl or 'Altercation' as it became known and subsequent acquittal of all charges against 21 members of the Sherston Order at Devizes Quarter Sessions the following year. Sadly today Sherston is the only village remaining with a maid.

As well as the Making there will be a competition before hand at 1.30pm to appoint a new Summoner for the Order. Sadly Summoner Malcolm Jarrett passed away last year after sterling service with the Great Horn of Moyne, the historic hunting horn used to call participants to hurls. Those entering the competition will need to be able to show equally impressive techniques on the horn as Malcolm if they are to be deemed worthy of stepping into his smock and gaiters. Those interested in the position of Summoner should read the requirements of the judge The Very Reverend Ivor Horn BSc (Hons) set out elsewhere in this esteemed publication.

All are most welcome to attend the Maid Making and to drink a toast to the Maid with a glass, or two, of scrumpy.






