# Sportsfield

At the first meeting of the parish council's new Sportsfield subcommittee last month good progress was made in respect of some of the immediate improvements required.

Quotes have been obtained for upgrading the pavilion with a new covered veranda and renovation of the outside toilet with a view to these being made available to members of the Tennis Club as well as to football spectators. The quotes also include for the provision of a car park.

Final plans have hopefully been agreed as regards an extension to the skateboard park and figures for its construction costs are now awaited. Details of youth shelters have been received and are being examined. Any shelter would 'double up' for use by spectators when a football match is being played.

In the long term enquiries are being made about the practicality and cost of providing an all weather surface for use by a number of different sports.

# **Parking**

Parish council has decided not to take forward the proposal put to it by a resident to use part of the recreation ground for car parking. The decision was unanimous.

In reaching the decision council took into account the 35 or so letters it had received on the subject with the vast majority being opposed to the suggestion. Those who did take the time to write are very much appreciated as a number of useful points were made including –

- The problem of parking in the central core of the village particularly the High Street was not sufficient to warrant the loss of green space or the costs involved in providing a car park. Indeed some residents of the High Street commented that whilst they may not be able to park outside their properties they didn't expect to be able to do so as of right and that they had little or no difficulty in parking elsewhere in the street.
- If any car park on the recreation ground was to be used to any extent restrictions on parking in the central area would have to be imposed which would be both costly to implement and cause resentment amongst residents throughout the village.
- Green Lane would have to take greater traffic than at present which gave concerns as to safety and further deterioration of the surface and verges.
- Those residents with the benefit of off street parking should use them wherever possible.

The consultation also showed that even if the parking issue did not warrant the use of the recreation ground there were nevertheless problems which needed to be addressed. The question of emergency vehicle access to Cliff Road and Silver Street is one as is continued inconsiderate parking on pavements and on junctions. Both these are being taken to Highways and the Police for action.

Whilst on this occasion a resident's suggestion to council has been rejected it has brought lively debate about an issue that does exist and which is likely to get worse before, if ever, it gets better. Council very much welcomes suggestions on any other aspects of parish life. Whilst it can't guarantee to implement them they will be given careful thought and where appropriate opened up to residents for discussion.

We are experiencing increasing problems with our bins, which stand outside the Tolsey building, being filled by other people's bin bags, and bags of dog poo! As a local business we have limited dustbin space which we have to pay for, so please can we politely request that people dispose of their own rubbish and particularly their own dog poo themselves.

# HE ANCIENT ORDER OF SHERSTON MANGOLD HUR

Members are now rising from their winter slumber and beginning to give serious thought to this year's crop of Mangolds. Bed preparation is the key and like all brassicas, the best soil is one richly manured last autumn. An alkaline soil is best, so that's no problem for Sherston folk. Seed sowing can begin in late March, but is perhaps best left to April or even May. Don't forget to obtain your free packet of seeds from Sherston Parva Nursery, Sherston Post Office Stores or the Rattlebone Inn. All should have a plentiful supply by the end of March.

Artificial practice mangolds are perhaps something of an anathema to older members of the Order, but to be frank after Sherston's lamentable display at last year's Hurl, some of us will try anything to perfect our root handling skills. Unfortunately the construction of the artificial mangolds is proving somewhat difficult, with skins splitting with far too much ease to meet the British Standard required. The Order is therefore most grateful that Mrs Marion Gee and her band of lady quilters have so kindly offered their not inconsiderable skills to produce a tough but sensitive skin to hold the weighty contents – a couple of pounds of dried marrowfat peas. Please note that the artificial mangolds will in no way replace the real thing at the Hurl and are used solely for technique perfection whilst natural mangolds are in close season. It is hoped that some artificial mangolds will be produced in time for Village Green Day on 22 May, when demonstration hurls will be performed.

Speaking of techniques, this year's AGM is likely to be somewhat controversial. It is whispered that the present Keeper of the Technique, Mr Ian Ashby, may well face a challenger for his position from a lady hurler who says she has the skills to enhance a member's performance to hitherto undreamed-of levels. #### Action stations.....

February activity in Grove Wood made up for the lack of it in January. With all snow gone, there was no holding our volunteers back. Each Sunday saw a small increase in numbers with an average of around 16 intrepid souls now turning up for duties. Arborist, John Lloyd, has devised a management plan whereby the wood is divided into three sections for coppicing purposes over a six-year period. We are now nearing completion of the first cycle and the hazel stools (or stumps) are being covered with soil and brash before



they start sprouting, or wandering deer begin nibbling! The debris has also been cleared and burnt at the top and bottom ends nearest Stretchline. Even on weekends when John can't be present, he makes sure to mark trees for cutting beforehand so we know what we are doing.

The Community Payback Scheme team has grafted hard on the perimeter fencing which was finished









at the end of February. Their project leader reports that the work has given them a sense of achievement. They are looking forward to repairing the path along the river, and will ultimately help us establish new paths within the wood itself.

Sharp-eyed walkers will have noticed the smartly laid new hedgerow along the top of the wood. We have John to thank for this too. He will also beef up existing hedging by infilling with new plants.

The Wiltshire BikeSafe Partnership is once again running its successful 'Love to Ride...Ride to Live' one day seminars and assessments aimed to reduce the number of motor cycle rider casualties in the area. Wiltshire Council is reviewing the provision of grit bins. If you know of an area in the parish which might benefit from a new bin please let the parish clerk have the details.


### Attempted Assassination

The following transcript has been supplied by Richard Stancomb and was found at Kew in the National Archive by Major William Naesmyth retr. He was the great, great grandson of George Creswell a Lieutenant in the Royal Wiltshire Yeomanry and the eighth and youngest son of Eastcourt Creswell senior, of Pinkney. George moved on after this incident.


The Times Wednesday 27 November 1833 pg2 col3: A most dastardly attempt was made by some scoundrels between one and two o'clock on Tuesday morning last (the 19th instant) with a view to assassinate G.E.H. Cresswell, Esq., of Sherston, Wilts, in revenge for some imaginary grievance, incident to that gentleman's efforts in the suppression of poaching, which has been the besetting sin of a certain class of the inhabitants of Sherston Magna and its vicinity for a long series of past years. Incredible as it may appear, the poachers, who are a most daring and original band, have in former seasons levied a species of English black mail, or forbearance money, on the gentry, in various immediate districts of Glocester and Wilts, to prevent their depredations in the preserves, &c. Mr Cresswell had lately rendered himself obnoxious in his endeavours to suppress this systematic gang, and received an intimidation to expect a consequent revenge, which, we are sorry to add, was attempted, as before detailed, by the ruffians making a noise under his bed-room window, with a view to draw him to the spot, but failing to do so, they discharged a volley of







guns, laden with shot and balls, through the three front bedroom windows, in one of which were Mr & Mrs Cresswell and his infant child, fortunately without their intended victims sustaining any other injury than the alarm incident to such an attempt at midnight assassination necessarily occasioned. A reward of 30l(shillings) has been offered by Mr Creswell and we are informed that it is the intention of the gentry and principal inhabitants of the district to offer a still further reward, and to apply to the Secretary of State for the Home Department for the usual proclamation of pardon and reward for the apprehension of the principals in this diabolical outrage. Mr Cresswell had a pointer dog destroyed about two months since by having his throat cut and then suspended from a sign-post of a public-house, with a notice appended, in the true Captain Rock style, commanding him to leave the county or they would have blood for supper and serve him in like manner; desiring him also to prepare his coffin. # Speed

The latest stage of progressing the parish council's request for a community speedwatch scheme in Sherston has now been completed with the publication of the metro check results of six areas of the parish which have been highlighted by residents as being of concern.

None of the areas checked met the criteria for police camera enforcement but three are deemed suitable for speedwatch although two of those were on the borderline.

The B4040 at Pinkney (40 mph limit) fell within the speedwatch criteria whilst Easton Town and Tetbury Lane although falling just below by 0.1 mph will be included in the scheme. Other areas monitored were Knockdown Road (outside the School) Brook Hill and Sandpits Lane none of which produced figures which would allow them to be included. The full results are set out below.

In order for the scheme to proceed the three areas to be covered have to be risk assessed by the police so that the volunteers operating the hand held camera equipment are working in safety. In addition the volunteers need to go on a short training course which will be held locally at either Sherston or Luckington village halls.

Although volunteers have come forward for Sherston at least two more are needed to spread the load and make the scheme work.

While evidence collected by the volunteers will not be used to prosecute speeding drivers, it will be invaluable in pin-pointing areas on which the police can concentrate most effectively. Registered keepers of vehicles reported to the police will receive written warnings. After three warnings, the police will put the vehicle's information on their computer system which can result in it being stopped and investigated by their patrol vehicles.

The scheme has been shown to work in reducing speeds elsewhere and is not about spying or snooping on neighbours. It is about taking positive action on the ground to improve the safety and quality of life for everyone in the community. #### Metro check results

Knockdown Road, Sherston: The survey was carried out between 20 and 27 January 2010 a total of 6385 vehicles were checked. The 85%ile was 29.1 mph (the 85%ile is the speed at which 85% of the traffic is travelling at or below). The average speed of the vehicles checked was 22.9 mph. Of the 6385 vehicles checked 12.33% were travelling in excess of the speed limit, this figure also includes vehicles travelling just 1 mph over the limit. The number of vehicles travelling above the ACPO (Association of Chief Police Officers) threshold, this is the point at which the police would prosecute was 2.3%. This site does not meet the criteria for Camera Enforcement or Community Speedwatch.

B4040 Pinkney (40mph limit): The survey was carried out between 20 and 27 January 2010 A total of 15533 vehicles were checked. The 85%ile was 47.6 mph (the 85%ile is the speed at which 85% of the traffic is travelling at or below). The average speed of the vehicles checked was 41.2 mph. Of the 15533 vehicles checked 56.31% were travelling in excess of the speed limit, this figure also includes vehicles travelling just 1 mph over the limit. The number of vehicles travelling above the ACPO (Association of Chief Police Officers) threshold, this is the point at which the police would prosecute was 18.1%. This site does not meet the criteria for Camera Enforcement but would meet the criteria for Community Speedwatch.

Easton Town, Sherston: The survey was carried out between 20 and 27 January 2010 a total of 19678 vehicles were checked. The 85%ile was 34.9 mph (the 85%ile is the speed at which 85% of the traffic is travelling at or below). The average speed of the vehicles checked was 29.8 mph. Of the 19678 vehicles checked 46.42% were travelling in excess of the speed limit, this figure also includes vehicles travelling just 1 mph over the limit. The number of vehicles travelling above the ACPO (Association of Chief Police Officers) threshold, this is the point at which the police would prosecute was 14%. This site does not meet the criteria for Camera Enforcement and fails Community Speedwatch by 0.1mph.

B4040 Brook Hill, Sherston: The survey was carried out between 3 and 9 February 2009 a total of 10470 vehicles were checked. The 85%ile was 24.2 mph (the 85%ile is the speed at which 85% of the traffic is travelling at or below). The average speed of the vehicles checked was 20.5 mph. Of the 10470 vehicles checked 0.53% were travelling in excess of the speed limit, this figure also includes vehicles travelling just 1 mph over the limit. The number of vehicles travelling above the ACPO (Association of Chief Police Officers) threshold, this is the point at which the police would prosecute was 0%. This location does not meet the criteria for either Camera Enforcement or Community Speed Watch

Sandpits Lane, Sherston: The survey was carried out between 3 and 9 February 2009 a total of 1736 vehicles were checked. The 85%ile was 29.5 mph (the 85%ile is the speed at which 85% of the traffic is travelling at or below). The average speed of the vehicles checked was 24.2 mph. Of the 1736 vehicles checked 13.54% were travelling in excess of the speed limit, this figure also includes vehicles travelling just 1 mph over the limit. The number of vehicles travelling above the ACPO (Association of Chief Police Officers) threshold, this is the point at which the police would prosecute was 2.2%. This location does not meet the criteria for either Camera Enforcement or Community Speed Watch

Tetbury Road, Sherston: The survey was carried out between 3 and 9 February 2009 a total of 4987 vehicles were checked. The 85%ile was 34.9 mph (the 85%ile is the speed at which 85% of the traffic is travelling at or below). The average speed of the vehicles checked was 28.2 mph. Of the 4987 vehicles checked 42.79% were travelling in excess of the speed limit, this figure also includes vehicles travelling just 1 mph over the limit. The number of vehicles travelling above the ACPO (Association of Chief Police Officers) threshold, this is the point at which the police would prosecute was 14.3%. This location does not meet the criteria for Camera Enforcement and fails Community Speed Watch by 0.1 mph.

### Searching for a new Vicar

by George Rendell

The question, 'what are you looking for in your new vicar?' always draws a range of responses but there are often common threads. Typically churches want a person who: leads worship well; respects their particular traditions and style; has time to talk to people especially if they have need of some kind of support; is able to make connections with younger families; gets on well with everyone both churchgoers and non-church goers. These are not unreasonable aspirations and in fact they line up quite well with the list of charges given to priests at their ordination service.

Unfortunately what remains unsaid is expectation that the new vicar will also: chair the PCC; serve as a school governor; attend church committees on finance, buildings, the fete, the harvest appeal etc; organise rotas for opening the church, readings, intercessions, coffee etc; take all the weddings, baptisms, funerals and handle all administration.

Clearly in the Gauzebrook Group it is not feasible to carry out, anywhere near, this list of activities in 8 churches. It is especially important therefore to be clear about what the new vicar might be expected to do before any appointment is made. That is why I am spending time in the Group, working on behalf of the deanery, to help churches in their search for the

In his time Andrew Evans did some excellent foundation work. The individual churches have already taken on many of the tasks that clergy would have done in the past (running the PCC, maintaining the building, organising rotas, etc). There has also been some good experience of running activities, such as courses and children's work, across the parish boundaries.

Which leads to the main question 'What will you be looking for in the next incumbent of the Gauzebrook group of churches?' To answer that question I am working with a group of representatives from each of the 8 churches. We have no firm answers yet but some things are becoming clear: The new vicar will not be doing those things which lay people can, and should, be doing. He or she will know what is expected and will work closely with a wide range of people to ensure the church in each village thrives. The group hopes to have a description of this role by Easter.

# Village Hall

There has been a noticeable recent rise in bookings of the village hall for parties, gigs and dances as well as other large scale events. This is very welcome as the hall is there to be used by and for the community. Very often these events are important and successful fundraisers for a number of different groups.

The increased use of the hall has however brought a problem. Many of the extra bookings include a request for the sale of alcohol and at present under the Licensing Act 2003 the maximum number of events at which alcohol sale is permitted are 12 per year. These permissions have to be sought by the event organisers from Wiltshire Council, the licensing authority, by what are known as temporary event notices which cost £21 each and must be obtained at least 10 working days before the event itself. It already looks as if 12 such notices will be insufficient to cover all that is being planned for 2010. The solution is for the hall's current premises licence to be extended so as to allow the village hall committee to agree itself those events which can sell alcohol with there being less restriction on the number of such events per year. In order to achieve this formal application has to be made to Wiltshire Council with an appropriate notice being given to the public.

The village hall committee is liaising closely with the licensing authority on the situation with a view to shortly deciding on the details of the intended application which will also seek to allow the showing of films. At the moment to hold a single film show requires the giving of one of the 12 temporary event notices allowed per year whether or not alcohol is sold as well.
