The ride is in support of the charity PROPS which stands for Providing Opportunities and Support. This charity, through a variety of projects from touch rugby to the production of photographic canvasses, champions the inclusion of disabled young people within the wider community.

The money raised from this year's ride will go directly to support the new PROPS centre, situated at the Vassalls Centre in Fishponds, Bristol. This is a purpose built facility which will enable us to provide support and opportunities for 19 to 26 year old students with a range of disabilities.



The centre is an exciting development for PROPS as it offers a permanent home for our unique business enterprise initiative and for our programme of inclusive projects developing the involvement of disabled young people in mainstream activities.

There's still lots to do, including a complete redecoration of the facility, but the centre will be up and running and ready to accept its first students in September this year.

Heartbeat

During the April Parish Council Meeting there was a presentation from Community Heartbeat. This is a charity working to provide publicly available defibrillation equipment to local communities.

Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) happens between 140,000 and 200,000 times a year in the UK, making it one of the UK's largest killers. The potential for saving a life is dependent on time; the faster medical help is administered, the better the chance of survival.

To achieve a positive outcome when dealing with SCA, medical assistance must be given within 4-5 minutes of the event. In remote areas it can take more than 8 minutes for an emergency medical team to arrive on scene and this is why Community Public Access Defibrillators (cPAD) play a vital role in helping to save lives in rural communities.

Statistics suggest that the survival rate after a SCA with normal first aid techniques alone is 5%. By using a defibrillator, the survival rate increases to 50%.

According to the British Heart Foundation's Guide to GPs, 'the development of the automated external defibrillator (AED) has been described as the most important advance in resuscitation practices for many years. The AED has made the whole process of defibrillation simpler and has greatly increased the range of people who can use one.'

Current international resuscitation guidelines advise that evidence supports the establishment of public access defibrillation programmes when:

- The time from call out of the conventional ambulance service to delivery of a shock cannot reliably be achieved within 5 minutes. (For practical purposes, this means almost all of the United Kingdom).

- The time from collapse of a victim until the onsite AED can be brought is less than 5 minutes.

It would be a great asset to the area if within the Sherston Parish we could have at least three publicly available (In Sherston, Pinkney and Willesley) so that one was within easy access of most people. They are extremely easy to use – the box tells you exactly what to do!

Depending upon any funding that might be available, the overall cost would be equivalent to about £3 per adult in the Parish. This seems to be excellent value to have such a potential life-saver to hand.

I would be interested to know what people think, and to see if anyone would be willing to help with collecting some money to help fund this.

School Pond



Sherston Primary School has received a Wessex Watermark Award to help create a pond and boggy area for their new wildlife area. The pond will be central to the wildlife area and is the second major development in the school's new Environment Area. Richard Chivers from Wessex Water was shown what has already been achieved when he visited the school with their Watermark cheque for £250 on Friday 23 April.

'It is important to introduce environmental topics as stimulating activities into regular school life' Crispian Huggill parent governor and chair of the Environment Area Group said, 'so this Watermark Award couldn't have come at a better time to help us begin the pond and bogland site. The children love their new wildlife area and with this support from Wessex Water we can develop the project further for future pupils to enjoy and learn from.'

The Watermark Award provides funds for environmental projects within the Wessex Water area. Now in its seventeenth year, it has supported nearly 500 environmental initiatives. Organised by The Conservation Foundation, all projects are judged by a panel chaired by its President - David Bellamy.

Village Hall

Decoration of the exterior of the hall and of the interior of the small hall by the Community Payback Team will start in May. The large hall is hoped to be tackled over the summer holidays once decisions have been made as to how best to proceed. There are particular issues to be resolved due to the nature of the walls of the large hall.

It has been agreed to invite the Wiltshire Air Ambulance charity to provide a clothes recycling bank in the yard to the hall. These recycling banks have proved to be a popular and successful way of raising funds for this essential service.

Living Churchyard

Now May is here the churchyard should be full of wild flowers and it will be interesting to see if we can equal the number recorded last year or whether even more will appear as a result of a year of management. The grass seed planted around the stumps of the felled trees in March should be well grown by now, although the meadow flowers that were included in the seed mixture will probably take another year to flower.

Despite my fears about the bluebells, it was only the very cold winter which had held up their arrival. In February the Living Churchyard volunteers added lesser celandines, primroses and snowdrops to the woodland area. All were transplanted from elsewhere in the churchyard or the immediate local area so that they represent the local wild plant-life. When all these plants have naturalized, together with the violets, wild strawberries and lords and ladies which were already there, the side entrance to the churchyard should be beautiful to walk through in spring.

Come and find out about what the Living Churchyard Project is doing at Sherston Village Green on 22 May and perhaps you may be encouraged to join us in continuing to make the churchyard more of a haven for wildlife, as well as a fitting resting place for hundreds of years of the people of our parish.



Following the agreement to pursue a community speedwatch scheme in Sherston the three areas identified for action (Easton Town, Pinkney and Tetbury Lane) are now being risk assessed by the Wiltshire and Swindon road safety partnership so as to ensure that the volunteers operating the hand held camera equipment are working in safety.

The next stage will be a short training course for the volunteers which will be held locally and also include volunteers from Luckington and Oaksey. Although volunteers have come forward for Sherston at least two more are needed to spread the load and make the scheme work. Can you help and hopefully make our local roads safer for all? Speeding vehicles in our area is one of the most complained of subjects so this is your opportunity to do something to reduce the problem.

While evidence collected by the volunteers will not be used to prosecute speeding drivers, it will be invaluable in pin-pointing areas on which the police can concentrate most effectively. Registered keepers of vehicles reported to the police by the volunteers

It is about taking positive action on the ground by local people to improve the safety and quality of life for everyone in the community. Remember 80% of children hit by a car travelling at 40mph will die whereas 80% hit by a car at 30mph will live.

The Last of England

By Richard Stancomb



The Last of England 1855 by Ford Maddox Brown (1821-93) Pre-Raphaelite artist whose paintings glorified labour.

Among his most famous paintings is a destitute couple leaving England for the last time.

June 1832

A Journal by E Cresswell containing the principal events of her voyage from the period of her leaving England to that of reaching the City of Philadelphia, in the United States of America, which voyage took 10 weeks (viz) from 11 June to 25 August 1832.

We remained in Bristol a week waiting for the vessel to sail, which time we spent in preparation for the voyage and in viewing the City of Bristol, but unfortunately we were not enabled to see Clifton but we were in a manner compensated for our disappointment in sailing down the Avon viewing the (St Vincent's) rocks, woods and trees which diversified the scene delighted all beholders. I was in extasies (ecstasy) having never beheld such a scene before only conceive the different coloured foliage of the trees which bordered the banks of the beautiful Avon quite down to Pill, (under the M5 bridge). All I regretted was leaving dear, dear England so soon. We sailed as far as the Hotwells, (under Brunel Way) on Saturday. On Sunday we were so dirty that we could not go to church but were prevailed on, in the afternoon, to go on board the George Canning which was a much larger vessel than ours. It set sail on the

same evening. We also went on board a Steam Packet that had just arrived from Ireland laden with black cattle and pigs. We enjoyed the sight very much never having seen a Steamer before.

The following morning we set sail accompanied by Mr Skeate who as soon as we got to Pill left us In a boat which brought some passengers on board. (assuming Mr Skeate changed his mind about emigrating?).

The next day we sailed into the Bristol Channel and for several days I could see the borders (coast) of England which I shall always consider my own country when we get out to sea. We had a little rough weather and a great swell which made us very sick and ill for several days. I suffered severely from two days and a half being obliged to keep to my berth. When I got up I was so weak that I could not stand or sit without support.

We had a very pleasant sailing being stormy only the days which was before we got clear of the British coasts. We had more conveniences than the cabin passengers but it would make any one laugh to see how we managed. The only thing we had to drink, besides tea and coffee, was wine and water or spirits. We made puddings and cakes having plenty of flour and baked them very well considering we were not on land.....

You would be quite astonished at the regularity and good order which the sailors are kept in. They appear to be a good tempered set of men and are willing to do any thing for us when they are not engaged at their work. They have plenty of food and beer, but are not allowed spirits and although we have been in the vessel these three weeks I have not heard the captain or any of the sailors swear which quite astonishes me. The only thing I want is some nice walks in the surrounding country or near dear Sherstone and also some (pages for the following seven weeks are lost)...

...next morning the pilot and the sea officer went on shore to tell them we had done as they desired us when they said they would come by eight the

01454 232941 or 07974194012 next morning, when we were to be dressed and on deck ready for his arrival. Tuesday they came and after making us march as before told the pilot he might set sail which he accordingly did and about two in the afternoon we reached Philadelphia and soon were on shore. We were very much tired but made a very good supper on bread and milk. Wednesday we went to try and get lodgings but had great difficulties in procuring them, but on Thursday we got some comfortable lodgings near the key.

Estcourt Cresswell Inr (1788-1828), fourth son of Estcourt senior and father of Elizabeth, served as 2/Lt in Royal Marines and 94th Regt. He was born at Pinkney, married 1814 Sarah daughter of Joseph and Jane Gibbs, millers of Ford. Until his premature death in 1828, he lived at 8 High Street Sherston. After his death his widow and children emigrated to Philadelphia in 1832, with three sons and four daughters where Sarah died in 1875. Her eldest boy died aged 15 in 1833, Joseph in 1856 and by 1878 only one child was living, Naomi the youngest, who married the Rev. Richard Lewis and with him paid a visit to Pinkney in that year. Elizabeth was probably the eldest child born around 1816 and was 16 when she wrote the above diary.



The Amazing and Preposterous Constance Smedley

Everyman Theatre Studio, Cheltenham (11 to 13 March 2010)

Few people would have heard of the subject of this new play before local author Frank Hatt came across a collection of letters stored away in South Gloucestershire.

A series of highly charged, snapshot scenes opens up the story of this Edwardian campaigner. Constance Smedley (Sophie Laughton) who is severely restricted by the times she lives in, not only from male-based establishment, but also suffering from the disadvantage of being crippled by polio.

The 'chamber play', is performed by the Stroud Theatre Company as a series of 'same room scenes' transported to various European cities where our heroine founded a number of residential clubs for professional females, the Lyceum Clubs.

Also, Constance championed the general improvement of women's rights through her talents as a novelist, journalist, illustrator, playwright and theatre-worker.

Her battle was not only with the middle-class society, but with her own family. The father William (Dan Maxwell), the sister Di (Sally-Ann Beighton) at first dubious and unhelpful to her plans and ambitions, eventually became fervent supporters. Her mother, Annie (Fiona Ross), increasingly backed her daughter's cause in support of women writers.

The middle section of the play deals with Constance's increasing campaigns in the face of determined opposition. This was a feisty lady living in a period which such behaviour was barely tolerated.

On a personal level, Miss Smedley's life hardly existed outside her family. However, there is a seemingly platonic relationship with Maxwell Armfield (David Seymour) which eventually leads to marriage and Maxwell provides valuable support to Constance, particularly in her moments of depression.

The scenes in latter parts of the play move to South Gloucestershire and Constance's efforts to stage a number of amateur dramatic performances in and around Minchinhampton. These productions did not win favour among the locals who did not respond positively to the high standards demanded.

The end comes only with frustration and disappointment, but the audience is left with the thought that Constance Smedley, although amazing and preposterous, was an important artistic visionary.

Vocally, even more than visually, the play relies on sparkling dialogue, a tribute to Frank Hatt's command of language and the ability to make the most of incidents that actually happened and to imagine what might have been said in any given situation.

The performances of this talented group of actors are universally fine, Sophie – Ann Laughton and Fiona Ross are worthy of special mention.

The stage was appropriately small as the play is concerned with matters up close and personal. Director Chris Garner and team realised, with great effect, the claustrophobic Edwardian middle-class life.

The play deserves a wider showing and is ideally suited to a studio facility and due to its vocal powers would transfer to radio. In any case, if it comes your way, do go and see it.


As summer looms, faraway places with strange sounding names will be regularly luring holidaymakers to sun and fun – pretty much innocent stuff. But in Sherston Drama Group's Holiday Snap, by Michael Pertwee and John Chapman, the characters are lured to Portugal by adulterous assignation.



'Innocent' well describes Commander Chittenden, a timeshare rep and bibulous naïf, who checks out properties for holidaymakers. He welcomes first an unlikely couple, hoping to couple on a four-poster. Eve's real husband, Sid, is a car dealer; Leslie, one of his salesmen. If Sid knew what his wife was up to, Leslie would have trouble with his big end. The fact that Sid is occasionally on the phone does nothing to settle the nerves. Next up are Henry and Mary, who believe they're the sole occupiers. To say Henry is all mouth and no trousers is to ignore the fact that he truly wishes he could dispense with the latter and get down to business. So how is this resolved? Well, as a lawyer, Henry thinks only one way - dirty. He overhears a conversation, realises the 'Smiths' are there for improper purposes and thinks he has the whip hand.

This was first class farce, with couples initially missing each other by seconds. Into this unruly mix comes Henry's mother-in-law. A neat twist, because Henry, it seems, is also on the pull and Mary not his legal beloved. Built around the plot is mistaken





identity. In fact, the plot is a bit like Brighton rock – it has mistaken identity running all the way through it. And with Henry weaving a web of deceit and cranking up his blood pressure, tension and laughter mount.





Clive Renton was wonderfully entertaining as the lush; Andi Hunte as Leslie proved himself a master of accents, while Kim Hunte's Eve was a glam temptress; David Jarrett gave a bravura performance as Henry, injecting him with all the pomposity of the law,

and Sue Ormiston's Mary, his longsuffering paramour, conveyed just the right sense of pique. As late arrivals, Maggie Instrell was an amusingly eccentric mother-in-law, Richard Skeffington a scintillating upper class loon and (even later) Nikki Sanders came on as Henry's real wife.

The production was skilfully directed by Hazel Jarrett and Richard Warren, whilst a team of dedicated helpers (including some of the cast) helped with all the essential backstage graft. Special mention to set designer Malcolm Jarrett, who, although in hospital, was very much there in spirit.





Talking to a neighbour recently it appears that some residents of Manor Close are experiencing problems with electric showers and water pressure, especially around breakfast time. I've spent the winter rising earlier than necessary, to shower before a nominal witching hour of 6.45am. Any later and the shower will be either scaldingly hot, or stone cold, due to low pressure. It appears my next door neighbours have been doing the same, and they're aware of other residents having issues.

I've now had three different shower units in three years, and several visits from plumbers and engineers.

I'd be interested to see how widespread this problem is. If anyone else in Sherston is experiencing the same problems then please email me details nic@dpsrelocation. co.uk or drop a note through 41 Manor Close. I know that Bristol Water's contractor, Daniel, has been doing work in the area recently and, to be fair, I haven't had an issue over the school holidays, but then the problem has been less of an issue over previous holidays. Bristol Water has appealed against Ofwat's decision on how much the company can charge its customers for the next five years, as they themselves would like to impose an increase of 29% before inflation, which I find slightly galling given my problems. Have they made any local investment to take into account the additional houses built over the last few years?
