After a long hard winter the sun is finally out and doesn't our church look magnificent? With its new roof and bright shiny clock and weather vanes and cockerel the venerable old lady looks set to face the next 130 years at the centre of our village community.

Thanks to a generous donation from the Eleanor Barton Trust of £150,000, we were faced with a shortfall of approx £40,000 to complete the tower roof and the chancel roof whilst the contractors were on site.

From the start of our somewhat daunting task of raising the £40,000, to closing the appeal took just three months, due entirely to the imaginative and, at times, inspired Fund raising committee. I think it is only right to name and thank those individuals.

It is fair to say that we all felt humbled by the overwhelming generosity and goodwill to our much loved and cherished church. Our sincere thanks go to all who donated. Many of you bought a tile with your own inscription and they now sit proudly on the new roof.

Our thanks must also go the roofing contractor, Mr Jonathan Adye of Grove Road Sherston, and his excellent team of tradesmen, notably Andy and Shaun. They have all been discreet and respectful in going about their business and the quality of their workmanship will stand as testimony to their skill.

The joint complimentary skills of John Smith and Roger Whitehouse ensured that the contract came in on budget and (almost) on time.

As with any new venture the lasting success is down to good maintenance practice. We, along with every church, are always looking for volunteers in all aspects of maintaining the church. What

about helping with the 'living Churchyard' or repairing the seemingly endless stone boundary wall? After all, we don't own it, we are merely custodians for future generations, and who wouldn't want their son or daughter baptized and married in this special place?

On Sunday 5 June, why not make your way to Grove Wood to enjoy Sherston's first 'Woodland Frolic'? Unless you're new here, you'll hopefully know that volunteers have been working hard for two years to improve the wood for the enjoyment of everyone in the village. We want to show off what's been happening so are devising a fun day for the whole family.

Conveniently, the 5 June falls (just) within National Family Week, the UK's largest annual celebration of families and family life. One of the aims is to encourage families to spend more time together so we're making sure the event will give all ages something to enjoy.

There are now steps up to the new perimeter path around Grove Wood, making walking considerably less hazardous than it was in the past. There will be wild flowers and other flora to see now that more light can penetrate the parts of the wood that have been coppiced. You'll be able to see the young trees from the Sherston School tree nursery that the children and their parents have planted, one name-plated tree for each child.

We're also creating a special 'child-friendly' competition to encourage them to spot things as they go round and there will be prizes for the winners. A bit like last year's Boules Treasure Hunt but with subtle differences.

For those who might find the trek too much of a training exercise, we're laying on demonstrations of country crafts and skills in the field at the entrance to the wood. These will include Adrian whose bushman skills proved so popular with tots and teens at last year's Village Green and Boules Days. And to round it all off, we'd like everyone to bring a family picnic so you can relax and not have to rush off to get lunch ready.

Sherston's Woodland Frolic' for families, volunteers and friends will be held between 12 noon and 4pm on Sunday 5 June.

National Family Week is also part of the new website www.familytime.co.uk, a one stop destination for families with children of all ages. The site will provide families with valuable information on what to do and where to go together in their local area and beyond. Plus with the Family Value Club there will be great money saving offers for families to save money. In 2010, National Family Week saw over 5,000 events take place all over the country.

Boules Day Car Parking

To avoid the issues that arose last year as a result of the increased numbers of visitors to the event, it is proposed to operate three car parks this year – the Recreation Ground, the Sportsfield and Stretchline.

The Recreation Ground will be available to residents, stall holders and disabled visitors only and, as usual, we would kindly ask that residents move their cars from the centre of the village the night before, so that pitches can be set up in the High Street from 6.30am on the Saturday and the road diversion put in place.

Permits will be issued for residents to park on the Recreation Ground nearer the time, so they can come and go during the day in the safe knowledge they will be able to re-park on their return.

The Sportsfield at Knockdown Road and Stretchline at Brook Hill will be for visitors' car parking. The Boules & Carnival committee are most grateful to Stretchline for making their car park available.

Police News

PC Steve Humphries

My colleague PCSO Durry Maule and I have continued to try to patrol Sherston and other villages as much as possible this year after it was agreed at the Malmesbury and Villages Community Area Partnership meeting in January that high visibility patrolling should be our priority.

We complement this with advertised quarterly street meetings throughout the year (the next one is on Tuesday 24 May in the High Street 2.30 to 3.30pm).

A matter of great local interest is the ongoing misuse of the Fosseway at Easton Grey at the river crossing where a site of historical interest seems to have turned into a playground for a minority of off road type enthusiasts. Although not in the Parish, Sherston council has written a letter of support to a multi agency meeting which I attended at County Hall in March and at last various organisations are pulling together to end this destruction. This means for the next three months I have to prioritise my resources in preventing further antisocial behaviour there rather than high visibility patrolling for this short length of time.

You may also recall problems were reported outside the school with parking during school hours. I have had no further complaints so far this year and either it has resolved itself to the satisfaction of all or people are not reporting it for whatever reason. If you feel the Police should be dealing with something then please report it - I cannot deal with something if I don't know about it.

Finally, a happy(ish) ending to a local Police enquiry - in Mid March a local resident in The Tarters found a jewellery box and contents in undergrowth. There was no clue to its ownership bar a card which read 'To Mum...love Andrew and Caroline' After a lot of enquiries and an article in the press we have traced the owners - the elderly parents of 'Andrew and Caroline' - who live in Tetbury and were burgled in February. I have returned the items found which perhaps were not of great financial value but obviously sentimentally priceless to the victims.

TREEtalk

MAY 2011

As the best part of the year for outdoor activity is getting started, work in Grove Wood is just about finished until autumn. There have been regular updates in TREEtalk in recent months (thank you, Sue, for your hard work) and our volunteers can be proud of their efforts in the 'Riverside' middle section. What is so striking now is the contrast between it and Mill End where we laboured last year. The first section is a riot of colour, particularly along the top edge with lots of bluebells flowering alongside yellow celandine and white anemones. If anyone wants visible proof of the merits of coppicing (cutting down hard), then here it is. The hazels are producing new growth and the extra light has encouraged long dormant flora.

Martin is delighted that the wild daffodils he planted in rock-hard ground late last year at great personal expense to his muscles and two trowels have repaid his efforts by bursting forth. Bag loads of snowdrops were also planted recently together with some 400 winter aconites.

It's nice to see that all the Sherston School trees are now in their final positions and the children can be justly proud of their planting efforts. What a great idea that each child has 'ownership' of one tree and can keep an eye on its progress over the years.

As for the Payback team, they have worked incredibly hard to lay the vast majority of the woodland path with our volunteers finishing the job with the last of the mulching. We think it looks like something of which the National Trust would be proud! The

memory of Ron Shortridge is preserved by the recent planting of a wild cherry tree on the river bank at the end of the wood. It will be followed soon by a rustic bench that has also been commissioned by Sue, Mike and the rest of his family.



Finally, the new Kissing Gate at Brook Hill, installed by Noel Banks, our Cotswold Warden and his team, is encouraging more people to visit the wood. The grass is beginning to wear thin on the path to the wooden bridge! There will be a great opportunity to see more at the Woodland Frolic for families on Sunday 5 June, of which details are on page two. Please come along with your picnics to see what our volunteers have achieved in less than two years.

Church Concert - Music for Awhile

Music lovers are in for a real treat at 7.30pm on Friday 3 June in Sherston church

Margaret Faultess and Simon Whistler founded Music for Awhile in 1996, bringing together musicians of international standing to perform Baroque music on original instruments. Since then, the ensemble has given nearly one hundred performances, sometimes expanding to form a large orchestra and it has played in venues such as Westminster Abbey, Exeter, Gloucester, Hereford, and Bristol Cathedrals.

Margaret Faultess is the artistic director of Music for Awhile and is co-leader of the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment, with whom she has performed at the Tetbury Festival. For the last few years she has led the orchestra at the annual performance of the Messiah in Tetbury church. She has directed the Britten-Pears Baroque, the European Union Baroque Orchestra, the Jerusalem Baroque Orchestra and in 2008 was in Moscow with Vladimir Jurowski to lead the Russian National Orchestra. She is Director of Performance studies at the Cambridge university music faculty.

Nicholas Mulroy has also performed as a soloist in the Messiah in Tetbury church, in the

Three Choirs festival (to outstanding reviews), at Glyndebourne and extensively overseas. For some years now, the Cecil King Memorial Foundation has sponsored Music for Awhile to give concerts of Bach in churches to raise funds for the fabrics of these buildings.

The programme will include arias for tenor and obligato instruments from Bach's secular and sacred cantatas, including from the Hercules cantata and Phoebus & Pan. Bach sonata for violin and harpsichord, CPE Bach oboe sonata, Handel trio sonata, a Bach solo cello suite.





Sherston Living Churchyard

The wonderful Spring weather of late March and early April has brought rapid growth to everything in the churchyard. On 5 April I saw my first swallows, not just one but four, so even if you listen to the old saying I could be justified in saying that summer is here! No doubt by the time you read this, three or four weeks after I have written it, things will be very different but just now I am looking forward to our April session in the churchyard knowing that we won't be wet or cold.

In March we raked up the leaves from the huge copper beech tree at the front of the churchyard so that they did not choke the spring flowers coming up below the tree or make the soil too fertile for the wild flowers to prosper. The primroses are now flowering in profusion and well-worth a look as they cannot be seen from the path. In the back of the churchyard we planted yellow rattle seeds, kindly donated by the Stanton St. Quintin Living Churchyard group. This plant, also known as Hay Rattle, is semi-parasitic on the roots of grass and reduces its growth which would be very helpful in grass management if we get successful germination. It is also a plant which is increasingly threatened by the loss of traditional hay meadows.

Another new planting has been that of two cherry trees which were put in by pupils from Sherston School. These are a partial replacement for some of the evergreen trees which have been cleared over the past couple of years. They should grow up, under the care of the children, to provide a source of food for wild birds as well as flowering attractively in the Spring. It is good to have this tangible link between the church and the school and to continue to develop the churchyard to be both a more pleasant resting place for the dead and greater haven for wildlife.

Our next work session will be on Saturday 7 May from 2.00pm to 4.00pm and all are welcome to come and help or just to see what is going on.






Wild Hyacinth

by Martin Rea

The display of Bluebells *Hyacinthus nonscripta* in Grove Wood this year has been truly breathtaking and provides further evidence of the benefits of coppicing which has allowed so much more light into the wood encouraging improved flowering from many wild plants.

The flower is associated with grief and mourning. being named after Hyacinth of the Greek myths who was a beautiful youth loved by both Apollo and Zephyrus. Hyacinth preferred Apollo the Sun God to Zephyrus the God of the West Wind who sought revenge. When Apollo was throwing the discus with Hyacinth it is said that Zephyrus blew a discus off course killing Hyacinth. Stricken with grief Apollo raised the flower from Hyacinth's blood.

The bulbs are full of a viscid juice which is also present throughout the plant. It has been used as a starch substitute especially when stiff ruffs were the height of fashion. Due to its sticky nature was also used as bookbinders' gum.



Bean time by Cepheus

The sowing of runner bean seeds or more particularly the optimum time for doing so is food for endless discussions and indeed arguments amongst vegetable gardeners. Many start them off in early April and prepare all sort of protection contraptions when planting out as soon as they can to avoid the dreaded late frosts of May. Is it worth the trouble, I ask? Very early sown plants are often drawn and weak. They may be protected from frost but low temperatures lead to slow and stunted growth. Far better to sow outdoors two weeks or so just before the last possible frost or sow inside in early May so that you have strong young plants ready for those bean poles at the end of the month.

Old May Day, the 12th in the modern post 1752 calendar, was for many a favourite time to sow. After 1752 some May Fairs continued to be held on Old May Day and even today figure in planting reminders.


Twelfth of May, Stow Fair Day, Sow your kidney beans today

Remember too that runner beans can be sown anytime up to the end of June, and sometimes even later, to produce a first class late crop when all around you have long since picked the last of their runners.

All the frost-tender vegetables are best put out or sown at the end of May including French beans, courgettes, marrows, squash and pumpkin. Plants of tomato, aubergine, outdoor cucumbers and peppers can also be put out and if earlier must be protected to avoid succumbing to the curse of the late frost. Finally please don't forget to earth up those young potato shoots as well.
