

Members of the football clubs and the tennis club were interested in improving the pavilion and the provision of an all weather surface which could be used for a number of sports as well as their own, including basketball, hockey and netball. Thought was also given to a fitness course around the perimeter of the field.

Those present included: Louise Cary, Wiltshire Council's sports and physical activities manager; Kirsty Brammer, Wiltshire FA's county development manager; and John Thomson, our Wiltshire councillor. They provided a great deal of useful information and expertise on the funding issues involved especially as to the long term development of an all weather surface. The overall view of the meeting was that the parish council be asked to take that proposal forward and that in the meantime the skateboarders' plans and the suggested improvements to the present pavilion be undertaken as soon as possible. A report on the meeting and recommendations for action will be presented to the parish council at its meeting on 12 November.

Wildlife wall

'Next project for the wildlife area is the proposed pond,' he continued. 'We should hear if our grant funding application has been successful in November.'



Thieves strike locally

Sherston's Holy Cross Church is one of three in the Malmesbury area recently targeted by thieves.

Cash has been stolen from donation boxes in Sherston and Crudwell, reported neighbourhood police PC Louis Bowden and PCSO Durry Maule.

And thieves tried to steal lead from the roof of an outbuilding at St Aldhelms Roman Catholic Church in Malmesbury.

'The price for scrap metal has risen again and we're urging people to look out for suspicious activity around the area's churches,' said the police officers. 'These buildings get few visitors during the day unless a particular event is on.'

Thieves also struck at Easton Grey business park over the August bank holiday weekend. They made off with between 20 and 25 pairs of top range wellington boots and 50 gallons of diesel fuel.

'Suspicious callers had been challenged in the previous days at a business park in Pinkney,' said the officers.

Please give a description of people and vehicles - with their registration numbers - where you see something suspicious at business parks or isolated places such as farms.

'We'll be happy to make discreet inquiries. It may be nothing but it may help prevent or solve a crime in your area.'

Lest we forget

Some 53 Sherston men lost their lives in the two World Wars and in Northern Ireland. Below is the story of one of them taken from Cilla Liddington's book 'Heroes All'.

Private 241826 Alfred Clark

1st/8th Bn Worcestershire Regiment

Who died aged 23 Monday 4 November 1918

Son of Alfred and Mary Clark, High Street, Sherston.

Remembered with honour

Landrecies British Cemetery, Landrecies, Nord, France

Alfred Clark fell in action in the Battle of the Sambre, one of the final battles of the Great War.

The 1st and 8th Worcestershire formed up during the night of 4 to 5 November in the assembly trenches outside Le Faux. In the mist at 4.15am all were ready for attack on the town of Landrecies.

Before the attack, machine gun fire opened up all along the line of attack in addition to the artillery bombardment. This was not only to harass the enemy but also to mask the advance of two tanks ready to spearhead the attack. The attack was a complete success. Landrecies was captured and secured along with an entire field hospital and many prisoners.

In the afternoon, the 1st and 8th Worcestershire re-formed and defended the western outskirts of the town, the Germans being in full retreat. Alfred Clark was killed along with three other ranks and four officers. Another officer taking part in this attack lost his life that day crossing the Sambre River. He was the famous war poet Wilfred Owen.

Pay-back time

Offenders are repaying their debts to the community with schemes in Sherston.

Under the probation service's Community Payback scheme, offenders have recently cleared a rough area of land around the sports field skateboard area for the parish council.

'We're very pleased indeed with the standard of work shown by the offenders and how well the scheme appears to be organised,' said parish council chairman John Matthews.

'We intend to use the scheme on other parish projects including fencing at Grove Wood and footpath maintenance.'

The village hall committee hopes the scheme can help with internal and external redecoration of the hall.

At the service, which will be attended by members of the parish council, a wreath will be laid on behalf of the parish.


The service will be preceded by the traditional parade by the local British Legion and Sherston Scouts, Cubs and Brownies.

For those who would like to be able to attend a remembrance service but would rather not have the children in church with them, there will be a Children's Church at Court House, Hullavington, from 10.30am until the end of the remembrance services (approximately 12 noon). There will be games, stories, music and bible teaching. Any child under the age of five must be accompanied by an adult.

All Hallows walk

Following the sucess of the Michaelmas walk with over 25 people taking part, the parish footpaths group's next seasonal walk is set for All Hallows on Sunday 1 November.

The walk will begin from the village hall at 10am and is particularly suitable for families. Well behaved dogs on leads are as ever welcome. The walk will end at the Rattlebone Inn at around 12 noon where complimentary seasonal food will be available courtesy of the pub. The apple and blackberry crumble with custard went down very well at the Michaelmas walk!

The walk is free with no need to book. Just turn up with suitable footwear and clothing for weather conditions on the day.

All Hallows was made a feast day in 835 AD by Pope Gregory IV and is to honour all the saints. Hallow is an old word for saints or holy person and the day is now more usually called All Saints' Day. It is preceded by All Hallows Eve (Halloween) on 31 October and followed by All Souls' Day on 2 November. As with many Christian festivals its origins can be traced back to Celtic traditions or earlier- in this case the feast of Samhain or 'summer's end'. The last seasonal walk of the year will be at Christmas and takes place on Sunday 27th December – just right for some well earned exercise after all that feasting. New-look charabanc trips

Weekend sightseeing and shopping trips could be on the cards thanks to the new community bus.

The new Malmesbury-based 17-seater Cartmell community minibus was delivered in September and can be hired by any local community group.

In conjunction with Malmesbury and the villages community area partnership, the parish council is taking part in a pilot project to run trips to places such as Bristol and Bath at weekends.

'The trips are designed to enable those who would otherwise find it difficult, if not impossible, to visit large shopping centres and other places of interest,' said Sherston Parish Council vice chairman Martin Rea.

Two Christmas shopping trips from Sherston to Cribbs Causeway have been arranged: one on Sunday 15 November and another on Saturday 19 December. The bus will leave the High Street at 11am and leave Cribbs Causway at approximately 4pm.

The cost is £4 return and tickets, available from Sherston Post Office, should be bought well in advance as only 16 seats are available on each trip.

Under-14 s must be accompanied by an adult.

The parish council thanks Eric Thacker for giving his driving services without charge.

If these initial trips prove a success they could be extended next year.

'Who knows; a trip to Weston could be on the cards next summer,' said Mr Rea.

In the longer term, the Malmesbury and villages community area partnership hopes for regular trips using larger coaches and serving Malmesbury and other villages.

Study that sack

One of our readers fears people may be misled by organisations asking door-to-door for secondhand clothes.

Not all these requests come from charities.

'More and more lately we are getting sacks put through the letter box asking for clothing etc,' wrote Owen Fitzpatrick of the Tarters.

'Most of these look genuine but I have noticed some recently from companies that don't appear to exist and, if they do, look suspect.

'One came through this morning called RCC Ltd (Recycling Clothes Company) who claim to be sending the clothes to undeveloped countries.

'I have just looked them up and they are a retail company selling second-hand goods.'

A Recycling Clothes Company Ltd is listed on the internet as a business for 'the retail sale of second-hand goods in stores' and there are several organisations with similar names.

Indeed many companies trade in second-hand clothing both here and worldwide. Supporters of the overseas trade point out it creates employment in the receiving countries where people earn money transporting, cleaning, repairing and restyling these clothes.

It also provides low-cost clothing for people living in poverty.

At the same time, however, it is probably one factor undermining the local manufacture of clothing and other textiles in sub-Saharan Africa and is a threat to the livelihood of West African cotton farmers.

Meanwhile, as Mr Fitzpatrick suggests, look carefully at requests for second-hand goods before you decide whether to donate.

Talking about trees

Sue McKechnie (yes, I have a deputy!) and I attended the 2009 Tree Warden Forum at Daglingworth near Cirencester last month. There were about 70 of us (I wonder what you call a group of tree wardens, a branch, perhaps?). The theme was the pressures on trees in the 21st century in the light of climate change, urban development and building constraints. Experts from the Tree Council and Forestry Commission delivered thoughtprovoking presentations, helped along by some very nice lunchtime refreshments. We all piled into coaches for a short trip to the Bathurst Estate where we saw wonderful, ancient trees, allowed to grow unhindered for over 400 years old. Our passionate (and extremely funny) host for this session was a gentleman from the Veteran Tree Forum who exhorted us all to "Get out there and open your eyes.", which is precisely what the Ancient Tree Hunt is all about, see below....

How do you recognise an ancient tree?

Being described as fat and old may sound less than complimentary – unless you're a tree. People all over the UK are being exhorted to find ancient trees in their own areas to help the Woodland Trust's ancient tree conservation work. The trust is attempting to create a comprehensive living database of ancient trees as the first step towards cherishing and caring for them. They aim to record at least 100,000 ancient trees throughout the UK by 2011.

There are plenty of ancient (or slightly smaller veteran) trees in and around Sherston that can be spotted during country walks. If you find impressive specimens that you think might qualify, either let me know or take a photograph for downloading on a new display page we are hoping to create on the village website. And finally,

Wiltshire's oldest tree is probably an ancient concrete filled yew at Tisbury Parish Church. It might not be the county's fattest, measuring a relatively slim 30 feet but as one of the slowest growers it's thought to be well over 1,000 years old!

A hollow tree is often a healthy strong tree. The decaying wood produced as it hollows acts as extra food. The tree might even send down aerial roots inside the hollow to make the most of the rich pickings.

Living Churchyard

There were two important events in the churchyard in September – the Moth Night and the first of what I hope will be regular Saturday morning sessions, which have the long-term aim of increasing the churchyard's value as a wildlife area and as a reflection of the miracle of the natural world.

On Friday 18 September we had a perfect warm, still, dry night for attracting moths to a mercury vapour lamp. Sadly the number of moths was like the number of people attracted to the event – small. Nevertheless eight different varieties of moth were identified, which our expert from the Wiltshire Living Churchyard Project, Mr Ivan Randall, said was a good total. Those who were there enjoyed the evening and the results are on their way to the National Moth Night project co-ordinators.

The next morning, again in perfect weather, the LCCP volunteers met in the churchyard and spent several hours cutting ivy from trees in order to save their lives! One ivy stem was about six inches/15 cms in diameter where it started up the tree trunk and the top growth was starting to pull down the upper branches of the tree. We hope that two trees have now been saved for the future.

You should soon see some radical clearance taking place in the churchyard, to remove overgrown trees. These will eventually be replaced by native British species which will be much more wildlife friendly. Watch next month's report for more news of what exactly has been done.

Top tenor tunes up for charity

One of the most powerful and dynamic tenors in the country has agreed to help the Malmesbury St Aldhelm Masonic Lodge, which includes members from Sherston and the villages, to raise money for its 2009/10 chosen charity, Diabetes UK, by giving a concert locally.

Tim Pitman, who comes from Ditcheat in Somerset, worked with big names in show business after he became, in 1992, the first singer-songwriter to be awarded a grant by The Prince's Trust and was invited to sing before The Prince of Wales.

He made a life-changing decision when he entered the world of classical music and has become well known for his ability to hit the top 'b's and 'c's with power and yet recreate the same type of dark tenor voice of old-time tenors such as Caruso.



A new face has recently appeared in the High Street on Tuesday mornings.

Every Monday afternoon John Petersen selects a consignment of recently landed fish from the store in Grimsby. Then at about 4am the next day he collects what he has selected, loads it into his ice-packed van and sets out down the motorway for Sherston.

John remembers when Grimsby was home to a huge fishing fleet. His father was the skipper of a fishing trawler. Sadly, he was lost at sea in 1979. John himself went to sea at the age of 15 and spent several years on the fishing boats before settling for a less hazardous way of life.

John's van is parked outside the post office for the first half of every Tuesday morning, then goes on to Tuck's yard for a couple of hours. He also fits in deliveries to some of our housebound elderly villagers. Then it's off to Hullavington, an overnight bed-and-breakfast stop and a stint in Tetbury on Wednesday before getting back up the motorway to Grimsby.

It's not an easy way to make a living, and in fact John has to spend the rest of the week doing other work to make ends meet. But he lives in a part of the country that was having a hard time even before the present economic downturn and he's using his initiative and his knowledge of the fish trade to survive. Those of us hereabouts who appreciate fresh fish are getting the benefit.

Crab apple harvest

This year's crab apple crop has not been as good as last year's. That's the informed opinion of Willow Class from Sherston School, with advice from Guy Tullberg and Liz Cuff from Tracklements

For the fifth year in succession, Sherston School pupils have helped to pick crab apples for making into jelly. This year they picked from trees on The Cliff, thanks to generous permission from the Sidebottom family.

'First the children pick the fruit, then we show them how to make it into crab-apple jelly (boiled and strained through muslin) and finally, we sell it,' explains Guy. On good years, the joint venture produces 1,000 jars of jelly, which is particularly delicious with roast pork. Some of it is sold at the school's Christmas fund-raising fair, the rest is distributed to the small food shops that stock Tracklement's products. For every jar of jelly sold through these outlets, the school gets 25p.

As well as financial rewards, though, Project Crab Apple brings a whole bunch of educational benefits attached. 'We'll talk about weights and numbers of the apples in maths; we'll do designs for the jar labels in art; and we'll produce a report of the day with pictures in ICT,' says Sue Wild, Willow's class teacher. 'From a broader perspective, an outing like this helps children understand exactly where food comes from.'

As Guy explains, 'In our headlong rush for balsamic vinegar and continental flavours, we often forget that we've got a food heritage of our own. We've got a blind spot when it comes to acknowledging that pork pie, cold meats and piccalilli, along with cheese and chutney, are a British version of antipasto.'

It has been a bit of an eye-opener for all of us to see how unpredictable the crab apple harvest can be. Trees that are loaded with fruit one year produce nothing the next year. So far this year Tracklements have sold over 2000 jars – all of which were made with crabapples picked in the vicinity.



After this year's hurl there can be no doubt that a great deal has been achieved in that direction despite the result of the team final on Sunday 4 October producing a vicious sting in the tail.



It was at Anointment of the the Normans Friday evening before the hurl that it first became apparent to members of the Order that the PR campaign for the event so ably masterminded by Kate

Hosier was beginning to show dividends. This usually secret ritual washing of the Normans was witnessed by a packed bar of visitors and locals in the Rattlebone Inn. Mangold Matron Caroline Scarlett took charge of the ceremony showing quite how easily she can still bring a tear to many a member's eye. Once the Normans had been gently washed in cider in the 'Luckington Bowl' and then decapitated by the present mangold maid Amelie Smith with passionate assistance from former maids Hannah Neal and Jo Jo Richardson all the remaining liquid in the Bowl including the dirt and grit was drunk by all present in a toast to the maids.

The eve of the hurl brought a flurry of activity with the joint Keepers of the Cart, Richard Langley and son Tom, leading an early morning posse of Sherston Scouts to the famous mangold fields of Wotton under Edge to collect this year's crop. All were greatly impressed with the size and quantity of the crop grown

by Sid Young on his family's farm. Meanwhile back in the village news was spreading fast that Kate had worked her PR magic by getting a piece on the hurl published in that day's Times newspaper.

From dawn on Hurl Sunday it was clear that we were about to enjoy a most

The arrival of the Cook family from Mansfield Nottinghamshire, drawn by the Times article, gave an early indication of the record crowd to come some 300 in all including a team from Wales - the first international team to take part.

Meanwhile amongst the revelling crowd Penny Forster offered all a nibble of her magnificent mangold muffin. Further entertainment was provided musically on equipment kindly provided and

set up by Dave Shepard.







As the team event got underway it soon became clear that the many hours of patient practise was paying off for some. Nevertheless the Willow Ade Mynes, superbly assisted by Dean Parkes, was kept busy all afternoon in his refereeing capacity shouting the dreaded word 'bent' at all those hurling foul with a less than straight arm. Indeed at one point he threatened to invoke the drastic rule 54 A iv (as amended by the now notorious 1963 Newton Abbott convention) before sanity was finally restored.

Children seemed to delight in the hurl and their own competition proved a great sucess with the NABS team running out the winners. The Order sincerely hopes that all these young hurlers will go on to represent their parish in years to come.

So intense were the teams in the main event that a second pitch had to be brought swiftly into play by Graham Hayman the Keeper of the Field to ensure that all was concluded well before darkness fell. Eventually around 5 pm the two finalists took up their positions

before a vociferous crowd. After a hurl of monumental proportions going right down





to the final root it was the Root Vegetable Aerobatic Display Team who proved victorious over local team the Five O'clock Shadows and lifted their prizes – an enormous 20 lb mangold and brilliant T shirts produced by the pupils of Briarwood School Bristol.

As already reported, a member the winning team was no less than Jimmy Doherty of the TV series 'Jimmy's Farm' along with brothers Tom and Will Lawton. Jimmy was so impressed with the hurl that he invited the Order back to his farm in Suffolk next year for a sugar beet

throwing match.

Despite the ignominy of the team title going to a team 'without' the parish, Sherston's pride was fortunately restored in the individual hurl, which attracted a massive field of 31. Jock Walker (last year's champion) and Rob Punter, both from the parish, had to suffer the intense pressure of a hurl off demanded by the



Willow to determine this year's winner. Rob claimed victory with a hurl of 125 yards and was duly crowned this year's Mangold King.

On a serious note, the Order has constituted with immediate effect a special commission to investigate the failure of a Sherston side to win the 2009 team event and to make in-depth recommendations as to the future organisation of the sport in the parish. Their report is to be be published by the end of the month. In the meantime Ian Ashby, this year's Keeper of the Technique, received a somewhat muted vote of confidence in the hours shortly after the hurl from members of the Order, despite their being in an increasing state of shock and confusion as the reality of the result began to sink in.

Leaving the team result well aside, the day proved not only to be hugely enjoyable for all those who attended but also produced a profit of some £300 towards Sherston 1016's funding of the Christmas senior citizens' vouchers. This gave particular pleasure to Noel Banks the Keeper of the Groat.

With more teams from Wales, Suffolk, Devon and Nottinghamshire expected next year, preparations are already under way for 2010, with the weekend of 2/3 October being set for the hurl. Till next year may your arm be straight and your root firmly grasped.


