Gauzebrook gathers to welcome its new priest-in-charge

More than 200 people gathered at the Church of the Holy Cross in Sherston on 11 October to see their new priest-in-charge, Reverend Christopher Bryan, licensed and installed by the Bishop of Swindon. Parishioners from all eight parishes in the Gauzebrook Group – Alderton, Easton Grey, Foxley with Bremilham, Hullavington, Luckington, Norton, Sherston and Stanton St. Quintin – were joined by members of Christopher's family and friends from his previous parish in Lechlade.

Clergy from the North Wiltshire Deanery, led by the Archdeacon of Malmesbury and the Area Dean attended the service as did representatives of other Christian denominations, including the local Roman Catholic, Methodist and Congregational Churches and Hullavington's Mount Zion Church. The four Church of England primary schools in Gauzebrook sent representatives, and so did the local parish and district councils and uniformed organisations. Each of these groups extended a welcome to Christopher, his wife Chantal and children Jonathan and Susannah, as part of the service.

The evening began with the ringing of the church bells for half an hour before the service. Afterwards there was a reception in the Village Hall, where everyone enjoyed a hog roast and many people were able to meet the new priest and his family. Christopher, Chantal and their children will be living in the rectory in Stanton St. Quintin.

Heartfelt thanks must go to everyone who helped to make the evening such a success. There are too many to name individually but a large number of people worked hard for some weeks to bring this event together. The people of the Gauzebrook Group have been heartened by the warmth of feeling, level of community involvement and show of ecumenical support which characterised the evening. Now we all look forward to the next stage of our Christian journey under the care and leadership of our new priest.

Lest we forget

Pte 17598 William Breakspear 1st Batt Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry



Who died aged 21 Sunday 23rd July 1916

Son of Alfred and Helen Breakspear. Keeper's Cottage, Pinkney Park, Sherston, Wilts.

Remembered with Honour

Thiepval Memorial to the Missing. Somme. France.

William Breakspear was the eldest son of Alfred and Helen Breakspear. His father was Gamekeeper for Colonel Turnor at Pinkney Park. William worked alongside his father on the estate and was known to be a very shy and quiet man.

William was killed in the Battle of the Somme.

On 23 July 1916, the 1st Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry were involved in an attack starting from a sunken road in the vicinity of the village of Longueval leading towards the infamous High Wood. Initially the attack appeared to be a success, but determined German resistance forced the remnants of the battalion back. High Wood would not be captured this day.

War diaries from the day recall how the soldiers were going over the top to attack, two yards apart and wearing helmets. After a short interval, there was terrific machine gun fire and then silence.

William Breakspear has no known grave and is commemorated along with 72.000 men missing at the Somme, on the Thiepval Memorial.

The above extract is taken from 'Heroes All' published by Sherston Parish Council and compiled by Cilla Liddington. The book commemorates all 52 men whose names are inscribed on Sherston's war memorial with their individual stories. It also gives fascinating insight into life in the parish during the war years. The book is available from both Sherston Post Office Stores and the Rattlebone Inn at a price of £9.99. All proceeds go towards special parish projects.

That clock

Is back in town! Yes after a brief sojourn to the Hawkins Clock Company in Market Deeping the High Street clock has returned fully repaired, repainted and ready to tock. Some work has also been recently carried out to the bus shelter itself and hopefully it too will soon be given a coat or two of paint.

Lines theories

The recent work by BT in undergrounding telephone lines in the High Street has resulted in two very different schools of thought as to the reason why.

One is that the telephone poles, especially the one at the front of the Old School, are well past their sell by dates and cannot be easily replaced in a conservation area. The other is that the removal of the overhead lines is in preparation for the High Street being used as a film set for a period production. The appearance of Steven Spielberg and Cate Blanchett in the Rattlebone Inn during September has done much to further fuel speculation on this score. As to which is right – only time will tell.

Village hall


Work on improving the main hall is continuing and over the next few months the repointing of the recently exposed stonework will be undertaken as well as the installation of new wall lights.

A major issue is the fitting of a fire and smoke alarm system. This is needed not only for public safety but also to extend the present premises licence so as to allow the regular sale of alcohol and the showing of films, which will in turn increase the usage of the hall and therefore its income. All buildings, such as the hall, which can be used by the public for various activities including the playing of live or recorded music, dancing and plays, are legally required to be licensed by Wiltshire Council. As can be expected, licensing brings with it inspections and statutory responsibilities, all of which inevitably result in costs both in terms of money and volunteer time.

The cost of the fire and smoke alarm system alone is in the region of £3000. Recent grants of £1000 each from Sherston Boules & Carnival and Malmesbury Carnival are therefore greatly appreciated.

Fundraising will be necessary for some time to pay for the many improvements necessary to the hall which as well as those to the main hall include modernising the main lobby and toilets. In due course the kitchen will also require updating. Please therefore support future events which are being planned to help meet all the costs involved. 

1st Kevin Smith, and his team The Bungers2nd Hector Walker, and his team The Hoose3rd Tom Dryden, and his team Tommy's Tigers


League 2

Further reports from Neighbourhood watch, Community speed watch, Malmesbury CCTV, Westlea Anti Social Behaviour team and Wiltshire Fire and Rescue ensured a packed and lively meeting with plenty of participation from members of the public. Highlight of the event was presentation from PC 1103 Tony Miles of the Wiltshire Police Rural Crime Team. He appealed for more farmers and other land users to join the Farmwatch scheme which can deter crime, give land users timely warnings when criminals are active in their area, and provide a significant source of intelligence to help Wiltshire Police catch and prosecute offenders.

The Wiltshire Farmwatch scheme has some 2000 members with 90 in the Malmesbury and the Villages' area. This is a somewhat disappointing figure compared, say, to the Marlborough area which has over 300 members. For more information or to join the Farmwatch scheme please contact

BT Infinity – Information for internet users

BT are rolling out BT Infinity across the country. BT Infinity is system to connect subscribers to their local telephone exchanges by using fibre optic technology, giving much faster and more reliable access to broadband internet.

Currently BT have stated that exchanges that have fewer than 1000 subscribers will not be automatically considered for upgrade (this includes Sherston). However, users can influence this decision by logging on to www.bt.com/infinity and registering their interest. Currently only 25 (out of 973) people on the Sherston exchange have registered and I urge all users to take a few moments to log on and register – you don't have to be a BT customer. BT state that they will consider the situation if more than 75% register an interest.

This is a repeat of what happened a few years ago when BT said that Sherston did not qualify for Broadband, but because so many subscribers registered an interest then, BT eventually provided the service on our exchange.

There is a need for better broadband access in our area and here is a chance to influence BT – go on, do it now even if you get your broadband through another supplier.


Sherston 10k


A chair from the forest

Want an adventure? An opportunity to make a chair using no power tools, in the middle of Westonbirt Arboretum.

A dear friend, Lin Prior, had booked me on the course, and as the date approached, I wondered if I would walk out of the forest with a chair or a bag of potential firewood. I should not have worried!

Paul Hayden, who runs the course, www. greenwoodcourses.co.uk is a true professional and, most importantly, can ascertain one's level of competence very quickly. He sends clear instructions beforehand on what to expect, what to wear and what options are available in terms of style and difficulty. All tools are supplied together with the basic timber. One is advised to bring lunch on the first day; none were touched as around 12.00pm, sausages and jacket potatoes were cooked on open fires, accompanied by homemade apple chutney...a feast in the forest. Tea and coffee are constantly available.

The first hour is spent emphasising safety, tool management and care of one's fellow chair-makers. Two things are worth mentioning at this point. Firstly the ratio of men to women. This is often fifty-fifty, and on one occasion eight women and one man. The other is the ritual that should anyone cut themselves, even the smallest splinter, the drinks are

Day 6: Depending on one's own skill level, help from Paul and another accomplished chair-maker is vital. They are very good at making one feel special and an emerging chair-maker.

All the legs, stretchers and spindles are made on a pole lathe, which is great fun to master, along with a multitude of other tools.

A great course, great people and I loved every minute. Not least, spending six days in Westonbirt and leaving with a sturdy chair. This would make a wonderful surprise gift for almost anybody who loves a challenge.

Rec

The annual safety report from ROSPA (the Royal Society for the Prevention of Accidents) is now to hand. It highlighted one particular item of concern, namely a loose shackle on one of the swings. This has now been attended to. Other repairs are also necessary, however, as the majority of the heavily used playground equipment is now some seven years old. Quotes are being obtained for the necessary work which includes the repair of the very popular 'Nellie the Elephant' which recently suffered a broken spring.

There have unfortunately been some recent incidents of anti-social behaviour on the Rec and these have been reported to the police. Evidence has also been found of apparent drug-taking and underage drinking which the police are also investigating. Residents are asked to please report any incidents of concern to the police as soon as possible so that these problems can be quickly resolved.

Turn them off?

The parish council has agreed to take part in the previously reported consultation organised by Malmesbury and Villages Community Area Partnership (MVCAP) to identify locations where street lights can be switched off between approximately midnight and 5.30am. MVCAP is undertaking the consultation on behalf of Wiltshire Council's Malmesbury Area Board which is providing £5,000 for modification of approximately 100 streetlights. Switching lights off during the middle of the night will reduce their carbon footprint and energy costs as well as local light pollution.

The first part of the process is for the parish council at its next meeting on 11 November to identify possible lights which could be part of the scheme. Once that has been done, Wiltshire Council highway engineers and their Safer Communities team will check that the lights identified are suitable to be turned off. Residents living in the vicinity of the lights considered appropriate for the scheme will then be consulted in writing by the parish council before any recommendations are made to the Area Board. It is very important that the scheme has the support of the residents in the areas concerned.

Malmesbury and Villages Community Area Partnership (MVCAP) exists to bring everyone together by working on local projects and by helping promote and develop community events. It is inclusive and everyone can get involved. Speed

The review of speed limits by Wiltshire Council of all A and B roads has now been completed. Locally the limit on the B4040 from Pinkney to Malmesbury and from Sherston to Luckington is to be reduced to 50mph as is the limit between Luckington and Acton Turville. The parish council supported all these reductions which will be implemented in due course.

The community speed watch scheme has been operating in Sherston since July of this year. Four checks have been made to date, with the following results:



THE ANCIENT ORDER OF SHERSTON MANGOLD HURLERS

This year the Order enjoyed one of its most successful hurls of the modern era which was attended by larger crowds than ever before despite a 'mucky' start weather wise on the morning of Sunday 3 October.

As was well known there was great concern for some weeks, if not months, before the Hurl as to the availability of sufficient mangolds for the event. The disastrous and well documented attempts of Nic Fisher and Fred Harrison to protect the crop from an attack by the dreaded mangold fly had left the Order almost bereft of mangolds. Fortunately however Howard Harding of North End Gardens had carefully nurtured an excellent supply as had Charles Mellor - Gail Mather's father in law - in far distant Hyde near Manchester. These two gentlemen's valiant efforts would save the day as far as Normans were concerned but what of the vast quantities of mangolds – at least 300 – which were required for hurling itself?

By mid September panic amongst the Order's members had well and truly set in. A full blown national campaign to find those mangolds was hastily devised. The NFU was initially brought in to assist as was NFU Cymru, the Scottish NFU, the Ulster Farmers Union and even the Irish Farmers Association. NFU Cymru and the Scottish NFU contacted their local officials and the Scots emailed 3000 of their members in an attempt to help.

The campaign moved swiftly on to the local and national press. The Gazette and Herald, the Wilts and Glos Standard, the Western Daily Press and Wiltshire Radio all helped in the search by publicising our plight. It was even picked up nationally by the Independent and the BBC Farming Today programme which reported at least three times on the story. This all brought a huge response with calls flooding in from Somerset, Dorset, Bath and Devizes amongst other areas. Such was the frequency of the calls – almost one a day at its height – that extra staff had to be called into to the Order's offices to cope. It, was however Tristram Cork's efforts through his articles in the Western Daily Press which brought home the mangolds. There was a stunned silence in the Orders' offices followed by a tremendous out pouring of relief as members almost too closely hugged countless secretaries and receptionists on the news that the hurl was saved. Mr Redman from Newark Farm at Ozleworth, just over the border in Gloucestershire, had kindly offered us the pick of his 18 acre field of prime mangolds. All thoughts of emergency supplies of swedes or sugar beet were cast aside - the mangolds were found at last! All credit for this magnificent act of PR must go to Irene Johnston who had for months been planning her strategy for just such a situation from her home in deepest France.

So it was that on the autumn morning of Saturday

2 October an intrepid group of members silently crossed the county border just before dawn. With the sunrise they quickly pulled a cart load of mangolds from Mr Redman's field. Those present marvelled at the legendary uncanny song of the mangolds as their succulent stems gave forth a strange but beautifully haunting sound as they were firmly yet gently pulled from the moist rich red soil of the field. Despite a run in with HM Revenue & Customs officers at Kingscote the cart returned to the village without surcharge to a tumultuous welcome as regulars from the Rattlebone spilled out on to the road to applaud the carts homecoming.

The success of the mangold pulling put everyone in excellent spirits for the Anointment of the Normans later that evening in the Rattlebone Inn. A packed pub stared in wonder as the Normans were—lovingly caressed and gently washed by the Alderton freshwater sponges soaked in cider from the Luckington Bowl. This year's Mangold Maid Miss Stacey Dryden led the anointment ably assisted by a veritable entourage of past maids and matrons. The intervention in the ancient ceremony by those wonderful tuggers - the Rattlebone Ladies Tug of War team -brought a new twist to the



evening. A bemused and rather excited Keeper of the Maids Mr Jason Read saw his loins put to good use by the ladies, maids and matrons alike as a new method of decapitating the Normans was introduced. Whilst photographs were taken of this novelty they cannot be reproduced here for fear of offending public decency. Rob Strong does however have them available at a very reasonable price. The evening was brought to a close by a superb musical set from Gouldie which sent everyone home in eager anticipation of the next day's Hurl.

The following morning all was set early in the Great Field and village hall for the main event itself. Sherston 1016 had kindly put their not inconsiderable erection skills to good effect with the marquees and Margot Holland had done a wonderful job organising all the stalls. Benedicte Nichols had been working hard from

8 am taking in the entries for Picklemania and our intrepid judges Bill and Jennifer Tulberg arrived bang on cue at 10 am for two hours of concentration on the feast of produce laid before them. Jo Jo Richardson was manning the bar despite a dastardly attack on her dog Fred by an errant barrel of beer. Lynette Willets and Liz Walker were soon cooking away at the BBQ producing an unprecedented number of superb burgers and hot dogs supplied by Tucks. Dave Sheppard had kindly set up the PA system and our old friends the Dodington Parish Band had arrived in good numbers and fine form. Thanks are due to all those who made day such a success including the many who found themselves hastily press ganged into service as the usual crises of a hurl unfurled!

At 12.37pm Malcolm Jarrett resplendent in his Summoners attire called the 2010 Hurl to order with the Great Horn of Moyne. Dave Sheppard led the community singing with a splendid rendition of an' Ode to a Mangold Hurl 'which left many visibily moved. Graham Hayman in his capacity as Keeper of the Cart had absolutely no problem in organising a host of men young and old to pull the mangold cart full of mangolds and the Mangold Maid herself, Stacey Dryden, onto the field. Unfortunately and in true Benny Hill style the pullers disobeyed Graham's precise orders and the cart entered the proceedings at break neck speed drawn by a veritable stampede of scrumpy induced pullers much to the delight of a screaming Stacey as well as the crowd. This was quickly followed by the mass 'Agincourt 'hurl - the best to date as scores of mangolds flew through the autumn sky. Paul Ormiston the Keeper of the Challenges was as usual almost overcome with entrants and soon 14 teams were ready for the team event.


The PR machine had done its work again with not only photographers present from all the local papers but also Steve Knibbs from BBC Points West plus cameraman. Later that evening film of the Hurl was beamed to TV sets around the region - fame at last!

As the matches progressed the skies cleared and later in the afternoon the sun shone as mangolds by the score thudded as they hit the ground next the Normans. There were many close matches with the



team of umpires ably led by Jennie Lamont being called upon to make many a tight call. As usual appeals came in thick and fast to the Stewards committee who following the 1957 Hurl bribery allegations now sit well away from the emotion of the hurl moving rapidly from bus shelters to telephone boxes throughout the parish in the vain hope of avoiding various team followers discovering their whereabouts and subjecting them to the usual chants of abuse. This year Rule 17 C 6 VII d - stem gripping – proved by far the most controversial ,indeed so much so that it is to reviewed be the Mangold Hurling Association at a special convention to be held at Truro in January next year.

By late afternoon the final was upon us with the glorious result that a Sherston team had restored the Order's credibility after last year's ignominy of the title disappearing along the B 4040 to Malmesbury and Suffolk. The winning team 'No Sharking' consisting of Chris Gough, Kevin Smith and Ryan Walker duly attired in polo shirts, so generously donated by PROPS, were noisily hoisted aloft by jubilant members of the Order. Much of the rest of the day's proceedings rapidly disappeared in a scrumpy filled haze aka 'a Jason Read' so much so that to this day many members including myself cannot recall the exact identity of the runners up. Hopefully by next month the cider stained results ledger will have been retrieved from the hedge bottom in Norton where it was last seen and our counselling sessions succeeded in enabling us to put the record straight.



The singles was massively popular with well over 25 entrants. Jock Walker bettered himself from last year and was duly pronounced 'Mangold King' with a lovely lass by the name of 'Tory' being this year's 'Mangold Queen'. To end a wonderful day the children showed some excellent skills in their own competition and gave notice that in times to come the Hurl will be in good hands.

This year's level of participation bodes very well for next year especially as we had observers from German and Swiss teams present with a view to coming over in 2011 when the Hurl will take place on Sunday 2 October.

Till next year may your arm be straight and your root firmly grasped.


