Sherston Church Roof Appeal

Progress towards the target of £40,000 has been very encouraging. By the end of September the half way point of £20,000 will be passed. A most important factor has been the success of the envelope appeal launched through The Cliffhanger.

Yes the Cliffhanger is two years old this month and haven't we grown!

In October 2008 our first edition was a mere 4 pages with a print run of 650. We now regularly have up to 28 pages and have just further increased the run to a 1,000 copies so as to meet demand.

Financially the Cliffhanger has been equally as successful and as of March 2010 had turned in a healthy profit of £3,700. That level of profit is unlikely to continue however due to the increased size which results in higher print costs. Nevertheless the aim is to continue to operate at a profit. We are most grateful for the support of all our advertisers which has done so much to bring about this state of affairs.

As to the profit it is ring fenced by the parish council for special items which benefit the parish and which otherwise could not be afforded. It does not go towards the day to day costs of the council. With the likely level of cuts in national and local government due to be announced later this month, having this additional finance available will become increasingly important.

Sherston Living Churchyard

In late August and early September a lot of work has been carried out in the churchyard, both by the Living Churchyard volunteers and by people working under the Community Payback scheme, for whose efforts the Church is extremely grateful. The churchyard is now, I think, looking tidier than it has for a long time. Some of this work has been straightforward tidying up after this summer's growth outstripped local volunteers' efforts to keep it under control. In other areas work has been carried out with the specific aim of encouraging wild flowers.

In the front of the church, to the west of the path, the meadow area has been cut, the grass left to dry and then raked up and taken away. This copies what was carried out in the hay fields of the past; flower seeds should fall from the cut plants as they are raked up and the removal of the cuttings stops the soil from becoming richer. Most gardeners might think this a strange thing to do, but meadow flowers thrive where the soil is poor and die out if it is allowed to become too rich, so in order to encourage them the fertility of the area needs to be limited.

Part of my summer holiday was spent in Shropshire where a charity called Caring for God's Acre (CfGA) has received funding from the National Lottery and other backers to set up an organization to encourage Living Churchyards in the English counties bordering on Wales. It was very interesting to visit a number of churches which are actively managing their churchyards and have noticeboards about their activities, supplied by CfGA, and leaflets in their churches to explain what they are doing. If you visit Stanton St. Quintin you can see an excellent interpretative board at the entrance to the churchyard and it would be good to have something similar in Sherston, to increase understanding of what we are doing in the churchyard here.

Our next session will be on Saturday 2 October starting at 10 am, I hope to see some of you then.

Eilmer saw Halley's Comet twice in his lifetime and was inspired by it. A 3D comet, made of willow, wire, fabrics and beads, which was designed by Susan Sutton, was created by pupils from Malmesbury Schools. It will be hung in the upstairs Eilmers Bar at the Town Hall, alongside four large stitched textile wall panels, designed by Sherston's Heather Martin. The panels feature the characterful rows of cottages in the town, the Market Cross and of course, Eilmer.

Bulb planting in Grove Wood

Remember, remember, the sixth of November

Sherston's bonfire and fireworks extravaganza will take place this year on the evening of Saturday 6 November.

The firework and bonfire event, organised by Sherston 1016, is held on land generously lent each year by the Hillier family at Lower Farm. Members of Sherston 1016 have attended specialist courses on fireworks and public safety, and pride themselves on getting all preparatory works done to a very high standard, with safety being uppermost in their minds. There will be increased stewarding, and a dedicated first aid post.

The event, starting at 6.30pm, is always held on the nearest Saturday evening to 5 November, to enable families to attend together. There will be a barbecue and hot and cold drinks on sale.

Please wear sensible footwear, with wellingtons being preferable, especially if it's wet underfoot. It's also advisable to wear older clothes, just in case you spill tomato ketchup down your front. It's not a high fashion event, and after all you'll be in a farmer's field. Sparklers are not permitted at the display for safety reasons, but safe light-sabres and light-ropes will be on sale.

Entrance charges (non-refundable) are the same as last year, at £5 per adult and £3 per child on the gate, or £12 for an advance family ticket for 2 adults and 3 children, available from Sherston Post Office Stores.

Combustible material should be taken to the site during the week leading up to the Saturday, and put over the wall into the bonfire field, which is on the right as you approach the farm buildings.



Edmund II (989-1016)

'Compared to many kings of England, little has been recorded about the life of Edmund II, yet few forget his nickname: Ironside. There are conflicting opinions as to why he was given this name. Some say that it was on account of the armour he wore, others believe it resulted from his powerful stature and legendary strength, but most claim that it was because of his military leadership. This is borne out by an 11th century historian who described Edmund Ironside as a 'brave soldier and an able general'. Edmund was the second son of King Ethelred the Unready and his first wife Elfleda, and was born around the year 989. His elder brother died in 1014, leaving him heir to the throne. Edmund was very different in character from his badly advised father. Headstrong and determined, he followed his own heart even if it meant going against his father's wishes.

In August 1015 he married Edith at Malmesbury in Wiltshire, deliberately defying his father, for Edith was the widow of the King Ethelred's sworn enemy Sigeferth. Following a power struggle over the north of England, Sigeferth had been murdered on Ethelred's orders, so it can have done little for family harmony when Edmund married Edith. He even abducted her from a nunnery to claim her as his wife just to antagonise his father. The couple had two sons, Edward and Edmund. In the month of Edmund's marriage the Danish King Canute had landed at Poole harbour with a fleet of more than 200 ships, each with 80 men on board, going on to attack areas of Dorset, Wiltshire and Somerset, before heading to Warwickshire. The Anglo-Saxon Chronicle records that they 'plundered and burned, and slew all they met...Canute went out through Buckinghamshire to Bedfordshire; thence to Huntingdonshire; and so into Northamptonshire along the fens to Stamford, thence into Lincolnshire, thence to Nottinghamshire; and so into Northumbria toward York'. Canute finally marched his men back down to Wessex, arriving on 1 April 1016, before heading for London. An 11th century monk, Florence of Worcester, wrote that Edmund Ironside mustered an army but gained little support from the people of England. Edmund therefore attacked those that refused to fight against the Danish army and many English villages were destroyed in the process, although it has been said that the villages were destroyed simply to prevent the Danes from getting supplies of food and extra horses.

On April 23 1016, just as Canute and his army reached London, King Ethelred died. Edmund succeeded to the throne and was crowned that same month at the old St Paul's Cathedral. He inherited a country under attack and with divided loyalties Although Edmund was amongst the people. accepted by citizens and nobles of London as king, nobles and churchmen in Southampton turned their allegiance to Canute instead. Canute had greater military strength and began to lay siege to London. Soon a deep trench had been dug around the city so that Canute's men could control who went in and out. Before London was completely surrounded, Edmund managed to escape and fled to Wessex to gather an army of his own.

The Battle of Sherston

As King, Edmund was now able to muster a supportive army and many battles with the Vikings followed to gain control of England. The English defeated the Danes at Pen on the Somerset-Wiltshire border (known as Penselwood), at Brentford (London) and Otford (Kent). After midsummer there was one particularly bloody and indecisive two-day battle at Sherston in Wiltshire, where a local man called John Rattlebone fought on Edmund's side against Canute. Although mortally wounded, Rattlebone simply clasped a stone tile to his side to staunch the flow of blood and carried on fighting, dying as the Danes retreated. Today, the Rattlebone Inn at Sherston is named in his honour, and in the church is a chest carved with the initials JB that is reputed to have held his armour. A weather-beaten Saxon figure outside the church porch is believed by some to be the image of John Rattlebone, clutching a stone to his wound.

It was during the Battle of Sherston that Edmund's brother-in-law and supporter Edric Streona suddenly turned traitor and changed his allegiance to Canute. He viciously cut off the head of a man named Osmear, whose face and hair were like King Edmund's, held it up and declared 'Oh, ye men of Dorsetshire, Devonshire and Wiltshire, flee quickly; ye have lost your leader: Lo! Here I hold his head of your lord and king, Edmund. Flee with all speed!' Believing that the king had been slain, the soldiers were terrified until they realised it was a trick, and that Edmund was still alive. In spite of Edric's support, Canute was unable to win the battle, and the Danes withdrew under cover of darkness and returned to London, 'slaying and burning whatsoever they overtook as their custom is,' according to a contemporary report.

On 18 October 1016 Canute finally gained victory over Edmund at the Battle of Ashington. The Danes with a smaller army were inferior in strength, but had greater determination to win. The Anglo Saxon

Chronicle records that, 'all the nobility of the English nation were destroyed'. Unfortunately for Edmund, his army leader was the treacherous Edric Streona who severely weakened the English army's morale and the battle was lost. Edric 'betrayed his natural lord and all the people of England', declares the Chronicle. 'There had Canute the victory, though all England fought against him!' Called the Battle of Assandune in the 11th century, Ashingdon in the Rochford district of Essex, south of the River Crouch, and Ashdon in north Essex both lay claim to being the battle site. The ghostly moaning of dying soldiers has been heard at Ashingdon, and at Bloodstained Hill where the battle supposedly took place it was said that no grass would ever grow again (although today there is grass). At Woodham Mortimer near Ashingdon graves of Danish soldiers have been unearthed, and it is known that a church built by King Canute to commemorate his victory once stood in the neighbouring village of Hockley.

Four years after the battle, Canute returned to Ashingdon, accompanied by Archbishop Wulfstan to consecrate a church 'for the souls of the men who had been slain'. The 13th century St Andrews Church stands on the site today. After his defeat at the Battle of Ashingdon, King Edmund and his army retreated to Gloucestershire, but were soon followed by Canute. Legend has it that Edmund challenged Canute to single combat, believing that it would save unnecessary loss of life. The conflict was, after all, between the two of them over the crown. In the fight to the death, the victor would become King of England. Canute was much smaller in stature than Edmund, and realising that he could lose his life, suggested a peaceful solution instead. The two met at Deerhurst in Gloucestershire on an island known as Olney, formed by the River Severn and Naight Brook. The two kings sailed over from opposite sides in fishing boats, and negotiated a peace settlement, virtually dividing the country in half, with Edmund keeping the area known as Wessex, Essex East Anglia and London, while Canute ruled over the land north of the River Thames. It was agreed that whoever lived the longest would gain the territory of the other, and thereby rule the whole country. Florence of Worcester writes: 'Afterwards, having exchanged presents of arms and robes, they separated'.

On 30 November, less than six weeks after this agreement was made, Edmund died mysteriously in London or Oxford and Canute became King of all England. The cause of Edmund's death is unrecorded. Canute's supporters put about the story that Edmund died through illness, although inevitably there is suspicion that he was assassinated. Henry of Huntingdon wrote that Edmund 'was treasonably slain'. Thus it happened: one night, this great and good king having occasion to retire to the house for relieving the call of nature, the

son of ealdorman Edric (Streona), by his father's contrivance, concealed himself in the pit, and stabbed the king twice from beneath with a sharp dagger, and leaving the weapon fixed in his bowels, he made his escape. Edric then presented himself to Canute and saluted him saying, 'Hail! Thou art the King of England!' Having explained what had taken place, Canute replied, 'For this deed I will exalt you, as it merits, higher than all the nobles of England'. He then commended that Edric should be decapitated and his head placed upon a pole on the highest battlement.

Edmund was buried at Glastonbury Abbey in Somerset, near his grandfather King Edgar, although his tomb was destroyed during the Dissolution of the Monasteries. After Edmund's death, Canute sent Edmund's two sons to Sweden with orders for them to be murdered but their lives were spared and they eventually found refuge in Hungary. Another controversy surrounds Edmund to this day. An anonymous Elizabethan play called Edmund Ironside, telling the story of Edmund, Canute, and the traitorous nobleman Edricus, is believed to be an early work of William Shakespeare. The manuscript, which is now in the British Museum but obtainable on line, is said to contain over 250 words and phrases that appear for the first time in Shakespeare's writings, and more than 600 rare words used by him... Some have even gone as far as to suggest that Edmund Ironside could be the first drama that Shakespeare wrote. But, like much of the real Edmund's life, it's a mystery lost in the mist of time.'

2011 Census coming to a letterbox near you

On 27 March 2011 all residential households in the United Kingdom will be taking part in a census. Since 1801 a day has been chosen every ten years for this purpose (except in 1941 during the war). The census provides an excellent source of information about the population. This enables central and local government, health authorities and many other organisations to identify the need for housing, education, health and transport services for years to come.

Did you know that supermarkets use census statistics to work out the kind of foods they need to sell to keep local communities stocked up with their favourites? Water companies use the census data to plan the pipes for clean and wastewater – to make sure there's enough for everyone. Fire brigades and the police use census data to help communities, putting fire alarms and crime prevention measures in specific areas. The benefits are far-reaching.

The census statistics also feed into the allocation of funding for local authorities and play a major part in identifying need for local services in communities, so it is crucial the population estimate is as accurate as possible. When the questionnaire envelope comes through the door you'll easily recognise it by the purple 2011 Census logo. Take care of it. If, like many people, you want to complete the questionnaire online, your individual internet code is on the front of the questionnaire.

The 2011 Census doesn't want anyone to fall behind – so there is a wide range of help options available (such as language guidance booklets, large print format, Text Relay and census field staff on hand, as well as online help and telephone call centres).


