Annual Parish Meeting

There was a good turnout at the Annual Parish Meeting (APM) last month when some 40 residents gathered in the village hall. The APM gives residents an opportunity to raise any issues of concern in the parish – and this year the questions came in thick and fast.

The parish council chairman John Matthews gave his annual review, with the outstanding achievement being the progress made by SOSCIC in completing the Old School redevelopment both on time and on budget. With the new Post Office Stores up and running since last November and a number of tenants lined up for the rest of the building, the project could not have gone better since the premises were acquired in April last year.

Mike Johnson gave an overview of the work being done to produce a neighbourhood plan for the parish, in which he emphasised how important this was for residents, giving them a real say in what, how and where any future development takes place .One thing is certain: if no plan is produced the parish will leave itself open to unwanted development.

Residents' questions covered parking, which is one area that the neighbourhood plan will have to look at in detail, not only in relation to the situation in the centre of Sherston but also in other areas such as Green Lane. Speeding was another issue discussed, particularly the possibility of introducing a 20mph limit in Sherston itself. The continuing anomaly of Willesley having the national speed limit of 60mph was raised. And, of course, no parish meeting could go without mention of that most popular subject – dog fouling. Despite two new dog bins, unfortunately the problem persists. There has been some success of late with intervention by the dog warden - Cliff Road being an example – but this all depends on particular problems being reported by residents to Wiltshire Council. While the vast majority of local dog owners always 'pick up', it only takes one or two who don't to create an unsightly and unhealthy mess.

New surgery?

As part of the process of producing a neighbourhood plan for Sherston parish, the Tolsey Surgery has revealed its ambition to seek new purpose-built premises.

At the annual parish meeting last month, Dr Simon Watkins set out the need for a new surgery, stating that the present premises were simply not capable of conforming to new requirements for a modern facility. In particular, patients' access to the consulting rooms was not satisfactory and there was insufficient space to provide all the services that the practice wishes to make available to its patients.

A new surgery would be entirely on the ground floor, thus eliminating any access issues. It would also be of a size to ensure that many minor services could be made available for patient, rather than them having to travel to Chippenham or elsewhere as at present . There was also the possibility of a new surgery being able to include a dental practice. The vital dispensing service would remain an essential element of the surgery. Any site would need to include space for up to 30 cars for the use of staff and patients. Dr Watkins informed the meeting that the new surgery would be as close as possible to the centre of the village. The provision of a new surgery in Sherston will depend on both a suitable site being made available and finance. The latter is a matter for the practice and the NHS which, as we all know, is presently undergoing a major reorganisation.

The surgery is an absolutely vital local service and the need for a new site will undoubtedly be a priority of the neighbourhood plan. It is, however, only one of a number of aspirations that local organisations have put forward at the beginning of the process in producing the plan. Others include a stand-alone building for the pre-school, additional allotments, improved sports facilities, and further affordable housing for young people and families, as well as for the elderly.

The neighbourhood plan will include as many of the aspirations of the community as possible and, most importantly, will identify sites where they can be accommodated. The production of the plan is very much dependent on there being full consultation with residents as it develops. Indeed, at the end of the day, the plan will carry planning authority only if it is accepted in a referendum of the parish by at least 50% of those taking part.

Over the next few months, full details of the neighbourhood planning process will be published both in the Cliffhanger and on www.sherston. org.uk. There will be plenty of opportunities for residents to make their own aspirations and views known. The first of these will be an open meeting in the village hall on Tuesday 17 July at 7.30pm. Full details of the meeting will be given in next month's Cliffhanger.

There will be stalls, children's activities, tombola and raffle in and around the church on 23 June from 2.00pm to 5.00pm, replacing the usual Church Fête. All proceeds from the weekend benefit the upkeep of our lovely church.

Showjumping success for Sherston school

Congratulations to the newly formed Sherston School Equestrian Team who have just qualified for the National Schools Equestrian Association (NSEA) National Championships in October.

The team of Alex Harvey riding Baygo, Amy Peevers riding Obie and Charlotte Bailey riding Pudsey competed at the end of March in an NSEA show-jumping team competition at Summerhouse Equestrian Centre near Gloucester, in the 70cm category. They were against fierce competition, including last year's National Champions in this class, Pinewood School, on a tough track that was up to height. Although this was only their second competition, all three did double clear rounds, the only team in the competition to achieve this, and were therefore clear winners of the class. The fourth team member, Katie Pyle, did not ride on this occasion but played a critical role in keeping tabs on other teams scores and enabling Sherston to use the correct tactics for their rounds.

Amy, Alex and Charlotte also entered the 65cm warm-up class, which was for individuals rather than teams, and took three of the top four places! Charlotte did a blisteringly quick jump off round to take the win, with Amy coming third and Alex fourth.

The team, who are overjoyed at winning, will now go on to join another 23 teams from around the country to compete at the NSEA Championships which are to be held at Addington Manor in Buckinghamshire in October. Malmesbury School will be there too as they qualified a team in the 90cm class

'It is very exciting for the children to be going to compete in a National Final in such a prestigious venue. Actually, it's quite exciting for the parents too! We can't wait!' said Mrs Elise Harvey, summing up the feelings of all involved with the winning team.

From the Parish Chest by Cilla Liddington

A special parish meeting was held on the 6 November 1952 to discuss how the village could celebrate the Coronation of Queen Elizabeth. Fifty-seven parishioners attended and it was decided unanimously that celebrations should be held.

Mr J Wilson proposed that the Coronation festivities should be paid for by public subscription, this was seconded by Mr W Thompson. The Rev Eric Wall proposed as an amendment that public subscription be gratefully accepted, but that a foundation be provided for by a small and suitable rate. This was seconded by Mrs Rowcliffe. On being put to the vote, the amendment was carried by 26 votes to 22.

A committee was elected and agreement was made to co-opt someone to represent Willesley and to empower the committee to co-opt others if deemed necessary.

Among suggestions put forward at the meeting for the celebrations were: a feast for the children; a combined service in the church; a prize for the best floral display; a commemorative tree; and something for the old people.

The following extracts are taken from the minutes of the 11 meetings held to organise the Coronation Celebrations.

2 December 1952

It was agreed that a school pageant should be held on Saturday 6 June.

Mr Jack Neal promised to make enquiries about the possibility of hiring one or two television projectors for the Rifle Range.

Mrs West reported that the WI would be responsible for organising a tea party for the old people on Thursday 4 June.

It was agreed that a tea party should be organised for the children on Coronation day in the school. Mr Dyson (Headmaster) said that the staff and their friends would organise this. It was also agreed that a sports event should be held in the evening.

It was agreed that an open-air dance be held on the night of Coronation day.

Mr Jones proposed that the Parish Council be asked to levy a 4d rate as a nucleus for the expenses of the Coronation celebrations. This was seconded by by Mr Dyson and carried. Mr Hill suggested that further money be raised by concerts, dances, etc and said that he thought he could get a concert party from Malmesbury.

The secretary (Mr Barkway) was asked to get in touch with firms that could supply Coronation mugs for all children of and under school age. Mr Dyson estimated that 180 mugs would be needed. Mrs Platt suggested that a prize be given for the best decorated house.

20 January 1953

Mr Jack Neal reported that the idea of hiring televisions would probably not be worthwhile as only about 12 children could see properly on one set. Mr Dyson volunteered to make a list of people with TV sets and ask them if they would accept children as viewers and if so how

many. There would be roughly 170 children to cater for. He also suggested that the children have a free film show of the Coronation. (Wessex Cinemas provided sound film equipment, operator and the film 'A Queen is Crowned' at the Rifle Range, 18 July 1953, at a cost of £14.)

The programme.

It was agreed that a house to house collection be made, also collection boxes be placed in shops and other public places.

24 February 1953

The vicar asked to be relieved of his place on the committee due to his impending departure, but that he had ordered 300 copies of the order of service for the preceding Sunday.

The treasurer reported that the total to date of house-to-house collections was £103.15. 1/2d.

Tea for children: Mr Blunden asked whether children under school age would be admitted, Mrs Platt proposed that any child old enough to go to the tea alone be eligible. This was seconded .by Mr Jack Neal and carried.

Widows: Mr Blunden asked whether widows would be eligible for the old folks tea party. After a short discussion, it was decided not to extend the scope of the original qualifications.

14 March 1953

Coronation Film: Mr Walsh reported that he had provisionally booked this.

Mr Blunden reported that he had received £5 from the Football Supporters Club and £11.15.0 from the WI as the result of their Whist Drive.

The Sun Insurance Office offered to insure visitors, onlookers up to £5,000 for a premium of 7/6d. It was agreed to take out the policy to this effect.

Quotations for medals and spoons: This was passed to the Sports Sub-Committee. Also quotations from various firms offering firework displays.

Mrs Platt confirmed that the mugs had arrived. Mr Jack Neal proposed that the account for them be settled.

The report from the Sports Committee was presented by Mrs West who said a carnival with ten classes, a dog show and sports had been arranged. Lady Blanche Scott Douglas offered to be one of the judges of the carnival. It was agreed that prizes for the sports should take the form of Coronation souvenirs.

Children's tea: It was agreed that the staff should arrange menus, get food permits and report progress.

Sweets: Mr Frank Knapp suggested that if considered desirable they should be bought soon.

Recreation ground. The Hon Secretary was asked to obtain permission for use of the ground for the whole week.

Lighting: It was agreed that Mr Harris suggest what he thinks is necessary and to let the committee know the cost.

Dancing: It was suggested that a buffet for the open-air dancing might be provided.

14 April 1953

Scouts Programme: Mr Dyson reported that this would depend on a camp fire being available. It was suggested

that he approach Mrs Rowcliffe or Mr Bert Neal for the provision of some timber.

Flood lighting: Mr Jack Neal reported that Mr Harris was trying to obtain necessary equipment on loan.

Buffet for dancing: Mr Dyson said that the school room could be used for this. It was agreed to ask members of the Football Supporters Club to organise this.

Sports Sub-Committee report was presented by Mrs West. She said prizes so far arranged would cost just over £12. It was agreed that this Sub-Committee be empowered to spend £20 on prizes.

Old folks' tea: It was proposed to give a souvenir tin of tea to anyone who could not be present. £10 would cover the cost of the tea.

School tea: Mr Dyson reported that £30 would be needed to provide a good meal and worthy decorations.

Mugs: Must be claimed on Coronation

5 May 1953

Flood lighting: Mr Jack Neal reported that the cost of this would be very heavy. Mr Harris had arranged to install fancy coloured lights in the High Street at a cost of £8.10.0d to include a microphone. It was agreed to accept this subject to a satisfactory rehearsal to be held a week before the appropriate date.

Buffet for dancing: Mr Jack Neal reported that the Football Supporters Club would organise this. It was agreed that the buffet should be open from 10.00pm to midnight each evening.

Financial statement: The secretary reported that since the last meeting the following amounts had been received: from the Young Conservatives £10.0.0d, from collecting envelopes £3.5.0d. The balance to date was £108.6.9d.

19 May 1953.

Buffet for dancing: Mrs Platt explained why the members of the Football Supporters club were not keen on organising this. Mr Dyson proposed the Committee provide tea, coffee, soft drinks and biscuits. This was seconded by Mr Blunden and carried.

It was agreed that Mr W Thompson be MC for the open-air dancing. Mr Walsh proposed that any surplus funds be divided between Sherston men serving in the forces. This was seconded by Mrs West and carried. Mr Dyson suggested that a check be kept on the electricity used at the school during the celebrations.

26 May 1953

Programmes: Had been delivered and it was agreed to sell any surplus copies on Coronation day for 2d each.

Transport: Mrs Offer said that three or four people would need conveyance from Willesley on the Saturday. Mr Walsh promised to be responsible for this. Mr Jack Neal reported that the Wessex Electricity Board would charge for current used for outdoor illuminations. Mr Blunden offered to try and get newly minted coins for the cash prizes. It was agreed to spend up to £1 in prizes for the Square dancing. It was agreed to present souvenir lapel brooches to the lady judges and a pipe to the Rev J.M Wickham. The policeman had asked for a deputy to assist in traffic control during the outdoor

dancing. The Hon Sec was asked to book the Rifle Range provisionally in case of inclement weather.

3 June 1953

Mrs Platt reported that there was a lot of food left over from Tuesday's buffet. It was agreed to sell it that evening during the square dancing. It was also reported that there was not enough mugs. Mrs Platt offered to try to get another dozen. The Hon Sec was asked to write to thank Major Rowcliffe for judging the decorated houses and shops. The prize for best tubs was awarded to Mr Walsh the only entrant. Miss Woods had intimated that she would not be able to judge the dog show. It was agreed that Mrs Platt ask Mrs Stanley to deputise for her. It was agreed that the Taylor family (deaf and dumb) be invited to the special Coronation film show.

9 June 1953

Mugs: Mrs Platt said she was unable to obtain any more of a design comparable with the original. Mr Walsh and the Rev S Blunden offered to try in Bath and Bristol the following day.

Prizes: Mrs West reported that the following were left over- a thermos flask, two spoons and a book. They were bought by members of the Committee. Mr Dyson reported that 54 units of electricity had been used for the school functions and he proposed to report the fact to the Directors of Education. Gifts to Servicemen. Mr Blunden proposed that a gift in cash or kind of a certain value be made to those serving abroad, and a gift of half that value be made to those in Sherston at the time. It was estimated that there were 13 men abroad and nine at home. The Hon Sec was asked to advertise a list of those eligible for ten days with a request for their addresses. It was estimated that £1 and 10/- respectively would be available for each recipient.

The final meeting of the Coronation Celebration Committee was held on 6 October 1953.

Mugs: One dozen had been obtained from Messrs Rawley of Bristol at a cost of £1.15.0d and all those eligible had received one. Mr Dyson reported that he had received no reply to his letter to the Directors of Education, so the matter was considered closed. The Hon Sec reported that 14 service men had written to thank the Committee for their gift. Mr Blunden reported 13 men serving overseas had received 22/- each and nine at home 11/-, a total of £19.5.0d. The total receipts were £151.16. 2d and the total disbursements came to the same figure. It was agreed to ask Mr Davis to audit the alc and put it up for public inspection. Mr Knapp said he was very grateful that the whole scheme had been carried through without any complaints or bad feelings. Mr Dyson said he had thoroughly enjoyed his part in the work and was more than delighted with the result. The Hon Sec suggested that as many members of the committee as possible should attend the next Annual Parish Meeting and that after the meeting the financial statements should be handed to the Clerk of the Council for safe keeping. There being no other business, the Chairman closed the meeting at 7.45pm.

True to their words, all of the receipts, thank you letters, etc were safely kept in the Parish Chest along with the minute book, to be shown 60 years later!

It's fair to say everyone was impressed at the quality of the renovation and the careful inclusion of period detail within what is now (or shortly will be) working spaces.

Attention is now focused on clearing the old playground and deciding on its future use. (See Sherston Gardeners' Day for one imaginative event planned for October). In the short term, the area will be used by the tenants of each of the individual units to meet their own individual access and parking requirements. As we have said before, please remember that the space is not intended for use as a public car park.

Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Service – safety warning after local house fire

A discarded cigarette was the most likely cause of a house fire in Malmesbury on Friday 27 April that severely damaged the whole of the first floor. The bedroom where the fire started was destroyed.

Fires caused by cigarettes can be prevented by taking a few simple precautions:

- never smoke in bed;
- never leave lit cigarettes lying around;
- always use a proper ashtray and make sure it can't be knocked over;
- never empty ashtrays into bins before you go to bed;
- take special care when you are tired or when you've been drinking;
- keep matches and lighters away from children; and
- make sure you have a working smoke alarm.

Have you got working smoke alarms in your home?

The national Fire Kills campaign is focusing on the importance of working smoke alarms throughout May.

A smoke alarm is the easiest way to be alerted to the danger of fire, giving you time to escape from your home. They are cheap, easy to get hold of and easy to fit. You are more than twice as likely to die in a fire at home if you have not got a working smoke alarm. The more alarms you have, the safer you will be - as long as they are working. Alarms should be tested weekly. You should have a minimum of one alarm on each floor. If you have only one alarm and two floors, put it somewhere you'll be able to hear it when you are asleep. Usually, it takes only a few minutes to install your smoke alarm yourself - just follow the manufacturer's instructions that come with it. The best place for your smoke alarm is on the ceiling, near or at the middle of the room or hall. The alarm should be at least 30cm (one foot) away from a wall or light. To keep your smoke alarm in good working order, you should:

- test it once a week, by pressing the test button until the alarm sounds;
- change the battery on the low warning signal or once a year (unless it's a ten-year alarm); and
- replace the whole unit every ten years.

Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Service can fit smoke alarms free of charge in households that meet certain criteria. To see if you qualify for a home fire safety check, call 0800 389 7849 or visit www.wiltsfire.gov.uk


we are also going to try and run a teenagers' quiz before the main quiz.



Walk on the wild side

Where has all the messiness gone?

The recent bout of sustained cold weather (which is thankfully now over) caused great concern for the animal life in the village. I suspect many of the birds trying to raise their broods were really struggling to find enough food and some chicks could well have starved due to the lack of insects. Having said that, from the number of birds mating around the village it looks like a second round of eggs are on their way.

The impact of the unseasonal weather got me thinking about the unintended effect we have on our local wild life. I have been talking to a number of people in the village who grew up here and are of a 'certain age'. They made observations such as 'We used to hear cuckoos every year - I haven't heard any for a while', 'My father used to take me out to pick mushrooms - you just don't see any any more' and 'There used to be so many wild flowers in the fields but they have all gone.'

If you walk around the footpaths, the fields appear to be healthy - and they are if you need to grow grass for cattle, fodder, etc - but, from a bird's or butterfly's perspective, the fields are mostly deserts: there is nothing to eat. Farmers have had a very real need to, for example, fertilise grassland to improve growth rates etc to earn a living and we need to respect this. This does mean, however, that flowering plants in fields have almost disappeared as the grass outdoes them as they need poor quality grassland to thrive. The consequences of this are, for example, a 50% reduction in the total number of birds in the last 50 years, a very sharp reduction in farmland birds, such as yellowhammers, some butterflies becoming locally or even nationally extinct, many meadow plants almost disappearing from around the village (when was the last time you saw a wild orchid?) and no cuckoos. These are all very real, local consequences from our demand for cheaper food.

There are some great examples around the village of farmers putting some land into 'set aside'. I saw one patch of this last winter near Stanbridge with literally thousands of goldfinches, greenfinches, etc. It was a stunning and very noisy spectacle.

We need to make more space for our local wildlife to thrive and if we provide the opportunity it's amazing how quickly, maybe with a little help, plants, insects, reptiles and birds can bounce back. And it's not realistic or fair to expect farmers to do everything it's in all of our interests to improve our environment. Wildlife needs 'messy' places to thrive but, with the pressure to increase yields, 'messy' gets tidied up.






