

New Sherston market every Thursday

Hi everyone! Holly from The Loaf Shack Bakery here to give you all the details about the new and exciting Sherston market. As of Thursday 6 July, there will be a new weekly farmers' market taking place outside Sherston Village Hall every Thursday from 10.30am until 1.30pm.

As you may already be aware, I have been setting up my stall outside the village hall every Thursday for the last year or so. I sell a selection of speciality breads, sourdough, sausage rolls, quiches, scones, tray-bakes, loaf cakes, savoury pies and more! Everything I bake is completely artisan and all homemade by me in my newly converted garage. It has made such a difference now having my own micro-bakery, I feel like I am living in a dream! My love for baking came from my granny; as a child, I was always stood on a kitchen chair eagerly wanting to learn everything (and lick the spoon of course!). After being awarded an A* in Food Technology at A Level, I then went on to get a first class honours degree in Bakery and Patisserie Technology. When I finished my degree, we were in lockdown so I started offering home deliveries to local villages, this is how the Loaf Shack started and it kept growing and growing! I now set up several stalls each week in local villages, as well as offering event catering, home deliveries and wholesale. I am also starting bakery workshops- you can find more details of these on Facebook or my website.

I have organised the new Sherston market to give the locals of Sherston more access to local food producers. The other producers who will be attending are:

- Farmer Fred (selling a selection of vegetables)

Malmesbury League of Friends buys blood pressure machine for Tolsey surgery

Malmesbury League of Friends (MLOF) has purchased a special machine to measure blood pressure for patients at the Tolsey Surgery.

The machine will enable the blood pressure of patients to be measured over a 24-hour period and the data can then be downloaded at the surgery. This will mean that patients will no longer have to travel to hospital in either Bath or Swindon.

Practice Nurse Sam Gallagher said: 'We have a growing number of patients with blood pressure problems, so this small machine will undoubtedly help us to give our patients a better service. We are extremely grateful to the Malmesbury League of Friends for this very generous donation.'

MLOF chairman David Hide commented: 'We were, once again, pleased to have purchased this item of equipment for the Tolsey. I am also pleased to welcome a new MLOF trustee, Dr Eve Miller, who is registered as a patient at the Tolsey, which will ensure a continuing good relationship between our two organisations.'

SOSCIC update: Unit 4 available and Units 2 and 3 available soon



There are going to be a few changes at the Old School in the coming months. As you may recall, we recently advertised the availability of Unit 4, at the back of the premises, which was formerly occupied by James Pyle and then by James Harris. This attracted some local interest but, in the event, our existing tenants Shear Class decided to relocate from the front of the premises to this unit. Arrangements were being made to allow Shear Class to do this in July. However, before this could happen, Apples and Pears, which occupies the small shop unit on the corner of Church Street and Gaston Lane, announced that it was closing. Shear Class informed us that this premises was likely to serve its needs better over the long term and so will be leaving the Old School to relocate to Church Street. Having been our tenants for over 10 years now, we are sorry to see Shear Class go but wish them luck in their new enterprise.

Once Shear Class has vacated and stripped out its existing unit (likely to be sometime in August), this will be made ready for occupation by new businesses. The unit currently measures approximately 7.5 metres by 12 metres (90 sq. metres / 970 sq. ft) and can be accessed from both the front of the premises (via the existing porch) or the rear. This unit it should be noted is capable of being subdivided into two separate units (Units 2 and 3) – as per the original planning permission. Ideally, however, we would wish to be able to let it as a single unit. Planning consent already exists for a variety of uses, including retail and office. Other uses would be considered, subject of course to any necessary planning and/or building regulations. Electricity and water are already available to serve this unit.

This means that, in addition, Unit 4 is now of course once again available to let. This unit measures approximately 3.37 metres by 3.71 metres (approx. 12.5 square metres – 135 sq. feet). As above, planning consent already exists for a variety of uses, including retail and office, and other uses would be considered (subject of course to any necessary planning and/or building regulations).

Changes to Wiltshire Council's recycling



In May, Wiltshire Council announced some further changes to its kerbside blue-lidded bin and black box recycling collection.

New collection of small rechargeable electricals

In order that the valuable metals in them can be recovered, these should be put in a carrier bag placed alongside your blue-lidded bin.

Acceptable items include rechargeable toothbrushes and shavers, rechargeable headphones and earphones, mobile phones and tablets (delete data and remove sims) and smart speakers.

What they don't want is anything that's not rechargeable and anything that's bigger than a shoebox, including bigger rechargeable power tools and cordless vacuum cleaners.

Stopping collecting textiles

Wiltshire Council will no longer collect textiles in the black box, as it was proving difficult and expensive to recycle. Good-quality textiles can be taken to charity shops, otherwise put them in the textile bank behind the village hall.

Stopping collecting shredded paper

Wiltshire Council will also no longer collect shredded paper in the blue-lidded bin. Instead, this should be composted at home, taken to the recycling centre or disposed of with your general waste.

Collection of small batteries

Wiltshire Council had previously confirmed the new collection of small batteries, which should be placed in a transparent sandwich bag on top of the blue lidded bin.

Holy Cross: Churchyard update



Dear all, Adam (the Rector) here. The church has received a number of enquires about the grass cutting in the churchyard, so I thought I'd write to give everyone an update.

Over the last few years we have been reliant on the Community Payback Scheme (CPS) to manage the grass. However, on 14 June we received an email to say that they are changing the way they organise things and that they cannot commit to having a placement in Sherston over the next eight weeks. The Prison and Probation Service, which runs the CPS, will then review which placements it commits to eight weeks at a time. I suspect this is also part of the story as to why we haven't seen them as frequently as we would like to in recent months, it seems that they are short handed.

The church only has a small number of volunteers and a small financial resource, which is all managed very well, but also means we are unable to do anything more than keeping a few paths mown. This gives me an opportunity to say a big thank you to all who do volunteer, and to those who support us financially through donations, the café, or other fundraising events - thank you!

As they say, beauty is in the eye of the beholder, some love the long grass, others don't, and we are also very aware that many people are hugely fond of the churchyard - it is a really special place to remember loved ones and a beautiful place for a quiet moment with your memories. So if you do prefer the grass to be mown around your loved one's grave please do go ahead - people often bring a strimmer, or there are push mowers by the gate to Green Lane which you may borrow. Likewise if you would like to volunteer to do more than that then we would love to hear from you! We can arrange to meet you to talk about which areas are mown and which are not and we have a decent mower that is available too if it helps. In fact, if enough people came forward we could even have working parties (with a beer at the end?), or a rota so that we could work together to keep it a wonderful space for remembering, for wildlife and for the village.

Out of interest, there are many important projects in churchyards that increase biodiversity. If you're interested there's lots more information if you search for 'living churchyards' on the web, or visit websites such as caringforgodsacre.org.uk. It is a core part of Christian living to take care of creation, and the (mostly) undisturbed grassland in a churchyard can give rise to lots of interesting plants and animals. To date, we have just kept some very small areas unmown, but it may be that we adopt a different management strategy which increases the amount of deliberately long grass if we are unable to keep as much of it short.

P.s. One final very polite plea. Could I gently remind everyone that it is against the churchyard regulations set by the Chancellor of the Diocese to introduce anything other than fresh cut flowers or spring bulbs into the churchyard without written permission. (Anyone who has had a headstone erected recently will have signed to say that they have read these regulations). We try to turn a blind eye to a few little things because we know how important they are to you, and we know that you only want your loved one's graves to be an extra special place, but introducing plants, weed barrier membrane, gravel, artificial grass, and glass or plastic items, or the removal of turf, apart from not being officially allowed, only makes the management of the grass more difficult in the long term. I absolutely don't intend or want to upset anyone by mentioning this but I'm afraid it really does add to the difficulties of churchyard management and makes mowing harder... again if you have any worries or concerns, or if I have inadvertently upset you with any of what I have said, then please do get in touch with me I'd love to chat to you. A.

Our next meeting, on Tuesday 30 May, was all about eco flower-arranging, ably presented by Julia Armstrong. We all learned something - who knew green oasis was so full of chemicals and took so long to degrade? There is an alternative that can be used instead of oasis, a fibrous wool block that is

kind to the environment. Julia showed us how to make a hand-tied bouquet and an arrangement for a table without using green oasis. She also showed us tricks to keep flowers in place by using sticky paper tape in a grid pattern on top of a vase. It was a very interesting and informative demonstration.

Looking ahead, we will have had our Garden Party by the time you are reading this report, weather permitting of course.



Sherston Velo Cycling Club













There is a wealth of beautiful roads, lanes and bridleways in the Cotswolds that carry the two-wheeled explorer between quaint villages, rolling hills and steep-sided valleys, drawing them on to the next glimpse of a sweeping vista as they spin their meandering way through some of England's finest scenery.

The lure of the open road on a bicycle inspired a small group of local riders to set up Sherston Velo Cycling Club, which now boasts 60 members and a packed yearly programme of local rides and tours to iconic cycling routes across the UK and Europe.

The club runs several rides each week, with outings to suit riders of all abilities, ages and types of bike, from youth and novice riders starting out in group riding all the way up to experienced riders. Every weekend there are at least four group rides which will take in Cotswold routes of distances from 20 to 50 miles – always visiting a café for some allimportant cake and coffee.

During the week in the main cycling season (April-September), there is a club ride at the Castle Combe circuit on Tuesdays and either a gravel ride, a supper

ride or a faster-paced team ride (great for developing fitness and group riding skills) on Thursdays. The club also organises mountain bike rides, visiting the nearby MTB hubs of the Forest of Dean or Bike Park Wales, or just heading out on some local rough stuff.

As well as the beautiful roads and trails of the Cotswolds, the club organises overseas tours so that members can have a taste of the iconic cycling roads and climbs that the professionals of the World Tour teams take on in the Grand Tours and Monument races. Every spring, there will be a tour to Belgium or the Netherlands to ride the routes of the tough Spring Classics races. Summer tours over the past few years have taken the club to the Alps, Pyrenees and Italy. This year, the club's flagship event is a weeklong trip to the cyclists' playground of Mallorca.




