Plans to close the Tolsey Surgery and relocate patients and staff to Malmesbury



You're most likely aware that, over many years, we've been trying to get the go-ahead to build a new site for our doctor's surgery in Sherston that is more modern, accessible and fit for purpose.

After a long and frustrating process, the Tolsey Surgery finally received a response to its new-build proposals. The document from the Primary Care Network Services and Estate Strategy department of the local Integrated Care Board suggested that instead of moving Tolsey Surgery to a new and improved site in Sherston, it should close and all services and patients should be relocated to the Primary Care Centre in Malmesbury.

This plan was made without the involvement or consultation of the community or the Tolsey Surgery team. It makes no reference to our Sherston Neighbourhood plan, of which the new surgery building is a major part, or the many business cases submitted by the Tolsey Surgery since 2012 in support of a new surgery.

The Tolsey Surgery, Sherston Parish Council and our local Wiltshire Councillor do not support this decision. We think it's important to have a local surgery that is accessible for elderly and vulnerable members of our community who are not able to get to Malmesbury and we're sure you do too.

What can we do about it?

The plan is a draft proposal at this stage, with the final decision being subject to a feasibility study, which is likely to conclude by the end of October. Even though we have been asked not to make this public, we feel that we need to make the community aware, so that you can make your voices heard before then.

Martin Smith (Wiltshire Councillor) has escalated the situation to James Gray MP to gain his support and we are working to get representatives from the Integrated Care Board and NHS to a consultation in the Village Hall, so they can explain to us how and why this suggestion has been made.

What we need from you:

- Spread the word help us make the community aware of the plans.
- Write a letter to the Tolsey Surgery Practice
 Manager (Sadia Chant) this can then be passed
 onto the Integrated Care Board. Sadia has said if

A statement has since been received from the Integrated Care Board apologising and retracting their proposal to close the Surgery. This followed the public reaction to the news about the proposed closure of the surgery, the engagement of the local press and James Gray MP coming out in support of patients to 'save' the Surgery – thanks must go to all of you who reacted so speedily to our plea!

Despite the retraction, we should not rest on our laurels. We are concerned that there remains a real threat to the future of the Tolsey Surgery, as such will be mounting a full campaign to ensure its future, the main objective of which is to obtain confirmation from the Integrated Care Board that they will support the proposed New Surgery Build detailed within the Sherston Neighbourhood Plan.

Get that warm buzzy feeling: donate unwanted medlars to help bees!



This autumn, as part of its commitment to being environmentally friendly, local condiment-maker Tracklements is calling for the local community to donate their unwanted medlar fruit. Tracklements turns this peculiar fruit into delightful aromatic medlar jelly, with 50p from the sale of each jar going towards helping the bees; 25p will go towards purchasing bee-friendly medlar tress, which blossom later in the year, when other blossoms have faded, providing an invaluable source of pollen; and 25p will be donated to the British Beekeepers Association, a charity committed to promoting the importance of and protecting the British honeybee.

The project is now is its 13th year and has helped plant almost 200 beautiful bee-friendly medlar trees across Britain and donated over £3,000 to the British Beekeepers Association last year alone.

At our next meeting, Michael Lees told us the story of the sinking of the Greek ship Lakonia in 1963. He related one family's experiences of the fire and subsequent rescue from a lifeboat. The family were separated from the father, as women and children were rescued first. Fortunately, the father was a strong swimmer as he spent several hours in the water before rescue. The mother, disabled grandmother and the rest of family - including a small boy of ten years old - were in the lifeboat. The mother proved to be a very resourceful woman, having found life jackets for all of them from a locker on the deck of the ship. They were picked up by different ships so had no idea what had happened to their loved ones for some time. Michael had a picture of the small boy from the ship. He then said the small boy was himself and it was his family who were rescued! What a climax.

We had our harvest auction on Tuesday 19 September, and we have another mystery tour scheduled for Tuesday 3 October, this time stopping for lunch. Leaving at 10.00am returning early afternoon.

Looking up and looking ahead at the Church of the Holy Cross



We are able to start the repairs to the ceiling of the North Transept in the Holy Cross Church in October. Parts of the ceiling collapsed last year, probably due to old age. After careful consideration and taking advice from specialists and the requirements to protect this Grade 1 listed building, we have decided that all the ceiling panels in the transept will be removed, new lathes installed and the ceiling replaced with lime plaster. The ceiling will have to dry before it can be redecorated. After the ceiling has been made secure, renovation works can start on the pipe organ below. At the time of writing, we have received a grant from the Wiltshire Historic Churches Trust, with other grant applications still pending. The pasteurised juice will last more than a year and is great as a mulled juice in winter or a thirst-quencher in warmer weather.

P.S. Please bring your surplus apples for pressing! There will be a big builders bag between the village hall shed and building from Sunday 1 October. We will mix them up. Cooking apples work just as well as eaters.

Sustainable Sherston tests the water

Water quality is in the news nationally and there is a lot of concern about sewage being dumped in our rivers. But what about our own river, the Sherston Avon? Following a Parish working group in 2020, Sustainable Sherston has started a monthly survey of water quality in the river from Luckington to Easton Grey, using funds from our activities to buy the water-sampling kits. These enable us to build on the Bristol Avon Rivers Trust (BART) annual RiverBlitz survey (see results at https://bristolavonriverstrust. org/riverblitz/). We will keep Cliffhanger readers updated.

Public meeting restart: Friday 17 November



Sustainable Sherston's popular public meetings in 2019 and early 2020 were cut short by the Covid pandemic. However the Steering Group is now working on a new season of open meetings, aimed at explaining the contributing factors to climate change and its wider effects.

The first, entitled 'Water in Sherston - Clean Water, Sewage and the Sherston Avon' illustrates the problems we are seeing on a national scale. How we use our water in Sherston and dispose of our waste products makes a fascinating story, going back to mediaeval times.

The lecturer is Sherston resident Richard Skeffington, who spent 20 years at the University of Reading researching water quality and teaching Environmental Science. He will cover our use of water and the effects on the river, past, present and future. This will include not only what we know about the river, but the political decisions that got us where we are today, and what we could do to make things better. After the lecture, there will be a discussion, and refreshments will be available.

Captain Chris Fisk must have kept it a secret that he broke a mirror on the morning of the match, but it was slightly unfair that seven years' bad luck would all be used up in one match.

Arriving at Keevil to play the bottom of the league, Fisky found a cricket ground quite unlike anything he'd ever experienced before. There was no need to worry about moving the side screens, there weren't any. The overnight rain hadn't got under the covers because there were no covers. The wicket itself consisted of lightly rolled mud and some dead grass, but the broad-leaf weeds were thriving.

A quick look at the clock, revealed an old clock face, with no hands or mechanism, stylishly nailed to a tree.

This all made the Captain require a nervous wee. But, of course, there were no toilets. A spectator, mum to one of the Keevil players, advised that the toilets were a bit of a walk away from the ground or 'you can just go in the bushes like everyone else does'.

Fisky dropped his bag off in the soggy tent that was supposed to be a changing room and went out for the coin toss.

All he had to do was win the toss; invite Keevil to sample their own mud heap first, and bowl them them out for something like the 49 they had mustered on the same ground, two weeks earlier.

'Tails' was the call. The coin splashed into the mud and the late Queen was staring up at our skipper, with a wicked glint in her eye. The rest, as they say, is history. A series of unlucky dismissals followed and Sherston were dismissed for 100. Keevil giddily slogged their way to victory and relegation is the punishment for Sherston.

It was in many ways a perfect storm and a fitting end to a season that has been plagued by injuries and general lack of availability.

Nevertheless, the spirit in the camp has remained excellent all season, a couple of exciting new players have been recruited and some solace was found later that evening in the Rattlebone.

As a final post-script to the tragedy, 'The Hat' has gone missing. Has anyone seen Andy Lea...?




Ancient Sherston

Back in July, as part of the Wiltshire Archaeology Walks 2023 programme, Wiltshire Assistant County Archaeologist Tim Havard hosted a walk and talk based around Sherston.

After a brief talk on the more recent history of the High Street the party headed down Brook Hill and across the Cliff towards Sopworth Lane. We had access to the earthworks by Sopworth Lane opposite the school. When you stand on the top you realise how substantial they are. Detailed dating has been yet to be carried out so their age has yet to be established.

The earthworks that were flattened on the Rec appear to have been a lot shallower and, as not many records exist of their construction, these would be more difficult to age. The image below is one of the few that

exist. If anyone has any photos these would add to any evidence already held in the department's archive.

We then visited the site of the Roman villa (nothing visible on the surface). It was noted that a more detailed excavation would be useful in the future but no plans currently exist.

Lastly we visited the site of the abandoned medieval village marked 'Easton Town' on older maps. The site is between Home Farm and Easton Town Farm.

The archaeologist was very interested to hear about the caves under the southern end of The Cliff as they have never been excavated for evidence of early or later human occupation. If anyone has any information regarding these or images of the Rec earthworks, please contact Paul Ormiston (840694) who will pass on any relevant details for assessment.






