Speeding Issues in Sherston: An Update



Sherston Parish Council and Wiltshire Council have been working together over the last year to try to reduce the speed of traffic through the village.

At the request of Cllr Martin Smith, the Parish Council purchased some village gates for installation at the main entrances to the village; these are shown to reduce approach speeds. Wiltshire Highways has informed us that they should be installed by the end of the year.

Speed assessments were also requested by Cllr Smith late last year to get definitive speed data which could then inform the councils on what the next steps should be. These were done in May this year and the data has been discussed at the Local Highways and Footpath Improvement Group (LHFIG) which is the part of Malmesbury Area Board that looks at highway's issues. The data suggests that on many of the smaller streets the 30mph limit is respected by most drivers, but there is a view from residents that 30mph is too fast for narrow lanes with no pavements. Many vehicles speed on Easton Town but on average not at a high enough speed to trigger sustained action by Wiltshire Police. Therefore the LHFIG is now doing a feasibility study on whether parts of the village can become a 20mph zone and what it would take to comply with national regulations. Any such change would only be done after local consultation with residents.

The data taken on Tetbury Road was extremely alarming with very high speeds being recorded by traffic moving south. Unfortunately, the data was captured at a point that Wiltshire Police say invalidates the data. Parish Councillor Keith Savage is arranging for this particular speed assessment to be done again, so that we can request more robust action from Wiltshire Police at that location and potentially set up a Community Speed Watch (CSW) team. A council representative will visit and approve a site that conforms to the relevant criteria prior to the deployment. A similar exercise will be undertaken on Brook Hill and at Pinkney at the same time. CSW is a police-approved scheme that allows volunteers to monitor the speed of passing vehicles using an approved hand-held speed detection device. This will only be sanctioned by Wiltshire Police upon receiving proven excessive speed data and requires police training under strict supervision.

Councillors Smith and Savage are now investigating the use of flashing Speed Indicating Devices (SIDs) on Easton Town and Brook Hill as both these locations are where motorists need to rapidly adjust their speed. If these are feasible, they would have to be purchased by the Parish Council with installation by Wiltshire Highways.

Sherston Seniors

In August, we had a very interesting and informative talk by Keith Mills, a paramedic with Wiltshire Air Ambulance. The service is entirely funded by the public via its charity. Originally, it shared costs with the police but, in 2011, a new charity was formed: Wiltshire Air Ambulance Charitable Trust (WAACT)

In 2012, Westbury charity shop was opened. In 2014, the WAACT lottery was founded, followed by a second shop in 2016 in Devizes. In 2018, the service moved into its purpose-built airbase in Semington, enabling all its aircrew and charity staff to be under the same roof for the first time. In 2021, the charity's costs rose to £4 million a year, hence the need for more financial support. In 2022, the charity received the Pride of Wiltshire Award at the annual Wiltshire Life Awards. Keith was a wonderful speaker and so full of enthusiasm that members were keen to support in any way they could.

Our next outing was the Autumn Colours Tour, a lovely ride through the countryside, before stopping at AV8 Café at Cotswold Airport for lunch.

Our next speaker, Susan Grey, told us about the history of pantomime. This was fascinating. Pantomime has its roots in 16th-century Italian Commedia dell'arte, a form of theatre with dance, music, tumbling, acrobatics and a cast of mischievous stock characters. In 1702, the 'father of English pantomime', John Weaver, staged a version of this at Drury Lane Theatre. Harlequin was very prominent throughout the years. Susan spoke with great clarity and enthusiasm.

On 31 October, Susan Mocker and Sue Poole, volunteers at Malmesbury's Athelstan Museum, made a welcome return. Previously, they told us about the Malmesbury hoard. This time, they told us how the museum was able to purchase the Turner painting of Malmesbury Abbey - a very interesting talk.

In November, we had the Jaybirds entertain us and also had lunch at The Ship.

Our final meeting of the year is on 12 December, when we will be having our Christmas party at the British School Room.

Our first meeting of 2024 will be on 9 January with a quiz and bingo. Membership renewal will be due - just £15 for the year. New members are always welcome. We meet every two weeks in the British School Room, Cliff Road, at 2.00pm in the winter, 2.30pm in the summer. Our club is very relaxed and informal. Bobby Van Trust

Sherston Parish Council was recently approached by the Wiltshire Bobby Van Trust Stay Safe Online Manager and asked to consider publishing an article in our village magazine highlighting the existence of the the Wiltshire Bobby Van Trust (WBVT) and the free service on offer to Wiltshire's over-60s and those 18+ with registered disabilities. The WBVT is a charity and its survival and growth is dependent on referral so the Parish Council has duly obliged and presents their verbatim comments for your consideration:

Since 1998, the WBVT has worked in partnership with Wiltshire Police to provide a free home service for elderly and vulnerable people. Our operators are skilled carpenters/lock fitters, trained in crime reduction and Fire Risk Assessment and provide reassurance to clients. On arrival our operators conduct a security audit and with the permission of the client, fit the necessary security equipment to ensure the home is safe. In addition, they carry out a fire risk assessment, fit smoke alarms and carbon monoxide defectors if or when appropriate.

Finally, all aspects of home, personal and fire safety are discussed and practical measures provided. The service and equipment are provided free of charge and this vital work is funded by the WBVT.

The mission of the WBVT is to help elderly or vulnerable people who have been victims of or are at risk of house crime, hate crime, domestic abuse or fire. The trust was set up in 1998 and is the first of its kind to be established in England.

1. Increasing sustainability

It's a form of recycling; 'one person's trash is another's treasure'. It creates a positive cycle of restoration of the life of clothes and products.

2. Reducing the demand for fast fashion

Using charity shops reduces demand for fast fashion production. In turn, fast fashion industries gain less of income and the popularity of this culture and these unethical ways of production can be reduced.

3. Helping those in need

Supporting charity shops is a great way of putting your money towards a good cause, whilst also getting something out of it yourself in an affordable, sustainable way. For example, there are more than 600

Oxfam stores across the UK, raising over £400 million for charity each year (2018/19).

4. Helping the community

Charity shops are a great means of supporting the community as, instead of using landfills, it creates new life for clothes and other items, and helps the economy.

5. Saving money

You can definitely find great bargains by shopping at charity shops. If you really commit to charity shopping and have a good rummage, you wouldn't believe the amount of money that can be saved - not something to be overlooked in the current cost-of-living crisis. Charity shops have provided me with everything from shirts, skirts and jumpers to bags and jewellery - all great quality. These items would have been very expensive new, but were being sold at extremely affordable prices. For example, I recently bought a skirt from a charity shop for around £2.50, in excellent condition, which would have been priced at around £35 new.

Work to support wildlife diversity in Holy Cross churchyard and to make it a more beautiful place for the community will begin at 10.00am on Saturday 6 January 2024.

Water in Sherston



On Friday 17 November, local environmental scientist Richard Skeffington gave a talk in the British School Room entitled Water in Sherston: Clean Water, Sewage and the Sherston Rivers. This was the first of a series of evening talks hosted by Sustainable Sherston - watch this space for the next! Richard covered a wide range of subjects from the sources of our drinking water, now and in the past; how the Sherston Avon obtains its water; the techniques and politics of sewage disposal; how healthy is the river; and and what threatens its health now and in the future. In discussion afterwards, members of the audience highlighted their own concerns about the river and changes they had noticed such as increases in silt; more algae blanketing the stream bed (also noted by the Environment Agency) and a decline in trout. Richard finished with a list of things we can all do to help our river back to health, including:

- Keep up the pressure on Government and water companies to invest in better sewage treatment;
- Don't contribute to sewer blockages by using 'flushable' wipes. Blockages caused by wipes are one of the biggest causes of raw sewage in rivers. Only put the '3 Ps' down the toilet (pee, poo and (toilet) paper). Only wipes meeting standard 4-02-06 are genuinely flushable without damaging the environment.
- Make sure water from your house roof and hard paving goes to a soakaway, not the sewer. This should be possible in Sherston and reduces the load on the sewage works, as well as entitling you to a rebate on your sewage bill if you are on mains drainage.
- Try to use less water
- Volunteer for river conservation work for instance for the Bristol Avon Rivers Trust (bristolavonriverstrust.org).


Sherston Drama Group – SHERSTON DRAMA The Elves and the Shoemaker

At the end of October, the curtains rose on Sherston Drama Group's production of 'The Elves and the Shoemaker', written and directed by Katie Skeffington. This was our first panto since 2019 and we were so excited to be back!

Sue Ormiston and Mandi Bailey-Turner played two brave and lovable elves, Twix and Curly, who had just arrived at King Nitwit's Palace on an important mission. The King, played with complete idiocy by Graeme Strachan, was meanwhile dealing with several problems of his own, including struggling to control his spoilt daughters (Tilly Baxter and Iona Breakspear were perfect as the obnoxious princesses), and trying to remember the names of his staff (Fergus Nicoll and Eva Edgecombe played the King's long-suffering assistants with tremendous comic timing). All good pantomimes have a messy scene and this one didn't disappoint as the King and his assistants were joined by palace chef Eggwardo (played with authority by Chris Fisk) to make a cake (cue: large amounts of gunge and the biggest mixing bowl you've ever seen!).

King Nitwit was also on the lookout for a wife and was delighted when Dame Dolly Doughnut turned up at the palace looking for work. Dolly was played by Clive Whitehouse who did a fantastic job of getting





in touch with his feminine side. Dolly's son, principal boy Joe (Sienna Badman) was also looking for a job at the palace, and was appointed as the Royal Shoemaker. Sienna put in a compelling performance as Joe and sang a beautiful solo, a love song to Elsie, principal girl and maid at the palace, played with great sensitivity by Kitty Strachan.

Riaan Van Rooyen and Andrea Sisson made a wonderfully evil couple – the Baron and Baroness, who were plotting to take over the palace. The menacing pair were helped by their henchman, dim-witted Blaze (Oli Kutchera, who showed an impressive ability to

mimic different accents) and Agnes, a witch on work experience (played by Stella Thacker with lashings of bad attitude). Judith Woolliams completed the line-up of baddies in her role as the superior Lady Olwyn, a more sophisticated witch.

Navigating all this chaos, the elves helped Joe to make some shoes in an enchanting shadow scene and then set off with their new friends into the forest, searching for goblins. Richard Warren and Dawn Gibbings played two long-nosed goblins with great character and were joined by junior goblins Eliza Evelyn and Amelia Gliddon, who performed a brilliant goblin dance. Richard also doubled as Frank, the Palace gardener and Dawn as the fearless Puss in Boots.

The younger members of the cast were kept busy, playing several parts each, and special mention should go to Eva Edgecombe as Chimes (a moody clock), Eliza Evelyn and Eva Edgecombe as princes, Amelia Gliddon and Eliza Evelyn as palace maids and Amelia Gliddon's portrayal of a scary bear in the forest.

Two awards are given out every production, and this year the Malcolm Jarrett award for Juniors was presented to Eliza Evelyn in recognition of her focus and helpfulness during rehearsals. The infamous Andrew Award for 'the hammiest acting' was won by Oli Kutchera, if you were watching the Friday night performance you'll know why!

Panto could never happen without a lot of help from a lot of people behind the scenes, and at last count we estimated a total of nearly 60 people were involved in this production! Before the service, the Sherston Band of Ringers started proceedings by ringing half muffled as the Union Flag flew over the tower. Revd Sharon Gleed led the service assisted by Revd Janet Evans of the Methodist Church and Pastor Andrew Williams-Tarling of the Congregational Church. Roger Whitehouse, the verger, carried the cross.

After the two minutes silence Wing Commander Chris Pickthall recited The Exhortation. Captain Henry Jodrell and Eva Edgecombe read the names of servicemen of Easton Grey and Sherston who died in past conflicts. Private Atwood of 9 Regt RLC recited the Kohima Epitaph.






