Community Speed Watch Team - Tetbury Road

To say that our Community Speed Watch team of eight is growing more and more exasperated due to unforeseeable delays since March is an understatement. The latest feedback from Wiltshire Police is that: 'We have quite a few teams joining us at the moment, so a lot of "risk assessments" need to be completed.'

Thankfully for us, once a new team has gone live, which is a result of the risk assessment paperwork being completed/signed off and passed to the team leader, the team can go out and carry out speed checks at the approved location. Roll on that day we say, it can't come quickly enough!

Pyramid Climbing Frame



Thursday 16 March saw workmen arrive on Sherston Recreation Ground and commence installing the new four-metre-high pyramid climbing frame which should be fully operational before we go to print! We trust that this play apparatus creates a challenge for its young users, gives them a sense of achievement and brings a smile to their faces.

Traffic Survey Update



A traffic survey was conducted on Pinchmore Lane, Pinkney, at two different locations from Monday 15 April to Sunday 21 April. The traffic volume recorded in both directions was 580 vehicles, with only eight exceeding the 40mph speed limit.

To warrant consideration for Community Speed Watch, the 85th percentile speed (the speed at or below which 85 per cent of vehicles travel on a road segment) within a 40mph speed limit zone must fall between 46.1mph and 49.9mph. To warrant police involvement/enforcement, the 85th percentile speed in the same instance must be in excess of 50mph.

The Pinkney traffic survey found that the 85th percentile speed was 32.8mph (south) and 31mph (north) which puts them well below the 46mph threshold criteria. This evidence therefore refutes the perception of excessive speeding.

Relevant Survey Criteria

All speed monitors must be securely fastened to existing roadside posts or trees.

They must be positioned within and at least 100 metres from the principal road speed signage/village gates.

They must be sited where most traffic is travelling at a constant speed across the rubber tubes.

They must not be positioned where vehicles are accelerating or decelerating due to sharp bends and steep inclines.

Preferred sites can be overridden by contractors if they are deemed to be high risk for installation workers resulting in compromises being sought.

Two further traffic surveys have been requested by concerned residents - one on Easton Town/Easton Grey Road and the other on Willesley Road (within the hamlet). As both roads have derestricted speed limits, advice is being sought from Wiltshire Council on how best to proceed and find a solution to both issues.

Future River Soundings: Sherston What would you like the River Avon to be like in the future?



It's time to register for Future River Soundings on Friday 14 or Sunday 16 June. How would you like the river to be in 20, 30, 40 years' time? Future River Soundings is a project funded by the University of Bristol which aims to capture participants' thoughts about the future of the River Avon, and use storytelling techniques and music to generate scenarios that can be shared with others, notably DEFRA, which is interested in radically different ways of engaging people in decision-making about the future of freshwaters.

Sherston has been selected by Bristol-based theatre company Uninvited Guests to represent the upper part of the river. There will be two chances to take part: on Friday 14 June at 6.30pm or Sunday 16 June at 2.30pm, starting from the British School Room in Cliff Road. Each session will take about two hours. You will take a short walk along your local river and into the future. As you walk, an app on your phone will guide you to imagine and write about how you would like the river and its environment to be in years to come. We can lend you a phone if you don't have one. When you return to the British School Room, you will hear all your stories of the future told by a performer while a musician creates an improvised immersive soundtrack. Afterwards, we will get people talking about what steps could be taken towards the futures we want for the local environment. As well as being entertaining, the event hopes to build a sense of responsibility for our rivers. This is one of a series with communities along the Avon, from the river's source to its mouth.

Everyone is welcome, but places are limited and must be booked. There is no charge, and there are refreshments at the end! Food, Farming and Nature Recovery

Monday 11 March saw the last talk in our winter/ spring series with Ian Wilkinson, Co-Director of FarmED, sharing his accumulated knowledge from farming life in the Cotswolds.

Soil improvement was the focus of his talk. Ian described the decreasing nutritional value of foods grown in depleted soils after years of intensive production and soil 'improvement' by fertilisers, pesticides and herbicides. Large supermarket chains have driven food prices down, but the costs to food quality and the soil have been high.

With 75% of the UK being used as farmland, and costs for farm machinery increasing as the size of tractors and combine harvesters grow, farmers have to keep production high in order to make a profit. In the process, hedges have been destroyed while the quality of our soil has been undermined by successive applications of chemicals. Biodiversity has suffered as a result of large, arable monocultures. Our food security is under threat.

FarmED is at the forefront of research to calculate whether nature-friendly farming can give us back our fertile soils and create the biodiversity we need to meet our net-zero climate pledges - reducing carbon emissions and the effects of climate change.

We need more local food supplies, less ultraprocessed food and a new willingness to prepare and cook seasonal food from scratch.

Farmers can help make these changes by joining forces to link farmland and help nature recover. Since the talk, a new farm cluster is being launched in the area, led by Harry Long (from Yatton Keynell), which will set farmers on the road to nature recovery, with increased resilience and biodiversity. At the talk, we also welcomed representatives sharing information from the Wiltshire Wildlife Trust (Chelsie Fuge, Head of Nature Recovery); Cotswold National Landscape (Lorna Baggett); Wiltshire Biological Records Centre (Jon Isherwood); Soil Association (Adrian Steele), and the Future Farming Resilience Fund (Adam Langford).

Sherston Town Football Club Vets

This was the second season in the Bristol Corinthians League for the Sherston Town Vets. Competing in the Over-35s Division 4, the team was keen to build on the previous season's mid-table finish.

A new formation and a couple of new faces helped the team get off to an excellent start in September, with back-to-back home wins in the league and cup.

The following month offered up a greater challenge. While an 80-mile round trip to play in Weston-Super-Mare demonstrated the depth of the squad's commitment, it resulted in their first defeat. This was followed by losing an away cup tie, albeit with a strong performance against a higher-ranked opposition.

The reaction to these defeats was superb, with the Vets building an incredible winning streak in the league over the wet winter period. Slick passing football and a ruthlessness in front of goal propelled the Vets to the top of Division 4 and built up an impressive goal difference. This put the Vets in the driving seat going into the final fixtures, going up against their title rivals. A 4-1 home win against West Country Utd was followed by a 3-1 away win at Easton-in-Gordano, putting the Taters out of reach with a game to spare. The following week, Sherston Town Vets received their trophy as Division 4 Champions!!

What is a farmer cluster?

The idea is a simple one: farmers and landowners group together, 'cluster', to form a loose community with shared goals. Clusters are inherently environmental by design; if each member makes small adjustments to the way they manage their business then genuine landscape-level improvements can be achieved. These might include bolstering and reintroducing hedgerows, soil quality initiatives, or water quality and natural flood management projects. Through neighbouring land managers making small coordinated and complimentary changes, a more connected landscape can be established.

Farmer clusters first started appearing in the Marlborough Downs and chalk stream valleys of south Wiltshire (Wylye and Nadder) almost ten years ago. Now, there are over 100 in Great Britain, yet within the Bristol Avon catchment, there are very few.

The South Cotswold Fosse farmer cluster is an attempt to re-energise three groups that have all attempted to start over the past few years but have not quite got off the ground. As the name suggests, the ancient Fosse Way provides the backbone across the landscape stretching from Bath to Cirencester. To date, over 50 farms have joined this start-up community and a funding application has been submitted. It is hoped in the coming weeks the cluster will be able to get off the ground slowly and steadily!

We will be arranging talks based on various agricultural and environmental topics. These will be presented by a panel of experts in those subjects and form the mainstay of the cluster's activities. However, with time and consistency, it's members gathering and sharing knowledge regularly that really generates the cluster community.

We look forward to being able to publicise our events calendar.

D-Day 80th anniversary 626th Engineers of the American Army in Sherston

In March 1944 the American Army arrived in Sherston in preparation for the D-Day landings. Their recollections were recorded in a book compiled by veterans of the 626th. Extracts have been published in the Cliffhanger each month leading up to the 80th anniversary on 6 June.

Part 5

While we were in Sherston we would occasionally listen to the BBC radio to a British traitor, William Joyce who used the name 'Lord Haw Haw' when broadcast ing propaganda from Berlin. He would play soft music and try to convince us we were being used as pawns by the British. He would also chide British troops fighting far from home that the Yanks were having a wonderful time with their wives and girlfriends while they were gone.

On another day he thanked one of the Army Air Force (AAF) bomber groups for dropping him a number of the latest American 'Swing music' records in a container with a note informing 'Haw Haw' that they were tired of the same old songs. He obligingly played their music along with the usual propaganda that hundreds of airmen were dying each day for the Wall Street warmongers. Most of the men ignored his broadcasts, others saw it as a form of entertainment. In September 1945 he was found guilty of treason and hung for his admiration of Adolph Hitler and at tempting to destroy British morale.

On 1 June 44 the 299th was sent on detached service to a provisional engineer task force. Lt. Col. Milton Jewett knew all of his companies were equally proficient and decided to flip a coin to determine who was to go where. Capt. Ambrose Manion of B Company won the coin toss and chose Utah Beach where they would clear obstacles and mines for the 4th Infantry Division. H & S, A and C Companies, a 299 Medical detachment plus men from the 2nd Engineers, 23rd Infantry Regiment, 382nd, 383rd and 684th Medical collecting companies were divided into boat teams. They would be assaulting Omaha Beach in the 4th wave behind amphibious tanks in support of the 1st and 29th Infantry Divisions of the V Corps.


According to various sources the 1128 ECB, not being attached to the provisional engineer task force was to be used as a reserve along with many other engineer groups. If the beaches could not be taken on schedule the reserve was prepared to move as direct support for the infantry. By D+2 or D+3 bulldozers, graders and truck cranes were engaged in clearing up the beach of wrecked vehicles and other debris and building exits and roads leading away from the beaches.

The 626th was to land in Normandy in the 11th wave which would have been D+7 or 8. Extremely bad weather prevented our preparations for a move to an embarkation port. About this time the Germans began launching V-1 buzz bombs. We observed a number of them near our bivouac area. They had a distinct sound and when the ram jet engine shut off, would fall aimlessly on some unsuspecting target. Many innocent civilians were killed or seriously wounded and an untold amount of property damaged or destroyed.

Knowing we would be receiving embarkation orders, Mike Barrett rear ranged his duffel bag so that he could hide, 'Medic' in order to get him aboard our landing craft.

Shortly before D-Day we exchanged our American and British currency for invasion Francs. Weather conditions played havoc with embarkation orders and it wasn't until June 18th that we bade farewell to the City of White Walls, Sherston, Wiltshire.




