





This year's Remembrance Service will take place on Sunday 10 November at 10.45am outside the Church of the Holy Cross, with the welcome support of 90 Headquarters Squadron of 9 Royal Logistic Corps from Buckley Barracks, Hullavington. They will lead the parade which will include the uniformed youth organisations and children from Sherston Primary School. It will start from the Scout Hut on Green Lane and go via Court Street and the High Street to arrive at the church ready for the service. There will be minor delays to traffic while the parade passes. After the outdoor service has finished, the parade will march towards Easton Town and then loop back to the church lychgate.

To enable the parade and outdoor service to take place, Church Street will be closed from 10.00am until noon with an alternative route via Sandpits Lane, Green Lane and Court Street. All cars and vehicles will need to be moved off Church Street for the stretch from The Rattlebone to the Sandpits Lane junction, during the period of the road closure. Please help create maximum space for those attending by moving cars before 9.00am on Sunday morning. Thank you for your understanding.

All are welcome to this ceremony - from all denominations and none - to show support for the armed forces, and to commemorate those who gave their lives for our freedom in conflicts past. Please remember to bring cash for a collection to support the Poppy Appeal.

## Sherston Living Churchyard



Our working party on Saturday 5 October was blessed with beautiful sunny weather, so we were able to make good progress with grass cutting, shrub pruning and planting more native flowering plants, which you should see blooming next spring and early summer. This was followed up by an all-day visit from the Community Payback Team on Wednesday 9 October. Although the weather that day was damp, the eight people who came along made further progress in clearing the backlog which had arisen over the summer. This will probably be the last time that the shorter grass is cut until next spring but strimming of longer areas will continue over the winter as the weather allows.

A very interesting 'Nature Notebook' column titled 'Few Insects all summer, but then a rare wonder', which was published in *The Times* on Friday 13 September, has thrown some further light on the problem that we've had in the churchyard with grass growth this year. It's author, Matthew Oates, is a retired naturalist who used to work for the National Trust and other wildlife bodies. He writes:

'2024 was the strongest vegetation growth year I have experienced, partly because of knock-ons from a mild, wet winter, grass growth was scarcely checked ... brambles trailed and tripped like never before, nettles overtopped themselves, exuberant coarse grasses blocked the view at many a road junction and roundabout ... grassland nature reserves ... found themselves ... with small plants and precious bare ground pockets swamped by coarse grasses.'

How well much of his description applies to the churchyard! Our meadow areas have often had more rank grass than flowers. Let's hope for a different type of weather over the next year, better for the results we are trying to achieve.

Bulb sales went very well over the GrowGreener@ HolyCross weekend, with the opportunity to continue selling on Apple Day. The Living Churchyard tries to work as closely as possible with Sustainable Sherston, organisers of Apple Day, as we aim for the same goals of biodiversity and an environmentally better world for the sake of all our futures.

There will be no further plant sales until the spring but working parties will continue over the winter, the next one on Saturday 2 November from 9.30am. As ever, come prepared for the weather and bring tools and wheelbarrows if you can. Refreshments will be available. We hope to see you for some sociable exercise in the open air, guaranteed to make you feel better!

The EcoCafe in November will be on the Thursday after the weekend working party due to a quirk of the calendar. Come to church on Thursday 7 November for coffee and companionship. Recycled and charity Christmas cards will be on sale.

## Wiltshire Living Churchyards and Cemeteries Project: Annual seminar and Bishop's Award Ceremony



The seminar was held at St Katharine's Church in Holt near Melksham on Saturday 28 September. Representatives from 17 churches in Wiltshire came along to listen to presentations and exchange ideas about how they are managing their varied burial grounds for the benefit of wildlife. Hearing that you are not working on your churchyard project in a vacuum but are part of a regional and national movement is very inspiring and encouraging.

Two presentations were given - one by Jon Isherwood from the Wiltshire and Swindon Biological Records Centre (WSBRC) and a second by Ilene Sterns of the Wiltshire Bat Group.

WSBRC is Wiltshire's local environmental record centre and holds data on a wide range of species, sites and habitats. Among other uses, the data is used to inform the planning process and ensure environmental protection when new developments are being planned. Groups working to improve the environment in churchyards can submit records of the species they find to help build up the countywide picture. WSBRC is currently in the process of mapping in detail all land owned by religious bodies in Wiltshire and plans to add details of species recorded on that land to the maps. This is a pioneering project which it is hoped may be rolled out to cover the whole country.

Ilene spoke exceptionally fluently about her many years volunteering with her husband with the Wiltshire Bat Group to protect the future of these mammals in Wiltshire. She also talked about the role of church buildings as havens for bats. Although the people in charge of those buildings may fear their presence as a source of extra work, they are a protected species and cannot be summarily ejected. The Stanton St Quintin Living Churchyard Group bought one of her husband's bat detectors which I hope we may be able to use in Sherston churchyard.

Everyone shared a copious ploughman's lunch and homemade cake over which we exchanged ideas about our different living churchyards. The day ended with the distribution of Bishop's Award certificates marking the years of management for wildlife in each churchyard or cemetery. Some have been doing this work for more than 50 years!

The seminar is open to anyone and I encourage you to come along next year, to a different church in Wiltshire, if you are interested in helping the natural world survive in a hostile modern environment.

#### Harvest

We celebrated the beauty and richness of God's Harvest at our Harvest Service and Supper on Sunday 6 October. However, Richard Gray, our guest speaker, from the Trussell Trust, reminded us that demand for food and other essentials at the Malmesbury Food Bank (run by the Trussell Trust) was at an all-time high. There is no charge for the lunch, but donations go to charity.

#### Looking ahead

Please make a note in your diaries of the dates of our special services to celebrate Christmas. Of course, you will already have Christmas Day marked – which this year is a Wednesday! We welcome everyone to our Christmas Day Family Service at 10.00am. On Christmas Eve, the Nativity Service will be at 3.00pm. This is a special service around the crib and suitable for all ages. Our annual service of Nine Lessons and Carols for the village community is on Sunday 22 December at 6.00pm, so join us as we sing traditional carols and share some hospitality afterwards.

It is really thrilling to see the village come alive with the light of Advent, and the amazing Advent windows. We will have a special Advent service in Sherston on Sunday 8 December at 10.00am when we will be joined by the other churches in the Gauzebrook Group.

There have a been a few changes to the regular pattern of services within the Gauzebrook Group of churches. Gauzebrook was formed so the local churches could work together to provide a variety of services to serve the needs of all our village communities. There is something for everybody. Because we are without a serving Rector at the moment, we are trying some different options that we hope will suit our community, so on Sundays in

winter, (November to March) our Sunday evening services will now be at 4.30pm with the exception of the Carol Service. The first Sunday morning service each month will now be a more informal service (without Communion) suitable for young and old. We serve coffee and croissants at 9.00am before the service starts at 9.30am. ## Sherston Velo Summer Time Trial Series – Round 5



The final round of the series saw riders pair up for a two-up Team Time Trial, working together to complete the course in the fastest possible time. Honours on the night went to the Chippenham and District Wheelers pair of Simon Cox and James Eccleston in 25:45. First Sherston Velo pair to cross the line were Chris Potter and guest rider Ben Gaby in 34:52.

The 2024 season has been the first time that we've organised a 'Club 10' Time Trial. It's been really successful, with more than 30 riders, including 16 from Sherston Velo, taking part in five races from April through to September.

To get the event off the ground, we had to design and test a new 10-mile course for approval by the national governing body, which involved a lot of poring over maps, sitting by the roadside counting traffic and writing risk assessments. The effort really paid off, with our event generating a lot of interest and the course quickly gaining a reputation as a great test of riders' abilities over rolling terrain.

There has been some very competitive racing. The overall course record was set and broken four times in three races, falling by more than three minutes from 26:12 at the start of the season to 23:11 (set by Jamie Richardson-Paige of Magspeed Racing on 18 July). The road bike record is 23:37 (Kevin Thomas, Bradford on Avon CC, also 18 July) and the female record is 28:53 (Emma Angove, Chippenham & District Wheelers, 20 May). It's been fantastic to see so many riders from other clubs make the journey to Sherston to take part.

The club record time also fell by more than 40 seconds from 26:12 to 25:30 (Simon Vannerley, 20 May). The club female record is held by Kate Potter at 30:24 (20 June) and the club road bike record stands at 25:41 (Paul Chessell, 18 July).

We also held a club handicap championship, in which riders' times were adjusted for age, gender and the type of bike ridden. A minimum of three rides were required to qualify for the championship and the final result was very tight, with only 31 seconds between the top two riders.

Planning is already under way for next season, when we're looking to include some improvements to the series to provide an even more exciting challenge in 2025.

## Sherston Velo Isle of Wight Tour

A tour of the Isle of Wight has been on our to do list for many years, and this year we finally made it happen, with 20 members of the club embarking on a three-day adventure to explore England's smallest county – when the tide is in!

As we decided to make a long weekend of it, three groups of riders set off from Sherston on the morning of Friday 4 October. Despite a light headwind, the miles gently ticked by along the picturesque 80-mile route through Bradford-on-Avon, the delightful Wylye Valley and the grandeur of Wilton and

Salisbury before arrival in the bustling port city of Southampton. After a hearty meal (and some hearty singing in a German-style Biergarten), we headed off to bed for a good night's sleep ahead of the ferry crossing over to Cowes in the morning.

Saturday dawned bright and breezy, with a great day's ride in prospect around the 60-mile Isle of Wight circular cycle route, which takes advantage of some very well-kept tarmac and amazing views of the chalky south coast of the island to the Needles and beyond to Portland Bill.

The early stages of the ride are challenging with barely an inch of flat road, but once past the seaside resorts of Sandown and Ventnor, the character of the route changes to glorious swooping roads by the sea, with long, gentle climbs giving way to exhilarating descents all the way along the old Military Road to Yarmouth on the western end of the island. Turning inland for the final stretch, more easy riding lured us into a false sense of security before the final kicker of a climb over the ridge above Cowes and the ferry back to Southampton, dinner and a well-earned glass or two.

The next morning brought a different challenge in the form of rain, spray and cooler temperatures, but thankfully a strong tailwind for the return journey pushed us back uphill to Sherston and a muchneeded bath.



Well done to all our riders, particularly those making their first foray into multi-day touring, and a very heartfelt thank you to the Two Steves (Bombroff – event planner, and Leonard – logistics) for organising a corker of an outing.

#### Flu, Covid and RSV Update

Following the recent outbreak of Covid in the village and surrounding areas, we are pleased to report that it is not too late to book your appointment for your flu and Covid vaccines for all those eligible.

We are also offering patients the chance to book in for the RSV vaccine. The RSV vaccine helps protect against respiratory syncytial virus (RSV). RSV is a common cause of coughs and colds. It usually gets better by itself but, in some people (especially babies and older adults), it can cause bronchiolitis and pneumonia. The RSV vaccines is recommended if:

- You're pregnant the vaccine is recommended during every pregnancy from 28 weeks onwards to help protect your baby after it's born
- You're aged 75 to 79

However, if you turned 80 on or after 1 September 2024, you're eligible for the vaccine until 31 August 2025.

## Bells And Ribbons - a tale of Malmesbury morris dancing

Malmesbury Morris were approached last September by Joe Jordan (MA student) about being involved in a short documentary about morris dancing. This is Joe's account:

After filming a documentary in Morocco, I was confronted by a feeling of guilt that I had told someone else's story without the right to have done so. I thought about myself as the person behind the camera and considered what unique story I could bring to the world.

Reflecting on my childhood growing up in the Cotswolds, I considered my history and culture as an Englishman. I thought back to Beavers in the town hall, school services in the abbey and colourful morris dancing at summer fêtes.

I was confused as to why morris dancing was mocked and ridiculed when Scottish Highland dancing and Irish dancing were celebrated. Why did other nationalities take so much pride in their culture, and the English did not? I became curious about the role of morris dancing in the 21st century and what the future held for the 'colourful dancing' from my childhood.

I nervously reached out to Malmesbury Morris to see if they would be willing to take part in a short film. Despite their justified scepticism, they allowed me to accompany them on one of their days of dance. They were immediately open, honest, unbelievably accommodating and kind. I was honoured that they were willing to put as much time and effort into my film as I was. I had many conversations about concerns for the longevity of morris dancing due to the lack of younger members taking it up.

I decided to give the film a modern twist, taking the traditional sounds of morris and mixing them to create modern music or pushing the colour to feel even more vibrant and as much of a spectacle as I remember it to be.

I spent months researching morris as an art form, trying to pick apart its origin, cultural standpoint and presence in the modern world but it was only by spending week after week with these lovely people that I truly started to grasp what morris dancing means in the 21st century: community. I hope I enable others to see morris dancing in the same way - as providing a sense of belonging that is of the utmost importance for many in more rural parts of our country, which will be just as important in the future as it is now.

The short documentary, entitled 'Bells And Ribbons', can be found on YouTube.

If you'd like to help us to continue this wonderful tradition, why not come along and have a go, either as a musician or dancer, you will be very welcome. No previous experience required, just a desire to have fun! We meet every Thursday evening between 7.30pm and 9.00pm in Malmesbury Town Hall. The winter is the ideal time to have a go, as we are less busy dancing out and have more time to teach.



# Printer Sherston Parish Council Cartridge Recycling

For a number of years, on behalf of the Parish Council, I have been organising the Printer Cartridge Recycling located in the old telephone box on the High Street. It's great that so many people use the facility. So far this has raised over £400 which is ploughed back into such things as keeping the defibrillators serviced and working.

However, we only receive money from this scheme if the cartridges meet the following criteria:

- Cartridges MUST have one of the following logos: Brother, Canon, Dell, Epson, HP, Kyocera, Lexmark, OKI, Ricoh, Samsung, Xerox.
- NO compatible or remanufactured cartridges these contaminate the whole load.
- Remove ALL packaging and dispose in the normal way - packaging left here contaminates the whole load.
- NO damaged units or toner waste containers these contaminate the whole load.
- Please do not leave anything else at this recycling facility!!

This facility is liable to be removed if onerous sorting is required due to this guidance not being followed. Having said that, most contributors do already do all

this, so thank you very much for your efforts and for your cooperation, from Sherston Parish Council.

As mentioned, the funds earned contribute to the upkeep of the defibrillators in the Parish.
