#### Sherston Remembrance Service 2024









The theme for this year's Remembrance Sunday service was the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings on 6 June 1944 and the subsequent Normandy Campaign. The weather was excellent for the open-air service and we estimate that there were in excess of 400 people present. As in recent years, 90 HQ Squadron 9 Regiment Royal Logistic Corps were the centrepiece of the parade, supported by Sherston's uniformed youth organisations (the Guides, Brownies, Scouts, Cubs and Beavers), plus a contingent from Sherston Primary School and their headteacher, Tommy Towers.

Before the service, the Sherston Band of Ringers started proceedings by ringing half muffled as the Union Flag flew over the tower. Padre Alastair Davies led the service assisted by Pastor Andrew Williams-Tarling of the Congregational Church. Roger Whitehouse, the verger, carried the cross.

At the end of the service, 90 Sqn RLC, followed by the youth organisations, marched past and Councillor Tanya Burgess took the salute.

In particular: Mike Whatley, the linchpin of the entire ceremony, who provided the sound system and music and again timed things to perfection; Head of Sherston School, Tommy Towers, plus Scout Leaders Riaan van Rooyen and Shelley Vickerman who organised the participation of the various youth groups; Staff Sergeant Callum Orton for organising the parade by 90 HQ Squadron 9 Regiment RLC; Dr Pip Pettit and the Sherston Band of Ringers; Trudi Baker who led the Sherston Community Choir; the stewards, organised by Jim Robinson; Nigel Freeth who managed the closure of Church Street and the traffic diversions; and Paul Ormiston of Compass Graphic Design who designed the Order of Service. We also thank Tea Smart and Nick Holland for taking the photos.

### Reporting issues to Wiltshire Council



#### Wiltshire Council

How do you report issues to Wiltshire Council and what type of issues can you report?

There are two main ways to report an issue to Wiltshire Council:

- 1. Using the Wiltshire Council website
- 2. Using the 'MyWilts' app

Both are really simple to use. They both provide you with a reference number so that you can track progress, if you register; you can still log an issue and receive a reference number without registering, but you just won't be able to track the progress of your issue.

Report via the website, simply type 'Wiltshire Council' into your search bar and you will be presented with the screen below:



Click on 'MyWilts' (indicated by the red arrow above) and it should be pretty straightforward from there on.

Alternatively, you can log using the MyWilts app which you might find easier as you can do it there and then, and you have the ability to take and attach photos of the issue on the spot. You are in control!



#### What type of issues can you report?

- Abandoned vehicles

- Fraud Parking Play areas Roads, footpaths and pavements – this includes potholes, road markings, street lighting, road signs, bollards or railings, road hazards, drains, manhole covers, public rights of way, pavements and kerbs • Rubbish or recycling – this is where your bins and, topically, dog poo bins come into play • Street scene • Trading standards • Trees, hedges and grass • Unauthorised encampments • Unlicensed scrap metal collection • Unlicensed waste collection • Weather emergencies

As a Parish Council, we really do need your support to help identify and report these issues to ensure the environment and infrastructure in and around our village is maintained. If you contact us, we simply end up logging for you, which results in extra work for us and means that you will not receive updates on the issue you have reported. Please, please help us to help you, we really would appreciate it.

## Sherston Needs you ...



This is a reminder to please take the opportunity to complete the Sherston Neighbourhood Plan Review Household Questionnaire.

The Sherston Neighbourhood Plan (NDP) was made in 2019 following a successful referendum where over 92% of voters agreed that Wiltshire Council should use the Neighbourhood Plan to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area.

The NDP sets out policies, written by the community, that define the development and use of land in the Parish to cover the period to 2026. Our NDP can be viewed online at:

sherston.org.uk/sherston-neighbourhood-plan/

Since the NDP was made, we have seen a number of changes to the policy context that the NDP must conform to, such as the emerging Wiltshire Local Plan and the revised National Planning Policy. The policies in the NDP and some of the evidence base are therefore unfortunately now out of date. Sherston Parish Council has started work on preparing a revised Neighbourhood Plan. This is intended to cover the period to 2038 to align with Wiltshire's emerging Local Plan.

It is vital that the revised plan continues to reflect the views of the local community and, for this reason, it can be completed only with YOUR help. Nobody knows our parish better than those of us who live and work here. So please take this opportunity to express your views about a wide range of issues as set out in the questionnaire.

We hope that you will become involved by completing this questionnaire and help the Parish Council to deliver a Neighbourhood Plan that truly reflects local need. You can do this:

1. By returning a completed paper copy of the questionnaire to either the Co-op, The Angel or the Tolsey Surgery. (A hard copy was included in November's Cliffhanger)

2. By completing the questionnaire online by following the link below. forms.office.com/e/eYQVZrqpje
Or by using the QR Code

Each member of your household can have their say and complete a copy of the questionnaire. All responses will be used solely for preparing this Neighbourhood Plan. Your participation in this questionnaire, together with your individual responses to the questions asked, will be kept confidential and no one will be identifiable in any published results.

The deadline for completion of the questionnaire is 15 December 2024.

## Grow Greener@ Holy Cross ECO & CHURCH

#### Sherston Living Churchyard

Progress is being made in clearing the backlog of long grass in the rear of the churchyard. The recent period of dry weather has made areas accessible and the Community Payback Team did a lot of work during a whole day in early November. Another whole day visit is planned so let's hope for good weather so that work can continue.

Last month at our working party day, we planted yellow rattle seeds in one of the wildflower circles near the east end of the church. This is a native British wildflower which used to be widespread in hay meadows. It can still be found in a few fields around Sherston but changing agricultural practices mean that it is becoming a rarity in the wild. It is an annual plant and, if well-established, will seed itself from year to year. There were plants in the churchyard for some years but they were overwhelmed by the increasing rankness of the grass - which I described last month and so we're trying to re-establish them. Yellow rattle has a special role in allowing other flowers to flourish in grassland; it is semi-parasitic on the roots of grasses, greatly reducing their vigour and making space for other plants to grow. It has to be planted in autumn and some authorities advise trampling it into the ground to mimic the hooves of cattle which were put into hay fields after the cut to graze on the remaining grass. I found the seeds just stuck to the soles of my boots! I had to scrape them off and bang them into the ground with a rake head, hoping this would have the same effect. The seeds also need to be frosted in order to germinate and that could be a problem in our current mild winters. Late next spring will show if this planting has been successful.

## Local Author Talk: Saturday 25 January



Many of you will have known or heard of Hilary Peters. She called herself a part-time hermit and lived for the last 15 years of her life in Worcester Lodge, Didmarton, the gatehouse for the Badminton Estate - visible to us from many different places in our beautiful countryside around here.

As caretaker and gatekeeper, no one could have asked for more. Hilary would share her home with any stranger who wished to drop in, and impart her extensive knowledge of the Lodge and estate along with provision of her home-made refreshments. For those of us who knew her, she was the warmest and most truly sincere person we have probably met. The late Duke wished her to live in Worcester Lodge as 'she was the right person'.

Unbeknown to almost everyone, Hilary had been on a 'church crawl' - her words - around the churches of the North Wiltshire deanery, with a few of her close friends. She had mentioned to Catherine Price, who works for Malmesbury Abbey, about creating some sort of pilgrim way or passport, between these churches.

And then Hilary suddenly died. And by chance, I met Catherine.

My book, 'Past, Present, Presence' is an account of Hilary; her life, her achievements, and how she is the inspiration for the newly created Athelstan Pilgrim Way, linking over 30 churches that she visited and wrote brief notes about. My book is a companion guide to the Athelstan Pilgrim Way, and I talk about each of the churches, taking Hilary's thoughts, and discovering for myself the history, people, villages, communities and, of course, the churches, involved.

I am telling the story of what I discovered about Hilary and how the Athelstan Pilgrim Way came about from a conversation between two friends. Whether you knew Hilary, or would like to find out who she was, she is remembered for 'an extraordinary life well lived'.

Launched earlier this year in Malmesbury Abbey, the Athelstan Pilgrim Way includes Sherston, Alderton, Luckington and all the other churches in the Gauzebrook Group. Our patron is author and historian Tom Holland.

My talk is at Holy Cross church, Sherston, on Saturday 25 January, from 3.00pm. All are welcome, and refreshments will be available. I will also be signing copies of 'Past, Present, Presence'. For more information, please email sherston@gauzebrook.org

## Holy Cross News

We were pleased to welcome many visitors and members of our village community to our services in November: the special service for All Soul's Day gave us an opportunity to remember those who had passed away and to hold them dear to us in our hearts; we welcomed the Bishop of Swindon who confirmed 17 young people and adults from across the Diocese of Bristol in their Christian faith; Sherston School's Year 6 pupils and head Mr Towers visited with Reverend Alastair Davies to look at the war graves, hold a short service of remembrance at our war memorial at the lychgate and plant miniature crosses along the church path, each one representing one of the lives of Sherston's fallen in armed conflict; and there was the Act of Remembrance on Sunday 10 November in Church Street, attended by a large number of the community, including our uniformed youth groups and a marching detachment from 9 Regiment RLC (see front page for more on this).

Advent this year begins on Sunday 1 December, when we start our Advent journey to prepare for the coming of Christ on Christmas Day. On each of the four Sundays during Advent, we light a special purple or pink candle on the Advent Ring, culminating in the lighting of the white candle (representing purity) on Christmas Day – the birth of Christ. Join us as we light our second Advent candle on Sunday 8 December when we will be hosting the Gauzebrook Advent Service at 10.00am. This is always a great and atmospheric occasion to enjoy the music of Advent and to continue our journey towards the Birth of Christ. The service will be followed by mulled wine and mince pies.

Sherston School will be hosting 'Carols by Candelight' on Thursday 12 December at 5.00pm in church. Last year, this special service was notable for its wonderful atmosphere, fabulous congregational singing, readings and beautiful music. The church was lit almost completely by candlelight, creating much drama and excitement - amongst children and adults alike! The whole school will also come to church on the last day of term for their Christingle Service, which is in aid of the Children's Society – a charity that supports vulnerable children and young people facing abuse, exploitation and poor mental health. During the year, we have been treated to the wonderful sound of our bells ringing, not only for our Sunday services, but also to mark other special events. The Chippenham Branch of Bell Ringers, which includes Holy Cross, Sherston are holding their Carol Service on Saturday 14 December at 12.00noon. Of course, you will hear the bells first, please then do come and join them for their carol service.

Our own Community Carol Service will be on Sunday 23 December at 6.00pm when we will be hearing the Christmas Story in both prose and drama, and singing the traditional and favourite carols. Come and celebrate with us and share a glass of mulled wine afterwards.

On Christmas Eve, we will have two services: a nativity service at 3.00pm and our midnight communion at 11.00pm (please note the time, as this is different from recent years). Children and families love our popular nativity service but of course it is enjoyed by people of all ages. Our Crib marks the end of the Village Advent Trail (see page 7-8). It is always lovely to have a host of angels, shepherds, sheep, kings and the odd caravan of camels. So do come dressed as one of your favourite characters from the nativity story.

Our service on Christmas morning will be at 10.00am, with a family communion led by the Reverend Tom Hunton – a chance to sing the final verse of 'Oh come all ye faithful'!

Please don't forget our Christmas Bazaar in the village hall on Saturday 7 December. We'll be raising funds for the church, including our important project to renovate and repair our draughty windows, so we can do our bit for energy efficiency. We hope to see you at one or more of our services during Advent and Christmas, but if a peaceful church is more your style, please do come in for private prayer, as the church will be open during daylight hours.



At the end of October, Sherston Drama Group treated audiences to a hilarious retelling of Lewis Carroll's famous story, adapted for pantomime by Ben Crocker and directed by Katie Skeffington.

Eva Edgecombe played the title role of Alice with a perfect mix of curiosity and innocence. Joining Alice on her trip down a rabbit hole was Harry, acted with some lovely expressive touches by Kitty Strachan. Once in Wonderland, the pair encountered numerous well-known characters, including the perpetually late White Rabbit (played with well-judged agitation by Sienna Badman), the crazy Mad Hatter (played with suitable eccentricity by Mandi Bailey-Turner) and the equally crazy March Hare (brilliantly brought to life by Sarah Scherer).

Other favourite characters included Tweedledee and Tweedledum, played by Eliza Evelyn and Amelia Gliddon (who perfected the art of whacking each other over the head with a foam frying pan!), the Cheshire Cat, played with a grin by Andrea Sisson, and the very sweet but long-suffering dormouse, played by Rosie Thomas. Other Wonderlanders included playing-card soldiers and live plants and flowers (Oliver Brady, Bode Scherer-Cowell and Edie Thomas, who all put in great performances in their first pantomime).

Graeme Strachan played the Right Royal Red Queen of Hearts, entertaining the audiences with his (her?) terrible jokes and just about managing not to trip over his enormous dress. The Queen was supported by the King (Richard Warren), although he was mostly asleep and failed to help control their daughter Scarlett (acted with attitude by Tilly Baxter).

To save Wonderland from the villainous Wrong Queen, portrayed with menace by Sue Ormiston, Alice's mission was to retrieve a key from the fearsome Jabberwock (Bode Scherer-Cowell). But first Alice and Harry made a trip to the royal kitchens to bake some jam tarts with the 'help' of a flamingo (superb puppetry by Fergus Nicoll). In the kitchens, they also met the larger-than-life Duchess (Riaan Van Rooyen, with his dramatic sneezing) and the Cook (well-timed lines delivered by Judith Woolliams). Alice and Harry then set off for the Jabberwock.

The Wrong Queen deployed her army of 'Wrong

Rabbits' to thwart Alice's plans. Clive Whitehouse perfectly portrayed Bandersnatch, the most senior Wrong Rabbit, with Oli Kutchera and Fergus Nicoll playing Wrong Rabbit bandits Scar and Knuckles with great comic timing. Completing the Wrong Rabbit line-up was Bandersnatch's wife, Mrs Wrong Rabbit (portrayed with subtle ferocity by Tahiti Van Rooyen), and a gang of junior Wrong Rabbit bandits (Oliver Brady, Eliza Evelyn, Amelia Gliddon, Bode Scherer-Cowell, Edie Thomas and Rosie Thomas). However, good prevailed as Alice and friends dodged their schemes, survived an encounter with the Jabberwock, solved the mystery of some stolen tarts, took a trip through the looking glass and finally found the key and wound the great clock, saving Wonderland from certain despair.

Panto is a massive team effort and there isn't space to list everyone who contributed here. However, special mention must go to choreographers Helen Fisk and Sarah Scherer, who put together the incredible range of dances, songs and UV scenes featured in this show, as well as Debbie Luter, who took charge of organising the fantastical costumes and somehow managed to keep everything under control in the dressing room. Kate Kutchera did a brilliant job as backstage manager, Jenny Baxter, Sally Clayton and Helen Thomas shared the prompting, Paul Ormiston and Laura Edgecombe provided sound and light respectively, Vee Skeffington headed the front of house team, Helen Fisk ran the box office, Robin Turner, Sue Ormiston and Kirsty Strachan made the props and scenery, and Tea Smart took all the fantastic photos you can see here.

We're also very grateful for the financial help we received this year – the costumes for this production were sponsored by the Midcounties Co-operative, while grants from Sherston Parish Council, The Jack Lane Trust and The George Veterinary group have contributed towards a major upgrade of our lighting system, masterminded by Colin Wootton, as well as improvements to our sound system and staging.


