Flooding; Impact and Action



Monday 10 March, 7.00pm, British School Room £5 on the door, light refreshments available from 6.30pm

Please join Sustainable Sherston for an evening looking at global climate change, weather impacts and how that translates into very local impacts and actions for Sherston and the Bristol Avon. There will be a speaker panel with opportunities for audience questions.

The evening and audience panel will be chaired by Martin Smith, Wiltshire Councillor for the Sherston Ward. The evening will start with a short film from Cornwall Climate Stories, Down the Drain, which resonates strongly with Sherston's concerns. The film will be followed by our speakers: Dr Pete Jeffs, Melissa Hoskins and Richard Skeffington.

Dr Pete Jeffs, an active member of the Design School for Regenerating Earth, will be speaking on 'Resilience in the Bristol Avon Watershed, a microcosm of a worldwide view'. His talk will draw on a session held in Lacock last summer.

Melissa Hoskings of Bristol Avon Rivers Trust (BART) will talk about the practical issues affecting the Bristol Avon catchment area. BART is a charity, delivering education, land and river management advice and practical river restoration work.

Richard Skeffington, a long-time resident of Sherston, leads the Sustainable Sherston river sampling activity and is a former Professor of Physical Geography at Reading University. Richard will discuss how Storm Bert and related flooding affected Sherston.

The evening will conclude with a panel of the speakers taking audience questions.

Please report village maintenance jobs!




Please help Sherston Parish Council identify maintenance tasks that need doing in our village by notifying the Parish Council's clerk or Wiltshire Council.

The Parish Council's own maintenance crew are responsible for the recreation ground, the play equipment, the sports field and the hedges around our allotments. They also cut back vegetation along our footpaths, and sweep and weed our pavements. Please email our clerk with any jobs on clerk@ sherston.org.uk.

Wiltshire Council's responsibilities include our roads, the road hedges and signs, and highways drainage. We are as frustrated as you are about the poor state of our potholed roads which Wiltshire Council struggle to maintain with their constrained highways budget. It's still worth reporting problems to them as they should get to them eventually. Please report issues on Wiltshire Council's website or using the 'MyWilts' application (app).

To report using the Wiltshire Council Website, type Wiltshire Council into your search bar and you should be presented with the following screen:



Click the MyWilts highlighted by the red arrow and it should be pretty straightforward from there.

Alternatively, you can log issues using the MyWilts Application (app) which is available to download on to most smart phones from the Google Play or Apple App Stores.

The MyWilts App allows you to report issues as you come across them, mark the location on its digital map and attach your photos. Thank you for your help.



Sherston Neighbourhood Plan Review:

Come along and have your say!



Drop-in event at Sherston Village Hall, Saturday 8 March, 10.00am-4.00pm


Sherston Parish Council is progressing with the next stage of the Neighbourhood Plan Review.

As a reminder, Wiltshire Council's draft Local Plan sets out a housing requirement for Sherston of an additional 87 homes by 2028. Our existing Neighbourhood Plan already contains three allocations which together would deliver 52 homes. These, along with other existing commitments in the village, means the residual still to be planned for is 30 new homes. We are looking to plan for these additional 30 homes as part of the Neighbourhood Plan Review. By allocating additional land for housing in our neighbourhood plan, the community is able to shape development in our village, as well as communicate our expectations and aspirations for where housing should go, what it should look like and what infrastructure would be needed to support it. In order to do this, we have commenced the first step in our site selection process.

A total of 10 sites have been assessed to consider if they would be potentially appropriate for allocation in the Plan. These sites were identified through a 'call for sites' exercise which we undertook over the spring and summer last year, as well as including those on Wiltshire Council's housing land database (known as the Strategic Housing and Economic Land Availability Assessment - SHELAA). This first step involved a Red, Amber, Green (RAG) assessment to determine which sites were not suitable for allocation at the current time due to overriding constraints and those that were potentially suitable for allocation and hence considered worthy of further consideration. The full complement of sites assessed by this method is shown on the map below.

The RAG assessment has concluded that six of these sites are potentially suitable and available but have constraints – some significant – which would need to be overcome if they are to be selected in due course. For the avoidance of doubt, this assessment does not propose to allocate all of these areas of land for development but simply identifies the six potential sites that are to be carried forward to the next stage of the site selection process and subjected to more detailed evaluation. As part of this process, we are seeking to understand where the community's preferred location for development is.

The community views, alongside a more detailed appraisal of each of these sites against the Neighbourhood Development Plan objectives, will inform what land is eventually proposed to be allocated as part of our neighbourhood plan review to meet the residual requirement of 30 dwellings. It is important to highlight that these 30 dwellings do not have to be provided on a single site. It is the purpose of the Neighbourhood Plan Review to decide where and how much of any site can be developed to meet the residual requirement.



We are holding a drop-in day on Saturday 8 March, 10.00am-4.00pm, in Sherston Village Hall where the results of the above-mentioned assessment will be presented, and where you will have the opportunity to speak to members of the Working Party and the appointed planning consultants. All of this information, including the methodology and full details of the site assessments will be available on the Parish Council website from the Saturday 8 March: sherston.org.uk/ sherston-neighbourhood-plan/

Private vs NHS

Due to some lengthy delays in NHS waiting times for hospital appointments, it is sadly not surprising that many patients are choosing to go private instead. However, many are then left frustrated and upset when they have to pay for a private prescription as they feel they should be able to get it from their GP. The NHS has very clear guidance about this and states that any new treatment recommended by a private consultant must be issued by them. Once the patient is stabilised on the medication then the prescription can transfer to the NHS GP. We have had several instances recently where patients have become quite irate as they were not aware of this policy.

A memorial service is taking place on Saturday 15 March at 12.00 noon at the Holy Cross Church in Sherston for Anthony Neal, fondly known as Tony, who sadly passed away in December last year age 82 years old. Afterwards there will be

Our Precious Countryside Gone Forever

Goss Croft Hall in Upper Seagry had standing room only on Monday 3 February for a meeting hosted by the Stop Lime Down steering committee – just as full as it had been in Sherston Village Hall two days earlier.

Many in the audience had been aware of the Lime Down Solar proposal, but the details outlined by the speakers, Sir Mike Pitt, (former Chair and Chief Executive of the Planning and Inspectorate), Professor Richard Skeffington, (an scientist environmental and hydrology expert) left them stunned, shocked and outraged.

The meeting was one of four in the week hosted by Stop Lime Down to update local residents on the solar scheme and to explain how to tackle the consultation feedback questionnaire.

Sir Mike Pitt set out the timetable explaining that we are at the second consultation stage in Q1 2025 where Lime Down developers are holding local meetings to brief residents and take feedback. It would also be an opportunity for residents to ask them questions. Then follows the developers' formal application to the Planning Inspectorate, and then a lengthy examination of the application, after which it is either recommended or rejected by the Planning Inspector to Ed Miliband, Secretary of State for Energy, Security and Net Zero. However, of most concern to all is that Ed Miliband has recently approved schemes that the Planning Inspectorate have rejected. It is his prerogative but alarming just the same.

Of even bigger concern to residents attending was Richard Skeffington's presentation regarding the solar panels themselves – up to 4.5m high, that is the size of a double-decker bus, and a huge banner was displayed to bring this height to life. Panels, usually static, are planned to be tracking, moving with the sun with accompanying noise. And will any hedges grow 4.5m high to screen them?

Other noise worries will be from conversion units, 130 in the scheme, each the size of seven shipping containers, with cooling fans creating noise, hum and water run-off. On top of this will be 33 kV substations, 25 of them 4m high and 3x 132kV substations 7m high covering 9000m², but these are nothing compared with the huge battery storage unit at Hullavington, 13m high and covering 42,500 m².

The construction will take two years, with the destruction of hedgerows as tracks are widened, and the subsequent compaction and contamination of



soil as up to 104 HGV are due to be visiting the site daily, let alone the 500 workers travelling there in buses and cars. Questions were raised as to the suitability of our country lanes for this influx.

Richard also briefed the meeting on the cable routes between the 5 sites and the link to Melksham (as wide as a football pitch) and pondered whether once the cables are in place there would be additional solar panel development to capitalise on the installation. He mentioned the flooding issue caused by so much concrete and hard surfaces affecting the delicate nature of the Gauzebrook and the Avon, recently experienced in local flooding after storm Bert.

A number of residents were quick to raise their concerns at the end of the presentation. What about safeguarding food production on our good agricultural land? What will happen to the sites after decommissioning - further development on a brownfield site? How can MP's be lobbied to turn against such irresponsible developments? Is solar suitable? - no, the UK is the second lowest country in the world suitable for solar energy. Why not rooftops, not on land? Who gains from this development? - well the landowners, eventually, but the overall profit will go abroad and the electricity to the general grid, not locally. Tourism and landscape were flagged as an issue as the sites will be seen from a distance - Chipping Sodbury to Minety and in clear view of Malmesbury.

Understandably there were many more questions to be answered but the meeting was brought to a close by Hugh Roche who encouraged, nay exhorted anyone with concerns to attend the Lime Down meetings in February, ask questions and then list their concerns on their feedback questionnaire – to 'have your say'. The consultation period ends on Wednesday 19 March.

VE Day 80th Anniversary: Thursday 8 May



Our grounds and beyond: Thank you Mr Brown


Our learning environment is as unique as our approach to education, and much of this is thanks to the tireless efforts of Mr Brown. His commitment

Martin's Tour Aotearoa Bike-packing challenge

Hi, I'm Martin Weaver. As you read this, I will have already started on my toughest cycling challenge yet! An event that involves cycling mainly off-road from the northernmost tip of New Zealand to the southernmost tip of New Zealand, whilst carrying everything I need and camping every night.

The event - The Tour Aoteraoa is a 3,000km cycling odyssey, with around 100,000 ft of ascent, following a set route and taking no less than 10 days and no more than 30 days.

Sherston Living Churchyard Churchyard Churchyard

It was once again cold and grey for our February meeting, but we are a hardy bunch and were out there raking cut grass, tidying and preparing the churchyard for the growth to come. Now that a lot of the grass is short, it is easy to see the mounds of the yellow meadow ant on the west side of the churchyard. These ants are only found in the unworked grassland of ancient meadows and churchyards, a habitat which is becoming ever rarer. With 8,000-40,000 ants in each hill, they are a valuable food source for certain birds such as green woodpeckers. The ant hills also offer sites for particular small plants and mosses to grow because they offer warmer and drier soil than the surrounding sward

Are you a dog or cat owner? Do you use a flea treatment which is applied directly to the animal's fur? Scientists at the University of Sussex have just reported research (in Science of the Total Environment) that showed that all of 103 blue tit and great tit nests sampled, which are lined with animal fur, were contaminated by these treatments. Two pesticides banned from agricultural use in the UK are still widely, and legally, used by vets to treat dogs and cats. The study found a higher number of unhatched eggs and dead chicks in the nests with the greatest contamination. These chemicals have already been proven to be present in UK watercourses and to affect life there. What can you do about this? Ask your vet if routine treatment is necessary or if it could be less frequent. If you brush your animal outside clear up the fur so birds do not pick it up as a nesting material. Apparently it has previously been suggested that leaving this fur out for birds to collect would be helpful to them but this research has shown that it is actually killing them.

Our churchyard is very easily accessible and many people walk through it every day. If you haven't done so recently, do go and look at everything that has been achieved over the past year. We will be back there from 9.30am on Saturday 1 March. Would you like to help with our churchyard project? Have you got any knowledge or skills that could help bring success? If so, do please get in touch. More volunteers would increase what we can do and support our overall vision to 'Make Holy Cross churchyard a haven on earth for people and wildlife'.

The first plant sale of 2025 will run from Saturday 1 until Thursday 6 March by the church porch. Bring and buy good-value plants with all proceeds to Sherston Living Churchyard funds.



Extension of Athelstan Pilgrim Way set for spring launch


Saturday 5 April will mark the launch of an additional 30-mile section of the Athelstan Pilgrim Way, a free environmentally friendly walking route linking the historic churches of North Wiltshire. The pilgrimage route, which is a Church of England initiative, will eventually extend to around 100 miles. The first 35-mile section was launched at Malmesbury Abbey in June 2024, with a talk by historian and broadcaster Tom Holland as part of the Athelstan 1100 celebrations. The new section includes a further 12 churches in the Woodbridge and Draycot benefices and is located between Malmesbury and Chippenham.

The launch event will take place at St Peter & St Paul Church, Great Somerford (SN15 5HZ) on Saturday 5 April at 2.30pm, with a talk by writer, environmentalist and broadcaster Martin Palmer. Martin co-founded the internationally renowned Alliance of Religions and Conservation with HRH Prince Philip, and is also the author of Sacred Land. Martin will talk on 'Walking Gently: From Sacred Land to Storied Churches'.

The launch event will include a performance by Malmesbury Choir, and an exhibition of photographic artwork by our artist in residence, Sheona Beaumont. Malmesbury Choir was established in 2014 and has entertained audiences mainly in the Malmesbury Abbey or Malmesbury Town Hall ever since. Sheona's six-month residency on the Athelstan Pilgrim Way will explore the relationship between faith and the landscape through visual art. She will introduce her work with a short talk, and the church will be open from 1.30pm for refreshments and an opportunity to view the artwork.

Tickets for the event, priced £15 (children £5), will be available from the Athelstan 1100 website (https://athelstan1100.co.uk/) from 10 March. Free parking will be available opposite the church.

Following the launch, there will be an organised 1.5-mile walk to the church of St James the Great, Dauntsey, where there will be a short talk by Carole Britton, author of Past Present Presence: The Companion



Guide, which follows the journeys of Hilary Peters, who inspired the Athelstan Pilgrim Way.

An extended 10-mile pilgrimage walk on the morning of Saturday 5 April is also being run in partnership with the Diocese of Bristol's Rhythm of Life initiative. This will begin at Malmesbury Abbey in time for arrival at Great Somerford by 1.30pm. Rhythm of Life is a year-long exploration of devotional Christian practices, including pilgrimage, with contributions from the Bishop of Bristol and the Bishop of Swindon.

On Sunday 6 April, there will be a pilgrimage walk from All Saints Church, Sutton Benger (SN15 4RP) at 2.00pm. This will be a circular walk, calling in at All Saints Church, Christian Malford, and returning to Sutton Benger by around 4.30pm for a short optional pilgrimage service.
