Watch out for car-park payment scams



Although no incidents have been reported in Wiltshire, there have been cases elsewhere where scammers have placed fake QR codes on parking signage. Scanning these codes can direct you to fraudulent websites designed to capture your payment details. To avoid being caught out, always:

- Check machines for anything unusual

- Check that the website address is legitimate

Alternatively, pay for your parking using the relevant parking app, or by using cash or card at the parking machine.

Scammers are also sending texts about supposed parking fines so please watch out for these too (see example below). Be wary of messages demanding immediate payment with no details of where or when the parking violation occurred, especially if they include suspicious links or are sent from an unknown number. Legitimate parking fines are typically issued via physical letters, not text messages. If you receive a suspicious text, do not click any links, and verify the claim with the issuing authority directly. Legitimate parking fines will be addressed to you personally with your vehicle registration number, not just a general message.

Weight-loss medication on the NHS

We are starting to get enquiries from patients believing that, as of the end of June, GPs can prescribe certain injectable medications for weight loss if patients meet set criteria. Unfortunately, at the time of writing we regret to inform our patients that GP practices have not yet been commissioned to prescribe this treatment. The ICB have shared messaging with the public and have kindly asked patients not to contact their GP practice with requests for weight-loss treatment at this time.

Teaching Nomination

We are pleased to report that at the end of the academic year, the Tolsey Surgery was shortlisted for a Best Teaching Award by the University of Bristol. Unfortunately, we were not successful on this occasion but we did receive some very positive and glowing feedback from medical students who had spent time at the practice. We are extremely grateful to all our patients who help with the teaching of medical students at the surgery.

Celebrating together: Sherston's vibrant spirit







Sherston Living Churchyard ECO & CHURCH







In early July, the churchyard working party began to remove some of the long grass, raking off areas cut a few days earlier by the Community Payback team. In contrast with much of the weather recently, we worked through periods of drizzle but it was not wet enough to make us break off from our efforts. Sadly, a young hedgehog was found dead that morning. It was too small to be one of those released into the churchyard and was probably one of this year's youngsters. Given the very hot dry weather this spring and summer, it is quite likely that it died from hunger and/or thirst. Slugs are one of the hedgehog's favourite foods but these creatures are keeping well hidden to save themselves from drying up. Gardeners will probably be very pleased about this, but please spare a thought for the hedgehogs which are a gardener's friend as they can remove so many of these pests. Leaving out a shallow dish of water could be a lifesaver for a hedgehog, as well as many insects which are also suffering in the current conditions.

A survey of butterflies in the churchyard in early July discovered eight species - large, small and greenveined whites, meadow brown, ringlet, gatekeeper, speckled wood and peacock. This is a 'good' year for them, although generally their numbers are in serious decline. It's good to know that our churchyard is playing a small part in their continued existence by providing the right conditions for them to prosper.

Our next working party will be on Saturday 2 August from 9.00am and I look forward to seeing you there. The plant stall is now closed until next spring but should be back in March 2026.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Tricia Lawrence for her hard work and enthusiasm for the Living Churchyard over the past two years. She is stepping back from some of her many commitments and will no longer be taking a lead role in the churchyard.

We have already had many visitors to our church this summer, as during the recent heatwave, we were one of the coolest places around. Don't forget that we will be open during the next heatwave!



The National Churches Trust, along with the Wiltshire Historic Churches Trust, is once again promoting the annual Ride+Stride (https://ridestride.org/) to raise funds specifically for the care and repair of historic churches. If you would like to take part by walking, cycling or riding on Saturday 13 September, please contact sherston@gauzebrook.org for more details. Most churches nationwide will be open on the day for the bike ride so, even if you are not taking part directly, do take the opportunity to visit some amazing places: you could use the Athelstan Pilgrim Way (https://athelstanpilgrimway.org/) as a guide for your travels.









Phew, it's a scorcher! What can we do about climate change?



With temperatures recently reaching 32°C in Sherston and surrounding villages - and 31°C on Boules Day - we are all now starting to feel the impact of our changing climate. The latest data from the Met Office shows that, in the last decade, the number of days exceeding 32°C (90°F) in each county of the UK has more than trebled compared to 1961-1990 (1961–1990 is widely used for historical comparison, climate change monitoring, and climate modelling).

The cause? High levels of CO₂ emissions because of our use of fossil fuels (oil, coal and gas), which trap the Earth's heat - the 'greenhouse effect'. The main culprits are: transport (cars, ships and planes); building construction and heating buildings; industry (manufacturing and other industrial processes); agriculture (intensively farmed livestock, fertilisers plus global land use changes); power generation and waste (landfills, incineration).

We express our energy usage as our 'carbon footprint' and most of it is carbon dioxide (CO₂) but nitrous oxide (N₂O) and methane are also products of the way we live. For calculation purposes, they can be converted into 'carbon dioxide equivalent emissions' and this helps get us to the overall picture.

Have we got so used to the way we live that we can't change this? There are many solutions at an individual level.

Fossil fuels

Most important!! The use of fossil fuels - common in processing, packaging, refrigeration, waste, transportation and manufacturing goods - is the biggest producer of human-caused CO₂ emissions.

Plastic

One of the main culprits. Refuse plastic packaging! See how many plastic items you can do without.

Meat

Look for low-input farms (minimum fertilisers and pesticides) with small numbers of livestock. This minimises climate emissions and improves the health of soils and the amount of carbon they can store.

Energy

Fossil fuels are still used to power agricultural equipment and for raising crops and livestock.

We should support moves to renewable energies - solar and wind (and tidal when we have good enough technology) - while being cautious about them being in competition with productive farmland and mindful of the long-term intentions of investors.

Houses and home-heating

Broadly, think about insulating your home start with thick curtains and double glazing. For home heating, many plumbing engineers will still recommend oil boilers, but air source heat pumps can win on efficiency, especially when a house is insulated. Talk to several suppliers before deciding! **Transport**

A new Electric Car Grant of £3,750 has just been introduced. Doubtless, electric cars are the least polluting but are still expensive. And manufacturing them uses large batteries as well as the usual bodywork, brakes and tyres. The situation will improve when the power on our electric grid is 100% from renewable sources.

Trees

Plant trees! Trees draw down huge quantities of CO₂ from the atmosphere. Cutting down trees releases the CO₂ back into the atmosphere. Support the use of trees in agricultural systems (agroforestry, sylvopasture).

Peat

Peatland, bogs and marshes can store vast amounts of CO₂. Draining bogs and harvesting peat do the opposite. Look for peat-free compost (quite a new product, so look for a consistency that works for your planting).

Soil

This is the source of plant growth, so its health is critical. Underground fungal networks (a bit like roots) - called mycorrhizal networks - help plants absorb nutrients. This is why 'no dig' gardening is becoming popular. Don't disturb your soil more than you need to for planting! Plant deep-rooted plants to improve the soil structure and keep plants in the ground all year.

Biodiversity

When farms grow single crops (monoculture) over large areas, fewer insects are supported, so biodiversity is reduced. This makes crops susceptible to disease and reduces pollination.

Even in your own back garden, grow a variety of flowers, fruit and veg to encourage pollinators and protect from predators.

Climate emergency

In 2019, the UK Parliament passed a motion declaring a climate and ecological emergency, though no legal obligations were added to the Climate Change Act of 2008.

Also in 2019, Wiltshire Council declared a climate emergency and set legally binding targets to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 50% by 2050. However, its actions are limited to its areas of responsibility: local transport; local house planning; schools; the care of older people; waste management; local police and water supplies.

To take action on these issues at a local and individual level and help us all move into a climate-secure future, join the Sustainable Sherston group for our monthly meetings at the Rattlebone.




