Antisocial behaviour

Recently, our village has experienced a bout of antisocial behaviour and vandalism late in the evening and in the early hours. The police have been called, have attended numerous times and are investigating to identify the culprits.

Houses on Court Street and, to a lesser extent, Church Street have been targeted by youths throwing things and banging on the doors. We are reasonably sure they are youths as they have been observed from upstairs windows. Items being thrown include lumps of concrete and, on one occasion, a heavy plastic pot containing ornamental grass was flung at the door. Offenders also scaled a tall wall of a property in Court Street entering the garden and beating on a back door.

During recent episodes, one house was targeted multiple times: at approximately 1.00am on Saturday 9 August; between 11.00pm and midnight on Sunday 10 August; and just after 11.00pm on Monday 11 August. These attacks are causing distress to residents, as well as damage to property. On each occasion, the police have attended, and will be taking an active interest in this type of behaviour moving forward.

The Parish Council would like to hear from any other residents who have similarly been affected and ask anyone with doorbell cameras or CCTV to see if they have recordings of any groups out at the times above.

Wiltshire Police encourage people to report all crimes and antisocial behaviour via wiltshirepolice.uk or the non-emergency phone line 101.

Please note that in 2026, Sherston Boules Day will take place one week earlier than usual, on Saturday 4 July, instead of our traditional weekend closest to Bastille Day.

This change has been made due to a scheduling clash with the RHS Flower Show at Badminton, which will be held from 8 to 12 July, i.e. over the weekend we would typically host the festival.

We've made the decision to move the Boules Festival to avoid this overlap and ensure that both events can be enjoyed by the community.

Speeding update



You will hopefully have seen by now that, following the installation of the 20mph signs around the village, roundels have now been be painted on the road. Wiltshire Highways is also looking at what else can be done to better protect pedestrians on Brook Hill. It's a complicated area which is providing them with a challenge as to what they can do while keeping within the regulations.

New SID

Willesley

Some of you will have noticed that a new Speed Indicator Device (SID) has been installed on Tetbury Road. This involved getting agreement from Wiltshire Highways for the positioning of the SID, getting agreement from the Parish Council to pay for it and helping Cllr Nigel Freeth install it. This road has some of the more excessive speeds recorded around Sherston. I hope that locals will respect the speed limit there and set an example to other road users who may be just passing through. The Community Speed Watch (CSW) group will continue its work in that area and I will be requesting further visits from Wiltshire Police to enforce the speed limit. Many thanks to Keith Savage for setting up the CSW team and thanks in advance to Cllr Nigel Freeth who is now taking on the leadership role in Keith's place.

Following a request from the Parish Council, Wiltshire Highways is recommending a speed limit of 30mph through Willesley. Given the speed data collected, I'm challenging them as to why they don't think 20mph is appropriate. This report needs to be considered by the Parish Council at their September meeting.

Sherston's Mystery Cook

Last July, there was a last-minute call for cakes for the famous Duck Race teas. Homemade cakes were needed, so here's a recipe. My mum always said, for a Victoria sponge, 'the weight of egg, in fat, flour and sugar'. Sorry Mum, I am also going to add two level teaspoons of baking powder to the self-raising flour. The trick is to weigh your eggs, then it doesn't matter how many eggs or how big or little they are. Repeat the mantra: the weight of egg in fat, flour and sugar. Start! Put the oven on at 350°/180°. Grease two identical tins.

In a mixing bowl, cream the eggs and sugar. Break in one egg with a flop of flour (roughly a third). Repeat twice. Pour the mixture into your identical tins. Your oven should be at temperature now. Cook for roughly 25 mins until golden and softish to touch. When cool, spread your favourite jam in the middle of the two halves.

September plant sale

Plants will be for sale outside Well Cottage, 6 Cliff Road, throughout September, with all proceeds going to Sherston School's Greenfingers Gardening Club.

We welcomed new members at Greenfingers for our summer term and continued to learn about the importance to the health of our planet - and ourselves - of soil and compost, habitats, biodiversity and trees, water, and pollinators.

We sowed seeds of lots of different flowers and vegetables, potted on and out in our keyhole gardens and saw the flowers and vegetables develop. We learnt about propagation and how collecting seeds is the simplest and cheapest way to get more plants. We harvested the broad beans sown in the spring and collected their seeds, thus completing the circle of sowing a seed, helping it grow, seeing it flower and produce pods, and then collecting seeds ready for next year.

Each session ends with quiet time when we consider the 'five ways to wellbeing':

- Connecting with each other and asking questions,
- Being active by digging and raking,
- Taking notice of our surroundings by listening, looking, smelling, feeling and tasting - especially delicious raspberries!
- Learning new facts each week, and
- Giving by sharing food and being kind.

Hopefully, a shelter will be built in time for the start of the new school year this month - thanks to support from Sustainable Sherston while we source other funding, and £200 from Whatley Manor raised at the Garage Sale in June. Thanks also go to Ann Booth, Gail Whale and Marion King who help us and the children each week.

Grab a crabapple for a jelly good cause







This September, award-winning condiment-maker Tracklements is encouraging the local community to don their wellies, take a walk in the countryside and start collecting crabapples for a terrific cause!.

Tracklements is once again partnering with Sherston Primary School to collect crabapples to make English Crabapple Jelly. A forager's delight, crabapples are small, 'wild' apples which, while hard and inedible raw, make an exquisite, jewel-coloured jelly. Associated with love and marriage, crabapple trees can often be found nestled in British hedgerows. For every kilogram of crabapples donated, 50p is given to the school, as well as a further 25p from the sale of every jar sold nationwide. Running for over 20 years, the project has raised almost £15,000.

As a certified B Corp, Tracklements is committed to using business as a force for good. The crabapple project is a perfect example of this ethos in action. Not only does it raise vital funds for Sherston Primary School, it's also a great way to teach Sherston's young people about the provenance of their food by showing them the process from tree to jar, as well as using fruit which may otherwise go to waste. Last year, we held a label design competition for the children at Sherston School, so look out for the winning artwork on this year's jars (see above).

You can either drop off your collected crabapples directly at Tracklements (Whitewalls, SN16 0RD) between 9.00am and 5.00pm Monday to Friday before 30 September or you can drop them off in the box outside Sherston School.

If crabappling isn't your thing but you still want to help the school, buying a jar of this scrumptious jelly gives the school a donation while you enjoy it with sausages or roast pork!

Sherston Apple Day 2025





Our fifth Apple Day, taking place on Sunday 12 October, is shaping up to be the most exciting yet, with the Friends of Sherston School providing games, face painting and a bouncy castle!

In addition, Luckington Farm is coming with a BBQ and their high-quality meat for sale; Ros from Adeline's Farm is bringing fruit and veg; and The Tetbury Flower Company is offering beautiful blooms (having just won a 'Silver Gilt' medal at the Hampton Court Flower Show!). Chris Exton will have Malmesbury Honey on sale, alongside superb olive oil from Sicily (from Sarah and Paolo, the growers in Malmesbury) and cheeses from Armadeli.

We will be judging the apple juice label artwork - all done by children at Sherston School - at the start of the new term, ready for Paul Ormiston (Compass Graphics) to create the bottled apple juice labels!

We are collecting surplus apples from Sunday 21 September, in a huge bag outside the village hall (between the wooden shed and the hall). Apple pressing starts in September and we welcome all helpers! Call Eleanor or email Sustainable Sherston (details below) to tell us what suits you. It could just be 30 minutes of apple washing, or 'scratting'

and pressing! On bottling days, there is lots to do, rinsing or filling bottles, capping them, or helping the pasteurising team. If you can spare an hour or two, the dates for pressing and bottling are:

Session one: Thursday 25 September, 2.00pm-6.30pm, pressing; and Friday 26 September, 2.00pm-6.30pm, bottling and pasteurising.

Session two: Tuesday 30 September, from 2.00pm, pressing; and Wednesday 1 October, from 2.00pm, bottling and pasteurising.


Session three: Monday 6 October, from 2.00pm, pressing; and Tuesday 7 October, from 2.00 pm, bottling and pasteurising.

Remembering 'Shortie': The Mike Shortridge Memorial Cup returns

For those who didn't know Mike Shortridge - affectionately known as 'Shortie' - he was a true stalwart of Sherston, having lived in the village his entire life. Mike was more than just a familiar face; he was the heartbeat of the community. Known for his quick wit, infectious humour, and unwavering kindness, he was involved in every corner of village life - from local events to lending a hand wherever it was needed.

Mike bravely battled bowel cancer for seven years, showing incredible strength and spirit throughout. His passing in May 2021 left a deep void in Sherston, but his memory continues to bring people together in celebration and support.

He was an avid participant in what was originally The Rattlebone Golf Society, a group that brought together local golf enthusiasts for friendly competition and camaraderie. In honour of Mike, the society evolved into the Mike Shortridge Memorial Cup, a heartfelt tribute to a man who gave so much to the community and brought joy to so many.

The golf day has become a cherished tradition, with the previous two years drawing fantastic turnouts and plenty of laughter - just the way Mike would have wanted it. This year promises to be just as special, and everyone is welcome to join us on the day, whether you're golfing or simply coming along to enjoy the atmosphere and celebrate Mike's legacy.

The day continues at 6.30pm back in Sherston at the Rattlebone Inn, where the grand raffle will be drawn. Sherston Living Churchyard







Have you noticed the golden colour of the long grass in the churchyard? I think it's a beautiful sight, especially when the low sun is shining through it at the start or end of the day. This is a result of our long, hot dry summer and not something we usually see. A couple of years ago, after a very wet summer, the grass was very tall and green in August. The churchyard varies enormously from year to year with the weather. It seems that our climate is changing to be hotter so we may see grass like this in the late summer more often.

Our August working party had a beautiful day but was somewhat down in number. Many people were away, but thank you to those who were able to come and worked hard to tidy the front of the churchyard. Unfortunately, the Community Payback team arrived this month with no strimmers! This has meant that much less long grass has been cut back than I would have hoped by this time of year and there is still quite a lot of clearing to do. I hope for dry weather into the autumn and lots of strimming at the beginning of September so that we can catch up with what needs doing.









Sustainable Sherston river testing









Sustainable Sherston's river testers have now completed two years of testing the quality of the River Avon every month, from Luckington Meadow down to Easton Grey. In the present drought situation, our results can explain some of the things you see if you take a walk by the river.

Some parts of the river look good, as in The Grove, with some clean gravels (which hide a healthy population of invertebrates) and modest plant growth. Others are not so good, as in the Didmarton branch of the river near Stretchline, which is currently choked with fools watercress, duckweed and green algae. Why the difference?

In the present drought situation, the upper part of the main river is essentially kept flowing by Wessex Water pumping groundwater into the stream channel upstream of Luckington. This is to compensate for the abstraction of drinking water — without this input, the river would probably now be dry upstream of Brook End, and very low elsewhere. Groundwater has a constant temperature throughout the year of 12-13°C, which keeps summer water temperatures down. The Didmarton branch is normally kept flowing by Crowdown Springs, also of groundwater, but this year the Springs have dried and, although Wessex Water can supplement the river by borehole water here



too, this was not done until very recently. When the photographs above were taken, the water temperatures were 16.1°C in The Grove and 23.7°C at Stretchline, which is stress level for some organisms, such as brown trout. Higher temperatures mean faster plant growth, and the amount of growth is increased by the nutrients phosphate and nitrate in the water. Compared to lower down the river, our phosphate concentrations are in fact low, though in summer this is largely due to the extensive plant growth taking the phosphate up! Nitrate has also reduced this summer but, as there is a hundred times more nitrate than phosphate, the plants can't remove it completely. Lower flows also mean algae have a longer time to grow and plants don't get swept away. So the combination of nutrients, low flows and high temperatures is putting the river under stress, and we can only hope for some rain soon!

More on our results later in the year.

200th anniversary of Sherston Congregational Church!

SHERSTON



Two-hundred years ago, a barn in Cliff Road was purchased by a small group of believers in order to establish a chapel. This group had been meeting since 1822, when preachers from Bristol (probably Wesleyan and on horseback) had come regularly to the village and formed a fellowship. The barn served as a place of worship for 189 years - until 2014. It is now a private residence but still proudly displays the founding date of 1825.

Congregational churches were, and still are, founded and funded entirely by their own congregation, and are consequently free to follow whatever collective guidance the members receive through prayer. Originally, as dissenting folk, our forefathers were determined to be 'free' (non-conformist), so resisted national authority. This meant that some suffered poverty, imprisonment, even martyrdom; others travelled to the New World with the Pilgrim Fathers.

Sherston's traders, butchers, bakers, tailors, farmworkers and humble country-folk gave so generously over those 200 years that our village legacy now includes our modernised place of worship, the British School Room (BSR), one residential property (now our main income), a memorial garden (behind the old barn chapel) and provides employment

for three personnel for BSR management, regular cleaning and bookkeeping/accounting.

Through both world wars, Sherston Congregational Church was very well attended and active but, by the year 2000 was reduced, sadly, to just one attending member, Lily Rice, who found herself responsible, with no funds whatsoever, for three decaying buildings. Had she died that year, the Congregational Federation would have been duty-bound to sell all three properties and give the resulting funds to other chapels in the south-west region.

Consequently, at that point, some of us decided to help Lily and the story of all that has happened since then is told on the walls of the BSR lobby, with photographs so all can understand this recent history any time they are in the building.

The aim in the original School Room deeds remains unchanged: 'For the advancement of the Christian faith'. For this, we work with believers from all local churches. Times change but gospel truth remains and offers the whole community hope and strength to face the future.

To celebrate and commemorate the 200 years of 'salt and light', we intend to unveil a plaque donated by 'The Singalong Club' on Thursday 30 October. Cheese and wine (or tea and coffee) will be served from 7.00pm. Memorabilia (even 'temperance medals' from the time there were 13 pubs in Sherston) will be on display. If you enjoy using our premises, or remember times past with affection, or would just like to look around for the very first time, we invite you to join our 200th anniversary celebration.


